A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

DEAR FAMILIES:

Welcome to the 2019-20 school year. Our 144th year of Lasallian Catholic education is off to a fantastic start with strong enrollment, energized teachers and staff, a fresh new parking lot and the joyful sound of earth movers permeating the campus as the new stadium takes shape.

Tim thrilled to share that in August, Peter Bollinger "S7 pledged a prodigious \$1.5 million to the Securing the Future Campoign. This is the largest single contribution to the campaign and brings us closer to our \$11.8 million goal As we celebrate this transformative pledge, the work outside continues at a rapid pace. Thanks to the generosity of many, we are close to making this dream a reality for our students without taking on any long-term debt.

We recognize that some of you may not be familiar with this endeavor. Six years ago, school leaders began the process of creating a new 15-year campus master plan. After consulting with community stakeholders, architects and building professionals, the following immediate priorities were identified:

- Improved outdoor athletic facilities Education at Christian Brothers extends beyond the classrooms into the athletic arena, providing life lessons in leadership, teamwork and perseverance all skills crucial to success in college and the workplace. Each year, approximately 700 student-athletes participate in one or more of our 77 sports. Unfortunately, our athletic fields did not meet the needs of our physical education classes and student-athletes, nor were they comparable to facilities at other schools.
- Growing the endowment An essential component of our Lasallian mission is our insistence on education for all, regardless of their ability to pay. The Lasallian District of San Francisco New Orleans places a priority on service to the poor, and emphasizes outreach to the most socioeconomically disadvantaged in our community. OB proudly leads the region in tuition assistance. More than seven percent of our families live below the federal poverty level. Last year, 405 students received 52.7 million in need-based tuition assistance. Of that amount, approximately 5425,000 comes from endowment earnings. Growing the endowment allows for continued support and growth in the tuition assistance program.
- Infrastructure improvements As enrollment has grown to just over

1,150 students, so has the need for improved parking. Programs like Junior Falcons football and cheer, Diocesan and middle school events help strengthen community outreach and long-term enrollment, but also place extra demands on limited parking facilities. CB's new parking lot and reconfigured entrylexit will help ensure a more efficient traffic flow. When construction is finished, we will also see increased parking capacity. Further, from a safety and good-neighbor perspective, ensuring that students and visitors have adequate on-campus parking alleviates a need for parking on the surrounding streets.

We continue to believe that buildings are just buildings, just as an arthletic field is just an arthletic field. It is when our phenomenal teachers, staff members, coaches and students bring the facilities to life, the magic really happens. In the case of the George Curningham '40 Performing Arts Center, our theatre program earned an impressive 17 Elly Award nominations this year from the Sacramento Area Regional Theatre Alliance for its phenomenal productions of 'Singin' in the Rain' and "The Martian Chronicles." Prior to 2014 when this facility opened, we knew that we had talented performers, but the theatre really gave us a place to develop and showcase their gifts. We believe the same will ring true for our student-athletes.

If you are not already a part of this important endeavor, we welcome the opportunity to share more about the Securing the Future Compaign and the important role you can play. We look forward to celebrating with all of you in early 2020 as we cut the ribbon and open the gates to the Peter Bollinger 'S7 Stadium!

The freshmen will then be able to access this very important website for college and career planning and personal awareness. Mr. Purdy will also be handing out a packet of helpful information to the frosh regarding how to be successful at CB and utilize their counselors. This will take place during their pre-scheduled small-group conference. On Wednesday, September 11 at 6:00 p.m. in the George Cunningham '40 Performing Arts Center, the counselors will be hosting all freshmen parents for "Making the Most of High School." We will give parents a preview of what to expect from the counseling department over the next four years and discuss important issues concerning academic, personal and college counseling.

Sophomores - Mrs. Erica Gormley and Mrs. Arry Archer, Class of 2022 counselors, will have the sophomores taking "Do What You Are," a personality profile/career interest survey on Family Connection. 
Frosh All Class Retreat

COUNSELING

Testing Day

Wednesday, October 16 is a very important day for students at Christian Brothers. Testing Day is a late start/minimum day that involves the freshmen, sophomores and juniors in preliminary college entrance testing. The exams will begin at 9:00 a.m. and students will be dismissed at about 12:30 p.m. after all grade-levels have completed their tests. Coordinated by the counselors, the teachers will administer the following assessments to students:

JUNIORS will take the PSAT/NMSQT Exam (preliminary SAT). This test is great practice for the SAT and also allows high achieving students the opportunity to qualify for participation in the National Merit Scholarship Program, National Hispanic Scholars Program, and the National Achievement Scholarship Program for Black American high school students.

SOPHOMORES will be taking the new Pre-ACT. This test will be an excellent, low-risk practice for the ACT exam, which has gained in popularity both locally and nationwide.

FRESHMEN will be taking the PSAT 8/9, which will give us a reliable baseline score early on in high school and will allow us to keep statistical comparisons when the students take the PSAT/NMSQT and the SAT at a later time.

SENIORS will be given the day off – however, this day is a great opportunity for visiting local colleges. Seniors may be ready to begin applying to colleges in October, and if they have not visited local or regional colleges yet, this mid-weekday is a perfect time to schedule a tour and find out more about a college while it is in full swing.

Results of the exams will be returned to students by their grade-level counselor in January/February 2020. If you have any questions, please call the Counseling Department at 916-733-3680. Here are some tips to help students do their best on the Testing Day exams:

- Remind your child to get plenty of rest the night before the test.
- Students should eat a nutritious breakfast the morning of the test. Food and drink (including water) are prohibited during the test, except during breaks. (The cafeteria will not be open that day, so students who will be staying on campus for sports practices, etc. may want to bring a snack or bag lunch).
- Juniors have already received information and materials about the PSAT from their counselor in September. This included a PSAT Official Student Guide with a practice exam. Please encourage your son/daughter to prepare for the test by taking the practice exam at home before Testing Day.
- Remind your student (at all three grade levels) to bring two sharpened #2 pencils and his/her calculator.

A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CAMPUS MINISTRY

DEAR FAMILIES:

I invite you to recall with me the words of our Founder, "In the I responded with a quick "that's nice" and a nod as I pulled her light of faith you see things differently." As you may remember, these words helped frame our school theme this year which is focused on "vision" and the importance of seeing all through the lens of faith. As we enter the season of Advent, I offer a few thoughts for reflection. In the Gospel for the First Sunday of Advent, Jesus tells his disciples: "Be watchful! Be alert! You do not know when the end will come." I believe the message for us is to open our eyes, pay attention, slow down and really see. But how do we know what to watch for? For some of us we might find ourselves watchful in anticipation of something joyful. For others, we could be on the lookout for something challenging. In either case, I believe there is an opportunity - an opportunity to embrace the sacrament of the present moment. I think about how often we use the words "Let us remember...that we are in the holy presence of God" in our Lasallian community. Each time we say this we are invited to consider the sacrament of the present moment, to acknowledge our moment by moment encounter with God. And while we confess that God is everywhere and, in all things, it can be all too easy to walk through, more like run through, our days treating all things that we encounter as just that, things. We miss the reality that God's presence is being shared with us in and through all things.

The call to see with eyes of faith challenges us to be open and aware, and to slow ourselves down enough to not miss the blessing of the moment before us. I recall a simple example that taught me this in a profound way. One fall morning, I was working tirelessly to get out the door in a timely fashion with my daughter, who was six years old at the time. As we rushed out the door, I struggled to juggle my travel coffee mug, laptop bag, purse, car keys, her backpack and her change of clothes for a soccer practice later that evening. Needless to say, my daughter, Jessie, was hardly aware of the rush we were in as she moved at a slug's pace that morning. As I threw the items in the car and attempted to hasten her to the car, she pulled at my hand wanting me to follow her, exclaiming "Mommy, look! Mommy, look! It's so cool!" In my best "trying-to-be-patient mom voice,"

into her seat so we could get moving. We pulled away and I prepared to face the morning commute. At one point during the drive. I looked in the rear-view mirror and saw Jessie's little face looking so sad. When I asked her why she was sad, she told me she had really wanted me to see this very cool ladybug and that I had missed it. In an instant I knew I had indeed missed something very cool. I had missed a moment of excitement, discovery and beauty through the eyes of my child. I had missed the moment to be able to crouch down alongside her and share in her moment of joy and awe. I had missed the sacrament of the present moment because I was in a rush and failed to stop and to really see.

Advent is a season of waiting and preparing that invites us to slow down and affords us the opportunity to see with eyes of faith all that the season holds. My prayer for each of us is that we can avoid our inclination to rush, and that even in the midst of the hustle and bustle of preparing for Christmas and holiday festivities, we can slow down enough to embrace the sacrament of the present moment. Who knows what we'll discover when we slow down and open our eyes to see?

COLINSELING

College Entrance Exams

It's that time of the year when we break down the basics of the tests that students may need to take as they consider their college options. Most four-year colleges and universities require a college entrance test score as part of the application process. The two national tests are the ACT (American College Test) and the SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test). All colleges and universities will accept either score. Both tests are offered at local area high schools seven or eight times throughout the year. CB administers both exams on dates in the fall and spring. Research nationally, and with our own CB students, indicates that students often perform differently on the ACT and SAT. Here is some information on each test:

ACT

- Has four content areas English, math, reading and science reasoning
- Measures academic achievement in the four areas and contains analytical and problem-solving exercises related to what has been learned in the classroom.
- · Has an optional essay (which we recommend)
- Registration for the ACT is done on the ACT website (swww.actstudent.org).

SAT

- Tests reading and mathematics
- · Has an optional essay (which we recommend)
- Focuses on problem-solving, data-analysis, evidence-based reading and writing, and writing and analyzing literature, social studies and science passages.
- Some parts of the math test now eliminate the use of calculators.
- Registration for the SAT is done on the SAT website

(www.collegeboard.com)-

SAT SUBJECT TESTS

- Subject area tests that UC and a few selective colleges either recommend or require (it will depend on the schools and the major areas of study – check their websites)
- Should be taken by the fall of senior year, but can be taken after sophomore or junior year in May or June, following the completion of the last course in that subject or after an AP course is completed

Though the trend seems to be to take college entrance exams earlier in a student's high school career, we do <u>not</u> see any significant benefit to this action for <u>most</u> students. Sometimes waiting until a student finishes Algebra 2 or junior year English can greatly improve scores. There is never a penalty for taking a test early or more than once. Colleges will see every SAT score (unless a student chooses SAT score choice, which we do <u>not</u> recommend), but they always take the highest score. The UC system takes the best score from one slitting. Many private colleges and the CSUs will take a student's highest score from each section during different slittings and combine them into the highest possible score (the "super-score"). Since colleges will accept either the SAT or the ACT and take the highest score, we recommend that students consider taking both tests at least once.

If your student does not do well on standardized tests, check out Fair Test at www.fairtest.org for a list of schools that do not require either the SAT or ACT for admissions purposes.

Free Online Test Prep

Khan Academy and ACT Academy have made an agreement with SAT and ACT to do free online test prep. You may view details of that program at the website referenced above.

Testing Day Results for Juniors, Sophomores and Freshmen

Counselors will be returning score reports in January and February 2020 from the SAT and ACT practice tests that were administered in October 2019. We will let parents know when that process begins to unfold.

Mock SAT and ACT for Juniors

On January 25, 2020 juniors will be able to experience each section of the SAT and ACT in a real exam setting to help decide which test to take in the spring and during senior year. The cost is 530. Click here to sign up, More information will be available at our December 4 College Night for Juniors.

SAT and ACT Prep Classes for Juniors

CB is once again offering an SAT prep course at CB for the class of 2021 students planning to take the SAT on March 14 or May 2. The class will be taught by our math and English teachers and will be held from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on four Saturdays (February 1, 8, 15 and 22). We are also offering an ACT prep class at CB in April, leading up to the exam we host on April 4. The course will be from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m on two Saturdays (March 21 and 28). Registration information will be available on the Counseling section of the CB website.

Check with our Director of College Counseling, Ms. Melissa McClellan, if you have any questions or seek guidance on the many options that are available for ACT and SAT prep.

Tips for Parents on Using CB's Family Connection

Family Connection is a remarkable tool for students and parents to use for self-awareness or educational, career and college planning. There is information on hundreds of careers and scholarships that students may apply for and Scattergroms to show what it might take to get into individual colleges. Students have been shown how to access and navigate the site, and are urged to share the log-in information with their parents and communicate about the features that are available. Counselors will continue to present information at student/parent evenings, but parents who have specific questions should contact their son/daughter's grade-level counselor or the college counselors.

Parents: If your child has 'D's or 'F's on his/her report card, PLEASE READ THIS!

As stated on page 13 of the CB Parent/Student Handbook. 'D's' and 'F's' are bad news on report cards! It is important for you and your student to understand that neither 'D's' nor 'F's' are acceptable. 'F' grades must be repeated for credit to graduate from Christian Brothers High School, 'D' grades, though worth five credits toward graduation, are not accepted by four-year colleges and universities. All California State University campuses, University of California campuses, and most private institutions require a 'C' or above in all core courses (Core courses are approved history, English, math, lab science, world language, visual and performing arts, and elective courses - also known as the 'a-g' list of approved courses. See the chart below for these requirements). If students have 'D's' on the transcript in any a-g courses and do not remediate them, they are not eligible to apply for admission to CSU and UC schools, therefore seriously limiting their choices for college.

If your child would like to keep his/her options open and remain eligible to apply to a four-year college, the Counseling Department highly recommends that he/she remediate (repeat for credit) any 'D' grades earned in a-g approved courses. Students may encoll in a variety of classes during the 2020 CBHS Summer School session to remediate a grade. While previous grades are never removed from a student's transcript, if a student completes the course in summer school with a 'C' or above, his/her transcript will reflect the new credits and the new grade will be used when calculating the grade point average.

For example, if your child is currently enrolled in biology and received a 'D' the first semester, he/she should consider repeating biology this summer. If he/she is currently enrolled in a math

or world language course and received a low grade the first semester ('D' or 'F'), it is important to receive a 'C' or above at the end of the spring semester. CSU and UC will "validate" (count as successful) the whole year of a math or world language course if the student shows marked improvement the second semester (i.e. goes from a 'D' to a 'C,' '8,' or 'X'). Therefore, students have a choice - work very hard this semester in math and/or world language and bring the grade up or repeat it in summer school or next school year to raise the grade. Since a full four years of English is a basic requirement for eligibility to a four-year college, any 'D's' in English should be remediated in the summer. One year of world history is the minimum requirement for eligibility, so students should be sure to have a 'C' or above for at least two of the four semesters of frosh/soph world history. Any U.S. history 'D's' should also be remediated.

Please contact your child's grade-level counselor if you have questions about remediating grades. If you intend to register for summer school, registration will be available online on the C8 website beginning January 1, 2020.

Standardized Test Scores

I grade 10) test results will be returned to students during classroom visits in January and February. Counselors will go over results with students by explaining and analyzing their scores and will also assist students with pre-registration for classes in the 2020-2021 school year. Please ask your son/daughter to see his/her exam results (scores are also already posted on Femily Connection). Look for a mailing regarding pre-registration in early February.

Attention Seniors and Their Parents:

Please remember to turn in copies of your admission decisions and scholarship letters to Mrs. Cynthia Grajeda, Ms. Melissa McClellan, Mrs. April Melarkey, or Mr. Armando Diaz "94 in the Counseling Center as you receive them. It is also very important that students update their admission status on Remity Connection.

Pre-Registration for 2020-2021 Classes

Freshmen, sophomores and juniors will be working on pre-registration for the 2020-2021 school year with their counselors during February. Reflections for February... Are you "Fired Up?"



In preparation for Christian Brothers serving as this year's host for the annual Diocesan FIRED UP Confirmation Conference for youth, I offer you a reflection on the role of the Holy Spirit in everyday life. In one of his meditative writings,

our founder, St. John Baptist de La Salle, says, "Earnestly ask Jesus Christ to make his Spirit come alive in you, since he has chosen you to do his work." (Med 196.1) That is an amazing reminder that the very presence of Christ lives within each of us through the power of the Holy Spirit. We have been called and chosen to share the "Good News" with others that they may see the fire of our faith burning within us. We are not called to respond out of duty or obligation, but out of the desire to say "yes" to this important mission and to offer our response with zeal and enthusiasm. The power of the Holy Spirit in our lives gives us the strength to stand up for what is right and just, to discern well and make sound decisions, to practice empathy and compassion for others, and to respect life in all forms. A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

DEAR FAMILIES:

Last month, the gates to the Peter P. Bollinger '57 Stadium remains below the average for Catholic high schools in Northern officially opened with a blessing and dedication ceremony. California Our constant challenge is balancing mission-centered The festive celebration marked the culmination of the school's Securing the Future Compaign. In just four and one-half years, CB alumni, parents, and friends contributed and pledged a remarkable \$12.6 million to improve athletic facilities, parking and infrastructure, and grow the endowment. Thanks to the generosity of many, and the hard work of staff and volunteers, our student-athletes now have a beautiful, state-of-the-art facility that allows them to develop and showcase their Godgiven gifts. Further, our students, families, employees and guests have more on-campus parking available.

We recognize that many of you make tremendous sacrifices to provide Lasallian Catholic education. I am pleased to share that the cost of the construction projects is exclusively funded by donors without the use of tuition dollars and without incurring long-term debt. Further, \$2.6 million of the \$12.6 million campaign is dedicated to growing the endowment which helps fund tuition assistance.

Our Lasallian Catholic mission calls for us to serve the poor and we must also ensure that CB is accessible to modest and middle-income families. We embrace this opportunity. In 2019-20, we are distributing \$2.8 million in need-based tuition assistance to 421 students. That is more than one-third of our student body. We expect these numbers to be similar in 2020-21. Tuition assistance comes from three sources: endowment earnings, fundraising efforts, and the operating budget. We are grateful to all of our parents, alumni, and friends who support our fundraising activities, including the Securing the Future Compaign. Your ongoing support is critical to our mission!

Our commitment to prayerful and careful stewardship of school resources is steadfast. Recently, the Board of Trustees approved a 2020-21 operating budget which raises tuition and fees by a total of 3.5 percent. Tuition for 2020-21 will be \$14,550 and the registration fee of \$700 will remain the same. Our tuition

A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE COUNSELING

DEAR FAMILIES:

want to address some of the ways the Counseling Department is is a form of control. We must control the controllable. Take time working with our Christian Brothers community and offer some suggestions for moving forward while maintaining a level of mental and physical health.

The Counseling Department is available and would love to hear from our students and parents. We are checking email and Schoology messages regularly and setting up video conferences through Zoom. We are working with students on their attendance, checking grades, updating classes for next year, discussing the college decision process and helping students process this difficult time in our world. Our Wellness Counselor, Mrs. McDougall, is posting helpful tips for students on Schoology. We would also like to share the following:

Homework and study tips for students

Communicate with your teachers if you are having trouble understanding a topic. Set up a "regular school schedule" and set aside time for breaks, just as we do on campus. Seek out a "digital learning coach" or "peer tutor" to help with difficult.

Tips for parents to support your student

Set a daily plan/goal with your student to maintain schoolwork expectations and help him/her stay on task with a structured environment as much as possible. Check PowerSchool and Schoology for missing assignments. Inquire about the positive aspects as well as the challenges of digital learning.

Take mental health/study breaks throughout the day Students do not sit at school for four straight hours doing work, so school from home should look similar. Begin the day with our morning prayer and enjoy "Midday Mountaintop Moments." Encourage and allow snack breaks, a quick video chat/Facetime with a friend, a 20-minute nap, a quick meditation or stretch break, or get outside for a walk on these nice spring days.

The stress and anxiety our students are feeling around COVID-19 are real and valid. They may be experiencing a loss of control and worrying about a life they suddenly feel they have no influence

As we enter into our new reality of "Digital Counseling" days I over. When we, no matter the age, have something to do, that to consider the small things we can control, such as planning a meal, checking in with friends and family or committing to an exercise plan. Do now well; do today well. Help students focus on what they can be successful at each day instead of worrying and focusing too far into the future. Erma Bombeck said, "Worrying is like a rocking chair: it gives you something to do, but it never gets you anywhere." Our brains can only focus on one thing at a time. When students begin to feel overwhelmed, encourage them to meditate or practice a breathing pattern:

> Inhale on a four-count, hold for a four-count, exhale on a fourcount, hold for a four-count and begin over again. While counting and hreathing, the mind facuses on the numbers, not life around us.

> Much of this advice was borrowed from a podcast called Laughter Permitted by Julie Foudy in her interview with Sports Psychologist Colleen Hacker, who has worked with athletes from the NFL, NBA, U.S. Women's National Soccer Team, and many more. Much of sports performance can be related to getting through the stress and anxiety many are now facing in our daily lives.

> Easter break with Coronavirus: Easter break is probably going to look a lot different this year. Most likely there will be no flights to warmer weather and no big family gatherings, reunions and meals. So, what will we do? The following page lists some ideas you and your family can do to relax and rejuvenate during our two-week vacation.

College News

Graduating seniors have been receiving letters of acceptance to colleges and universities across the country. Congratulations to the class of 2020! As many seniors already know, this has been a very competitive year for college admission. Since the class of 2020 is one of the largest graduating classes in American history (over 3 million), the number of students applying to colleges has seen exponential growth.

In addition, a new trend has developed that has more seniors across the country applying to more colleges than ever in order to "hedge their bets." Many private colleges have reported that they have had a 30% increase in applications this year over the previous year, resulting in record numbers of applicant pools. Since most campuses have from 45,000 to 65,000 applicants to fill freshmen classes of approximately 4,500, one can see how difficult decisions have been for admissions offices in 2020. In fact, for the seventh year in a row, many UCs and CSUs have instituted a waitist for stellar students who were not admitted. It is difficult to know to what extent the waitlists will be used; as a result, there have been disappointments not only among our own students, but for tens of thousands of other California seniors.

Thankfully, most of our seniors planned well and applied to not only "reach" schools, but "target" schools and "safety" schools as well. As a result, CB students have options for next year and are able to begin their college careers at great schools. If any seniors are still grappling with final decisions, remember that Mr. Diaz, Mrs. Melarkey, and Ms. McClellen are available to assist and support you. Seniors who will be attending community college should have already completed their application, registration process and the online orientation. Students attending a UC and needing to satisfy the Entry Level Writing Requirement should be receiving information on the May 16 (tentative) Analytical Writing Placement Examination (WMPE).

Many of our students have been admitted to several prestigious universities and programs, including University of Southern California, Northeastern University, University of California, Berkeley, University of California, Los Angeles, Loyola Marymount University, Santa Clara University, Seattle University, Saint Mary's College of California, and many more. All the colleges that our students have been admitted to will be listed in the graduation program.

Parents, be sure to have your senior go to the <u>C8 Family</u>
<u>Connection</u> website (see the letter mailed home to senior
parents for details) and update it no later than April 3
for scholarships and awards and by May 8 for college
admittances. Students need to list all colleges to which
they have been admitted and all scholarships, awards, etc.
received.

Reflections for April...

Last month we began our Lenten journey together. I recently saw a post online that read "I had no idea I'd be giving up so much this Lent." I'm sure this is a sentiment we can all relate to. Who could have predicted that we would find ourselves and our country facing the COVID-19 pandemic? Now more than ever, we can unite our sufferings with the suffering of Jesus. As we continue our journey to the cross, we can see that the struggles and falls that Jesus endured while bearing the weight of the cross are not unlike our own feelings of fear, doubt, struggle and worry that we encounter now. The feelings of helplessness and powerlessness that Veronica and others in the crowd must have felt as they watched Jesus walk toward his death are feelings many of us are currently experiencing with each passing day of this mandated shelter in place. The notion of standing by and watching a loved one die as Mary did at the foot of the cross reminds us that we, too, must put our faith in God, who has surely promised resurrection for those who believe. We know that the Spirit of Christ lives on in our hearts as we try our best to live lives that are hope-filled and life-giving. As we continue along this journey, we do so together even though we are physically separated from one another. This is where we can draw our strength. The plentitude of amazing individuals living the Lasallian mission throughout our world and our local Christian Brothers. family are gifts to be grateful for. My prayer is that the recollection of many grace-filled moments will be something to sustain us even when the road gets tough. Let us remember, we are never alone, and we are always in the holy presence of God. So, as we prepare to embark on our journey through Holy Week, I affer you these reflections to consider:

On Sunday, April 5, the Church will celebrate Palm Sunday to celebrate Jesus's arrival in the city of Jerusalem. What do I celebrate most about Christian Brothers and the experiences it has provided to me? To my family?

The Paschal Triduum, often called the Easter Triduum or simply the Triduum, includes Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. This also consists of the great Easter Vigil, the high point of the Triduum. The word "Triduum" comes from the Latin word meaning "three days." The Triduum celebrates the heart of our faith and salvation: the death and resumection of Christ, thus being the high point of the liturgical year.

On Holy Thursday, April 9, we celebrate the Institution of the Eucharist and we commemorate the Last Supper where Jesus became a servant by washing the feet of his disciples. Now have I "washed the feet of others?" How have my "feet been washed" by members of this CB community? On Good Friday, April 10, we mark the final moments of Jesus's life through our recollection of the crucifixion. What feelings of Joss, sadness, worry or devostation am / feeling? How can libest acknowledge what pierces my heart?

On Holy Saturday, April 11, we acknowledge the day that Jesus is laid in the tomb. Are there things I must let go of and prepare to leave Awkinst?

On Easter Sunday, April 12, we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ

– Jesus's triumph over death and renewed hope for life in the Spirit.

What moments of grace have blessed me? What am I hopeful for in the
future? What gifts of life, hope and renewal am I most thankful for?

As we continue this journey together, know that I am praying for you. The hope and gratitude that fills my heart as I work and minister at Christian Brothers blesses me as I continue this journey even during uncertain times.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

DEAR FAMILIES:

Sixteen years ago, I joined the CB community as President/CEO. Kingdom CAN be. We bring together a diverse group of students Last summer I announced that 2019-20 would be my last year of service. Never could I have realized my time at CB would end under such strange circumstances. Just six weeks ago, few of us could have conceived the scenario in which we're now living.

I'm certainly missing the series of "lasts" and the rituals that come with the end of a school year. But it's our seniors and their families that I ache for, and our faculty and staff I so deeply appreciate.

When I decided to step down, we were wrapping up a major fundraising campaign and plans were in place to complete a major campus improvement project. We had obtained our six-year accreditation. In the past 16 years, the campus has been transformed; an air conditioning system, Witry Field House, Cunningham Performing Arts Center, Chapel of St. Joseph, Bollinger Stadium, and a host of other improvements. We have become the largest Catholic school in the region. Every student has an iPad as part of our robust technology program. We've welcomed numerous international students into our community. These are noteworthy changes accomplished thanks to the hard work and generosity of MANY.

But as I reflect on these changes, I'm most proud of the human and Christian education that took place before I arrived and will continue long after I leave. CB is a microcosm of what Christ's

CB will look different in many ways when we return to our new normal. But we will still be guided by faith and committed to our mission to provide a human and Christian education to the young, especially the poor.

COUNSELING

Summer is still a time for action! The counselors would like to remind students and parents that summertime is a good time to continue college planning and academic preparation. Studies continue to show that students who are involved in structured, productive activities in the summer are less likely to engage in at-risk behaviors. Busy, involved and goal-oriented students who are working on academic pursuits, athletics, a summer job, community service or enrichment activities are better prepared for the rest of high school and for college. With the possibility of continued health restrictions, consider CB's own online Summer School program and remember there are several other things that students should be doing this summer:

All Students: Remember to spend time this summer completing your summer reading assignments!

Freshmen: Update your resume and finish your MI
Advantage on Femily Connection If you have not already done so.

Sophomores: Update your resumé and complete any other activities that are suggested on Femily Connection. Utilize Khan Academy's online SAT prep and the online ACT. Academy to start preparing for the PSAT/NMSQT, which will be given in October. See the Counseling web page to find out about college summer programs.

Juniors: A checklist of reminders:

MAY/JUNE

- Start prepping for the SAT by utilizing Khan Academy's online test prep and for the ACT by utilizing ACT Online.

- Update your resumé on <u>Family Connection</u> and finish any other suggested activities.

SUMMER

- Complete summer "homework" for college admission (will be distributed soon by Ms. McClellan and Mrs. Melarkey in the Class of 2021 Schoology group) – This is due the first day of school in August!
- Check commonapp.org and other college admissions websites for dates when colleges begin accepting applications (the Common App opens over the summer and the UC App will open August 1).
- Start checking out financial aid and scholarship resources and continue this throughout the summer. Try www.fastweb.com or www.finaid.com as well as the Scholarship Search and Scholarship Match on Family, Connection. Next fall will be very busy with your classes.

college applications and other activities that you are participating in, so "down-time" in the summer is the perfect time to seek out these opportunities.

- Begin drafting your college essay (part of your summer "homework").
- Log on to Family Connection to research colleges and career opportunities and visit colleges if you can.
- Do something extraordinary! Try a summer program on a college campus (we have a list on the <u>Counseling web.</u> <u>page</u>), work at a job, or travel (if safety permits).

MAY

- You must submit your acceptance ("Statement of Intent to Register") to the college you have chosen to attend by May 1 (some schools have pushed back the deadline to June 1st!)
- Congratulate yourself but finish strong. Final grades do count!
- Go to Family Connection by May 8 and list the colleges where you were admitted and where you have decided to enroll.
- Fill out college housing forms and pay careful attention to deadlines concerning housing deposits, etc.
- Write "Thanks, but no thanks" letters to colleges you will not attend. E-mailing them is okay. Ask Ms. McClellan or Mrs. Melarkey for help on how to do that if you don't already know how.
- Now is the time to order your final transcript for college.

JUNE

- Make sure you have responded to all requests from your college of choice.
- Don't forget to thank your teachers, counselors, the registrar, etc. for all their help over the past four years!

Important Reminders for Students Who Receive 'D' or 'F' Semester Grades

- All semester F's must be remediated during the summer in our CB Summer School program.
- Any semester F's by seniors will cause you to not receive the CB diploma that you have worked for over four years.
- Semester D's could put a student in jeopardy of not being eligible for four-year colleges and universities immediately after high school. We strongly suggest that D's be remediated in the summer! (If you have any questions regarding the need for taking these courses or the consequences of not taking them, please see the CB Course. Catalog on the school website and/or contact your child's grade-level counselor).
