Happy New Year.

Normally, Mr. Schulze, our Principal, opens each edition of Falcon Family News with a letter. This month, he has kindly allowed me this privilege. With this letter, I wish to share with you a little bit about my background, my role at Christian Brothers, and some thoughts on new beginnings.

### I am proud to begin this journey with you

There are many nervous souls on campus these first few weeks. I join with the freshmen, the transfer students, new parents, and new faculty/staff as one who is starting a new chapter in life, and happy to be doing so at Christian Brothers High School.

For the past eight years, I served as President of Chaminade-Julienne Catholic H.S. in Dayton, Ohio. "C-J" is a school very similar to "CB" in terms of the religious vision which guides the school, its history, student body composition, academic and cocurricular activities. Prior to that, I served as teacher, coach, and Assistant to the President at Loyola High School in Los Angeles. I hold a degree in Liberal Arts from Loyola Marymount University and an M.B.A from Woodbury University.

My wife, Patti and I have three sons. While we thoroughly enjoyed our eight years in Ohio, we are very happy to be back in our native California. Patti and I are from Visalia and Los Angeles, respectively. Our family is peppered throughout the state.

When Patti and I were looking to move west to be closer to family, we looked at several opportunities. We were not just looking for a 'job.' We were looking for a family-friendly city to raise our children. We were looking for a parish community with a strong school for our three soas. We knew the high school where I chose to minister would be the school they would attend.

I have ministered in Catholic education for fifteen years. I have worked for four religious orders in three schools, in three states. Christian Brothers is a strong, healthy school. As parents, you can be proud that your children are getting an outstanding education from professional educators and Christian role models.

I am happy to be here. I am honored to have the opportunity to serve.

My role in your sons' and doughters' education

I am not on the front line with your children every day. But I am

there in spirit. Everything I do is done to ensure that your children receive a first class Catholic education in the Lasallian tradition. For the most part, my work is done behind the scenes and beyond our campus.

My job is to make sure the mission of Christian Brothers High School is vibrant and tangible for today's students and to take the steps necessary so that this educational ministry serves our Church and broader community for generations to come. To this end, I am involved with governance relationships (Board of Trustees, the Christian Brothers' District of San Francisco, etc.) financial oversight, fundraising, public relations, strategic planning, campus development, and other matters. As President, I delegate the daily operation of the school to Mr. Schulze and the rest of the administrative staff. It is my responsibility to provide Mr. Schulze and our staff with the vision and the resources to provide your daughters and sons with a first class Catholic education in the Lasallian tradition. Relieved from the demands of these aforementioned responsibilities, Mr. Schulze can focus on what a Principal is trained and inclined to do. This model of school leadership enables Mr. Schulze to focus on students, parents, faculty/staff, curriculum, co-curricular activities, etc.

### Some thoughts on new beginnings

Whether you are a third generation Falcon or new to this community, each school year is a fresh start. Two hallmarks of our Cutholic faith are forgiveness and hope. Let's show these teeragers by our own adult actions that God wants us to constantly reflect on our past and pursue our potential.

As parents, you are the primary educators of your children. As teachers, we are trained professionals. Thank you for entrusting your children to Christian Brothers High School. Together our partnership will give your children the religious roots, the self confidence, and the experiences to achieve their God-given potential. Let us make sure that our words of encouragement and our actions inspire these young men and women to make good choices.

To those parents whom I have met, thank you for the warm welcome you have extended to my family and me. I have been deeply touched by the warmth of this community. I look forward to school activities and events which will give me the opportunity to meet you and your children over the course of this school year.



LITURGIES: We began the school year with an outdoor liturgy, the Mass of the Holy Spirit, on Aug. 26. Fr. Daniel Looney, the paster of St. James Church in Davis, presided at the Mass, and Mr. Rudy Schulze, our principal, gave the reflection. Parents are always invited to join us at our school liturgies. All liturgies begin at 9:30 A.M. Upcoming Liturgies: Sept. 19 – Sophomore Family Liturgy (on the main lawn); Oct. 24 – Frosh Family Liturgy; Nov. 1 – All Saints' Day Liturgy; Nov. 25 – Thanksgiving Liturgy; Dec. 8 – Immaculate Conception Liturgy.

RETREATS: The Senior Retreat Leadership Team held their training session/retreat at the end of August at St. Joseph's Camp on the Russian River. By the end of the three days there, after praying, eating, and sharing time on the beach together, we all felt like one big family! The seniors will be busy this school year leading the Frosh, Sophomore, and Junior retreats. The Senior Kairos Retreats will be held October 19-2, January 25-28, and March 15-18. This is a four-day, student-led retreat grounded in the Christian belief that God is very much a part of our real world, especially through the continuing presence of Jesus Christ as he shows himself to us through our family and friends. Kairos is an experience of Christian community with a series of talks given by both student peers and adults. Prayer and self-discovery are also essential parts of this program, as well as the retreatants' involvement in discussions and other exercises. A letter will go home next week to all senior parents with details about this retreat.

Junior retreats, a one-day retreat held at Christ the King Retreat Center in Orangevale, occur during the second semester. A letter with details will go home to all junior parents after the Christmas break. The focus of this retreat is "journey." Juniors are also invited to make their Kairos retreat early, the week after school is out, when they are "brand-new" seniors. Junior Retreat Dates: Feb. 18; March 4; April 26; Junior Kairos Retreat: May 31-June 3

Sophomore retreats, held at the Newman Center (across from CSUS), will begin in February. Focusing on "values and choices," these one-day retreats will be further explained in a letter to sophomore parents that will go home after the Christmas break. Sophomore Retreat Dates: Feb. 1; March 1; April 12 and 29

Frosh retreats occur during the first semester at the Marello Retreat Center in Loomis. The frosh attend these retreats with their religious studies classmates and teacher. This is a mandatory retreat; all frosh are required to attend. The frosh will explore their self-identity, their new CBHS identity, and their new membership in the worldwide Lasallian family. Details of this retreat will be in a letter to frosh parents that will be sent home next week. Frosh Retreat Dates: Sept. 14 and 28; Oct. 5 and 26; Nov. 5

Sophomore, Junior, and Senior retreats are optional. Students may eign up for these vetreats in Campus Ministry.

### Marinara Sauce... a recipe from Mr. Schulze

2 t extra-virgin olive oil

1 finely chopped onion ("minced" would be too fine; I like a little texture)

½ bunch Italian parsley leaves (rough chop)

5-10 leaves of fresh basil (stems removed; rough chop)

2-3 large cloves of garlic, minced

2 28 oz. cams whole pecled San Marzano tomatoes

1 t salt

3 T tomato paste
a dash of dried oregano (optional)

Pepper to taste
1 splash of (good) red wine

Heat the olive oil in a large 4-quart saucepan over medium heat. Add the onion and sauté until translucent, about 10 min. Add the parsley and garlic and cook briefly to release their "essences." Drain peeled tomatoes and mash with utensil or hands. Reserve juice. Do not pulverize or use a blender—some texture is important. However, for a very smooth sauce, pulverize. Add basil, oregano, tomato paste and salt. Simmer at least 25-30 minutes. After about ten minutes, add a good splash of red wine, some of the reserved juice, and continue simmering until reduced to the proper consistency, stirring occasionally. (For thinner sauce, add more juice or wine!)

Taste and adjust the seasonings (salt and pepper). If the sauce tastes too acidic, add a pinch of baking soda. If the sauce needs more sweetness, add a pinch of sugar. ENJOY!!


We are committed to Excellence in Athletics! Go Falcons!

### Dean's Diary

Dear Parents:

In 0.06 seconds, the search engine on my computer produced 266,000 results for the entry: Integrity cheating. I guess I'm not the only one thinking about this. One of the articles I found—"Why Integrity Matters"—is well worth reading (http://iga.ucdavis.cdu/integl.htm). This brief article discusses the consequences of dishonesty—the erosion of one's self-worth, personal relationships, community, and trust.

I believe that there are two underlying reasons why students choose to cheat: sloth and unrealistic parental expectations. Either they are just plain lazy or we adults are setting them up for a fall. On the one hand, students often choose not to do the work for a variety of reasons and indulge their indolent, sluggish, and lazy (slothful) tendencies. In effect, they choose not to learn and to take the "easy way out." On the other hand, parents can unwittingly place unrealistic expectations upon their children whose abilities and talents could not possibly meet the demand.

Somewhere along the line the designation "college prep" became an "outcome" rather than the "process" of education. The "outcome" was further measured by a rather select list of colleges and universities regardless of ability, talent, and sometimes even desire. We have forgotten that "college prep" means that the school attests to the fact that a student who successfully completes its curriculum is prepared for a number of higher education opportunities. It does not guarantee anything more or less.

I have known far too many students who played a sport they never enjoyed playing because doing so "promised" them a scholarship; and others who declared a major simply because it "promised" financial security. I wonder if we give students enough time and opportunities to discover their talents and strengths, or do we simply chart the course for them and demand nothing less than what we probably know they are incapable of giving. Have we set our kids up for a fall?

We have lost the true meaning of "average." For me "average" means that I have done my very best no matter what the grade is. In some areas, most of us are "average." In others, we run the gamut from "pitiful" to "exceptional." For example, I am "pitiful" at basketball and "average" at math. And yet, many students perceive that "average" is completely unacceptable to their parents and peers and therefore feel compelled to find ways (cheating) to make "average" look "exceptional." Sometimes cheating in the classroom or on the playing fields or with one's body is "the easy way out" (sloth), and sometimes cheating is "the only way out" (of unrealistic expectations).

At what cost? If we do not choose a course of action that is based on doing the right thing because it is the right thing to do, we will have surrendered to the lowest form of moral development: "I won't cheat because I will get caught!"

I invite you to sit down one night and ask your children'lf they cheat. Talk about all kinds of cheating: academic, personal, relational, and physical. When, how, why? If the "why" is the result of their indolence, then ground them for life. If the "why" is connected to your expectations, (realistic or not), then you have an opening for honest dialogue about who they are and how they hope to shape their lives. Catch all the pronouns there: who they are and how they hope to shape their lives. You also have a chance to speak about integrity and to ask them to be young men and women of their word. If they choose to perform at a level beneath their "very best," they must suffer the

I remember Stephen Blankley who worked as hard as I've ever seen a kid work on a major paper. He was not a naturally gifted writer; the skills and techniques had to be learned and practiced and integrated into his writing style over and over again. The day I returned the papers, I was walking by the pay phones at recess, (It was a long time ago.), and overheard Stephen say excitedly: "Mom, I got an A-. (Pause for Mom.) I know I worked hard." That was about 25 years ago. Stephen still teaches me lessons about integrity, plagiarism, cheating, and doing my very best.

If you find out anything about cheating that we should know, call us.

  whatever it takes to help your son/daughter achieve a worthy future.



### NEWS FROM THE GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT



The school year is in full gear with many activities and events sponsored by the Guidance Department! Mrs. Hesser, assisted by Mr. Riley-Portal, hosted College Night for Seniors and Their Parents in mid-September, and presented important and timely college information to an enthusiastic crowd of seniors and parents.

The freshman counselor, Ms. Bell, assisted by Mr. Purdy, Ms. Kambas, and Mr. Morrison hosted *Frosh Guidance*Night on September 29. This Guidance evening is a program especially designed for parents of freshman and deals with
the academic, social, and psychological changes experienced by young people as they transition to high school. Tips on
beginning college planning were also presented.

Wednesday, October 13 is an important day for students at CB. Testing Day is a half-day of school that involves freshman, sophomores, and juniors in college admission testing and career planning. Coordinated by the counselors, teachers administer the following assessments to students:

Juniors will take the PSAT/NMSQT Exam (preliminary SAT L) This test is great practice for the new SAT, and also allows high achieving students to qualify for participation in the National Merit Program.

Sophomores will take the PLAN exam (practice ACT.) This is an opportunity for tenth graders to experience what the ACT test is about. The PLAN also includes a career component and invites students to self-report college plans and academic strengths and weaknesses.

Freshmen will take the EXPLORE exam (an achievement test which also includes a career interest inventory). This exam will assist them in identifying their academic strengths and offer career options based on the results of the test.

Seniors will have the day off.

Please mark your calendars for this important day and remind your child to get plenty of rest the night before and eat a healthy breakfast. Results of the exams will be returned to students by their counselor in January, 2005. 

Dear Parents:

I am often complimented on how well-mannered and polite our students are, how comfortable they are with adults and guests, and how well they carry themselves. I am convinced that the credit belongs to you as parents. However, we also see them in the many other lights and shadows of their days.

In 1703, the Founder, Saint John Baptist de La Salle, published a wonderful little book entitled *The Rules of Christian Decorage* and Civility in which he describes Christian decorum as "that wise and well-regulated conduct which governs what we do and say. It arises from sentiments of modesty, respect, union, and charity toward our neighbor. It leads us to give due regard to proper times and places, and to the persons with whom we have to deal." (4)

We do not live in the France of Louis XIV and so some of the Founder's admonitions and directives are not only inappropriate for today's manners and customs, but are actually quite amusing. I have chosen ten of them for your edification and enjoyment. I want you to see how practical a man he was, how he read the signs of his times and prepared his students for the real world of seventeenth-century France, and how he looked beyond textbooks and lessons to help students live a human and Christian life. Remember that in 1950 Pope Pius XII proudly named Saint John Baptist de La Salle the Patron of Touchers—an extraordinary distinction and witness for the universal Church.

When seated, do not sprawl out in a slovesly way nor lean too noticeably against the back of your chair. (10)

It is not appropriate to wear a feather behind your ear or to put flowers in your ear or to have pierced ears with earrings. This is most inappropriate for a man, for it is a sign of slavery, which is not at all becoming. (12)

Do not, however, stare fixedly at anyone, especially persons of the opposite sex or persons of higher rank. And if it is proper to look at anyone, do this in a natural manner, gently and decently, so that no one can recognize in your glances any ill-regulated passion or offection. (20)

After spitting into your handkerchief, fold it immediately, without looking at it, and replace it in your pocket. It is extremely rude to spit out of a window, or into the fire...or even against a wall, or in any place where the spittle can be stepped on. (30)

It is altogether against politeness to lean on your elbows while listening to someone talk. It is even more impolite to do so at table, and to adopt this posture while praying would be a gross lack of respect for God. (32) When in company it is most uncouth to let gas escape your body, whether from the upper or lower part, even if this done without noise. And it is shameful and disgusting to do so in such a weythat you can be heard by others. (37)

Still, it is not always advisable to adopt all the newest fashions right away. Some of them are capricious and bizarre, just as there are some which are reasonable and conformable to decorum.... You should also change your shirt frequently, at least every week, and see to it that it is always white. (50-51)

When you are being served sliced portions of meat, it is rude to stretch out your plate hurriedly so as to be one of the first served. This is a sign and consequence of extreme greediness. (65)

With regard to [dances], suffice it to say that these are gatherings where behavior is neither Christian nor refined. They take place at night, for it seems that people want to hide from themselves the unbecoming things that take place and prefer to engage in them under cover of darkness so as to feel freer to do what is wrong. (94)

If any young persons have been left at your house, it is not proper to send them home alone, especially after nightfull; and if it is some distance to their homes, you should take them home yourself or entrust them to some reliable person for this purpose. (107)

The Rules of Christian Decorum and Civility by John Baptist de La Salle, translated by Richard Arandez, FSC and edited by Gregory Wright, FSC in 1990, is available for \$15. Log onto http://db.cbconf.org/cbc/index.html. I think the students would enjoy the book and it would make a great stocking stuffer!

For us in 2004, a few practical matters. We do not allow students to wear hats inside of buildings. We teach them to have a firm handshake and to make eye contact when they are speaking to individuals or to a group. Our "dressy dress days" are themselves lessons in how to dress for special occasions. Recently, I have been embarrassed about this generation's notion of appropriate dress for a funeral: shorts, athletic shoes, and young women whose outfits wouldn't pass our dance dress code much less our "dressy dress" code. I wondered how they got out of the house.

A good friend of mine worked in the Capitol for many years. He regularly interviewed students for internships and adults for other government positions. In going through hundreds of résumés each year, one spelling error was enough to bounce the résumé to the circular file. "The word oppo is your problem, not the government's problem." If the candidate was interviewed, how

they dressed and how they conducted themselves were important. A wrinkled shirt or slacks, a too-short skirt, and a five o'clock shadow were death knells

Preparing students for "life" was a foundational element of the Founder's mission to provide students with a "human and Christian education." He wrote another book entitled The Conduct of Schools—a kind of recipe book for school administrators-which discusses daily life in the schools, establishing and maintaining order in the schools, and the training of new teachers. How students conducted themselves, the life lessons they were taught about manners and civility, and their preparation as good and productive citizens of society were of paramount importance because these were means to an end: the salvation of their souls through a good, healthy, and productive Christian life. That's all that really matters to us here: the salvation of their souls.

### NEWS FROM THE GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

A Word to Senior Parents

Mrs. Hesser, Director of Guidance Services and College Counselor

The Senior class is involved now in the very serious business of applying to colleges. The first of the early applications have already been mailed, and both the University of California and California State University applications have a November 30 deadline. The process of application, with its possibility of rejection as well as acceptance, is stressful for everyone involved.

Some of the stress can be reduced. By and large, the seniors have the process well in hand and there should be little or no last minute panic. Essays are being written, auditions prepared, portfolios assembled. Students have contacted their recommenders. Students who are still selecting colleges to which they will apply have taken the standardized testing, determined their priorities, and organized the task at hand. To be so well into the process in early December means that students have time to present thoughtful applications.

At September's National Conference of College and Admissions Counselors, several sessions addressed various tension points in the process of communication between applicant and college. One of them is this: as deadlines are met, the colleges' admission offices fill up with mail (applications, recommendations, transcripts, and so forth) — all of this needs to be filled before folders are read. Often, during the filling period, colleges send letters to applicants noting that some materials are not yet in the files. Don't panie! The material in question is usually in the admissions office itself, somewhere in those sacks of mail and yet to be filed. The letters go out as a sort of insurance. Admissions offices, too, are under pressure to get all the folders complete for timely and considered reading. Harvard, for example, is very careful when asking for a second copy of any material to note that this sort of difficulty would in no way jeopardize an applicant's chance of admission. This assurance was reiterated at the conference by spokespeople at many college admission offices. The appropriate response to a letter like this is merely to ask me to call and verify the file. By the time the student speaks to me and I call the Admissions Office with a request to check the file, it is usually complete. I keep copies of everything that is mailed from the College Office, and encourage students to keep copies of their applications. Colleges also encourage making a copy of all application materials for the student's own records. Should any document be missing from an admissions file, there is plenty of time to fax a duplicate. The sooner I am contacted, the sooner I can ease everyone's concerns.

As your student completes and sends the applications, the pressure is reduced. The auxiety of waiting for the colleges responses, however, remains. Your confidence in the positive outcome of your child's application work is a great support — as are your congratulations on the completion of a complex task. The class of 2005 is working hard on the college application process, and I congratulate them on a job well done!

### Parent/Student Handbook - pages 14-15

### Planned Absences

Requests for permission to miss part or all of a school day for any other cause than those defined in this Handbook as "excused absences" must be submitted in writing, using the "Absence Permission Form," five (5) school days before a decision is needed. Each of the student's teachers must acknowledge the absence and sign the "Absence Permission Form" in order for it to be excused without further consideration.... If the request is approved by the Dean, the absence will be considered "excused. The student is then responsible for class work missed and is to follow the guidelines established and published by the teachers regarding missed tests and quizzes. If the request is denied by the Dean, any absence will be considered "unexcused."

### College Visitations

Seniors and juniors are permitted two school days to visit colleges although they are encouraged to visit colleges during Christmas and Easter vacations and on other school holidays. Students must clear these visits beforehand through the Director of Guidance Services. Students are responsible for all work missed while absent. The "Request to Visit a College Campus" form is available in Brother Edward Hall and must be approved by the Director of Guidance Services in advance of each visit so that the absence is excused. The Director of Guidance Services will file a copy with the Altendance Office. If the absence is not cleared in advance, the Dean of Students will consider the absence "unexcused" with its amendant consequences. Upon returning to school, a completed "College Visit Evaluation" form must also be filed with the Director of Guidance Services. This procedure applies to each campus visit.

Mr. Schulze's Turkey Stuffing Tacchino Ripieno



### Ingredients:

1 stick of butter

Olive Oil

2 cggs (slightly beaten)

3 garlic cloves (finely chopped) 3 medium onions (finely chopped)

1 bunch of celery, including leaves (chopped)

1 Granny Smith apple (peeled, cored, and diced)

8-10 fresh mushrooms (medium size, sliced)

3 mild Italian sausages

3 slices of prosciutto (thickness of a quarter, cut into ½-inch squares)

1/4 cup of pine nuts (lightly toasted)

1-1% cups of white and wild rice

2 cups unseasoned croutons (homemade or good brand-Acme,

Grace Baking)

I cup good white wine (Chardonney)

15.1 thyme

salt and freshly ground black pepper

You need 3 pots going on at the same time! (Or pace yourself!) (1) Cook the rice according to directions and allow to cool thoroughly.

(2) Remove the sausages from their casings, cook thoroughly in a skillet with 2 T of olive oil over medium-high heat until browned, breaking up the meat with a fork. Drain and put dry with paper towels. (3) In a skillet, melt 4 T of butter and 2 T of olive oil and sauté garlie, onions, and celery until the onions are a light golden color (about 10-15 minutes). Add apples and mushrooms and cook about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add % cup of (good) white wine. (If you wouldn't drink it, don't cook with stf.) Add cooked sausage and prosciutto and cook for three minutes more. Cool the mixture thoroughly. When everything is cooled, combine mixture with rice, croutons, eggs, pine nuts, and % cup of white wine. You may use more or less wine, rice, eggs, or croutons than indicated, so add them slowly until the proper "stuffing consistency" is achieved. When in doubt, add more rice or croutons! Refrigerate before using.

Either stuff the bird (Don't overstuff!) or serve in a buttered casserole (325 degrees for 35-40 minutes). Be careful that the stuffing doesn't dry out in the oven—use more wine! Hoppy Thankugiving!

With this issue, I wish to communicate to you our operational response to the unforeseeable loss our school community has suffered.

As president, it is my responsibility to hire a principal. This is my single most important responsibility. In my eight years as a Catholic high school president, I have had to hire an interim principal and a long-term principal. In approaching our situation this past month, I have drawn on those experiences. I have also consulted with members of the faculty/staff, the Board of Trustees, and the broader Lasallian family of the District of San Francisco. Our school community is fortunate to have so many caring individuals.

I am pleased to announce that Brother Dan Morgan, FSC will serve as our Interim Principal for the remainder of the 2004-05 school year. His first official day will be Monday, November 29. Brother Dan comes to Christian Brothers H.S. with 25 years experience in Catholic secondary education. He has served at five schools in a variety of capacities; including two stints as Principal. He taught at CB from 1980 to 1985 and during the 2003-04 school

He holds two Masters Degrees, one in Communications and one in Education. Brother Dan was enjoying a sabbatical in the state of Washington this year. He has agreed to postpone his studies in order to return to CB. We are very fortunate to have a person of Brother Dan's character and experience to serve our school community under these circumstances. It is a strong sign of how devoted the Christian Brothers are to our school.

As Interim Principal, Brother Dan will work closely with Mr. Barsanti, Mr. English, Mrs. Powers, and Mr. Schumann, as well as the rest of the faculty/staff to ensure that this school year continues to provide excellence at all levels for our students. We have a very strong and mission-oriented administrative team. I am confident they will work well with Brother Dan to serve your sons and daughters. Although he is an Interim Principal, Brother Dan will have the authority to make any and all decisions that normally fall on the desk of the Principal. Brother Dan will also ensure that we continue to look beyond the immediate to ensure that Christian Brothers continues to be a leader in Catholic education and a servant to our Church for future generations. To this end, he will be instrumental in ensuring a smooth transition to a longterm principal. A thorough search process to attract a long-term principal will begin after the holidays.

Advent is a time of new beginnings. As we wait with breathless anticipation for the celebration of Our Lord's birth, let us all take time to count our blessings. It is hard to understand why God took Mr. Schulze. Ours is not to understand. Ours is to have faith that Rudy is reveling in the joy of eternal life. Ours is not to dwell on the blessings He has chosen to take from us, but rather to enjoy the blessings God has given us.

### NEWS FROM THE GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

Mrs. Hesser, Director of Guidance Services and College Counselor About College Entrance Exams

Most colleges and universities require a college entrance test score as part of the application process. The two national tests are the ACT (American College Test) and the SAT I (Scholastic Assessment Test). Most four-year colleges and universities will accept either score. Here in the West, the SAT is more widely known and three times as many students take the SAT as the ACT. Both tests are officeed at local area high schools 6-7 times throughout the year. Christian Brothers is a test center for both the ACT and the SAT - we administer both exams on dates in October, April, and May.

Research indicates that students often perform differently on the ACT and SAT I. The tests, while considered equally for admission, are different in the material covered. The ACT test content has four areas: English, Math, Reading, and Science Reasoning. The goal of the ACT is to measure academic achievement in the four areas and contains analytical and problem-solving exercises related to what has been learned in class. Beginning in March 2005, the ACT will also offer an optional Writing section. The NEW SAT I (first exam March 2005) tests critical reading, math skills, and writing, and is designed to measure academic aptitude in analytical skills, numeric reasoning, and writing. Current juniors should use the next few months to prepare for the new SAT and plan on taking it for the first time in March.

Though the trend seems to be to begin taking these tests earlier and earlier in a student's high school career, we do not see any significant benefit to this action. Taking the tests too early is not advised, especially if the student has not covered the course work necessary to gain the skills needed for a successful testing experience. Since Christian Brothers has all sophomores take the PLAN test (the practice ACT exam) and all junious take the PSAT (the preliminary SAT exam), we have avenues for students to explore the testing experience. There is never a penalty for taking a test early, however, or for taking a test more than once. Colleges will see every score, but always take the highest score. The UC system takes the best score from one sitting; many private colleges and the CSU system will take a student's highest score from each section from different sittings and combine them into the highest possible

Since colleges will accept either the SAT or ACT and take the highest score, we recommend that students take both tests. A student who has had three years of science may do better on the ACT; a student who is strong in English and writing may do better on the new SAT. It will help to compare results from the PLAN and the PSAT and see which score is stronger to help predict your score on either test. By taking both exams, students increase their chances of achieving a successful score.

SAT II tests are subject area tests that UC and some selective private colleges require. Beginning in March, the UC system requires two subject area tests that are the student's choice (in addition to the SAT I or ACT). It is important to register and take these exams by fall of the senior year.

We recommend juniors take the tests in the spring of their junior year. They will then have time to take the tests again in full of their senior year if they wish to improve their scores. Seniors should not take the tests into the year 2005, as these test dates are too late to be submitted with other application material. Students should register for the SAT test online at <a href="https://www.collegeboard.com">www.collegeboard.com</a> and the ACT at <a href="https://www.act.org">www.collegeboard.com</a> and the

Admission test scores are only one piece of information a college looks at when considering applications. A student's GPA, number and rigor of college prep courses completed, and other factors are also considered. These factors include co-curricular activities, the college essay, community service, and other aspects of the individual that make him/her distinctive. It should also be noted that a growing number of schools are accepting applications with no testing requirement; instead they are requiring writing samples or other data. Be sure to come to College Nights here at CB and check out the college section of the CB website for more information.

### Would You Like to Take a Religious Studies Course - A Survey of Catholic Subject Areas?

For some years now, we have all heard comments from parents on Back-to-School night such as these: "I would like to take this course myself." "Boy, this is interesting staff. I wish I were back in school again." "Why don't you have some classes for parents," Parents, and others, are very interested in the topics that are covered in our religious studies classes, but they have neither the opportunity nor the connections to be able to pursue them. Under the sponsorship of De La Salle University, the new tertiary education project that the Brothers are beginning in the Sacramento region, we can now do something about that.

Religious Studies instructors at the school have responded positively to an invitation to teach short, concentrated classes in the religion subjects that they teach every day to their students. The next step is to find out if enough parents and others are interested in participating.

Proposed Course: A Survey of Catholic Subject Areas

Description: This is a course designed for parents of high school students and other adults who have expressed an interest in "taking" the courses that high-school-aged students are taking. A range of religious subject areas representing the scope of a contemporary high school religion curriculum will be surveyed in 2-hour increments by current instructors who specialize in those specific areas. The course is geared towards adults, highly condensed, and a great way of becoming familiar with contemporary religious topics and resources among Catholics, Christians, and all people of faith.

Details: The classes would be held on the following dates: Jan.18; Feb. 15; March 15; April 19; May 17. Each class would be held from 7 – 9 PM at the school. Topics would be chosen from among Hebrew Scripture / Christian Testament, Christian Morality; Church History; Social Justice; Christian Lifestyles; Comparative Religions; Catholic Social Teaching; The Mystery of Suffering and Death, Lasallian Spirituality, and others.

Credit: Those who wish may receive 1.0 CEU credit for the course through Saint Mary's College.

Cost: There would be a nominal cost for these courses - not more than \$100 for the entire series - primarily in order to provide a stirend for the teachers and cover basic overhead.

If enough parents and others express an interest in participating, the course will be offered. Please let me know if you might be interested in attending one or more of these classes. By responding through email, I will be able to keep you informed. Please invite others (neighbors, relatives, book-club members, etc.) to consider this class for their personal spiritual growth.

The catalogue lists a description of the courses, their pre-requisites, as well as the requirements for Christian Brothers' graduation and admission to the University of California (UC) and California State University (CSU) campuses.

Students will attend a class meeting to explain the pre-registration process on Friday, January 21, 2005. The counselors and Mr. Schumann will be present to answer questions. The schedule for Pre-Registration Duy, Friday, January 28, is as follows:

Please note that there are no classes on this day and the only times students must be present are during the hours indicated above. Unexcused absences will result in detention.

The majority of this "blogging" is positive and has enhanced our lives. Many of our kids have turned to "blogs" as a way to express themselves and talk about their lives with friends. In some respects these are similar to the journals and diaries we kept back in our youth; however, there is one glaring difference: we kept our journals in our sock drawer—private, and not open for comment on the World Wide Web.

Much of the content of these "blogs" is predictable: "I hate math," "School stinks," "I broke up with my girlfriend," and "My parents do not understand me." Sound familiar? Unfortunately, being adolescents, students often do not fully understand three major issues that arise from "blogging": 1) the content can go too far; 2) what students think is private can end up being public and harmful; and 3) specific references to their school and its community compromise reputations.

At times, inappropriate language, pictures, and information not in keeping with the values of our school, appear in these "blogs." Recently, it has come to our attention that postings include personal information, the school name and logos, provocative pictures, and questionable stories.

Additionally, the assumption made by students that blogs are private and protected is inaccurate. Imagine that back in high school, you wrote a personal note to a friend about a crush you had on another student. If that note was lost, personal details and feelings were now out of your control. Worse yet, the note was shown to others and open for comment by strangers. Certainly this would be an embarrassing situation. Now multiply this by the access of the World Wide Web. Our kids assume that there are built-in protections, but that is not the case.

Finally, the Christian Brothers High School community has a valued and trusted reputation that is important to all of us. Content and remarks that cast a shadow on any part of our community and its reputation are not acceptable. The 2004-2005 Parent/Student Handbook states: "Students who establish personal web sites, or participate in "web blogs" containing material or connections to material contrary to the mission and philosophy of Christian Brothers may be suspended or dismissed" (page 11 and page 22).

What should we all do? On behalf of the school administration, there is no move to stop "blogs" or "blogging" across the board. The purpose of this article is to make you aware of this trend and to provide you an opportunity to discuss the topic with your children. While talking with your child, find out how these "blogs" work and whether or not your child has one. Make him or her aware of the above-mentioned issues and help them see the dangers and any consequences that may arise. Any reference to the school, names of people within the school community, or personal information should be removed. If the school is forced to act because inappropriate items have been posted that we are made aware of, then we will do so properly in accordance with the "Rules and Code of Ethics for Technology" and "Failures in Good Order" sections of the Parent/Student Handbook. The school has a right to correct this behavior for the protection of all concerned.

Please help your children see that this is not meant to be another circumstance where authority figures are trying to run their lives, but rather, is intended to help guide them to an understanding that will allow them to be healthy and prosperous. Your involvement and assistance are very important as we partner together in the education of your child.

Dear Parents,

Rudy Schulze, our former principal whose letters traditionally filled this page in journeyman fashion, wrote the students of Christian Brothers a Valentines Day card in this month's newsletter last year. Alas, my history of St. Valentine in the fifth century and abilities to dispense advice to teenagers regarding relationships, love, and life's journey are sorely lacking (though if you asked my daughter who is a junior this year she'd tell you I'm full of a lot of things including plenty of advice!).

One of the passages of spring every year comes near the Ides of March (March 15"). It is the mailing of Letters of Admission for the next year's freshman class. I contextualize this event with a reference to one of Shakespeare's plays and the fortune teller's warning to Caesar because, for many potential new families to Christian Brothers, this becomes an ominous time of year as the "fate" of their son or daughter's choice of high school lies in the hands of an admissions committee.

Each year many more students apply to our school than we have spaces available. Last year 465 eighth graders signed up for and took the High School Placement Test at CB in hopes of securing a seat in the class of 2008. In kind, Christian Brothers admitted the largest freshman class ever, starting this school year with 326 freshmen. By doing the math, the warning to "beware the Ides of March" takes on a different connotation if your son or daughter is applying to Christian Brothers or one of the other Catholic high schools in Sacramento these days.

Christian Brothers admits the most diverse student body of any of the four Catholic high schools because of the educational philosophy of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, our founding order. Because of this, the young boy or girl who hasn't grasped the concepts of algebra in seventh or eighth grade and has struggled academically can find a place at Christian Brothers. Likewise, the young girl or boy who has remained at the top of their class can find a place at Christian Brothers where they will be challenged in mind, body, and spirit.

The fact of the matter is that despite the intimidating numbers that get out there and sometimes overwhelm, cause concern, anxiety, or worry, our school has been able, with very few exceptions, to find a place for almost every child who applies to our school regardless of affiliation or ability to afford tuition.

The Christian Brothers community is inclusive. What that correlates to is 70% of our students participating in athletics and all of our students studying either art, music, or drama as part of their studies, and all of our students being invited and encouraged to involve themselves in student government, clubs and activities. Most importantly, CB challenges students to believe that they are a part of something larger than themselves and the accomplishments they have achieved in the four years they have attended high school.

The fourteenth of February is marked by a celebration of love, admiration, and an invitation to get to know one another on a more personable level. The day is marked by flowers, balloons, candy, and the invitation to "be mine". We are blessed to be a part of a community where differences are embraced and where the love for one another is genuine. If there is ever doubt to the truth of that last statement, you only need to spend a day on this campus when someone is in pain, is suffering a loss, or is in need of a sympathetic ear and a helping hand.

Next month we invite the next class of young men and women and their parents to the Christian Brothers community. With their letter of acceptance and their subsequent registration for the class of 2009, they will be reminded of the prophecy to beware. To be aware that notions will be challenged, sacrifices will be made and that the commitment to one's self and to others in the spirit of Jesus Christ will be asked of all who enroll or aspire to belong to a tradition that echoes voices from generations preceding them.

May the season of love and the promise of new life this spring be upon us all and those who will join us in the next school year.



### Parents, if your child has D's or F's on his/her report card, READ THIS!

As page 8 of the CB Parent/Student Handbook emphasizes, "F's" and "D's" are bad news on report cards! It is important for you and your student to understand that neither "D's" nor "F's" are acceptable. "F" grades must be repeated for credit in order to graduate from Christian Brothers High School. "D" grades, though worth 5 credits towards graduation, are NOT accepted by four-year colleges and universities. All California State University campuses, University of California campuses, and most private institutions require a "C" or above in ALL core courses (core courses are approved History, English, Math, Lab Science, Foreign Language, Visual and Performing Art, and Elective courses - also known as the "a-g" list of approved courses - see below for a chart of these requirements). If students have "D's" on the transcript they are not eligible to apply for admission to CSU and UC, and therefore are seriously limiting their choices for college.

If your child would like to keep his/her options open and remain eligible to apply to a four-year college, the Guidance Department highly recommends that he/she remediate (repeat for credit) any "D" grades. Students may enroll in a variety of classes during the 2005 CBHS summer school session in order to remediate a grade. If a student completes the course in summer school with a "C" or above, his/her transcript will reflect the new credits and the new grade will be used when calculating the grade point average. For example, if your child is currently enrolled in Biology and received a "D" the first semester, he/she should consider repeating Biology this summer. If he/she is currently enrolled in Chemistry, it is important to receive a "C" or above at the end of the spring semester. CSU and UC will "validate" (count as successful) the whole year of Chemistry (but only Chemistry, no other science course) if the student shows marked improvement the second semester (i.e., goes from a "D" to a "C", "B", or "A"). Therefore, Chemistry students have a choice — work very hard this semester and bring the grade up, or repeat Chemistry in summer school to raise the grade. This holds true for all Math courses and foreign language courses as well. Since a full four years of English is a basic requirement for eligibility, any "D's" in English should be remediated. One year of World History is the minimum requirement for eligibility, any "D's" in English should also be remediated.

Please contact Mrs. Hesser at 733-3679 if you have questions about college eligibility and remediating grades. If you have not already registered for summer school, pre-registration forms are available in the Main Office or Bertram Hall and require a \$250 deposit when submitted. Summer classes are available for enrichment and advancement as well as rememdiation. ### Wrestling

At the Del Campo JV tournament on December 19 our team took 8th out of 19 teams. We had two undefeated wrestlers and several runners up. Champs were David Cotter at 103 and Mike Burlando at 152. On December 22 at the Galt Varsity tourney we took 14th out of 31 teams. Albert Tapia led the team with a 3rd at 119 pounds, and Tom Duffy at 160 and Scott Webb at 215 both took 5th. 
Annual Giving Program

Ad Reinhardt once said: "Art is too serious to be taken seriously." The humor in his statement lies in the sad fact that, for some, Art has all too often been considered a lesser form of academia. For others, it has simply been labeled as an unpractical path to take if one is to make a decent living.

When I was a student at Christian Brothers in the 80's, the art program barely registered on the radar. My desire to attend CB was driven exclusively by the prospect of a strong education and playing football. This was certainly the status quo for most students here at the time: academics and sports, not necessarily in that order. Art was something you learned to appreciate in Humanities class, but, practically speaking, was viewed simply as a cool hobby.

Fortunately, I had parents that encouraged me to continue my pursuit of the Arts. With their support, I branched off into sculpture, music, and poetry. Between homework and football practice, I poured my turbo-charged teenaged emotions into visual and auditory creations, certainly a positive outlet that gave me personal satisfaction as well as coordination, problem solving skills, and self-esteem. However, as I entered college, I hesitated to focus my studies on Art. I felt a sense of guilt in studying something that I enjoyed so much. Besides, what was I going to do with an Art degree... teach?

The fact is there is a multitude of opportunities in the Arts. Take the time to note how bombarded you are by the Arts on any given day. How many songs do you hear? How many television shows, commercials, news broadcasts, or movies do you watch? What about those ads, articles and photos in front of you? Is there any office in town that doesn't have something on the walls? Do you play video games? What's on display in your home?

Art is big business. Much of the success our country has enjoyed in the global market has been from the ability to take mathematical and scientific principles into creative directions. Playing the numbers and tubulating statistics certainly has legitimacy, but any business knows that it takes creative foresight to rise to the top. "Thinking outside of the box," requires development of both sides of the brain.

As LaSallian educators, it is our duty to educate the whole person by encouraging them to stretch their horizons and pursue their talents. It is heartening to see that through the diligence of people like Mr. Kevin McGovern and our dearly departed Mr. Rudy Schulze, the Arts programs at CB have expanded to serve the needs of our students. Although

we still have much to do, CB has made a name for itself in the Sacramento community as a premier school for visual arts, instrumental and choral music, drama, and media arts.

At any given time of the year, over sixty percent of the student body is enrolled in a visual or performing arts class. After the bell rings, these classes continue on in the form of concerts, plays, recording, editing, and exhibits. Students that are not enrolled in a class have the opportunity to audition for plays, art shows, or the phenomenon known as Open Mic, which in January had an audience of nearly 700!

If you have not attended any of the Art functions, I encourage you to do so even if your child is not in the spotlight. If you have, then I urge you to come to an event outside of your child's specialty. There are a number of exhibits, plays, broadcasts, Open Mics, dance recitals, and a talent show coming up. If you want to catch everything all at once, check out the Arts Expo on Sat. March 12th. You will not find more talented or professional high school artisans and entertainers than your children...our students. While you're there, be sure to stop by the Friends of the Arts table and get involved.

Things have certainly changed over the years at CB. The school I remember from the 80's has evolved in many positive ways. It's co-ed, the sports programs have doubled, and our student body is more socially and academically diverse than ever. The math, science and technology facilities are top notch, the Ron Limeberger gym has never looked better, and, as a UC college peep school, we offer four year programs in Choral, Instrumental and Visual Arts.

As we continue to change, it is imperative that we maintain our LaSallian mission. The "poor" that De La Salle refers to throughout his meditations is not necessarily a financial label. As Christian Brothers teachers we are called to nurture our students' spirituality, intellect, and compassion. Maintaining excellence in the Arts truly reflects this conviction by encouraging your children's creativity and diligence; traits that will help them to be successful in whatever they choose to pursue in life. We are committed to "enriching" their lives in hopes that they will carry on the mission. In this pursuit, we must take every subject seriously.

### NEWS FROM THE GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

Just another reminder! SUMMER SCHOOL REGISTRATION IS STILL OPEN. SUMMER SCHOOL BROCHURES WILL BE AVAILABLE IN THE MAIN OFFICE BEGINNING IN MID-MARCH. REGISTRATION REQUIRES A NON-REFUNDABLE \$250 DEPOSIT. If you have questions about summer school, please call Director Noel Hesser at 733-3697 (this is a voice mail number only). Parents, if your child has D's or F's on his/her report card, READ THIS!

As page 8 of the CB Parent/Student Handbook emphasizes, "D's" and "F's" are bad news on report cards! It is important for you and your student to understand that neither "D's" nor "F's" are acceptable. "F" grades must be repeated for credit in order to graduate from Christian Brothers High School. "D" grades, though worth 5 credits towards graduation, are NOT accepted by four-year colleges and universities. All California State University campuses, University of California campuses, and most private institutions require a "C" or above in ALL core courses (core courses are approved History, English, Math, Lab Science, Foreign Language, Visual and Performing Art, and Elective courses - also known as the "a-g" list of approved courses). If students have "D's" on the transcript they are not eligible to apply for admission to CSU and UC, and therefore are seriously limiting their choices for college.

If your child would like to keep his/her options open and remain eligible to apply to a four-year college, the Guidance Department highly recommends that he/she remediate (repeat for credit) any "D" grades. Students may enroll in a variety of classes during the 2005 CBHS summer school session in order to remediate a grade. If a student completes the course in summer school with a "C" or above, his/her transcript will reflect the new credits and the new grade will be used when calculating the grade point average. For example, if your child is currently enrolled in Biology and received a "D" the first semester, he/she should consider repeating Biology this summer. If he/she is currently enrolled in Chemistry, it is important to receive a "C" or above at the end of the spring semester. CSU and UC will "validate" (count as successful) the whole year of Chemistry (but only Chemistry, no other science course) if the student shows marked improvement the second semester (i.e., goes from a "D" to a "C", "B", or "A"). Therefore, Chemistry students have a choice — work very hard this semester and bring the grade up, or repeat Chemistry in summer school to raise the grade. This holds true for all Math courses and foreign language courses as well. Since a full flow years of English is a basic requirement for eligibility, any "D's" in English should be remediated. One year of World History is the minimum requirement for eligibility, any "D's" should also be remediated.

### !NEWSFLASH! The latest news from the University of California regarding Chemistry: Change in Validation Rules for Fall 2007 Chemistry

UC faculty has approved a change to the rule governing how students may clear a deficiency in chemistry. Implementation of the rule change has been delayed until fall 2007 to avoid disadvantaging high school students who plan to apply to UC in 2005 and 2006. The change means that current high school sophomores who take chemistry in the 2004-05 school year and receive a D or F grade in the first semester must repeat this semester and earn a grade of C or better to satisfy part of the 'd' subject requirement. The semester of coursework may be repeated any time prior to high school graduation. Students who apply to UC in 2005 and 2006 will not be affected by this change and will still follow the current validation rule. Under the current rule, a student who earns a D or F grade in the first semester of chemistry may clear the subject omission and scholarship deficiency if he or she earns a grade of C or higher in the second semester of the course.

### Service Learning/Community Service

Lenten Alms Giving: On December 25, 2005 our community was struck by a horrible tragedy. Two of our students were involved in an automobile accident, which resulted in the deaths of four young people. On that same day half way across the world, the Tsunami hit South East Asia and over 302,000 were killed in seven different countries (that number could still be rising). The first week of school was a difficult time; we were struggling on a local level with the sudden death of Tia Santos and on a global level with the tragic death of thousands of Tsunami victims.

It was the students who impressed me the most during that time. In the midst of mourning the death of one of their classmates and worrying about the fate of the one who survived, our students continued to pour into Campus Ministry and ask what our response was going to be to the Tsunami disaster. They wanted to know what they could donate, what they should donate, where they should donate, and when? We hadn't even put the final touches on the prayer service we held to honce the life of Tia. I was stunned and at a momentary loss for words, something that rarely happens to me. After I recovered I let the students know that we would certainly be doing something, but I wasn't exactly sure what or when. I was deeply struck by the maturity of our students, in all four grades, to be able to grieve the loss of one of their own, worry about the fate of another, but still be concerned with those who had lost more than just one. Our students were concerned about the Tsunami victims who were worried about the fate of their entire family or village, not just one friend. Having only been at CB for six months, I am struck by how much the mission of De La Salle has become a part of our students and how deeply they live out his teachings. I am also struck by the faith they learned from their families before ever coming to Christian Brothers.

It is by the strong urging of our students that the student/staff Tsunami Response Team was formed very quickly. The Response Team decided that students can give in three ways: 1) Donate money in the various Tsunami Relief cans placed around campus. 2) Buy a Tsunami Relief bracelet for \$3.00 in Campus Ministry. 3) Donate money at the Talent Show to be held on April 7. All proceeds from the above activities will go to our Lasallian Schools in South India that are partnering with other local groups to rebuild the devastated schools and local communities. The students have raised over a \$1,000 towards our Lenten Project of Tsunami Relief efforts.

Thank you to all of the students who came forward during this time. You have inspired me on what it truly means to be a member of the De La Salle Community, something I thought I learned fifteen years ago.



Dear Parents.

The view from the front steps of the school is quite remarkable. Standing out there every morning has allowed me to observe, reflect, and interact in quite unexpected ways. In fact the whole thing is still a bit of a mystery to me. What started out as only a first-day-of-school greeting two years ago was repeated the next day, stretched into a week, then became a month, and finally turned into a daily ritual. Gradually, others came to expect me to be there, and now I expect myself to be there as well, despite whatever else awaits my attention that day. Along the way I've discovered that you can learn a lot from one spot in the world, and you can sometimes accomplish a lot simply by showing up and just being there. That's not a bad thing to remember as we come to the end of a rather turbulent year in the lives of so many here at CB.

So what are some of the more interesting things that I've observed every morning? 1) Students emerge from cars exhibiting varying levels of perceptible life. Ditto on the parents. However, the most alert occupants are in those vehicles where parent and student switch driver-seats after arriving, the parents sometimes slowly shaking their heads as the students walk smilingly into school. 2) Arrival times seem to be timed to the second. The difference in the volume of cars over a period of three or four minutes is remarkable. There's a crush of cars between 7:54 AM and 7:59 AM, and then the street and front drive are deserted by 8:02 PM. It's uncanny - almost like a community biological clock. 3) Students generally return a morning greeting, ranging from a wonderfully smiling and genuine response to a head-down mumbled something to a bewildered, preoccupied, blissful ignorance of the outside world that makes me watch them to make sure that they don't trip on that first step or walk into a wall somewhere. 4) People have their own pace when they walk, from leisurely to self-conscious to harried. Whether ten minutes early or one minute before the second bell, their walking speed is constant and is only marginally changed by being in the company of others. In fact, friends are probably those who walk at a common pace. 5) You can learn a lot about people in daily 5-second increments stretched out over a year or two. Individuals reveal themselves in their walk, their voice, their face, and their eyes. Over time, the wonder of their personalities shines out in ways they don't realize. It's a true blessing to encounter that, even for those who sometimes act as if the word "goofy" might have been invented just for them.

The thing that comes most to mind, however, when I stop to reflect on these short daily encounters, is the interplay between permanence and change that defines our lives. Students are the same every day, yet we see them change profoundly over time. The school day is the same most days and weeks, yet each day is absolutely unique and different. This solid community of 1000+ teenagers and devoted adults is a beehive of organized educational life all year, yet every once in while - and all too regularly over the last few years - major changes or losses have required us to adjust in how we see and do things. It reminds me of the British author C. S. Lewis who wrote that God "whispers to us in our joys, speaks to us in our conscience, and shouts to us in our pain." All are invitations to remember the presence of God, something we hear every day. In the interplay between the things that are permanent and the things that change, God's presence abides. Whether in educational contexts such as the variations of a jazz tune, biological classifications, historical trends, linguistic permutations, physical training, and a host of other class topics, or in the circumstances of our personal or communal lives, certain things stay the same while others change. The difference is made in how we encounter that reality. And in a major way, that encounter and its "how" is what CB is about.

Lest you think that all that has nothing to do with standing in front of school every day greeting students, may I suggest that God also stands at the front steps of each of our lives, greeting us rain or shine, foggy or fair. God greets us daily in the people we meet, the situations we face, and even the challenges we run into – or perhaps run into us. God's love for us is about as permanent as anything permanent gets, and God's expression of that love is as attentive, authentic, and pervasive as the world around us and the people who show up before us. We can choose to respond with a wonderfully smilling and genuine response or a head-down mumbled something or a bewildered, pre-occupied, blissful ignorance. But it does make a difference. You can bet your life on it.

The itinerary includes Rome, Florence, Venice, Nice, Avignon, and Paris. ### Welcome Back to CB Information - Part I

### 2005-06 OPENING DAYS &

CBHS CALENDAR/SCHEDULES: Seniors start school on Wednesday, August 17, from 8:30-11:00 a.m. for mandatory meetings regarding their graduating year. Classes for all Freshmen through Seniors begin on Thursday, August 18, 2005 with a regular school schedule. As with the entire school year, students should plan on being on campus 10 minutes ahead of their starting class.

Contained in this first CBHS summer mailing you have received a preview of our school calendar and a preliminary list of scheduled classes. School calendars and your final class schedule will be mailed in early August.

PARENT/STUDENT HANDBOOKS: Official 2005-06 Christian Brothers High School Handbooks will be sent home later this summer. This Handbook serves as a guide for our entire CBHS community: parents/guardians, students, teachers and staff. CBHS policies, standards, and administrative operations are included.

Keeping current with our Parent/Student Handbook is <u>VERY IMPORTANT</u> and every family member's responsibility. Every family's continual enrollment depends upon the fulfillment of their responsibilities and adherence to the policies stated in this handbook. All families receive at least one handbook. The Handbook Partnership Statement included with each handbook is to be signed and returned to the Main Office by Friday, August 19. <u>Please note the following significant changes in CBHS policies:</u>

1. Attendance Policy (Consequences for Excessive Absences & Tardies).

CBHS students are expected to be in class, on time, and prepared to learn. Curriculum and instruction is planned by each teacher according to the CBHS calendar/schedules. Excessive absences from school, and excessive tardiness to class, cause students to miss valuable instructional time specific to our curriculum. Additionally, such absences and tardies can be very disruptive to the learning of others. Therefore,

- \*\* If a student is absent more than 10 times per semester from any class heishe will receive NO CREDIT for that class for that semester. If a student is more than 15 minutes late for any given set, the tardy is an absence. This rule includes all absences (excused or unexcused) with the exception of those that are "school-related" as defined in the Parent Student Handbook.
- \*\* Students who are less than fifteen (15) minutes late should report directly to class. Students who are more than fifteen (15) minutes late should report to the Attendance Office. If a student is more than 15 minutes late for any given set, the tardy will be considered an unexcased absence for that class. Students are still required to go to that class, if they fail to do so they will be considered trunk from that class.

Students will be allowed five (5) tardies per semester; any tardy after that will result in behavioral detention. There are no longer "excused" tardies. Students who are returning from appointments must report to the Attendance Office and present verification before they receive an admit slip.

2. Dress Code Policy (No Sandals) (No Skirts) (Liturgy Dress Days)

CBHS' Dress Code represents solidarity among our entire student body and is a good reflection of each student's own Falcon pride. Students are best prepared for school when they are peoperly dressed and groomed in accordance with our dress code; thus encouraging better behavior and a better learning environment. Abiding by CBHS' Dress Code also emphasizes modesty and self-discipline within students, while reducing peer pressure on campus. Therefore,

- Sandals/flip flops of any type are no longer allowed.
- Skirts and dresses are no longer allowed. (Only well-maintained long pants, walking shorts, or capris may
  be worn at CRIES)
- As in prior years, students will be required to dress specifically for school liturgies or prayer services; however, girls will no longer wear dresses or skirts and boys will no longer wear dress skirts and ties. To show reverence and solidarity during CBHS faith celebrations, all students (Boys and Girls) are now required to wear the following on designated "Liturgy Dress Days":
  - > Appropriately sized CB logo wear polo shirts must be worn. NO T-shirts, sweaters, sweatshirts, or any other type of top other than a CB sweatshirt or CB jacket on cold days.
  - > Appropriately sized dress pants/slacks or docker-type khaki slacks must be worn. NO shorts or skirts.
- Appropriate shoes. Dress shoes are preferred; however, tennis shoes, athletic shoes are acceptable.
