CBS Slips By Sac On Ross Free Toss In Overtime, 41-40

Christian Brothers upset Sac_o-to-go to put the gaels ahead again Tuesday night, 41-40, in the Jumi-ler College gym. The game turned into a thriller in the fourth period, with the outcome not being decided until the last moments of the overtime period when Bill Ross sank the charity toss that gave CBS the win. The Brothers suddenly became alive in the fourth quarter and sank 14 points while holding the Dragons to a mere six.

Sac took an early 4-4 lead only to have the Brothers overtake them and hold a 9-7 bulge nearing the end of the first quarter. Young tied it up 11 all with 30 seconds remaining but Colbert dropped in a free throw to give CBS their lead at the end of the first period.

In the second quarter the Dragons and Gaels traded leads until finally the half ended with SHS out in front 22-17.

Sacramento maintained their five point bulge throughout the third stanza, and also picked up another point on the gaels, leading 32-29, entering the final quarter.

It was in these last eight minutes that the Dragon roosters saw Sac's lead slowly but steadily dwindle down until Ross sank one from under the basket to put Christian Brothers in front 35-34. Bill was foiled in sinking the field goal and was given a free throw which he also made, making it 36-34. Before Sac fans had been able to recover from this horrible shock, Chado Vasquez followed with a layup to give CBS a seemingly insurmountable lead of 38-34, with just a little over a minute remaining. Sac took it down the court from where Jim Lyons put in a one handed push shot from the left corner to narrow the gap to 38-36. With just a few seconds shy of a minute remaining Red Young was fouled while going up for a shot which gave him two free throws, both of which he sank to tie up the game 38-38. Ithoburn put in a jump shot from the foul line with 30 seconds left

to go to put the gaels ahead again 39-38. Jim Fennstra was foiled while in the art of shooting just as the buzzer sounded ending the game. The crowd, thinking the game over poised onto the floor, but referee cleared them off to give Fennstra his two shots. Jim made both of them with the spectators standing along the sidelines and under the basket. These two points tied the game up and threw it into a three minute overtime period. Both teams took shots but missed. Then with only half a minute left Ross sank his charity toss to give CBS a hard fought 41-40 win.

Bill Ross was high point man of the game with 15 points, being closely followed by Red Young who had 14.

This was Sac's first loss in intra-city play.

SHS Defeats CBS 37 - 28, Goncalves Nets 10 Points

Ross Scores Free Throw In Overtime

Center Bill Ross made good on a free throw with a minute left in an overtime period last night as Christian Brothers handed Sacramento High its first defeat in intra-city play, 41-40, at Sacramento JC gym.

The game was marked by one of the wierdest finishes of the year in capital prepdom.

ROSS' POINT was the only score of an extra three minute session. The regulation game ended in controversy with the count tied at 40-40.

Playing without the services of two regular starters, Will Towne and Ron Limberger, both of whom are on the sick list, the Gaels fought from behind in the final quarter to overtake the Dragons and forge ahead, 40-38; on reserve Pete Shurburn's Frank Marriwell shot with 35 seconds left.

The Dragons took the ball out of bounds; a foul was called on CBS and SHS took it out at mid-court. The buzzer sounded the end of the game, but another foul was committed and Sacramento's young Jim Femstra stepped to the free throw line with the time expired and the entire crowd gathered around the sideline.

THE PRESSURE was on but Femstra was equal to it and put in both shots to send the game into the extra period.

Leading 20-17 at halftime, Femstra and Red Young kept the Dragons ahead in the third period and held a 38-36 margin entering the final stanza. Ross and Tony Latino scored all of the nine points for CBS in the third quarter.

Then the curtain fell on the Dragons. Latino scored his fourth shot from around the 25 foot mark, and Harvey Fong of SHS matched it with a perfect layup. Ross scored again for CBS with six minutes left and kept scoring until he had accounted for eight straight points and Chado Vasquez another two, all without retaliation to give the Gaels a 38-34 lead with less than three minutes remaining.

Ross Nets 22 As Brothers Win 56-46

CLARKSBURG—Bill Ross of Christian Brothers and Mike Bakarich of Clarksburg High staged a scoring duel here last night as the invading Gaels racked a 56-46 cage triumph.

Although his team lost the game, Bakarich won the duel, scoring 35 points to 22 for Ross. Bakarich was toading 'em in from short and long and Ross used a deadly hook shot to keep pace.

The Brothers led at halftime, 23-15 and were in front 40-35 after three periods.

In a B game, Jay Swain scored 16 points as the Gael lightweights outscored the Gaels, 39-37. George Gradij counted 10.

Ross Makes Long Jump As Scorer

Ross, Christian Brothers hook shot stylist and All-City gridironer of last fall, hooped 37 points in two games last week to jump from 10th to sixth place in the city's prep scoring race. Ross tanked 15 against Sacramento High and 22 at Clarkburg to run his season total to 133 points for 19 games.

TEAMMATE Chado Vasquez backed into the leadership again though scoring only 11 points in the two contests. Vasquez was second to Ed Aguirre of Grant Union, who recently graduated and is currently touring with an all-star high school team. Vasquez has 188 points. Aguirre left the prep ranks with 177 points in 18 games.

Sonny Rolls of Grant and Dick Traversi of McClatchy closed some ground on the leader during last week although each played in only one game. Rolls polled 15 points to take over third place with a total of 161. Traversi meshed 11 in one appearance.

ROLFE AND TRAVERS will collide tomorrow night during the Grant-McClatchy game at the latter's court.

Average-wise, Sacramento High leads the local pack with 11 wins against six losses for 247. Grant Union has 10-7 for 226, McClatchy 7-8 for 187, and CBS 9-11 for 450.



Sai "Chado" Vasquez of Christian Brothers is out on the pace again this season among the capital city's leading prep cage scorers.

The sharp shooting All-City basketballer has scored 44 points in the four games the Brothers have played for an 11-points-per-game average. The scoring generally has been spread out thus far among the city cagers with all of the regulars of CBS, Sacramento High, McClelchy and Grant Union getting a few.

CLOSE RESEMBLANCE to the pace setter is Norman Coons of McClelchy High with 40 points. Actually, Coons boasts a higher average, having had only three chances.

Grant Union's Dick Clare is third with 33 points scored in three games counted.

Two more McClelchy cagers men are among the top five giving the Lions a big edge in individual scoring. Dick Ba-



telle and Dick Travers are the fourth and fifth highest, respectively. Battelle has 28 point and Travers 26. Both have played in three games.

THE DRAGONS show an unblemished record for the present season with three wins to their credit. McClelchy and Grant Union have each won a pair while losing one and Christian Brothers has been successful once in four games.



This season's AILCHY selections seemed a problem since the two players considered should for the team played only until more than half the season. They were Aguirre of Great and Coons of the Lions. When the selection committee made them eligible for the honor, the two prep hopefuls were unanimous in their agreement, incidentally, the only two players whom coaches agreed to the plan.

THREE MORE MANT candidates for the three remaining positions on the final team and no less than 10 candidates, all rated nearly equally, for the berths.

The team represents a strong point marking continuation with four of the first five players within the first six individual scorers. Aguirre is the only repeater of the squad. Picked on the first team last year, the Giant slayer was the one man gang of Mata's Power attack. While he played in only 17 games before graduating, Aguirre fired 177 points for a 10 points per game average. He is an aggressive defense man as well.

COOKS WAS THE MOST consistent scorer of the group. He scored in 151 games before leaving Mechanics and forced the highest average. He played in 12 games for a 2.8 average. Travers was the city's starting charwoman for the first time and played the Lions to their decisive city title. She Mechanics' senior took over free throws when no latter was available and kept the Lions going. The second sophomore of the squad, Travers, scored up with 215 points in 18 games for an 11-point average. His second-pew shot from the free throw line was the ace in the nose of the Lions' preparer.

Bill Rose was named the center of the slacker, snubbed, Bill Rose was named the center of the group. One of the most improved players in the circuit, Rose was a strong performer in all of the CBS games. His ability around the post increased with the season until he was highly respected in local prep circles. The Quail star learned to hook during the campaign and became the Redheads' chief threat from the floor. Rose scored 179 points in 28 games and was a good rebounder.

GERALD McCORMICK of the Dragons was the dark horse candidate and made it. The diminutive-minded McCormick was tough on energy shooters, rebounded well and hustled all the way for the Dragons. He was one of the few Dragons in the early shifting BHS team who managed to hold a starting berth most of the season. McCormick tallied 111 points in 19 contests for Sacramento, averaging officially a impressive 5.8 points per game.

Stanley Rials of Grant is the only junior on the first or second teams. The Pacer at showed promise of becoming an outstanding hoopster next season.

Salvatore "Charlie" Yannone of Christian Brothers was a first

team selection last season but failed to do so the last campaign.

With the Al-City's only returnee with him every game, in addition to sealing the scoring pack, most of the season, the little giant dead-eyes was the target of all the Brothers' foes.

Sacramento started strong with nine straight wins. But January graduations, which took Brook Lowe and Bill Casselman, hurt plenty. The Dragons finished with 12 wins and eight losses, the C. K. McClatchy High School Lions coming in ahead of them in the city race and the Sac-Joaquin Conference.

The Lions' last finish was surprising because they lost Norman Coons, their top scorer, in January. The mid-term graduations also took a toll at Grant Union with the departure of Ed Aguirre.

Therefore it is wise to pick two all star city quintets, one including the mid-term graduates, the other without them.

Our all city five, including cagers who left the prep ranks in January, consists of Coons and Dick Travers, Lions, at forwards; Bill Ross, Christian Brothers, at center, and Lowe, Sacramento, and Aguirre, Grant, guards.

A team selected of players around at the season's end would have Gerald McCrum, Sacramento, and Travers, forwards; Ross, center, and Hal Vasquez, Christian Brothers, and Carl Roide, Grant, guards.

FOOTBALL 1956

UNBEATEN, UNTIED, UNINVITED, UNPLAYED

In the fall of 1952 the freshman class assembled a football team which, ironically, was one of the best and most spirited teams in the history of Mission University. This aggregation posted a record of three wins in four games, beating the C.O.P. Cubs, 19-0; the Stanford Popooses, 20-17; and the San Jose State Spartan Robes, 54-13, while losing only to the proscribed and battle-scared veterans of Treasure Island Navy, 7-14. As we well know, because King Football's predictability could no longer match his popularity, the winter of that same year witnessed the culmination of his fifty year reign on the campus of the University of Santa Clara.

As a result, the school of the Jesuit Padres waved a sad good-bye to most of her more talented freshman football players. At that time, students, alumni, and friends were heard to remark that had this team been allowed to mature and develop, it might well have been the team to bring to her Alma Mater her fourth bowl victory in her fourth try. Some, more skeptical, labelled these thoughts wishful dreams, speculations on the impossible or far-fetched fantasies. But wherever they were let us now, four years later, examine the individual records of the members of this team, some of whom have coveted on other gridirons for other colleges, universities and institutions.

This past year eleven of those players were seniors at the University of Santa Clara: Dan Comstock, Felton Ferrini, Pat Ellinger, Frank Loney, Sol

Liccardo, Roland Maddalena, Bill Ross, Marty Samman, Ted Spinardi, Manny Torres, and Joe Quinn. And twelve others, that we know of, made the varsities of some of the Nation's best teams: Jim Brown and Jim Decker, U.C.L.A.; Fritz Furlene, Stanford; Mose Mostelotto and Dick Burgess, Chico State; Dick King and George Souza, California; Funky Towne, Wichita; Max Yoshall, San Jose State; Pat Toomey, Washington State; Dick Dorn, San Diego State; and Ted Bronnen, U.S. Army in Japan. Of this group, Jim Brown was named an All-American and he and Jim Decker were named to the first and second strings All-Coast, respectively, and played in the 1956 Rose Bowl Game for U.C.L.A. Bill Towne was named first string and All-Conference of Wichita. Mose Mostelotto, also on end, was a first stringer — All-League of Chico State. And Ted Bronnen was selected as a first team lineman on the All-Service team in Japan.

Take another good look at the picture of the top of the page, add to its roster the names of those who are missing: Dossie, Ellinger, Liccardo, Long, Thompson, Trily, et al. Remember that 50 per cent of all these men were All-Catholic, All-League, All-CIF, or All-State in highschool. Add to these facts the records of those who left and the potential of those who stayed, now may we not safely say, this would have been a truly great Santa Clara Team!
