

Falcons Are Favored To Win In Metro

This could be the year for Christian Brothers High School and coach Dick Sperbeck.

Ask Sperbeck how his Falcons will do in the Metropolitan League this year, and he succinctly responds, "Well."

Ask the other Metro coaches, and they're a little more adamant than the cautious Sperbeck. All but one picks The Brothers to win the Metro for the first time in nine seasons under Sperbeck's tutelage.

Last year, the Falcons were 8-2 overall, 4-2 in league play. Although they've lost some key players, like Joe Gutierrez, John Hennessey and Pat McAuliffe, Sperbeck has some good ones returning.

Sure-handed tight end John (Doc) Blanchard is back, as is all-league tackle Stan Olsufka, a 6-foot-2, 230-pounder. Running back Dan Galvez returns to handle the ball-carrying chores.

In short, the Falcons are going to be tough. That's why they open the season ranked No. 2 in the North Valley, behind their opening opponent, El Camino.

Sacramento graduated a lot of talent last year, but still rates the team most likely to give Brothers a run for its money.

Falcons Gear For Serious Title Shot

This is the first of two articles dealing with the prospects of the two local Catholic high schools.

The Christian Brothers Falcons, winners of 16 of their last 20 football games, have been ranked 3rd and 6th in Northern California in each of the last two seasons. Their goal this year is Number 1. They may have the people to achieve it.

Most football coaches feel that the backbone of a football team is its tackles and Falcons boast two of the area's finest in Stan Olsufka (6-3, 221), all Metropolitan League in 1969, and Jim Sarti (6-2, 231), who runs 40 yards in a speedy 4.8, a fact which has Coach Dick Sperbeck toying with the idea of using him at fullback on occasion.

Two other top performers for the Falcons will be safety and tight end John (Doc) Blanchard (6-1, 196) who is the best all round football player on the Falcon campus since Steve

Scully, now a Santa Clara University coach, and quarterback Dan Carmazzi (6-1, 190) who played in Rick Cabral's shadow last time around and is more than ready to take his place at the helm of the Falcon's offense.

Other top lettermen preparing for the Falcon's imposing schedule which includes El Camino and Mira Loma as the first two games are guard-linebacker Pat Blocker (6', 190), running back Dan Galvez who gained more yardage last year than any other junior has done for Brothers since 1961, defensive end Tom O'Neil, wing Jess Coleman and running back Davey Hernandez who looks as if he is running with a third leg because of his great balance and ability to use his arm on the ground to keep him from falling.

Players up from last year's undefeated sophomore team who will vie for starting positions include Mark Russell, the red headed terror who will remind Falcon fans of Dave Page, the 1967 all-city linebacker, and running back Mark Gabrielli who gained over 1,000 yards for the sophs last year. John Cartwright, another sophomore, who logged considerable varsity playing time in 1969, will be in contention for a starter's position as a defensive lineman.

The Falcon's coaches will also be counting on the likes of junior defensive end Steve Olin, soccer-style kicker Jose Medina who kicked 18 varsity conversions as a soph last year, and defensive back Mario Trejo who sat out last season. Others to watch will be return man Ken Lewis, defensive back Steve Kitlas, lineman Roger Britton, defensive end Jim Blakeway and guard Jim Havey.

In both 1968 and 1969 the Falcons would have been league champions with one more win. This year they will have to beat Sacramento High School if they are to earn their first Metropolitan crown. This will be no easy task as the Dragons have lost only 3 league games in five years, one a 26-24 thriller to CB in 1968.

Prep football season gets started — though not in a big way — Friday night.

Seven games and a league jamboree are set for Friday, with six more on Saturday, but it's not until Sept. 17 that things really get rolling in the North Valley.

That's when El Camino, which enters the new season ranked No. 1, meets Christian Brothers, the No. 2 team. The contest is always a good one, but has special meaning this year.

El Camino is favored to win the Capital Valley Conference. Christian Brothers is favored in the Metropolitan League.

There's no county championship game, but the CVC champion meets the North Metro champion for a "North Area" playoff each year.

So, the El Camino-Brothers game could well pick the No. 1 team in the county.

Trouble is, first games usually are ragged because the kids are playing together under game conditions for the first time. You can hold practice all you want, but when a team goes out to play in front of 3,000 screaming fans, the game takes on a whole new dimension.

Christian Brothers beat El Camino last year, 18-13, in their season opener, and won the year before by a 34-13 count the year before, despite El Camino having a 34-13 count the year before, despite El Camino having a quarterback by the name of Bill Schauer.

Should be interesting to see if the Falcons can maintain their jinx over the Eagles. They were the only team to beat El Camino last year, so the Eagles have a good win streak riding on the contest.

The same magazine lists El Camino sixth in the state, a prediction that might come true since the Eagles have won three straight after an opening loss to top-ranked Christian Brothers. Brothers was not listed among the area's top clubs and Casavant says he will hold to his original prediction that Sacramento High will win the Metropolitan League. Time will tell. . .

Christian Brothers faces its toughest football schedule ever but the Falcons appear to have all the tools to wrap up their first Metropolitan League title since entry into the circuit six years ago.

By November the Falcons' overall win-loss mark may not look impressive, particularly since they must face powerful El Camino, Mira Loma and Jesuit, and conference rivals Burbank and Sacramento.

Counts On Carmazzi

Coach Dick Sperbeck is counting on returnee quarterback Dan Carmazzi, 6-1, 190, who saw limited duty last season, and vet halfback Dan Galvez, 5-9, 160, to move the offense.

The Falcons also have a pair of craggy tackles, Jim Sarti, 231, and Stan Olsufka, 227, back from last year's unit to bolster the defense. Olsufka was an all-city prospect before injuring a leg in the '69 campaign.

Burbank could provide the roadblock in Christian Brothers' bid for the crown but, like CB, the Titans face a rough schedule, going

Will Give Look At Top Teams

Who's No. 1?

El Camino? Christian Brothers? Some other high school club ranked in the Superior California poll? Or is it some team the pollsters missed in the preseason ratings?

No one is certain, except tonight's opener between El Camino and Christian Brothers should give local football fans a good look at who is ranked No. 1 and 2 respectively in the preseason polls.

El Camino not only will be fighting to keep its top rating but to avenge last season's only loss going into the 7:30 o'clock tilt in El Camino stadium.

The El Camino-Christian Brothers clash will be one of three nonleague games tonight to open the 1970 grid campaign locally.

Rio Linda, last season's co-North Metro League champions, will butt heads with the Casa Roble Rams at San Juan's McArthur Field and Grant will invade John F. Kennedy at Hughes Stadium. Both are set for 7:30 o'clock.

Loss Stigma

El Camino has an impressive nucleus from last year's No. 1 club in Superior California but the Eagles face the stigma of having lost their last two starts against the Brothers.

El Camino coach Hal Athon naturally will use those two losses to his advantage, whatever that might be. Rival mentor Dick Sperbeck knows this and has prepped his gridders accordingly.

Eagles-CBS Tilt Matches Top Two

When such prep football giants as El Camino, Christian Brothers, Mira Loma and Burbank clash, something has got to give — and that could be the Superior California preseason poll for 1970.

El Camino, ranked No. 1 and smack where they closed their 1969 campaign, tackles tough Christian Brothers, the No. 2 club, in a season opener next Thursday and prep fans are delighted by the match.

Christian Brothers, the

Metro League title choice, was the only club to mar El Camino's 10-1 campaign last year and the Falcons are known for their fast start. Christian Brothers has knocked over the Eagles in their last two openers.

"About even." That's the way El Camino High School football coach Hal Athon figures tonight's encounter between his Eagles and the Christian Brothers Falcons.

Game time is 7:30 p.m. at El Camino.

Athon's Eagles will be trying to overcome a jinx CBS has held over El Camino for two years. Last season, Brothers was the only team to beat the Eagles. The year before, Brothers and unbeaten Mira Loma were the only clubs to top El Camino.

"We're going to have a fine team," Athon says, "but we have a great deal of respect for Christian Brothers. We understand they have some fine material — a real good line."

Athon is right there. The Falcons boast two of the finest linemen in the area in tackles Jim Sarti (6-foot-2, 231 pounds) and Stan Olsufka (6-2, 229). And with John "Doc" Blanchard returning at safety, the Falcons figure to be extremely tough defensively.

"I've heard people say Blanchard is the best safety they've had since Steve Scully," said Athon. "With his size (6-1, 196), he must have pretty good speed."

Inexperience in the offensive units may slow both clubs down a bit.

"Their situation is just like ours," pointed out Athon. "We have two kids battling for quarterback right now, and one of them, Tom Olson, played a lot of ball for us last year.

"But Ron Bruno and Charley Moore are gone now, and their back-up men didn't play much last year so they'll be inexperienced.

"Dan Carmazzi, their quarterback, had to play behind Rick Cabral last year, and I thought Cabral was one of the best quarterbacks in the area last year. I'm not taking anything away from Carmazzi, mind you, he's a fine quarterback too. But he just doesn't have as much playing experience and that could hurt them."

Good College Prospect

"You know," chimed in Jim Dimino, Athon's assistant coach, "we have a good tackle too in Dick Lambert. He's 6-foot-2, 216 and a prime college prospect (he has the grades too).

"We haven't really set the starting lineup yet," continued Dimino (it was Tuesday). "We've had a real battle at seven positions. The fight for fullback has been a good battle, and the competition for flanker has been close."

Athon figures injuries could be the key not only to this meeting of the North Valley's No. 1 and No. 2 teams, but to the season.

"We've already lost Mike Shorrock for the season," Athon said. "He broke his jaw during our scrimmage with Hiram Johnson."

Athon also has recurring nightmares about the fourth game of last season, when the Eagles played Encina. El Camino emerged from that contest with a 34-18 win, a broken ankle, a broken collar bone and a broken arm.

Dick Sperbeck, head coach at Christian Brothers, is a little more reluctant to talk about tonight's contest. For one thing, Sperbeck has always been a little put off by rankings.

"They just add unnecessary pressure to a game," he's been known to say.

But Sperbeck is willing to talk about this talented crop of gridders.

"Carmazzi is looking great," says Sperbeck. "I think he's just a super quarterback. I'm sure that not playing much last year hurt him. There's no telling what he might have been.

"As far as I'm concerned, he could have started for just about any other team in the area. He throws beautifully."

And Carmazzi will be throwing "beautifully" to Blanchard.

"Blanchard is as good a kid as we've ever had here," says Sperbeck. "He's one helluva receiver. He plays tight end, but we'll use him wide once in awhile, too. He can even carry the ball."

Blanchard was impressive in last year's Cordova-Brothers game. He made a number of key catches to keep the Falcons going on downs against a very strong Cordova defensive unit.

"He's even bigger now," added Sperbeck. "And he has great speed. He can run the 40-yard dash in about 4.7 seconds.

"Scully was out to watch our practice the other day, and he was really impressed with Blanchard."

Sperbeck declines to make any predictions on tonight's contest.

"I always leave that up to you," he said. "We would kind of like to make it three in a row, though."

Falcons Outfly Sputtering Eagles In Opener 14-6

Christian Brothers High School continued its mastery over El Camino in season grid openers as 6,100 fans, including sports celebrity Joe Kapp, watched the Falcons post a 14-6 nonleague win last night in El Camino Stadium.

The Brothers, ranked second behind El Camino in the pre-season polls, pulled a few tricks out of their magic bag to knock off the top-ranked Eagles for the third consecutive year.

Kapp, the Minnesota Vikings holdout quarterback who has relatives in the Sacramento area, sat on the Brothers' side and signed autographs for young admirers. He left after the Falcons took a 14-0 lead at the final period start.

El Camino won the statistical war by outrushing the Falcons 179 to 162 and out-passing them 97 to 46 yards, but head mentor Hal Athon

conceded the only statistics that matter are on the scoreboard.

Falcons Take Lead

Christian Brothers took a 6-0 margin when reserve back Ken Lewis plunged over from the two midway in the second period. Lewis capped an 87-yard drive in which the 5-9, 150 pounder reeled off runs of 30 and 22 yards in the eight-play march.

El Camino missed a scoring opportunity the same period when junior halfback Jerry Machen fumbled on the Falcons' 13 on a first-down play. The Eagles had another drive bog down on the Falcons' 15 before the first half clock ran out.

Flankerback Mark Russell added the Brothers' second TD on a reverse in which the fleet 181-pounder baffled the Eagles' secondary on a 49-yard scamper. Quarterback Dan Carmazzi added

the two-point conversion on a sweep.

Eagles Rally

El Camino posted its only score after recovering Lewis' fumbled punt return at the CB 25 a few minutes later. Five plays later, after moving to the Falcons 12, halfback Jeff Moore took a scoring pass from quarterback Jack Haycock.

The Eagles drove to the Christian Brothers four before losing the ball on downs and an opportunity to catch the underdog Falcons late in the final period.

Moore was the game's leading ballparker and one of the few bright spots in the Eagles' attack. The 6-foot, 175-pounder picked up 91 yards in 20 carries and also took five passes for another 46 yards.

Joe Kapp, the Minnesota Vikings' \$1.25 million holdout quarterback, was among nearly 6,000 fans who turned out at El Camino High School stadium Thursday night.

But it wasn't a quarterback the El Camino Eagles needed in their 14-6 loss to Christian Brothers' Falcons. Hal Athon alternated Tom Olson and Jack Haycock at the QB spot all night and both were effective at times.

Kapp, who had to be escorted from the stadium by sheriff's deputies after being recognized and mobbed by autograph seekers, throws a little too wobbly to make the El Camino squad anyway.

A quarterback by the name of Dan Carmazzi (who was as cool as Kapp has ever been), a running back by the name of Ken Lewis, and a defense by the name of "TOUGH!" did the previously No. 1-ranked Eagles in in the season-opener. Brothers was No. 2. It was CBS' third straight win over the 1969 top team.

Only once did the Eagles break loose for a score. That was in the final quarter, when Haycock passed 12 yards up the middle to co-captain Jeff Moore, who made a nice grab.

Lewis gained 22 more yards and the Falcons were in business at the El Camino 2. Lewis took over from there.

Joe Medina's extra point try was aborted on a bad snap, and the Brothers lead stuck at 6-0 with 6:20 remaining in the half.

El Camino took over and drove from its own 34 to the CBS 16, but ran out of downs before the first half ended.

Steve Brooks' run for two failed, though, and left the Eagles with the six points.

CBS put the game away on the first play of the fourth quarter, with tight end Mark Russell galloping 51 yards around left end on a reverse. Carmazzi ran in the two-point conversion to give the Falcons a 14-0 lead.

El Camino drove all the way to the Brothers eight before running out of downs. Technically, the Eagles got down to the 4 on a fourth-and-goal pass from the 8 by Haycock to Moore. But that didn't matter, because the Falcons took over on downs.

Christian Brothers led at the half, 6-0, on a two-yard plunge by Ken Lewis over right guard after a Jerry Machen fumble on the 13 to half an El Camino drive. CBS moved 87 yards in eight plays to score.

Two long gainers by Lewis put Brothers in scoring position. The first was 29 yards on a pitchout to the left side by Carmazzi, and moved the ball from the Falcons' 32 to El Camino's 319.

Brothers nearly scored on a pretty pass from Carmazzi to normally sure-handed John "Doc" Blanchard. The pass trickled out of Blanchard's hands, preventing a sure six points.

CBS, Mira Loma Will Settle Which Is No. 1

FOR THE SECOND straight week Christian Brothers High School finds itself in the "have to try harder" No. 2 role going up against the area's top-rated club. It will be Mira Loma this time, Saturday night, in what some believe will be the top clash of the 1970 season locally.

Mira Loma, ranked third behind CBS last week, surpassed Dick Sperbeck's club for the top spot in spite of the Falcons' big win over previously top-rated El Camino. Mira Loma was elevated on the strength of its 19-0 win over Burbank Saturday night.

The Matadors looked like a club hard to stop in the Burbank game. Burbank was ranked eighth and was considered by some to be a much stronger foe than the one the Mira Lomans narrowly edged in the '69 opener. But Mira Loma simply overpowered them.

IN WINNING, the Matadors unveiled another fine running back in the Mira Loma tradition. An hitherto unknown, junior halfback Dave Mansoor, a 5-10, 173-pounder, reeled off 129 yards and scored once on a three-yard dash. He replaced starting halfback Kent Hawthorne, who has been sidelined by a pulled hamstring and who will miss the Brothers contest. But at that, coach Don Brown has a fine replacement in the junior linebuster.

Statistically Mira Loma came out of the Burbank clash impressive in most departments. Mansoor grabbed second spot in area rushing and the Mats' offense second in total yardage, 348 yards.

"They don't make many mistakes," Sperbeck said after witnessing Mira Loma's win. "They are methodical, they get the job done. They are the type of club that will find a weakness, if you have one."

Saturday's clash should settle the No. 1 rating, at least temporarily. The following week, Christian Brothers tackles a surprisingly tough Encina club and Mira Loma will go against Jesuit, a team plagued by injuries but still carrying the No. 5 ranking in Sup Cal.

Christian Brothers Keeps Top Rating In 28-6 Defeat Of Elk Grove Herd

ELK GROVE — Top-ranked Christian Brothers, fighting a week-to-week battle to keep its lofty rating, slowed up a potent Elk Grove High passing attack before easing to a 28-6 Metropolitan League football win last night before a capacity crowd.

The Brothers' defense, labeled by some as one of the best in the area, minimized the pass scoring threat of Elk Grove quarterback Tim Mahoney, who likes to throw TD bombs to halfback Juan Ortiz, the area's leading receiver.

Ortiz, who has been averaging better than seven catches a game, only took one toss for nine yards as

the CB defensive unit allowed Mahoney 10 completions for 89 yards, none of which were for touchdowns.

Mahoney going into the contest had completed 56 of 111 attempts for a whopping 820 yards and six touchdowns and, combined with another 79 yards rushing, had earned the Herd quarterback the total offense lead.

Christian Brothers quarterback Dan Carmazzi moved his club 65 yards for a score the first time the Falcons had the ball. Carmazzi capped the drive with a 20-yard scoring pass to end Steve Westlake.

The Falcons added two more scores in the second period on another Carmazzi pass, a 74-yarder to end John

Blanchard, and on still another toss by the CB quarterback of 15 yards to Stan Olsufka on a tackle-eligible play.

Halfback Dave Henandez ended the Falcons' scoring on a 23-yard romp in the third period.

Carmazzi, stealing the show from Mahoney, connected on 13 of 20 passes for 261 yards, his best game of the season. Blanchard took five Carmazzi passes for 149 yards.

In Elk Grove, CBS will be meeting a team that throws the ball three out of four times and has the ability to score a lot of points. They have scored 66 points in their four losses. The top ranked Falcons have scored only 55 in their three wins. Juan Ortiz, a wide receiver for the Thundering Herd, is a genuine breakaway threat and is by far the leading receiver in the area. He caught four last week against Sacramento for 177 yards, an average of over 40 yards per catch. The Fal-

con's pass defense will have to be sharp to contain him.

CBS used their week off to lick some of their wounds incurred in the Encina game. Quarterback Dan Carmazzi is the most notable of the injured as he sustained a painful hip bruise but he may be ready to play Friday. Stan Olsufka, one of the Falcon's outstanding tackles, who was slow in rounding into top physical condition due to an early season bout with the flu, had his best week in practice and appears to be nearing peak efficiency.

Steve Kitlas, the heir apparent to Carmazzi's position next week, looked good during the week as the team worked on their left-handed game to accommodate the southpawed Kitlas. Guard Mike Pach suffered an ankle injury and will be out for two weeks.

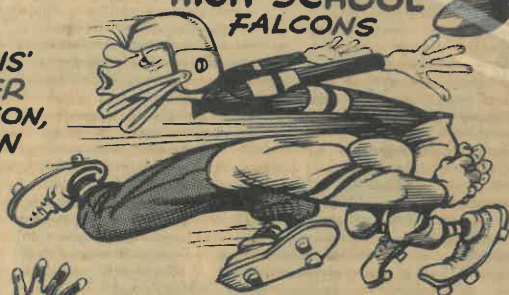

Carmazzi concluded the second period blitz with a 53-yard TD pass to John Blanchard with 4:45 to go in the half.

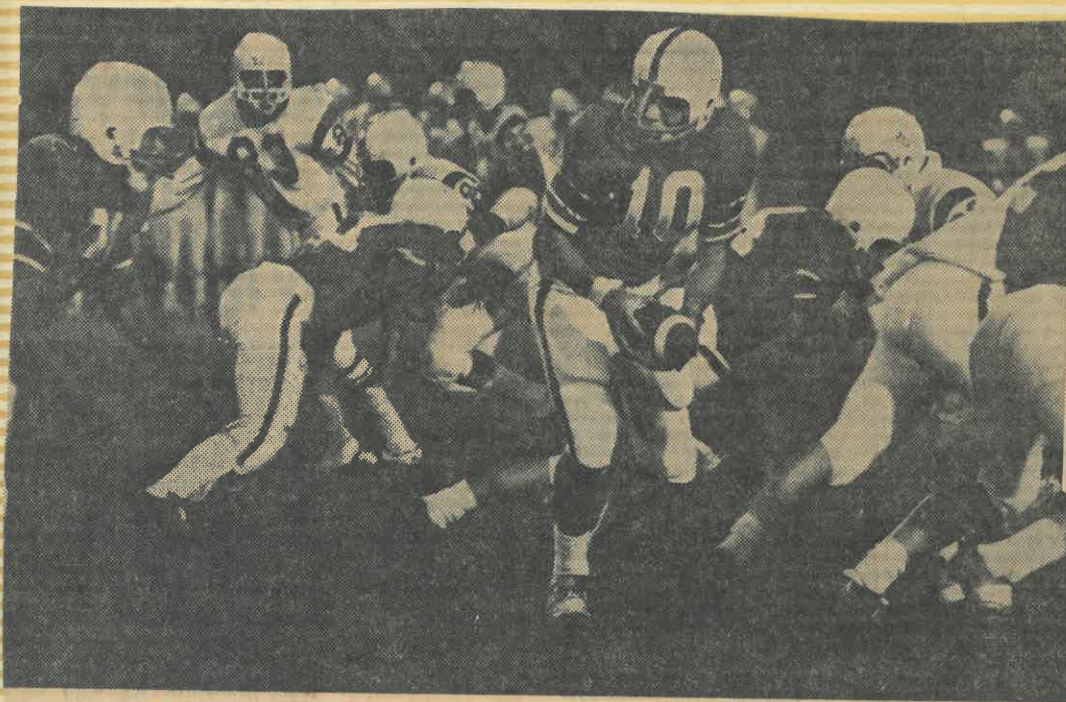
The other CBS scores came in the final period on Hernandez's third TD run and a 19-yard jaunt by reserve halfback Mark Gabrielli.

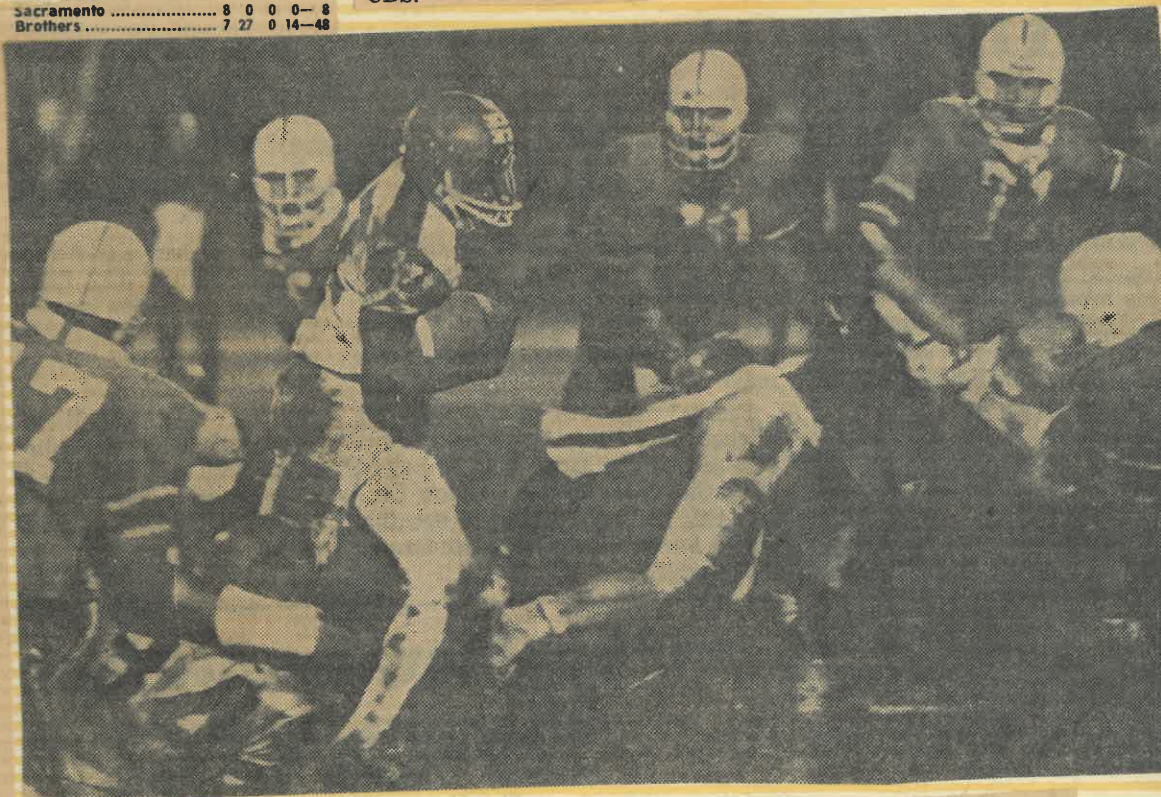

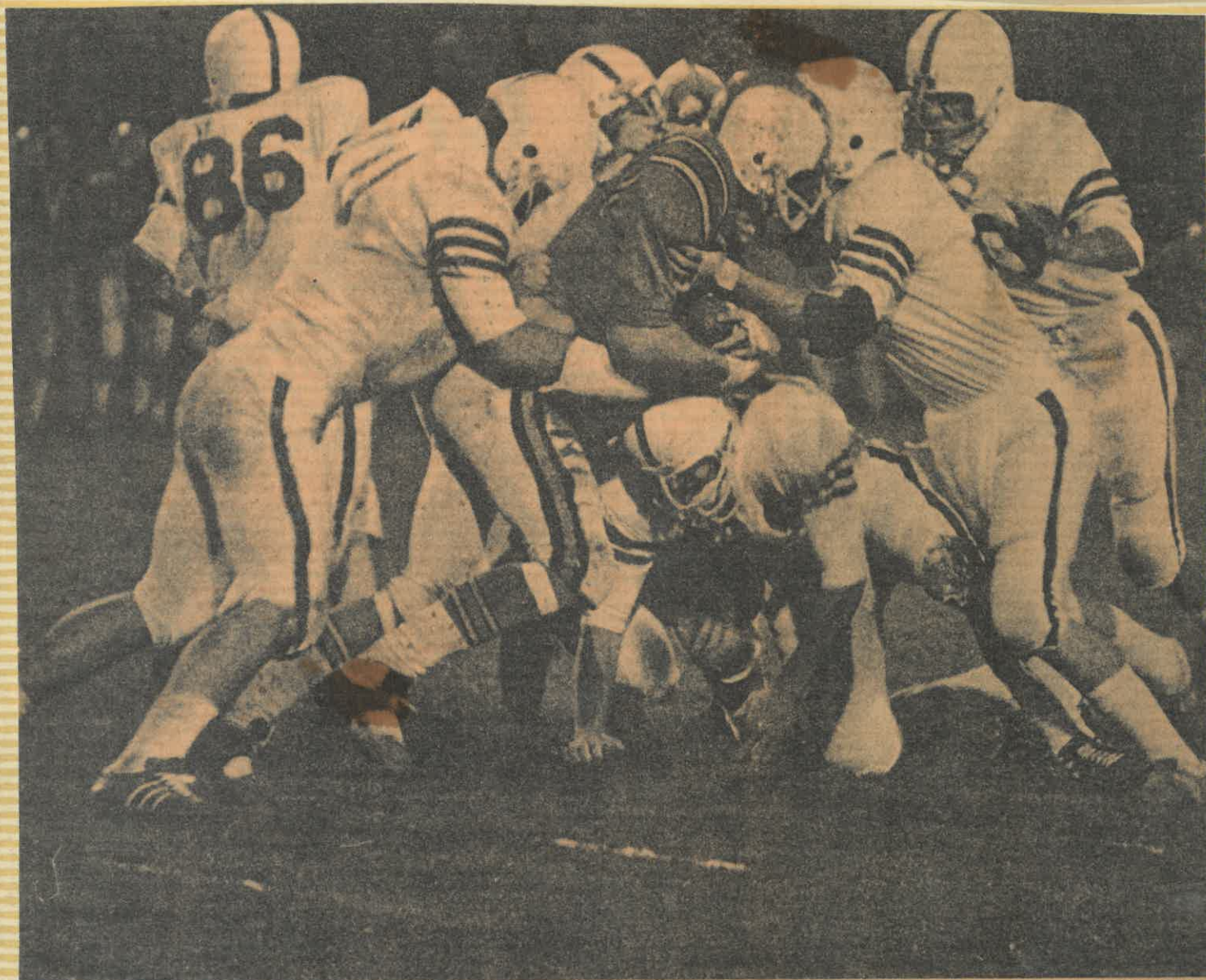

CBS Closes In On Grid Title

Christian Brothers High School's Falcons inched closer to their first Metropolitan League football championship Friday night, whipping the Burbank Titans, 20-14, before 3,300 fans at Sacramento State College.

Dick Sperbeck's Falcons are now 4-0-1 in league play and have one game left on their conference slate. Last week's tie with McClatchy prevented the Falcons from sewing up the title this week. Sacramento (3-1-0) is only a half-game behind the Falcons, with two left and can still rule supreme.

The Falcons play Kennedy in their Metro final and, as one of the league's coaches put it, "Brothers can name its score against that club."

Of course, the same thing might have been said about CBS's game last week with McClatchy. It wound up an 8-8 tie.

The Titans were driving for the tying touchdown against CBS late in the fourth quarter before John Blanchard intercepted a pass with 49 seconds remaining.

After a cold first quarter, the Falcons finally in the groove rolled up three touchdowns before the Titans could regain their balance.

Burbank took the initial lead, taking over on its 24 after an abortive CBS field goal try. The Titans went 76 yards in 14 plays. Long gain was a 20-yard pass from Eppie Delfin to John Freeman. The score came on a

19-yard toss from Delfin to Spencer Wanner with 3:11 left in the first period. Delfin's attempted pass for two points failed, but the Titans had a 6-0 lead.

It stood until Frank Aiello, the Falcons' brilliant defensive wing, intercepted a pass on the Titans' 33 and returned it to the Burbank 9. A moment later, Mark Gabrielli fought his way for the score and Joe Medina kicked the PAT to give CBS a 7-6 lead.

Earlier, Medina tried a 30-yard field goal, but the snap from center was fumbled by Steve Kitlas and the latter was tackled for a 13-yard loss.

Brothers added its second TD only 33 seconds after its first. Leon Newman fumbled on the Titans' first play from scrimmage and Gabrielli recovered on the Burbank 43.

The Falcons lined up and quarterback Dan Carmazzi lofted a scoring bomb to Steve Westlake. Medina's kick was wide right, but Brothers had upped its margin to 13-6.

It was unofficially the second scoring pass from Carmazzi to

Westlake. The first came a few seconds into the second quarter when officials ruled Westlake caught the pass beyond the endzone.

Christian Brothers soon added the clincher. Dave Hernandez scored on a two-yard plunge over right guard and Medina's kick made it to 20-6 at the half.

The Titans narrowed the gap to 20-14 in the third period, with Jeff Koehler packing it over from the nine. Delfin passed to Robbie Robinson for the two-point conversion.

But with last Saturday's victory it makes two out of the last three years over the Dragons for Coach Dick Sperbeck's boys. You would have to go a long time back in the record books to see when Sac was last beaten by anybody by a 40 point margin.

There were a lot of heroes for Brothers. Dan Carmazzi ran the team well and threw a 50 yard td pass to John Blanchard. Kelly O'Neil blocked a punt to set up a score and along with Tom Wolfe forced an interception that Mark Russell, who intercepted two passes, ran in for a score. The latter sustained a shoulder injury and may be out for tonight's clash.

Frank Aiello, a defensive wing, also intercepted a pass, the Falcon's tenth in the last

CBS will be coming back with fire in their eye for three reasons. First, it was Burbank who derailed them last year 38-8 when CB was 5-0; secondly the Falcons will be out to prove the McClatchy tie was due to the elements more than anything else; and third they can practically cinch the crown with a win. Ending years of frustration, Christian Brothers High School's Falcons won their first Metropolitan League football championship Thursday night, topping the Kennedy Cougars, 28-6, before 3,000 fans at Hughes Stadium.

The homecoming victory upped Brothers' league record to 5-0-1, a first-place cinch regardless of what happens between Sacramento and McClatchy Thanksgiving Day. Sacramento (4-1) was the only club with a chance to beat out the Falcons.

Overall, CBS is 8-0-1 and second ranked, while Kennedy finished 2-8 and 0-6 in the Metro.

But Dick Sperbeck's Falcons, who meet Jesuit Wednesday at American River College in the second annual Holy Bowl, were anything but impressive in beating the Cougars.

In fact, Brothers hasn't looked like a championship club since it beat Sacramento, 48-8, a month ago. The Falcons were tied by McClatchy and just barely got past Luther Burbank last week. And considering Kennedy's accomplishments this season, the Falcons' performance was only adequate.

The Falcons had to scramble to get their 7-0 halftime lead. They started out strong, taking the opening kickoff on their own 41, moving to the Kennedy 17 in nine tries, but the 10th try was a fumble, and Randy Harris recovered for Kennedy at

the Cougars' 21.

Kennedy ran only three plays before it was forced to punt and Mark Gabrielli returned the boot from his 44 to the Cougars' 30.

CBS drove to the seven, only to have Steve Kitlas fumble on a fourth-and-two. Kennedy took over at the 10.

The Cougars launched a drive, exhausting the first period before a pass interception cut the march short. Rick Pierucci's pass was picked off by John "Doc" Blanchard on the CBS 19 and returned to the Kennedy 28.

Brothers made it as far as the 15 before penalties reversed them to the 41. The Falcons were forced to punt.

Four plays later, Kennedy punted five yards deep in its end zone to Gabrielli, who took the kick at the 35 and returned it for a touchdown—almost. A clip at the 13 returned the ball to the 27, from where it took CBS 11 tries before Dave Hernandez crashed over left guard from the one. Joe Medina's kick made it 7-0 with 53 seconds left in the half.

CBS finally gained a little momentum midway in the third quarter. The Falcons picked up their second TD on a 32-yard pass from Dan Carmazzi to Blanchard. The latter caught the ball on the 19, eluded four tacklers down the right sideline and carried a fifth across the goal with him. Medina's kick opened the gap to 14-0 with 7:09 left in the period.

The TD was set up by a 19-yard punt return by Gabrielli, which put the Falcons in business at the Kennedy 37.

Gabrielli also set up the final CBS touchdown with a 23-yard return midway in the fourth quarter. He brought the ball to the Kennedy 30 and it took Brothers five tries from there.

Mark Russell scored up the middle from 11 yards out.

That came only a few minutes after Carmazzi connected with Russell on a 49-yard scoring bomb as the final period began. Medina made good on both conversions.

Kennedy's lone TD was scored by Robin Palmer with 4:41 left in the game. He shot up center from the 13 for the marker. Pierucci's pass for two failed.

Fights erupted as the contest ended and it took police and coaches five minutes to separate the two teams and nearly 30 spectators who ran onto the field to join in the fracas.

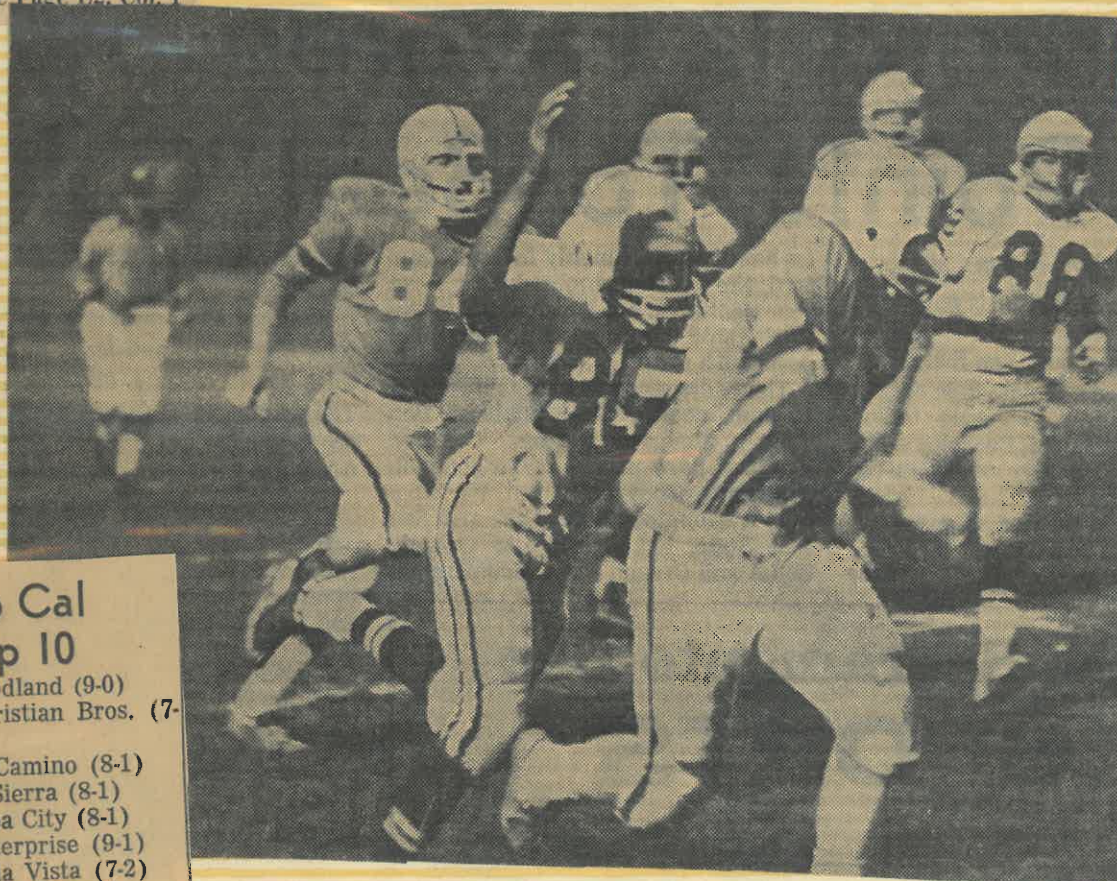

Jesuit, CBS Clash In Season Finale

Some of the luster was taken off next Wednesday's Holy Bowl Classic between CBS and Jesuit as the latter was victimized in a stunning 7-6 upset at the hands of Folsom last Saturday. The previous evening Christian Brothers ran their league record to 4-0-1 and their overall record to 7-0-1 by downing Luther Burbank 20-14. The Falcons need only to get by inept Kennedy tonight at Hughes Stadium to win the Metropolitan League crown.

Should the Falcons hurdle the Cougars tonight, next Wednesday's titanic at American River Stadium will match two league champions in a game that may have more appeal than the North Metro-CVC Playoff Bowl which will be played the following Friday. Jesuit earned the title in the GEL despite the loss as Galt, who had only one loss also, played one less game due to El Dorado not playing them because of the financial troubles which plagued their district. In addition, Jesuit had defeated Galt to erase all doubt.

Jesuit will be out to avenge their defeat in last year's Holy Bowl. They put up a brilliant struggle behind the running of flashy Joe Mangiaracina but fell to the favored Falcons 20-13.

This season the two clubs have played only one common opponent, Mira Loma. The Marauders fell to the Mats 28-7 while the Falcons downed them 21-0.

The one bright spot on Big Red's record is their stunning victory over Cordova by a 34-8 count. If they play to their potential the way they did that afternoon they could beat CB or anyone else for that matter.

Christian Brothers has played a major opponent every week, the same as they do every year, and have gone through unscathed except for the tie in the mud with McClatchy. They are the only undefeated team in town and will have to take the favorite's role in this game.

However, in traditional rivalries of this kind you can sometimes throw the form sheet out the window as emotion runs high and quite often the underdog can rise to the task. Foot-

ball is an emotional game and games are often won and lost on the psychological end of the coaching. We look for a close contest with the Falcons on top by one point off of Joe Medina's toe.

Kirk Foley recovered from his earlier injury and was seeing action again but he was injured again in the Folsom game so he may be doubtful. He was alternating at quarterbacking with Phil Rossitto who has thrown 50 times with 18 completions and 292 yards. Foley is 11 for 34 and 213 yards.

The Marauders' favorite receiver has been Matthew Reilly who has hauled down 14 catches for 291 yards. End

Fritz Hoffman is next with 7 catches for 100 yards. By contrast Falcon QB Dan Carmazzi is 30 for 74 for 646 yards and 7 touchdowns. His prime target is John Blanchard with 16 receptions for 396 yards which averages out to 24 yards per grab. Blanchard has 4.7 40-yard dash time despite his 191 pounds so he is quite a threat.

On the ground, Joe Ratterman is the Marauder workhorse as he has carried 133 times for 519 yards. He has been outgained by the Falcon's diminutive Dave Hernandez, who has packed 131 times for 575 yards in one less game.

The Falcon's stats will be increased with the addition of

tonight's Kennedy statistics. Other rushers to watch are Mike Smith of Jesuit who has 360 yards on 83 carries and Ken Lewis and Dan Galvez of CB who have rushed for 335 yards while alternating at the tailback spot. Hernandez is one of the leading scorers in the area with his 70 points.

There will be an aura of pageantry surrounding the Holy Bowl. The famed Rio Americano Rayettes, the three time state drill team champion under the direction of Barbara Harcos, will perform at half-time. A cross country meet between the two institutions will also be run during intermission. The rivalry is healthy and reflects interscholastic athletics at its best. Both rooting sections are well disciplined and enthusiastic.

This contest each year will prove to be one of Sacramento's premier athletic attractions. A crowd of 10,000

plus is expected so get there early. Game time is 6 PM sophomore, and 8 PM varsity.

Holy Bowl Pits Falcons, Jesuit

Much debate surrounds the football rankings near the conclusion of each season as fans and players alike place their favorites as No. 1. However, tomorrow night at 8 o'clock at American River College, the No. 1 Sacramento area Catholic High School team will be decided when Christian Brothers acknowledges Jesuit in the second annual Holy Bowl.

Christian Brothers, a 20-13 winner last year, will go into the game as a seven-point favorite. The Falcons currently are rated second in the Sup Cal Top 10 and possess the Metropolitan League championship. Only an 8-8 tie with the C. K. McClatchy High School Lions mars an otherwise perfect nine-game record. Jesuit, the Golden Empire

League titlist, is ninth-seeded in Sup Cal with a 7-2 mark.

The two teams have Mira Loma as a common opponent. CBS bounced the Marauders 21-0, while the Marauders fell 28-7.

"You might as well throw out the records for a game like this," said Falcon Coach Dick Sperbeck. "This will always be a tough game no matter what the records are."

The underdog has the advantage in a game like this because it will be trying extra hard to pull the upset. It's like the Stanford-Cal rivalry. Anything can happen.

Respects Foes

"We have a lot of respect for Jesuit and especially fullback Joe Ratterman. He is a real hard runner, as are halfbacks Mike Smith and Mark Costi. We also have to keep an eye on Matt Reilly because he is a good receiver."

Ratterman leads the Marauder runners with 521 yards gained on 133 carries, while Smith has picked up 360 yards and Costi 296. Quarterback Phil Rossitto has connected on 18 of 43 passes for 292 yards and four touchdowns. Reilly has 14 receptions for 291 yards.

Strong Defense

The Falcons run-oriented offense will be battling one of the strongest defensive units they have met all year. The Marauders have allowed only 150 yards per fray to rank third among Metro area schools. Dan McGinn, Tim Coyle, John Moloney, Ron Czarnecki and Fritz Hoffman pace the Jesuit defense, which has permitted only 73 points and racked up three shutouts.

The Brothers defense is not far behind. Statistically fifth-ranked, the Falcons have allowed 158 yards per tilt but only 68 points. Sophomore phenom John Cartwright and seniors Stan Olsufka and Jim Sarti bolster the unit.

Heart Of Attack

Dave Hernandez and Dan Carmazzi form the heart of the Falcon's attack. Hernandez, a fullback, has rushed for 595 yards in 141 attempts and 12 touchdowns to lead all runners. Carmazzi, the signal-caller, has nine touchdown passes among his 35 completions for 760 yards. His favorite receiver is John "Doc" Blanchard with 19 catches for 452 yards and four TDs.

"We feel we must stop Carmazzi and Blanchard," said Jesuit assistant coach Mark Waren. "Carmazzi is an excellent quarterback and Blanchard is the man they go to when in trouble. Their running game has been overlooked and is much stronger than most realize so we must shut it off too."

CBS presents a balanced attack led by hard-running fullback Dave Hernandez and smooth-moving quarter-

CBS, Jesuit Vie Tonight

Second-ranked Christian Brothers will go into the pits a heavy favorite (14 points?) at 8 p.m. today when the Falcons meet rival Jesuit High School in the second annual Holy Bowl at American River College.

One of the larger prep crowds is expected for the game, which matches the Falcons' 8-0-1 record against Jesuit's 7-2 mark. The Marauders, with a smaller enrollment, are in the medium school rankings, where they are fifth.

Brothers won last year's parochial meeting, 20-13, but with its first unbeaten team since 1936 should have an easier time tonight against a Marauder squad which was upset by a second-division outfit — Folsom — last week but still won the Golden Empire League championship.

The Metropolitan League titlists had only one flaw on their record, an 8-8 tie with McClatchy in the mud. The Jesuit losses were 7-6 to Folsom and 28-7 to Mira Loma. Brothers battered Mira Loma, 21-0.

Rain is forecast tonight, which may aid Jesuit's upset hopes.

The Falcons' strength lies in a veteran roster, headed by quarterback Dan Carmazzi, rusher Dave Hernandez, receiver John Blanchard and defensemen Jim Sarti and Stan Olsufka.

Nuggets on the younger Marauder club are running backs Joe Ratterman, Mark Costi and Mark Smith, receiver Matt Reilly and QB Phil Rossitto.

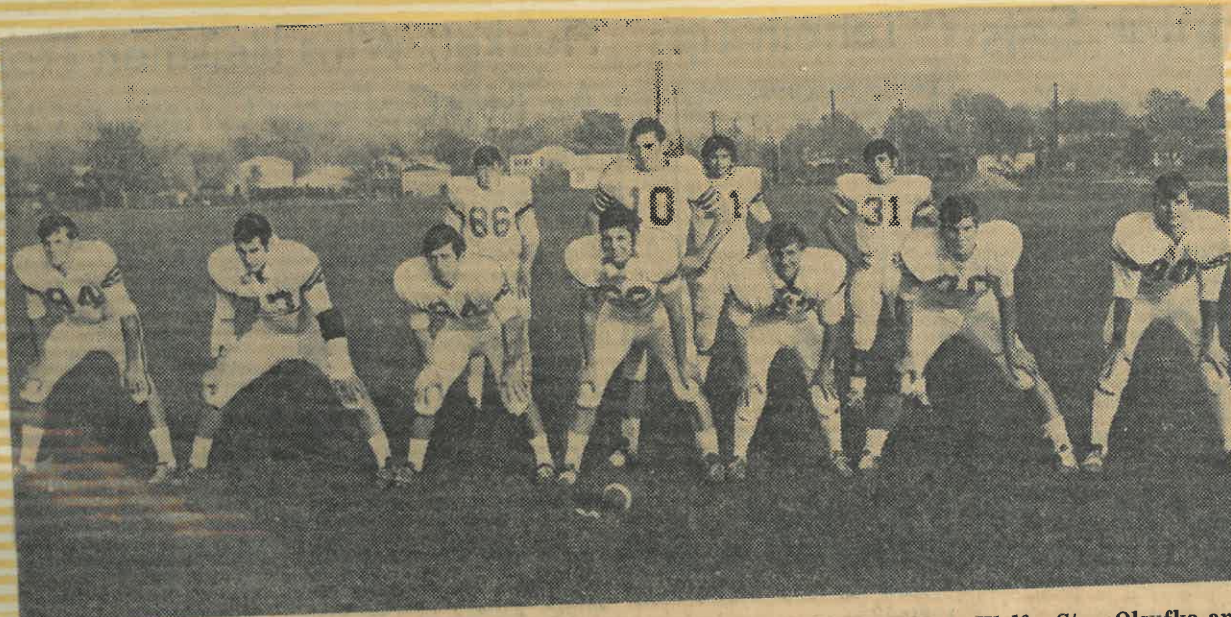
Both teams have strong kickers, Joe Medina for CBS and Ed Corr for Jesuit.

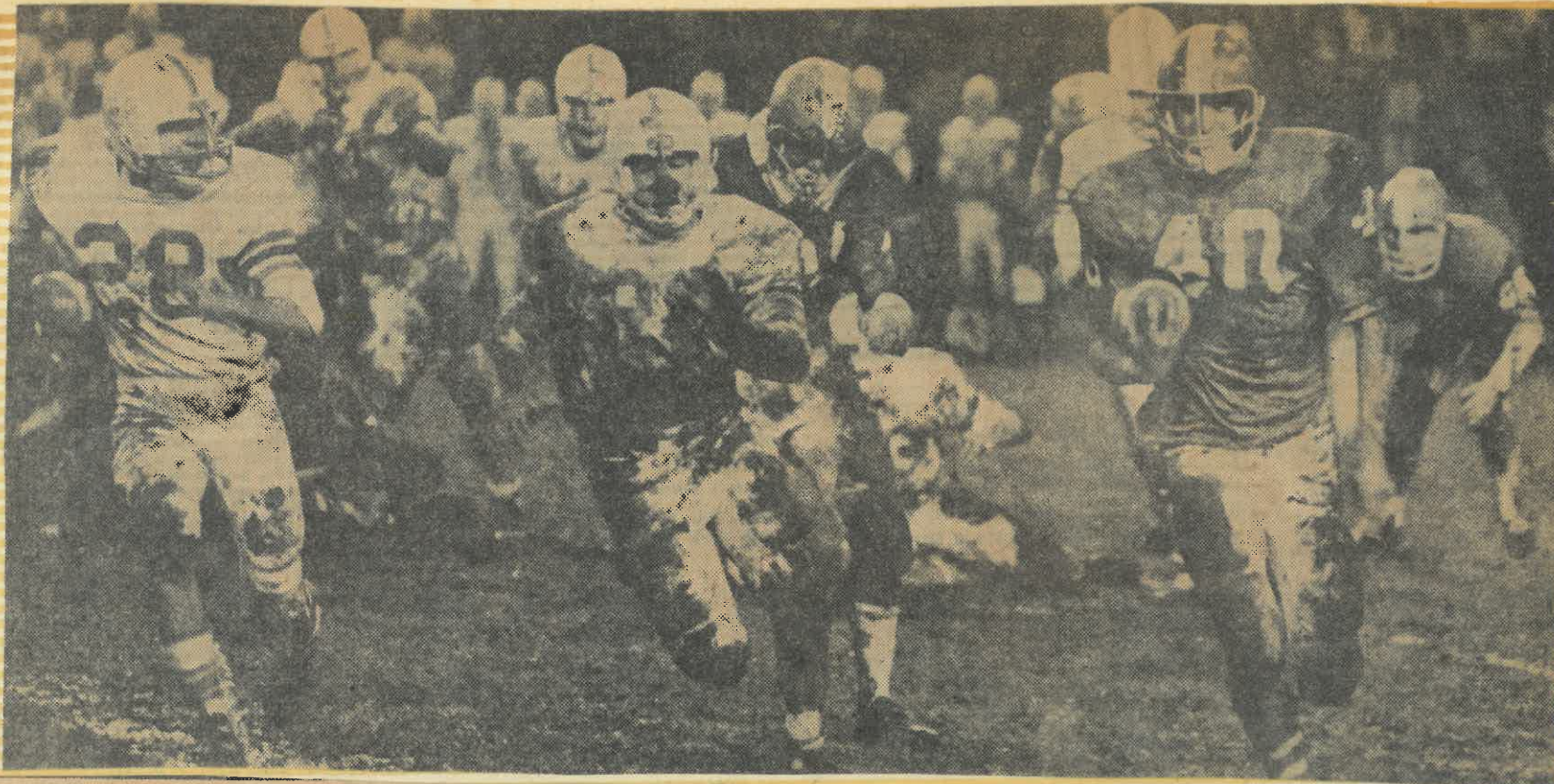

"If you would have gone for the kick I would have fired you," said Rev. Edward E. Callanan, principal at Jesuit High School, after the Marauders had defeated Christian Brothers 8-7 in the second annual Holy Bowl at American River College before 6,772

wet spectators.

Father Callanan was speaking to first-year coach Ben Sanchez and referring to the extra-point attempt following the Jesuit touchdown with 1:27 left in the game.

Joe Ratermann had just climaxed a seven-play, 40-yard drive, by plunging into the end zone from the one-yard Christian Brothers took a 7-0 lead with 4:53 left in the first half. Mark Russell skirted left end on a flanker reverse on a fourth and goal situation for the TD. The Falcons had moved 45 yards in seven plays following a 20-yard punt return by Mark Gabrielli. Olympic trainers. This fact alone attests to his excellent knowledge and understanding in the area of athletic training. His topic, "Prevention and Care of Football Injuries" will be beneficial to all. Lew has been a former college trainer at Ohio State University and Sacramento State College. As director of the Crowl Sports Medicine Clinic he has entered into a new concept of care for athletic injuries.

Two players equally adept at receiving and intercepting passes round out the first team. John "Doc" Blanchard of Christian Brothers made the Falcons' defense doubly tough. With Sarti at tackle (along with All-Metro Area tackle John Cartwright), and Blanchard in the defensive backfield, Christian Brothers swept to an 8-1-1 season. Zimmer was one of the area's surest-handed receivers for the Longhorns, and kept the opposition's pass attack in check as La Sierra ran up a 9-1 record.

JIM SARTI of Christian Brothers is the third defensive tackle (to be mentioned). He won Prep of the Week honors, was named All-Metro Area, and was the Metropolitan League's Player of the Year.
