Dear Parents and Students:

As a young woman in college, I had the wonderful experience of attending school in Germany. The year was back in the Pleistocene Age (1972-73), before cell phones and before the Internet. I relied on letters delivered to American Express for correspondence, and an international phone call required hours of planning and waiting. As a result, the world felt like a much larger place, and even in Europe, one could at times feel isolated and remote. Because of this, I was always attuned to the sound of an English voice. I could be traveling in a remote fjord in Norway or in the center of Paris, and when I heard that English voice, I would seek it out. "Where are you from?" would begin the exchange, and whether it was Minnesota or Australia, we were instant neighbors and old friends because of the connection of our language. Language has this unifying effect; when we share a language, we experience an intense sense of belonging. In the book of Acts, when the Apostles were gathered and received the gift of the Holy Spirit, they began speaking of God's glories-and each person who heard the message heard it in his or her own language. Those listening had an instant connection to both the message and the speakers. Familiar words fell on understanding ears, and a sense of belonging was the result. This was an essential part of the establishment of the Church-building a sense of community.

The work of the Holy Spirit will always result in building unity; and as we begin a new school year, I am happy to report that unity is alive and well at Christian Brothers High School. When Christians live in any kind of community, like that at Christian Brothers, we have a tendency to have friction with one another. This is evidence of our self-centered human natures at work which can have us hurt, exclude, harm, and tear down. But what Christ's Spirit stretches us to do is to help, to include, to comfort, and to build up. In all Catholic communities, we share the same spirit of Christ, regardless of our differences, and our spirits come together with God's Spirit to create that sense of community that we both

cherish and desire. A vital core principle of a Lasallian school is Inclusive Community – we include and respect not just the ones we like and befriend, but everyone in our community.

At Christian Brothers, we also share a common language - not just English, but the Lasallian language best recognized in the prayer which is recited by students and staff at the beginning of each class, meeting, or activity: "Let us remember..., that we are in the holy presence of God; Live, Jesus, in our hearts... forever." No matter where one is in the world, any Lasallian, when hearing that prompt, will instantly respond. While its repeated use has the danger of becoming simply rote, it can also form that connection and belonging I mentioned previously. I believe that our students carry with them, both during their years at Christian Brothers and beyond, a real sense of the presence of God; they are continually reminded about what it means to have the Spirit of God dwelling within them and the very real significance of sharing that Spirit with all others. As we welcome you and your children to the 2010-11 academic year, my hope is that we can work together to allow the Holy Spirit to stretch us in such a way that we continue to build the sense of belonging to a community characterized by the holy presence of God. Our Founder, John Baptist de la Salle, also knew the truth of a saying that a wise person once shared with me: "Words are powerful. Choose carefully." So today and every day, Let us remember... that we are in the holy presence of God. Live Jesus in our hearts...forever.

Summer is the Ideal Time for Campus Improvements

It has been a busy and productive summer at Christian Brothers. On June 1, construction began on a project to expand and enhance the school's entryway. The project establishes a centralized reception area to better serve students, parents and visitors; and allows for greater control in terms of monitoring students and guests.

"The change improves the aesthetics of the school and augments our efforts to protect the safety of our students, faculty and staff," explains CB President Lorcan Barnes.

Another boost to campus security efforts was the installation of an exterior camera system this past spring. This summer, technicians fine tuned the camera angles to ensure maximum coverage of the exterior and main access areas of the campus.

Throughout the school day, the system will be monitored primarily by support staff at the school's reception desk and as needed by the Attendance and Dean's offices. After hours, our security personnel will periodically monitor the system in addition to their routine campus checks.

"It is important to note that the camera system was not installed in response to any threat," says Dean of Students, Steve Barsanti
'78. "It is simply a part of our proactive efforts to maintain a safe campus community following a safety audit conducted by the
California Highway Patrol's Protective Service Division. Systems of this type are increasingly the norm at local schools and fellow
Lasallian schools and are seen as a way to provide the best care possible."

Funding for the projects comes from the school's annual operating budget.

DRIVER'S EDUCATION CLASSES AVAILABLE

Christian Brothers is again offering a driver's education classroom course outside the regular school day to students 15 years of age or older. The class will meet daily each quarter before school. No academic credits are earned. The fee for this course is \$100 for 30 hours of classroom instruction in the rules and regulations of driving. 

Dear Parents,

ress code checks, cell phone policies, and attendance regulations present daily challenges for Catholic educators, particularly at the beginning of the school year. While the days of a Brother facing off against a student in an after-school boxing match, or Sister Mary Immaculata dispensing justice with a ruler are long gone, "discerning the right way to guide" is a persistent challenge.

Fortunately, the challenges are typically minimal. One subject that does come up from time to time is whether or not a student's behavior outside of school has any bearing on his or her relationship with the school. I am not writing this in response to a particular incident, but rather as an affirmation of our commitment to your family.

St. John Baptist de La Salle insisted that the Brothers be with the students "from morning until night." He worried about the lives his students returned to when they went home each day. He worried about the company the students kept and who they associated with outside of school. Although our community is now comprised mainly of dedicated lay professional educators, the Catholic, Lasallian philosophy of caring for the whole child is woven deeply into our community.

Christian Brothers students are expected to conduct themselves with high standards both at school and on their personal time. It is important that they learn they are always representing their family and their school. Helping our students understand this is a vital part of our mission. A Catholic, Lasallian education does not end at the culmination of the school-day, the semester, or even the school-year. Quite simply, we care what happens after the bell rings.

If a student's behavior outside of school is detrimental to himself/ herself or the CB community, we would be remiss if we looked the other way. Teenagers make mistakes. We have understood that for 134 years. Our goals are to take all reasonable precautions to help students make good choices and to work with parents to help their sons and daughters learn healthy lessons from mistakes. At times, the lessons we are called to impart - as parents and as educators - are difficult. Yet, the lessons are always considered with careful, prayerful discemment, and a healthy dose of love.

As we begin our 135th year in Sacramento, we are grateful that you choose to partner with us to help our students - your sons and daughters - navigate the rough waters of adolescence. Together, we can achieve our shared mission to create leaders of tomorrow who are spiritually rich, morally courageous, and intellectually distinguished.



ATHLETICS

Christian Brothers High School truly believes in the education of the whole person, as stated in the first line of our Athletic Department philosophy.

The Athletic Department at Christian Brothers High School believes that athletics and participation in our athletic program is an educational activity that contributes to the physical, personal, social and spiritual growth of our student athletes and, therefore, develops student-athletes as Christian members of society.'

We strive to this end while balancing the high demands of competition. Our studentathletes consistently push themselves to their physical and emotional limits daily in their pursuit of excellence in sports. As a school and athletic department, we also understand that there are inherent risks associated with athletics. Our coaches take every precaution of safety where your sons and daughters are concerned, from keeping the environment safe and inspecting equipment to teaching correct technique. We are fortunate that the school views the safety of our student-athletes as a high priority by having multiple automated external defibrillators, (AED's) on campus to having a state-of-the-art athletic training facility and hiring a certified athletic trainer as a full time employee of the school. Durci Stark has been part of our community since May 2002. She received her Bachelor's Degree in athletic training from Barry University. She is certified by the National Athletic Trainers' Association and has a California single-subject teaching credential in physical education. Additionally she is a Certified Red Cross Instructor - Professional Rescuer. Since joining the community she has created a student athletic training program and instituted our concussion testing program.

Darci is the first point of contact in evaluation and care of injuries and responsible to verify that an athlete is ready to return to practice or competition. Her knowledge of both health and safety and the rigors of athletic competition make her uniquely qualified to make sure that athletes get back to full participation safely as quickly as possible.

As this year begins, we asked Darci to talk about two big safety issues, heat related illness and concussions, so you have a good understanding of the concerns and how we can work together to ensure the safety of your sons and daughters.

HEAT RELATED ILLNESS

As the temperatures begin to rise, the CB Athletic Staff wants to reassure you that we are taking precautions to help prevent heat related illness with all our athletes. By providing more frequent water breaks, decreasing the amount of conditioning during practices and always being on the look out for the signs and symptoms of heat illness, we hope to provide the safest possible experience for your sons and daughters. We also check the air quality on a daily basis and modify practices accordingly. In addition to the precautions we are taking at school, you can help by watching for symptoms at home and encouraging your athlete to continue to hydrate in the evenings and throughout the day at school. Sports drinks are a good alternative to water, but we recommend diluting the sports drink with water to decrease the amount of sugar being consumed.

Signs and Symptoms of Heat Exhaustion:

- Loss of coordination, dizziness or fainting
- Dehydration
- Profuse sweating or pale skin
- · Headache, nausea, vomiting or diamhea
- Signs and Symptoms of Heat Stroke:
- . Hot and wet or dry skin
- Altered consciousness, seizures, confusion, emotional instability, irrational behavior
- Increased heart rate, decreased blood pressure, or rapid breathing

CONCUSSIONS

A concussion is a disturbance in brain function that occurs following a blow to the head or a violent shaking of the head. While signs of a concussion may be immediately evident (see table below), it may also take several minutes or even several hours for the signs to be recognized. In addition, your son or daughter may not report having any symptoms for fear of being pulled from a practice or competition or because they don't want to let their coach or teammates down. As parents, your observations of your student athlete could be vital in recognizing a possible concussion.

Signs Observed

- · Appears to be dazed or stunned
- · Is confused about assignment
- · Forgets plays
- · Is unsure of game, score, or opponent
- · Answers questions slowly
- · Loses consciousness (even temporarily)
- Shows behavior or personality changes
- · Forgets events prior to hit (retrograde amnesia)
- · Forgets events after hit (anterograde amnesia)

Signs Reported by Athlete

- Headache
- Nausea
- · Balance problems or dizziness
- · Double or fuzzy vision
- . Sensitivity to light or noise
- · Feeling sluggish
- · Feeling "foggy"
- · Change in sleep pattern · Concentration or memory problems

In January of 2007, Christian Brothers began using the ImPACT software program to help better manage concussions sustained by our student athletes. This computerized exam is used in professional, collegiate and high school sports programs across the country. While it does not diagnose a concussion, it will help us determine when the brain has fully healed. In addition to the use of the ImPACT program, we have developed a return to play protocol that includes: clearance from a physician, a return to baseline neurocognitive function as measured by the ImPACT software, followed by a gradual return to contact that is closely monitored by the Athletic Trainer, coaches and the parents. Our goal is to get the athletes back on the field as quickly as possible without jeopardizing their health.



INTEGRITY * HONOR * EXCELLENCE

hese three seemingly simple words create the mantra of the Athletic Department at Christian Brothers High School. However, these words are anything but simple, or for that matter, easily maintained. The difficulty lies in the fact that these fundamental expectations are counter-cultural to what is encouraged in today's society. In a culture where winning is the only acceptable outcome, and anything less has no value, we are faced with the challenge to

INTEGRITY is the quality of always following one's moral principles. The quality of integrity helps us gain the respect and trust of others. A challenge faced by young people today is understanding the definition of moral principles. Where do kids look for guidance as they develop their own belief systems and morals? TV? The internet? Teachers? Coaches? Parents? How do we instill values of integrity in our youth when they often hear from trusted sources in their lives the phrase, "It's not a foul unless the official calls it"?

HONOR means to have or show great respect and admiration for somebody or something. Turn on any college or professional game and what do we often see demonstrated by players, coaches and fans? All too often we witness tantrums, foul language, berating and excuse-making. Open newspapers and read about the behavior of our idols. Despite protestations of innocence, we often read about an athlete who has broken the law and has been proven by irrefutable evidence to be engaging in the use of performance-enhancing substances in an attempt to obtain a competitive advantage. How do young people learn about respect and honor when everywhere they turn they witness contradictory actions?

EXCELLENCE is the quality or state of being outstanding and sperior. We often refer to excellence as a process, not an outcome. If students practice for excellence, the result will be excellence, both in effort and in the development of their maximum potential. Note that excellence is not equated with winning; but unfortunately, too often the primary emphasis is placed on the outcome (winning) instead of the process.

Some might consider the challenge to instill in our young people the qualities of integrity, honor, and excellence insurmountable. While our challenge is daunting to be sure, it is not impossible. When St. John Baptist de La Salle began his ministry in education he was considered a revolutionary. Like him, we are called to step away from social norms and be revolutionary, especially if our goal is to touch the hearts and minds of our students and teach them the values we hold dear.

The past five years we, as an Athletic Department, have taken one of the core principles of a Lasallian school and made it a focal point for the year. These core values: Faith in the Presence of God, Respect for All Persons, Inclusive Community, Concern for the Poor & Social Justice, and Quality Education, are the cornerstones of our Lasallian. charism. If we as an Athletic Department instill these values in our student-athletes, we have indeed enjoyed success.

Our athletic program is competitive, but we hope that focusing on the rocess of excellence, being persons of integrity, and honoring those against whom we compete will render positive results. It is very much like the classroom, where a student who actively participates in class discussions, does the homework, and studies for the tests is rewarded with a positive outcome. There is no shortcut; it takes commitment, personal responsibility, and dedication to succeed. That is the process we strive to teach in each of our athletic arenas. Ultimately, the Athletic Department hopes to complement what happens in the classeoom.

The last sentences of our Athletic Department mission statement read: Student-Athletes, coaches and parents are called upon to work together in a true spirit of sportsmanship to assist in creating an environment in which those Lasallian values can be revealed, tested and proven relevant both to participants and the entire school community. Every member of our community must seek to encourage, instill, and foster such growth and development in our student-athletes

We interviewed our Freshman Counselor on the topic of vocations. We are happy to welcome Mrs. Blaire Moskat to CBHS.

"I went to St. Francis and Sac State—I'm a local girl. My first job was at Le Grande Confectionary and I worked there with my friend, Sophie. We scooped and moided chocolates behind the scenes. I learned how to work as a team: we all did separate tasks, but they required working together. That job taught me you can have fain at work! We laughed and it made us better workers.

I wasn't a little girl who dreamed of my wedding, but I did always think fid someday be married. I didn't have much luck in high school, but then I met my husband and he's wonderful!

My advice is to shadow someone who is interesting to you and ask a lot of questions about their work: what do they do day-to-day? Do they enjoy their jobs? Do online research. This step is important because a lot of the ideas I had in my youth turned out to be the furthest thing from my later incerests.

When I was trying to figure out my vocation, I prayed, and I definitely talked to my parents. I was dating my (future) husband and I talked to him about what I would do. I also reached out to the community, and I found a lot of satisfaction in that service.

On a random occasion, a parent came in to the school where I was working and we were talking, and she told me her son was a school counselor. This convenation opened a door for me: I started looking at my past experiences and everything just clicked in that one short convensation. I started researching the program at Sac State that week.

I believe in 'planned happenstance': things don't just happen for you, you have to work hard and continue to be dedicated, communicate with others, and develop relationships. It will feel like it fell out of the sky, but you have to put yourself out there.

During college, I would have liked someone to tell me what my vocation was! I was an English LL major and intended to teach, but three-fourths of the way through I realized I wanted to reach out to people in a different capacity. Instead, I went on a journey in which I had an 'ahai' moment, and that journey led me to counseling. The journey is important. It helped me learn what I don't, an well as what I do, want to do. I was fazzled thinking I had wasted time not knowing what I wanted to do, then I realized my journey taught me, 'This is me: I like being part of a helping profession, I'm not a business or science person.' I think I'll be happy for the rest of my life."



We interviewed teacher and coach, Mr. George Petrissans, on the topic of vocation:

"When I was 11, I wanted to be a pro-football player. But in college, I enjoyed telling my younger trammates what they could do to be better. And I thought, "This is a perfect role for me." My new goal was to be a college football coach. I had a variety of coaching jobs while I went to grad school to get my Master's degree in Mistory (San Jose State, then Cal).

Coach Brian Radon; was one of my most memorable mentors. He tought me how to be a good person, and also influenced my eventual decision to be a teacher, I don't think I would have gotten into this profession without his mentoring me. He was like a wiser, older brother, someone I trusted and could talk to and relate to. So to me, he was my best teacher

Teaching at CB has been my most interesting job. In former coaching jobs I'd been moving every two or three years. I was working 80-90 hours a week and the pay wasn't very good. The coaching staff was often fired. When I finally made a decision to teach, my mather and father were happy because I finally had a stable solary! A few years ago, I had an apportunity to coach at the college level, and I surprised myself by realizing that I was really enjoying what I was doing here at CB. It was a moment of transition: Id always thought of myself as a coach—new I thought of myself as a teacher, who coaches. I'm proud of being a teacher

A book I word to be reading now is called Teammater. It's a true story about a guy who chose to forego being a scholarship player to be a walk-on player. why he decided to go through all the pain knowing he would only be a practice player.

When did I begin to know I'd choose the vocation of marriage? That's easy! When I met my wife, I knew she was the one. She is my sounding board and I salk to her about how I could have handled things better. I want to be that coach and teacher who inspired me when I was a kid and I'm always working towards that goal-it's a constant battle!



A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Dear Parents,

Advent is a time of preparation and it marks the beginning of a new liturgical year. The theme of the season provides an appropriate backdrop for me to share with you some news that involved a long history of preparation and a new beginning in our school's storied history

Last month, the De La Salle Christian Brothers District of San Francisco formally announced that a number of Christian Brothers' residential communities will be consolidated at the end of the school year. CB's residential community is one that has been selected for closure. Br. Christopher Donnelly, FSC; Br. Donald Johanson, FSC; and Br. Thomas Pham, FSC will be leaving CB next summer to join other Brothers' communities in the Western United States.

This change is reflective of the decline in religious vocations nationwide and allows for larger living communities for the Brothers, which is a vital component of their vocation to pursue works "together and by association." We are blessed in Sacramento to enjoy close proximity to the District of San Francisco headquarters in Napa and a number of Beothers' communities in the Bay Area. As such, we will maintain a close working relationship with the Brothers.

This change is also part of a long process of turning over school leadership to Lay Partners. For more than 300 years, the De La Salle Christian Brothers have focused their ministry on education. As such, they have been extraordinary teachers to all of us in sharing their mission, vision and values.

With considerable foresight, the District of San Francisco has invested extensive human and financial resources over the last sixteen years to provide Lasallian formation opportunities to trustees, faculty and staff. Our campus community includes a number of Lasallian Leadership Institute and Buttimer Institute of Lasallian Studies graduates who have benefitted from these multi-year training programs. Other faculty members and staff

have participated in Lasallian formation activities nationally and abroad. Principal Mary Hesser recently attended a worldwide Session on Association at the Generalate in Rome.

Other Lasallian schools in the District of San Francisco have been without Brothers' communities for decades while successfully advancing the Brothers' Catholic, educational mission. At CB, day-to-day operations will remain the same. CB will continue to be owned by the Christian Brothers District of San Francisco. Our Board of Trustees is appointed by the Christian Brothers and our governance model ensures that the decisions we make continue to represent the Brothers' educational priorities.

CB Sucramento can be proud that the Brothers see us as a strong and stable Lasallian school, capable of carrying on the Lasallian tradition of Catholic education for generations to come. While we will deeply miss the daily presence of the Brothers on campus, CB will steadfastly remain a Catholic, Lasallian school. We are well prepared and proud to be entrusted with carrying on the school's 135-year tradition of excellence in education while inspiring the hearts and minds of the students entrusted to our

As we prepare to celebrate Christ's birth, let us count among our many blessings the gift that the Brothers have been to our school for 135 years.

I have just returned from a historic international Conference held. at the Casa Generalizia (worldwide headquarters of the Christian Brothers) on the topic of Understanding and Living Lasallian Association Today. Seventy-seven Brothers and lay partners from all the Regions of the world attended to discuss, process, and create new structures to further Lasallian association for mission. I had the privilege of representing Christian Brothers High School, the District of San Francisco, and the USA/Toronto Region of the Lasallian family. Rich conversation, much personal study, gifted presenters, and challenging small group work characterized our time together. Not only did I come to know and appreciate the way Lasallian education is lived-out around the world by meeting and living with so many committed men and women from other nations who have given their lives to the "human and Christian education of the young" - I was also able to discern how we at Christian Brothers form part of a global movement of faith, service, and community. We have a hopeful future lying ahead for our school and all the Christian Brothers' works around the globe.

As you read in Mr. Barnes letter, now is a significant period in history for the De La Salle Christian Brothers, both at CB and around the world. Some may view the departuse of our local Brothers Community as dismaying; however, the Brothers and the faculty at CB sense an opportunity. We know that we shall remain firmly a Catholic, Lasallian school and that the core values, the mission, and the pedagogy we adhere to will remain strong. Because the

Brothers have been so very generous in the formation of the lay partners and have been welcoming and open to shared mission with un for many years, we are confident that God will continue to bloss our CB community and loop it strong. We celebrate 135 years of history in Sacramento – and know that we will continue the tradition of a quality education that is inclusive, respectful of all people, concerned for the poor and for social justice, and, above all, having faith in the presence of God for many, many years to come

So while the potter (the Brothers) hands us (the lay partners) the beautiful work of over 300 years of history, tradition, and excellence, we know they celebrate with us the new musterpiece we can create together. It is a time of hope! As Archbishop Oscar Remero said, "We must see with eyes wide open and feet firmly set on the ground, but with the heart also full of the Gospel and full of God." As we reflected on these realities at the Conference, a lovely symbol was drawn that encapsulates the current changes taking place in Lasallian education:

Together and by association, we pledge to move together with you, our school families, in tradition, transition, and transformation to new frontiers of quality Lasallian education for your daughters and sons. You may have noticed the Latin phrase after my signature on my correspondence. It says, "Domine Opus Tuum" – a statement our Founder, John Baptist de La Salle, repeated often. As we begin this transformative journey, let us all remember that "Lord, the Work is Yours."

VOCATIONS

Many of us gradually discern our vocation through the attention and insights of those who care for us. The following story is a memorable example of one mother's influence on her son, heard on NPR several years ago by our Vocations Coordinator and Religion teacher, Ms. Julie Greene:

The Interviewer asked, Who was influential in shaping your love for science?' Without hesitation, the scientist answered, 'My mother.

When I was two years old, I was lifting a bottle of milk from my refrigerator. It was awkward for my two-year-old hands, and the bottle slipped from my grosp and fell to the floor. There was milk everywhere. My mother was very calm. She said Let's play with it before we clean it up." We pushed the milk around to see the shapes we could make with it on the floor. We tried to floot different things across the surface of it. We looked to see what things absorbed the milk, and which didn't. When we were done playing, my mother and I cleaned up the milk. Then she told me to take the empty milk jug in the back yard, fill it with water, and find a way to hold it so the next time I wanted to get the milk, it wouldn't spill."

I went into the backyard and experimented holding the milk battle. I found that if I hooked the fingers of one hand in the lip of the battle, and held my other hand undervesth the battle, I could hold it securely."

What did my mother teach me that day? That it's okay to make mistakes. To learn from my mistakes. And to play with my mistakes before cleaning them up. It is my mother who taught me, that day, to be a scientist."

Each of us can be a mirror for our young people, to reflect their strengths, gifts and talents back to them in meaningful and life-changing ways.

"We must be careful with our lives, for Christ's sake, because it would seem that they are the only lives we are going to have in this puzzling and perilous world and so they are very precious and what we do with them matters enormously." — Frederick Buechner

About College Entrance Exams

Most colleges and universities require a college entrance test score as part of the application process. The two national tests are the ACT (American College Test) and the SAT Reasoning Test (given by the College Board). ALL four-year colleges and universities will accept either score. Both tests are offered at local area high schools 6-7 times throughout the year. Christian Brothers is a test center for both the ACT and the SAT - we administer both exams on dates in October, April, and May

Research indicates that students often perform differently on the ACT and SAT. The tests, while considered equally for admission, are different in the material covered. The ACT test content has four areas: English, Math, Reading, and Science Reasoning. The goal of the ACT is to measure academic achievement in the four areas and contains analytical and problem-solving exercises related to what has been learned in class. In addition the ACT recently began offering an optional Writing section (which must be taken if applying to the University of California). The SAT determines critical reading, math, and writing skills, and is designed to measure academic aptitude in analytical skills, numeric reasoning, and writing. Current juniors should use the next few months to prepare for the SAT and plan on taking it for the first time in March.

Though the trend seems to be to begin taking these tests earlier and earlier in a student's high school career, we do not see any significant benefit to this action. Since Christian Brothers has all freshmen take the PLAN test (the practice ACT exam) and all sophomores and juniors take the PSAT (the preliminary SAT exam), we have avenues for students to explore the testing experience. There is never a penalty for taking a test early, however, or for taking a test more than once. Colleges will see every score funless a student chooses SAT score choice, which we do not recommend), but always take the highest score. The UC system takes the best score from one sitting; many private colleges and the CSU system will take a student's highest score from each section from different sittings and combine them into the highest possible score.

Since colleges will accept either the SAT or ACT and take the highest score, we recommend that students consider taking both tests at least once. It will help to compare results from the PLAN and the PSAT and see which score is stronger to help predict your score on either test. By taking both exams, students increase their chances of achieving a successful score

SAT Subject tests are subject area tests that UC and a few selective private colleges require. Currently, the UC system requires two subject area tests that are the student's choice (in addition to the SAT or ACT) - although this will no longer be the case beginning with the class of 2012. They will be encouraged in subject areas in which a student hopes to major in college, but not required. Students who plan to apply to highly selective colleges should check to see how many Subject Exams are required. It is important to register and take these exams by fall of the senior year. We recommend juniors take the tests in the spring of their junior year. They will then have time to take the tests again in fall of their senior year if they wish to improve their scores. Current seniors should not take the tests into 2011, as these test dates are too late to be submitted with other application material. Students should register for the SAT test online at www.collegeboard.com and the ACT at www.actstudent.org.

Admission test scores are only one piece of information a college looks at when considering applications. A student's GPA, number and rigor of college prep courses completed, and other factors are also considered. These factors include co-curricular activities, the college essay, community service, and other aspects of the individual that make him/her distinctive.

Concerning the administration of final examinations:



Dear Parents and Families:

On January 2, the Catholic Church celebrated the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. The wood "epiphany" is a Greek wood meaning "appearance" or "manifestation." The Gospel passage for that day tells the story of the Journey of the Magi to Jesus. "We saw his star at its rising," they tell King Herod, "and have come to do him hornage." As our Christian Brothers High School community begins a new year, let us look at these wise travelers, for they have something to say to us about how we live our lives in the holy presence of God and deepen our relationship with Jesus. (The inspiration for the following comes from the article "Advent Activity" by Mark Neilson of Creative Communications for the Parish.)

Keep a large fixtur. The Magi ware led by a heavenly phenomenon, and by keeping their eyes on it, they found Jesus. Let us focus this year on something greater than ourselves, God in our midst, and we, too, will find Jesus.

Trim down for the trip. The Magi could only take what would fit on their carnels, so most of what they had was left behind. The new year is a time to leave behind anything that could show us down in developing our relationship with Jesus: holding grudges, usrealistic expectations, gadgments of others, indifference in our relationships.

Travel together. One of the Magi traveling alone would never have made it. They needed each other for support and encouragement while they figured out the best direction to take. Let us endeavor to be faithful in joining with the whole Church, especially in attendance at Sunday worship; it is in community that we encounter God concretely in our lives.

Be people of hope. Hope kept the Magi going. Many had seen the star, but only these three risked everything to find the king. This new year is an opportunity for us to overcome discouragement, uncertainty, and the skepticism of others and risk everything for our relationship with God.

It is important for you and your student to understand that neither "D's" nor "F's" are acceptable. "F" grades must be repeated for credit in order to graduate from Christian Brothers High School. "D' grades, though worth 5 credits towards graduation, are NOT accepted by four year colleges and universities. All California State University campuses, University of California campuses, and most private institutions require a "C" or above in ALL core courses (once courses are approved History, English, Math, Lab Science, Foreign Language, Visual and Performing Art, and Elective courses also known as the "a-g" list of approved courses - see below for a chart of these requirements!. If students have "D's" on the transcript in any a-g courses and do not remediate them they are not eligible to apply for admission to CSU and UC, and therefore are seriously limiting their choices for

If your child would like to keep his/her options open and remain eligible to apply to a four-year college, the Guidance Department highly recommends that he/she remediate (repeat for credit) any "D" grades earned in a-g approved courses. Students may erroll in a variety of classes during the 2011 CBHS summer school session in order to remediate a grade. While previous grades are never removed from a student's transcript, if a student completes the course in summer school with a "C" or above, his/her transcript will reflect the new credits and the new grade will be used when calculating the grade point average.

For example, if your child is currently enrolled in Biology and received a "D" the first semister, he she should consider repeating Biology this summer. If he she is currently enrolled in a Math course or foreign language course and received a low grade the first semester, it is important to receive a "C" or above at the end of the spring semister. CSU and UC will "validate" (court as successful) the whole year of a Math course or a foreign language course if the student shows marked improvement the second semister (i.e., goes from a "D" to a "C""S, or "A"). Therefore, students have a choice — work very hard this semister and bring the grade up, or repeat it in summer school to raise the grade. Since a full four years of finglish is a basis requirement for eligibility, any "D" in English should be remediated. One year of World History is the minimum requirement for eligibility, so students should be sure to have a "C" or above for at least two of the four semesters of Frosh/Soph World History.

Any US History "D" should also be remediated.

Please contact your child's courselor if you have questions about remediating grades. If you intend to register for summer school pre-reg forms will be available in the Main Office in early spring. Check the CB website in February for further information regarding summer school.

VOCATIONS

We interviewed History teacher, Ms. Stephanie Roybal, on the topic of vacation. Ms. Roybal received her B.A. in History from St. Mary's Callege and earned her teaching credential in 2006.

"A vacation cames naturally but not easily; it's something you can't imagine going through life without doing. I used to think my vacation was teaching, but many of my most enjoyable maments happen outside of class time: interacting with students, sharing with their struggles and helping them make their own conclusions. It's not so much being a teacher, but working with students in their element that I love!

I was a girl scout all through high school. At summer camps I worked with young children and I learned I could make a difference by teaching. I taught crafts but lots of other things, too: patience, dealing with frustration, etc. Sonia Zulpo was my 5th grade teacher and she was my favorite. She had great energy—and an ability to be real with the students. She made education fun, but at the same time she treated us like people, not pupils. These experiences influenced my current vocation

Ever had jobs that helped me "try on" my vocation. My first job was the summer after freshman year in callege—arientation for incoming freshmen at St. Mary's. For the first time, I got to work with the age group I knew I wanted to work with. For three months I worked at a maternity store to make money for school. It was interesting to work with mothers of children who weren't even born yet, so I observed the 'parent craze' at a very different level'

n is my role model for living a full life. She's been an all-encompassing role model for me. She has always encouraged me to be what I want to be. And she has supported me in all the decisions I've made in my life and my vocation.

Tim still figuring out if marriage is a vocational calling of mine. I haven't closed my heart to God's decision for me, but I still need to find His an

I don't think I would have listened to anyone who told me what my vocation would be; it's a journey that needs to be taken on your own. With God's guidance, you'll get to your vocation, but what's the point if it's not going to be an adventure? My recommendation to students trying to discern their vocation is vocation makes you happy! If you're not happy, you're still searching. It's not just a job or career, but a calling.

I think you tend to work harder when you're involved in something you have a vocation in, even if you haven't recognized it yet. I think you're born with a vocation, but not necessarily born with an awareness of it! The thing you naturally work the hardest at may guide you to your vocation. It's hard because you want to be good of your vocation. Vocations aren't easy—you have to work hard at them. On the other hand, just because it's easy, or it's the job you've chosen, doesn't mean it's your vocation. This quotation captures it well: "Vocation is not just holding on. The commitment holds you. You can't not do the work.' [Dalas, Keen, Keen and Parks, "Common Fire: Leading Lives of Commitment in a Compilex World"].





Sensing God's Presence

Recently my husband and I had the good fortune to purchase our first car that came equipped with a Global Positioning System, which we call our latest new "toy," complete with a name we've given it, "Gwendolyn." We were introduced to this feature a few years ago on a vacation, when the family rented a car which was equipped with a GPS system. Being a lover of maps, my husband was skeptical about these devices. More than once, he was amazed that the positioning device knew better than he did. "I know we need to go left," he would say, much to my protestations (sigh), and following his instincts, he would turn left. The friendly voice would say, "At the first opportunity, make a U-turn and..." After a few admissions that the device was correct, he had to succumb to defeat. Once, when he was absolutely sure he knew best, he reluctantly followed the device's instructions, which took us into rush-hour traffic headed into London. I had to admit that he was right-he had defeated the machine-until I found the switch that had been set at "shortest route" instead of "fastest route." A click of the button, and "the lady" as we called her, directed us to take the route he had known was right. We never were able to defeat her, and we must admit, she directed us to some very remote locations we never would have found as easily on our own. I wonder about the impact these systems will have on marriages, but that is a different story.

Our new system simply says "recalculating" when she realizes I am going the wrong way, and often, when I miss a turn and am foeling frustrated, I hear the calm redirections on the part of Gwendolyn. I constantly expect Gwendolyn to lose her temper after she has "recalculated" innumerable times, but she always speaks in the same, even, calming tone (though I think I detect a hint of superiority), and no matter how hopelessly lost I may get, she can always find the way.

As I ponder my vocation journey and those of our students, teachers, and parents, I often think of the metaphor of the GPS system to represent the presence of God in our life journeys. While many people have clear callings from God that they have been able to discern, some do not experience that sort of clarity for whatever the reason. Instead, many of us have weighed options, explored advantages and disadvantages, secured

advice, and then moved ahead in what appeared to be the right direction. Looking back, I believe that God has ultimately directed me to my place now at Christian Brothers, but there were many detours, striking out on my own, and wrong choices along the way. Accordingly, God needed to make many recalculations on my life journey. It may be that God has a distinct, best plan for a person's life, but I am not sure that anyone could ever realize such a plan. We too often go our own way, listen to bad advice, follow misplaced goals, and selfishly follow any number of ways to take us on alternate paths in the wrong direction away from God.

Like Gwendolyn, it seems to me that God is constantly with us providing direction, and constantly "recalculating" the journey as we go our own way either by choice or in ignorance. Just as Gwendolyn has the bigger picture from a satellite view, God has the biggest picture of all. The goal does not change, but the journey toward that goal may be longer or shorter depending on our choices and events beyond our control.

"Let us remember...that we are in the holy presence of God." Students at Christian Brothers express this profound truth seven times each day. Every meeting begins with these words. They are posted prominently on walls and in school literature. There is always a potential danger in making anything that is important too commonplace. It may become rote, meaningless. But just as we all have many "recalculations" on our life journeys, I believe that when the time is right, the Spirit will cause that phrase to resonate and bring peace to our souls. Being reminded constantly ensures that when we especially need God's presence, we know He has been there all along, recalculating in order to bring us to Himself.

Seven Myths About College Admission – advice for students

Myth #1: "Colleges receive so many personal essays that they probably only Myth #5: "Ivy League colleges are the only ones glance at them." Fact: Private college admission officers read personal essays with great care. Writing about yourself in a way that makes you unique and distinctive is the one significant thing you can do to overcome lackluster test scores and a less. than stellar GPA. Don't wait until just before the deadline and dash off anything to get it in the mail. Even at the University of California, a well-written personal nent can tip the scales in your favor; the personal essay does make a difference.

Myth #2: "Colleges do not look at the senior year grades." Fact: All private college admission committees analyze not only senior year grades in the first semester, but also the degree of difficulty of the senior year course of study. The UC and Cal State systems look very closely at the courses taken in the senior year. As for second semester grades, if there is a significant change in academic performance from January to June, the college that originally accepted you may require summer school work, put you on probation for the first semester of college, or rescind your acceptance on grounds that you are not the same student that they accepted.

Myth #3: "It's important to have as many varied extracurricular activities as possible to impress college admission people." Fact: Colleges are looking for quality of involvement rather than quantity. They want a well-rounded student body made up of students who are vitally interested in particular activities and haven't spread themselves so thin that they've demonstrated no commitment to to "dig" for the merit-based scholarships, especially anything. Go for depth, not breadth. Colleges prefer, for example, the student who those not institutionally-based, and research and apply was a solely dedicated yearbook editor rather than the student who dashed in and accordingly. out of ten activities. They call this "productive follow-through.

Myth #4:"It is better to go to a big university that is well known than to a small college that few people have ever heard of." Fact: All generalizations about large versus small schools are dangerous. A prestigious university like Stanford would be ideal for some students, but some would fare far better in a small, less widely known college such as Notre Dame de Namur in Belmont, CA. It is important to define the things you want in a college - to understand yourself and not to be influenced by others' opinions

worth applying to." Fact: This is another cliché. The key League colleges (Brown, Columbia, Cornell, Dartmouth, Harvard, Univ. of Pennsylvania, Princeton, and Yale) are among the most selective in the nation, but they may not offer what you want; besides, did you know that the Ivy League is simply an athletic league, like the Big 10 or Pac-10? Certainly the Ivy League is known for its academic quality, but it does not have a monopoly on academic excellencel It is worthwhile to explore other areas of the country and to remember that many prominent men and women have graduated from non-ky League schools. Suggested reading: Looking Beyond the My League by Loren Pope and My League Programs at State School Prices by Robert Sullivan

Myth #6: "The financial aid situation is completely hopeless this year." Fact: Financial aid continues to be more readily available than you might think in the forms of grants, loans, opportunities for on-campus work, and merit-based scholarships. But you do need

Myth #7: "If I make the wrong decision about college, my life will be ruined." Fact: While it is important to realize the significance of your college choice, you should remember that if you find, in spite of an informed choice, that you are not well-suited to your college, you can transfer to another college, So be conscientious, but don't envision yourself as a character in a Greek tragedy.



VOCATIONS

We interviewed Art teacher and Fine Arts department chair, Mr. Findlay McIntosh, on the tapic of vocation.

"A vocation is a meaningful activity you would do if you didn't have to work for money. There are jobs, there are careers, then there are vocations. Ask yourself: if you inherit a lot of money, or win the lottery, what would you do for a living? That question can help you discern your vocation. If I won the lottery, I think I'd still continue to do what I'm doing—perhaps on a part-time basis.

My parents definitely influenced my vocation. We always had books and magazines around the house—they were readers. I had poor vision, and the eye doctor said people with poor vision naturally gravitate toward reading (because reading is within the field of focus). When I said my parents I wanted to teach, they said, Tinally, you figured out you want to be a teacher. It had been a natural conclusion for them. Being married has made all the difference to me. Carol, my wife, really helped me and encouraged me to go to school. She's given me a sense of family and she helped point me in the direction of teaching.

Brother Thompkins was my favorite teacher. He had a wonderful sense of humor and was also very scholarly—a nice balance. Teachers would always tell me I was going to be a writer, so I accepted that. I didn't really do much writing and I'm glad I didn't. My perspective when I was young was foolish, and any early writings would have been there mocking me still. I didn't really have anything to say.

I went to college later in life, in my late twenties. I liked the school environment and have always been booksh; I like the world of ideas. College seemed a perfect place for me.

My first teaching class was a bronze-casting class at the UC Davis Craft Center. I took the jewelry class, melted capper pennies, and made a statue. They asked me if I'd teach the class after I'd taken it one time.

My most interesting job has been this one, for sure! Teaching has been the most challenging and interesting of my jobs. I was a tour guide at Shasta Dam in the 1980's. That was fun because you just walk people through the dam, talk about the big picture, and how the dam fit into the state's agricultural plan. It had a lot of implications for how people lived: water issues, etc.

I helped at the Goodwill store, and I learned people who wanted to feel good donated their junk and felt they had done a good deed. In fact, the Goodwill had to use their precious resources to throw away 80% of the donations, which were garbage.

Professionally, I've benefited from my experience with Wayne Thiebaud at UC Davis and Coach John Wooden. Thiebaud taught the concrete skill of drawing, he wasn't interested in whether or not you were an artist. He was reluctant to call himself an artist; he said it was like a priest calling himself a saint. Wooden always saw himself first and foremast as a teacher, he knew how to motivate people and get the best out of them.

Here's my advice about college: If you know where you're going to live for the rest of your life, go to college in that area. You might meet your significant other there, or create an important group of friends. You might never come back home; and if you do, you might lose that important circle of friends.

For me, the meaning of the is to find a meaningful contribution to the human experience. If I had my life to do all over again, I would change a lot but that would probably be a mistake."

"The man who does not read good books has no advantage over the man who can't read." Mark Twain

This month we consider the serious question, "Which series is better: Harry Potter, or Twilight?" Counting the number of Gryffindor scarces observed on campus, J.K. Rowling edges out the competition. This was verified by Meg T., junior, passing along this wisdom from Andrew Futral: "Harry Potter is about confronting fears, finding inner strength and doing the right thing in the face of adversity; Twilight is about how important it is to have a boyfriend.

What are our students reading? I IMs. Greenel surveyed students riding in my van as we returned from the Women's Vocation Retreat in lanuary. Junior Annie M. recommends Revolution by Jennifer Donnelly. The Sacramento Public Library summarizes this work of teen fiction this way: "An angry, grieving seventeen-year-old musician facing expulsion from her prestigious Brooklyn private school travels to Paris to complete a school assignment and uncovers a diary written during the French revolution by a young actress attempting to help a tortured, Imprisoned little boy-Louis Charles, the lost king of France." Junior Ava C recommends the Princess Diaries series by Meg Cabot. "The books are very different from the movies, and much better. Even major plot points were changed when they created the movies. I recommend the blooks." Senior Lynette S. chain-read on the trip, starting with The Color Purple by Alice Walker (required for class) followed by City of Glass by Cassandra Clare (Lymette said, "It's full of twists and turns and has a surprise ending!") and for a smooth finish, picking up the complete works of Jame Austen to reread Pride and Prejudice. Long car rides are a gift.

Mrs. Mary Hesser recommends: "I have just finished reading The Life You Sove May Be Your Own by Paul Elie. It is a fascinating and moving account of the lives of four twentieth-century Catholic thinkers and writers: Thomas Menton, Dorothy Day, Walker Percy, and Flannery D'Connor. Their biographies are interwoven flawlessly and give the reader a real sense of the major social concerns and movements of America from the 1930's all the way to 1990, and how each of the subjects impacts society with lives signified by faith, intellectual curiosity, and social justice. The subtitle of the book is An American Pilgrimage and it is truly a pilgrim journey to read - deeply thought-provoking with theology, philosophy and literature woven into a powerful story of vocation, it is definitely a book i recommend and one that will stay with me for a long time.

Mr. Micletosk: "The book I am reading right now is At Home by Bill Bryson. He goes through each room in the house and gives a history of much room: the kitchen, the hallways, etc.



Balancing Excellence and Affordability

Ah spring! Blue skies, high-level learning, athletics, the arts, service and faith. This is my favorite time of the year! As school lets out each afternoon, the fields, gymnasium, field house and weight room fill with student athletes working hard and competing. Our student artists are busy preparing for the spring play, the La Salle Art Show, the upcoming instrumental concert, and the Hollywood Bow!. Kairos and class retreats, family liturgies, and Christian service continue to enrich the faith life of our school community. Seniors are anxiously awaiting acceptance letters and discerning which college will be the right fit ... and their options include the most prestigious colleges in the country. Best of all, we anticipate the joy of the Resurrection on Easter Sunday.

With the renewal of spring comes a reminder to me of the many phenomenal facets of this school community. In addition to the outstanding academics and enriching co-curricular activities, there are signs of strength and promise burgeoning below the surface. We anticipate welcoming another strong freshman class. We've made significant campus enhancements over the past few years, and we are fortunate to be debt free. Our faculty and staff are loyal, peofessional, and mission-driven. Christian Brothers is the place to be.

All of this excellence comes at an economic cost. We recognize that you make tremendous sacrifices to send your children to Christian Brothers and take seriously our responsibility as stewards of the significant investment you make in your sons and daughters. Our constant challenge is balancing mission-centered excellence with affordability. I am confident that we invest your resources well in your children's education.

Two years ago we increased tuition by a modest 1.9%. Last year we announced that we froze tuition for 2010-11. Recently, the Board of Trustoes approved an operating budget which calls for us to raise tuition 1%. Tuition will be \$11,310 for 2011-12. (This does not include the annual enrollment fee.) Our tuition will remain well below the average for Catholic high schools in Northern California. I believe most other Catholic high schools in Northern California will be passing along tuition increases in the 4-5% range.

We recognize our tuition is a significant sacrifice for most families. We also recognize that, for some families, assistance is needed to make ends meet. In 2010-11, we are distributing \$1.4 million to 251 students. That's 25% of our student body. We expect these numbers to be similar in 2011-12. Tuition assistance comes from three sources: endowment earnings, annual fund donations, and the operating budget. We are grateful to all of our alumni and parents who support our Annual Fund. Your ongoing support is critical to our mission!

Raising teenagers is tough. We know it. We've been "in this business" for 135 years. But the sacrifices you are making for your children today – taition, time, and example – will reap rewards long into the future.

The National Merit Scholarship Program is conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation in conjunction with the College Board, and is a competition open to all high school juniors who take the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) test. Winners of scholarships are chosen on the basis of their abilities, skills, and accomplishments. In October each year, approximately 1.5 million high school juniors in some 22,000 high schools take the PSAT. Of those, students who achieve significantly high scores are selected by the NMSC to enter the National Merit Program. Approximately 50,000 students achieve commended status in the Program, and approximately 16,000 are named Finalists. The class of 2011 boasts nine students with National Merit Commended status, and one student who achieved National Merit Finalist status. The commended students are:

Nothing offers better guidance on our Lenten journey than the words Jesus spoke to his disciples, read during the liturgy of Ash Wednesday: "Give alms ... Pray to your Father ... Fast without a gloomy face ..." (Matthew 6:1-8)

Airnsgiving: Giving alms, Jesus teaches, means making the needs of others our own, especially the needy of our world. And what shall we give? Our time, our talent, our material resources. Jesus teaches that when we give, we receive a blessing from God in return. Before us is the great alms Jesus gave: "He loved us, and gave himself up for us."

Shut the door to the noise, the trivialities, the countless cares grabbing for attention. Put them aside. In the quiet place of your heart, with faith as your guide, speak to your God. A gracious God listens and knows what you need. What can we do this season to pray with greater care and devotion? Participate in church services – read a Scripture passage or a section of a spiritual book each day – put aside time for quiet daily prayer.

Fasting: Urging everyone to eat, drink, and buy more and more, our world today has made fasting unfashionable. This Lent, recognizing the hold things have on us, let us try, with God's help, to keep them in their right place. Reasonable abstaining from food, drink, and entertainments can help us do that. Today we have compelling reasons for taking fasting seriously. As the resources of our planet are increasingly threatened, it becomes clear that the human family, especially those living in affluent nations, can no longer be unlimited consumers. We must develop a leaner, less wasteful way of life if our planet is to survive. Can the Christian teaching on fasting lead us to a gentler style of living on planet earth?

VOCATIONS

We interviewed Ms. Jennifer Lystrup, Religious Studies teacher, on the topic of vocation.

"Vocation is passion. Powerty is one of the major underlying problems we have, worldwide. All of us can do something about it, and this is my passion. This passion fits in perfectly with my teaching. Homeless youth are our invisible youth, so I decided to address this local issue with my Social Justice class. Our young homeless are going to be adult homeless if we don't do something.

My What realization about the homeless came in 2010. I went with the WIND youth outreach coordinator and talked with some young people living by the river. That changed me so deeply. It hasn't gone away... It's present with me all the time now. The feeling I had that day told me yes, this is what I should be doing! I had a visceral feeling the first time I sat down and talked to a homeless youth by the river that has remained. Maybe because I really like working with seenagers, perhaps that's why it resonated so deeply.

I participated in the homeless count the last week of January. Over the past two months I have been doing some observations on K Street. How do we address the marginalized youth issues on downtown Sacramento streets? Another shelter or another soup kitchen are not long-term solutions. It would be a dream for our Lasallian District to get involved with transitional age housing (18-24 years), improving literacy skills, and offering counseling. Legal adulthood begins at 18, and many who have aged out of the foster system don't have social or financial support. Adult shelters can be very dangerous for an 18-year-old. Transitional age housing is necessary to create real change, and systemic change is what social literies is all about.

Now I'm more aware of homeless people; I stop and try to give them what they need. One recent encounter affected me deeply. I saw a lone woman in a busy intersection, destitute, wearing white but obviously dirty, urine-stained, obviously cold and struggling, but no one stopped to help her. I offered her a McDonald's card, but she was afraid to take it. I offered her dean socks, and those she took and definitely needed them. Sure, this interaction slowed me on my way to work, but it was the right thing to do.

I made a documentary, Beautiful Youth, about the issue of teen homelessness. I tried hard to respect and not exploit the youth I interviewed them. I'm graseful to CBHS senior, Mackenzie Long' II, who did most of the filming and all of the editing, and I'm also really grateful to Mt. Brendan Hogan of KBFT because he's been tremendously supportive. I'm very grateful to CBHS colleagues and administration for supporting me in this endeavor. I want to continue to improve my filming technique and bring my skills and passion to educate people through film on other justice issues. Including trafficking and gender issues relating to homelessness.

Each of us can do something to serve others. If you have resources, or gift cards (McDonalds, Target) you can help a homeless person immediately. And, don't stereotype: we really have no idea what these people's stories are. Sometimes they have experiences we could never conceive of. Be really present to them as human beings. As fellow human beings, we have to address homelessness. Whenever I see a homeless woman, I think, "That could be me," I feel great empathy when I see a homeless mother. Women face greater challenges: it's more dangerous for them, and there's a deeper share (they can't provide for their children).

I want my students to understand homelessness is a big problem that isn't going to just go away. I want all my students to find something they can be passionate about and stay involved with their whole life. Try to be empathetic and think, There but for the grace of God go L:*



COLLEGE NEWS

Graduating Seniors have been receiving letters of acceptance to colleges and universities across the country. Congratulations to the class of 2011! As many seniors already know, this has been a very competitive year for college admission. Since the class of 2011 is one of the largest graduating classes in American history (over 3 million), the number of students applying to colleges has seen exponential

In addition, a new trend has developed that has more seniors across the country applying to more colleges than ever in order to "hedge their bets." Many private colleges have reported that they have had a 30% increase in applications this year over last! This has resulted in record numbers of applicant pools. Since most campuses have from 45,000-65,000 applicants to fill freshmen classes of approximately 4500, one can see how difficult decisions have been for admission offices in 2011. In fact, for the second year in a row, UC has instituted a 'wait-list' for stellar students who were not admitted. Since it is so new, it is difficult to know to what extent the wait-lists will be used. As a result, there have been disappointments - not only among our own students, but for tens of thousands of other California seniors.

Thankfully most of our seniors planned well and applied to not only 'reach' schools, but 'target' schools and 'safety' schools. As a result, CB students have options for next year and are able to begin their college careers at great schools. If any seniors are still grappling with final decisions, remember that Mr. Purdy, Ms. McClellan and Mrs. Archer are available to assist and support you. Seniors who will be attending community college should be applying right now and visiting the school to take your placement tests. Students who will be attending a CSU should be registering for ELM/EPT tests on the CSUS website (see Testing Center) if they are required to take them. Students attending a UC (and needing to satisfy the Entry Level Writing Requirement) should register for the May 14 Analytical Writing Placement Examination (AWPE).

The good news is that many of our students have been admitted to several prestigious universities and programs. including Stanford, Brown, Dartmouth, Princeton, Penn, Georgetown, Notre Dame, Boston College, USC, the US Naval Academy, the US Military Academy, the Air Force Academy, UCLA, UC-Berkeley, LMU, Santa Clara, Saint Mary's, etc., and many more too numerous to list. All of the colleges that our students have been admitted to will be listed in the graduation program.

Parents, be sure to have your senior go to the CB Family Connection online (see the letter mailed home to senior parents for details) as soon as possible, but NO LATER than APRIL 13 for scholarships and awards and by MAY 3 for college admittance, Students need to list ALL colleges to which they have been admitted and ALL scholarships, awards, etc. We must have this information in order to accurately recognize your child at the Senior Family Liturgy on May 1 and at graduation on May 27.

Our two informative college information evenings were very well attended by Juniors and their parents in January and March. Seniors, please mark your calendars for Wednesday, April 27 at 7:00 p.m. in the CB Cafeteria. We will hold one last meeting for the class of 2011. The topic will be transitioning to college. There will be general information about the practical issues related to going off to college, as well as break-out sessions. One breakout session will be for parents with a panel of CB parents of college students discussing "Letting Go" of your college-bound child; the other will be for students and consist of a student panel of CB alumni currently attending college who will share "what I wish I had known" before heading off to college.



Prepared by the days of Lent, Christians celebrate on these holiest of days the saving work God has accomplished in Christ.

what does vocation mean to you? Vocation mains a call from God to each of us. My favorite description of vocation is Prederick Burchmer's. "The place God cells you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." I wish my parents had told me what they thought they saw as my vocation, because my parents gave me a lost of freedom ("Whatever makes you happy, honey!") without a lost of guidance about my gifts and abilities. I didn't really know myself or what I would be good at, so I wish someone had helped me identify what I was good at. However, I'm also glad no one explicitly told me what my vocation is, because life is full of surprises and unexpected turns so I don't think anyone can reill you what your vocation is. Propie can offer guidance, but should not pigeonhole you into a particularly vocation is. Perent is important to reflect on what you see in your children and tell them what they'd be really good at, here or your observations of your child throughout his or her life.

What is the best, or most feverite thing, about being Principal? Everything! There are only two things I don't look forward to so far: having to terminate people or to expel students. I'm not looking forward to either of those. But I love supporting teachers, and all that goes with the job. By strongly supporting teachers I can make a difference in the lives of students as well. And there is a lot of variety, every day is new and different. It's the most enjoyable job five ever had.

It's a Good Thing

Dear Parents and Students

Sometimes friends call me the "Martha Stewart" of their acquair take that as a compliment and not in reference to any prison time!) becau of my desire to create beautiful surroundings for friends and family. For those of you not familiar with Martha and her empire, one of her catch phrases is "It's a good thing!" Speaking of good things, it's a wonderful time of year. A milestone looms in the near future for Christian Brothers' families, a situation many find themselves facing with some trepidation. In just a matter of weeks, our seniors will graduate from high school and soon thereafter move off to college. I remember well this beachmark in the lives of my children, particularly for my youngest and most recent. I know she would be home for summers and holidays, but it would no longer be the same. The empty nest was upon us after thirty-two years of raising children. The college acceptance letters arriving each day heralded the advent of this inevitable change, the third high school graduation portrait was hung in the stairwell, and the days counted down to Amustasia's departure. It was on exciting time, but I must say, it was an excitement tinged with sadness. For those of you with seniors, the lives of your graduating children are changing, but so are yours as purents. They move on to a new level of independence, a life full of promise. We remain, though diminished. One less loved one with whom to interact on a daily basis, one more empty bedroom.

But it is "a good thing," If our children are able to move off to college and make a success of it, then it is good. This job of parenting is one where our obsolescence is an indication of our success. Perhaps obsolescence is not the exact word, but when we can say of our children that they no longer need us (at least on a daily level), then that is our reward. C. S. Lewis says of parental love that "it must work towards its own abdication." For all of their lives, we guide our children to higher and higher levels of independence. But it is not always easy to recognize that independence. We teach them to crawl, and then walk, and then ride a bike. Not much to segue with there - we all crawl and walk and ride in much the same way. But we also teach them to think, to learn, to have faith, and to express themselves, and here validation of their independence is more difficult. They do, after all, become their own people, and we do not always hold exactly the same views or values. While this may be disconcerting at times, parents must take heart as they remember the scripture which tells us, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Proverbs 22:6). When he or she is old - but watch out for those intervening years of conflict!

This scripture is so true to life - it recognizes the inevitable struggle between parent and child in the very difficult process of training. Few children comply at once on every issue: there is always a process of choice, acting on choice, and experiencing the consequences, good or bad. Our role as paeroes, difficult as it may be, is to trust the process, especially when we can foresee that the consequences will be bad. We must resist the urge to shield our children from the pain of suffering the consequences of their bad choices (within reasonable boundaries, clearly). We, of course, present to them the raise and boundaries. We explain the proper direction. We main them. But when they do step conside the boundaries and make the wrong choice (as they most certainly

will do at times), we need to let them fall. This, too, is training. The next time it will work better. And when they are old, they will not depart from it (and they will repeat the process with their own children and finally understand our struggle - not to mention the well-deserved and much anticipated payback.").

Sometimes children choose well; they do not always thwart our advice. But it is the process of choice which allows them to grow and learn. Dr. Jay Hoecker of the Mayo Clinic explains, "Your child will develop a clear and resilient sense of self only by making his or her own choices, one small decision at a time." I am not an advocate of always letting children choose - sometimes parents need to mandate and demand compliance. But we can model faith for our children and offer them multiple good choices in many areas and let them choose between them. Any time they choose a negative direction which was not offered, then experiencing the consequence is the best teacher.

My own children were accepted at a number of excellent colleges. We offered our advice, but then they had to choose. It was not a decision between the wrong choice or the right choice. Any decision would have worked, but it had to be their choice, knowing that choice would have determine the course of their lives. An alternate choice would have determined a different course. Not better or worse, just different. But the method of choosing using a process of prayerful discernment helped them to develop as people and at the same time take ownership of their own futures (though another lesson they will have to learn is that "we can make our plans, but the Lord determines our steps" – Proverbs 16:19). The more we can help them along that path in the little things each day, the better.

We will shortly graduate a remarkable group of students whose own choices, along with the influence and guidance of parents, teachers, and others, have directed them to this very good place. The families of incoming freshmen face similar transitional concerns, though one significant decision has already been made with the correct choice of the best school! Those in between know well that every day presents opportunities for achieving increasing levels of independence through the options their students face along with their resulting choices. Christian Brothers is a good place to make those choices - we are all privileged to participate in an environment whose mission is to provide educational excellence in a loving. Choice-centered community that is devoted to the intellectual and personal maturity of each student.

Congratulations to our extraordinary graduates – and to them I say, somember, once a Brothers boy or girl, always a Brothers boy or girl. Choose wisely, It's a good thing!

VOCATIONS

Brother Anwar, Brother Ken, Brother Lewis, Brother Tony, Brother Michael, Brother Bob, and Brother George joined us for two great days during Vocation Awareness Week last month. Our Lasallian Parent Club and every one of our students met the Christian Brothers Novices in their Religious Studies class, heard their vocation stories, and asked questions about life as a Brother and about vocation in general.

Students' faces lit up when they heard some of the Brothers' favorite apps and musical artists. Frequently heard comment from students? "The Brothers are so cool-they're normal, just like us?"

Someone asked Brother Michael if he thought there were fewer vocations today than in past generations. He thoughtfully replied he doesn't believe God is calling fewer people to do His work, but rather that we've forgotten how to listen to God's call. We have eliminated silence in our lives, and God speaks to us in silence. All the Brothers revealed their vocation journeys had unfolded in a series of small steps, by simply saying "yes" to the next step. All also said their families' support was essential in both discovering and fulfilling their vocation.

We interviewed Mr. Kevin Van Den Bogart of the Science Department on the topic of vocation

"My vocation was revealed to me through my interests. When I was first introduced to pre-algebra, I found it interesting and exciting to learn. It was full to work with symbols, not just numbers. I decided to focus on math and science and be an engineer. My high school physics teacher was cool and did a lot of cool stuff, which supported my interest in science. My father was a computer engineer, so I was exposed to that and I watched a lot of PBS and watched "The Voyage of the Mimi" and "3-2-1- Contact", I worked two years as an engineer at intel. I created some parts of the original Pentium

lenioved tutoring and teaching others what I knew translating what I knew into more simple language for others to understand. So there were hints of my vocation in my life when I was 16. I joined the Peace Corps in 2000-02 and taught in West Africa. So you see, teaching was part of my life from high school on. You can get caught up in other things in life, and it isn't until later you see things that were there all along. I believe God has a predetermined plan, but there are many discrepant events that set me on this trajectory to where I am today, they have no commonality, yet they led me here.

I'm passionate about communicating to others what I find interesting—the physics, and just understanding how the universe works from the point of view of science. In college you will learn more about yourself. Take advantage of that to make friendships and explore news things. You'll change dramatically during the college years!
