Catholic High For Boys In Capital City Prepares For Program Of Fall Semester

Course Of Study Gives Students Training In Academic, Commercial and Manual Arts Subjects; Spiritual Development Is Emphasized

Sacramento.—Boys from all parts of the state of California, and from more distant places, will gather at the Christian Brothers' School here to begin the fall semester on Wednesday, September 10. In the local school they will prepare themselves by prayer, study and play for future studies and for life in the world.

Located at 21st Street and Broadway in Sacramento, the Christian Brothers' School is under the patronage of the Most Rev. Robert J. Armstrong, Bishop of Sacramento.

The regulations for the boarding department are firm but not severe or harsh. Every means is used to make the boys contented and happy; conditions are made as homelike as possible.

The brothers are interested in each boy and are available for advice, sympathy and confidence, offering the boy every opportunity to receive the care and guidance given him at home.

tion is the development of the whole personality and this is done principally through the counsel offered to each individual student as well as through the religious influence which permeates the school.

Boys of primary and grammar grades, as well as of high school classes, are accepted as resident students. An experienced matron is in charge of the boys in the primary grades.

Care Of Boys

In addition three brothers are assigned as prefects of the boarding department. These prefects give special attention to the health, cleanliness, mental and moral habits of the boys committed to their care.

Only boys of good moral character are accepted. All resident students are required to adhere to the regulations.

The Brothers of the Christian Schools, familiarly known as "Christian Brothers," are members of a congregation of men devoted solely to the Christian education of youth.

This great teaching order has a tradition of 250 years behind it. With schools now established throughout all parts of the world, the Brothers are everywhere recognized as "moulders of men."

Choice Of Courses

Students enrolling at the school in Sacramento are directed to choose either the academic, the commercial or the manual arts curriculum.

In the academic course the plan of study aims to prepare the student for college work. Boys interested in the professions, such as those of the doctor, lawyer, teacher, engineer, architect, scientist, or who desire to enter the field of research or government service are recommended to register for the academic classes.

Boys interested in a business career are provided with an opportunity of a complete training in the commercial course. From the freshman year, the student begins to acquaint himself with the various business terms and practices.

Particular emphasis is placed on the up-to-date course in book-keeping, in which the pupil is given drill and practice in actual office problems and systems.

Manual Arts Course

Last year the manual arts course was inaugurated at the capital school. In this course the boys are acquainted with the use of tools and learn the techniques of wood-work.

Through this preparatory training the student is enabled to continue with facility in advanced training in the mechanical trade.

Ample provision is also made at the Brothers' School for the physical and social activities of the students.

Physical Education

With the appointment of John Giannoni as head coach, a program for the physical education of all members of the student body has been adopted. A period of time is set aside each day for exercises and games in which each class participates.

Besides the school teams, which engage in competitive games with other schools in the major games, inter-class leagues provide opportunities for all boys to engage in athletics. Facilities are available for hand-ball, basketball, football and track.

Club Sponsors Athletics

An organization of fathers, alumni and friends, called the La Salle Club, actively supports and finances the athletic program.

In addition, the Christian Brothers' School encourages all activities that aid the student in adjusting himself in a Christian manner to social life. School societies, class organizations, entertainments, debating, dancing, picnics and parties provide all the boys with an outlet for their social interests.

The Patrons Club, composed of mothers of the students, fosters dances and dinners for the student body.

Is Select School

A select Catholic High School for boys, the Sacramento institution has accommodations in the boarding department available to youngsters from six years of age to eighteen. Every phase of a young man's life is duly emphasized and developed, and the students have for their constant companions upright boys with real boylike interests.

The faculty is composed solely of men who have devoted their lives to the education of youth with no material compensation but the satisfaction that they are instrumental in forming solid Christian characters in the young men under their influence.

Worth Is Noted

The Christian Brothers' School is recognized here as a place where real boys grow into real men.

Insistence on high moral standards of conduct and the daily good example of men who lead a religious life of sacrifice emphasize the teaching of the classroom.

Solemn Mass to Be Conducted Sunday in Tribute to Brothers

The Brothers of the Christian Schools will be honored tomorrow by men and women of Sacramento Valley at a Solemn Mass, a civic banquet in commemoration of the establishment by the brothers of their first school in the United States in Baltimore, Md., in 1845. Delay in celebration of the centenary was caused by the war.

Bishop Robert Armstrong of Sacramento will preside at the Mass to be celebrated at 12:15 P. M. at the Cathedral of the Sacred Sacrament.

The banquet will be held in the Hotel Senator at 6 P. M. The Rev. Peter Mitchell will give the main address, with Leo Farrell, medical superintendent of Sacramento Hospital, postmaster, Brother Bertram, principal of Christian Brothers school in Sacramento, will welcome the visiting brothers, many of whom taught in Sacramento, and their friends.

HONORED GUESTS will include Bishop Armstrong, Brother Alfred, provincial of Christian Brothers in California, Brother Belle Coolegge, County supervisor James Garlick, and postmaster James R. Wilson, representing the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce.

The Christian Brothers first arrived in Sacramento in 1876 when they established St. Patrick's Academy, later known as Sacramento Institute, at 1126 K street.

According to records of the school, two months after opening, more than 250 had enrolled. The first public entertainment of students was presented on May 28, 1877, in the Assembly Chamber of the State Capitol Building. Brother Cianan was rector and Brother Alexander, director of the first Brothers school in this city.

BROTHER CONRAD and Brother Albion, who taught at Sacramento Institute more than 25 years ago, are now teaching here and will be present at the banquet.

It was through the efforts of Brother Vellasian and Patrick Keane, Bishop of Sacramento, that the school was moved to 21st Street and Broadway, and the name changed. More than 2000 students have graduated from Christian Brothers School during the 24 years at its present location.

Committee Arranges For Annual Field Day At Brothers' School

Sacramento.—The seventh annual Christian Brothers' School field day and carnival will be held on the grounds of the school at 21st Street and Broadway, Sacramento, on Sunday, May 24.

An elaborate program of amusements and sports, including two track meets, one for Christian Brothers High students, and one for students of the local parochial schools, is being planned by the committee in charge of the festival.

The next meeting of the committee will be held on Monday evening, May 11, at 8:00 o'clock, at the school.
