It was in 1935 and 1936 when the Flynn-coached Brothers made lasting football history by giant killing the Sacramento high school two seasons in succession in succession.

Soon thereafter the city school board became impressed with Flynn's ability. They hired him on the Dragon physical educa-tion staff—as head basketball
