At the beginning of the third week, the Major promoted some boys to corporals and 1st class privates. Among those who were promoted from IA were: Corporals, Bill Wested, Dennis Dorsey, Eugene Angelo, and Tom Connelly. Among the first Class privates are: Glenn Freitas, James Hoefling, Bill Chambers, Ronald Logan, Robert Kuhlman, and Tom Looome.

For the rest of the year there will be marksmanship and first aid. If this program is successful, it will very likely be continued at C.B.S. next year.
