BASKETBALL

Basketball was another new game for the College students, and considering the hard linek encountered, we did well. We started the season by practicing in the school yard, but later on Brother Albian rented the Y. M. C. A. thoor, where we practiced after school. Many boys came out to make the team, and Brother Baldwin volunteered to do the coaching. Unlike football, we began early in the season, and it was well for us that we did, for none of the boys had played the game before. Brother Baldwin was with the boys every afternoon, playing on the second team. He put so much pepper in his playing that the first team had to ramble so that they would not be humbled by the Yannigans. With this kind of practice every day, we soon developed into a fair team.

For our defense we had the old reliable Andrew Lagomarsine, who gave more than one forward a tough time to get a basket. We were glad when the league was finished, because then we could use the men we wished, and by this time Doyle was in condition to play. The first team we met when the league was over was the Peps.
