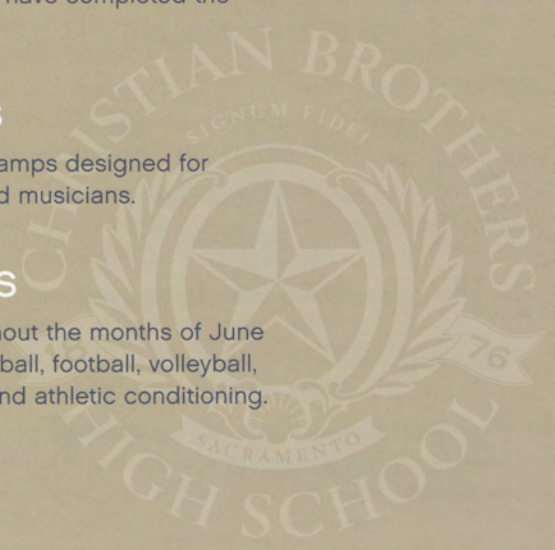
A variety of basic courses designed for entering freshmen or students who have completed the seventh or eighth grade.

GENERAL POLICIES

Students are expected to behave appropriately both inside and outside the classroom. No disruptive behavior will be tolerated and will be cause for dismissal with no refund or credit. Christian Brothers is a closed campus. No student is permitted to leave the property during school hours. No guests will be allowed during the summer session. Detention will be held for minor infractions of behavior or dress code at 12:50^{PM} for 15 minutes on the day of infraction. Failure to serve detention will result in increased detentions and will be carried over to the fall with additional penalty.

ATTENDANCE

Summer Session is a highly concentrated course of study with each day being equivalent to more than a week of normal school session. Because of this, attendance is crucial; **Students are allowed only two absences per three-week session.** Family vacations and student holiday plans may not be used as exceptions to these policies. **Three tardies are equivalent to one absence.**

CLASS SCHEDULES

Class schedules will be mailed or may be picked up at the front office prior to class (7:15am–7:55pm) on June 9 (Session I and 6-week classes) or June 30 (Session II).

CANCELLATION OF CLASSES

Christian Brothers reserves the right to cancel any course with insufficient enrollment.

DROPPING COURSES

- Course changes are allowed only on the first day of classes.
- No refund is issued for any course dropped after the second day of classes.

TEXTBOOKS

Students will purchase necessary textbooks at the beginning of summer school from the school's bookstore.

DRESS

Modesty and good decorum should be the guide for each student's appearance while attending CBHS summer school. CBHS is a private, Catholic college-preparatory school and expects appropriate respect and reverence to its mission. The basic Christian Brothers dress code applies with the following reminders:

- Personal grooming should be neat and clean at all times. Hair styles should be modest and non-distracting.
- Gentlemen are expected to be clean shaven each day (with the exception of neat moustaches; side burns cannot be below the ears).
- Ladies are expected to be modest with their make-up, jewelry, and accessories.
- CBHS Students must wear official Christian Brothers t-shirts or polo shirts. Students from other campuses must wear appropriately-fitting polo shirts. All students must wear appropriately-fitting knee-length shorts, long pants or capris.
- Shoes and socks are required. No sandals or flip-flops.
- No bare midriffs or plunging necklines are allowed.
- Undergarments should be concealed at all times.
- No denim, hats, or sleeveless tops of any kind.
- No clothing or accessories with inappropriate symbols or language.
- No sagging or baggy pants—pants or shorts should be worn at the natural waist line.
- No sweat pants, flannel pants, sweat shorts, beach wear, or sports shorts of any kind.

The summer school administration is the final authority regarding appearance, dress code and the consequences regarding students' appearance while attending CBHS Summer Sessions.



High School Courses

ENGLISH

Senior Composition 5 credits

Offered in Sessions I and II. Open to entering Seniors.

This course is based on a developmental writing curriculum in which students learn to increase their rhetorical skills and experiment with different writing styles. The art of essay writing includes critical reading of published authors, critical thinking, analyzing, and composing. Emphasis is placed on pre-writing elements: purpose, audience, thesis development, outlining, and drafting. The discovery of language and of writing skills through the types of descriptive, narrative, analytical, and persuasive essays is an objective of this course. Fulfills U.C./C.S.U. "g" elective requirement.

FINE ART

Ceramics 5 credits

Offered Session I only.

The summer course is open to all students in grades 7-12.

This is an introductory course for the student interested in ceramics. The fundamentals of kiln firing, glazing and painting will be studied continually throughout the semester. The course will also require the students to work with slip molds as well as the creation of their own plaster molds. Cost of supplies will run approximately \$35.00. Fulfills U.C./C.S.U. "f" subject requirement.

SCIENCE

All Science courses meet for six weeks 8:00am-12:50pm

Chemistry 10 credits

Open to Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors.

Prerequisite: "B" grade or better in Algebra I, both semesters and recommendation of current science teacher or approval of dept. chair. This is a standard lecture and laboratory class for the average college-bound student who is interested in science. Careful organization, observation, and analysis are emphasized. Areas covered include mole concept, Avogadro's Hypothesis, gases, solutions, chemical reactions, atomic structure, and chemical bonds. Fulfills U.C./C.S.U. "d" subject requirement.

Biology 10 credits

Open to Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors.

Prerequisite: A "C" or better in Conceptual Physics or previous science course. Recommendation: Completion of Algebra I. Biology is a lecture- and laboratory-based course which introduces the major fields of life sciences. Concepts of the course begin at the atomic and cellular level, with emphasis placed on inquiry in the laboratory as a basis for discussion and further exploration. Major fields covered include chemistry, cytology & microbiology, genetics, evolution, ecology, taxonomy, and systematics. Writing skills are emphasized. Fulfills UC/CSU "d" subject requirement.



MATHEMATICS

All Mathematics courses meet for six weeks
8:00am–12:50pm

Algebra I 10 credits

Prerequisite: Recommendation of present Christian Brothers math instructor.

This is a standard Algebra I course. The topics include equations and inequalities, integers, absolute value, rational numbers, exponents, polynomials, factoring, linear equations and graphs, systems of equations, quadratic equations, radical expressions and equations, and rational expressions and equations. Fulfills U.C./C.S.U. "c" subject requirement.

Algebra IB 10 credits

Prerequisite: A "C" or better in Algebra IA and teacher recommendation.

This course covers the second semester of a traditional Algebra I course in a full six-week session, giving students more time to learn the material.

Algebra IIA 10 credits

Prerequisite: a "C" or better in Algebra I and Geometry and teacher recommendation.

This course covers the first semester of a traditional Algebra II course in a full six-week session, giving students more time to learn the material.

Geometry 10 credits

Prerequisite: "C" or better in Algebra I and teacher recommendation.

The course requires a firm foundation in arithmetic and algebra as algebra is integrated throughout the course. This course will help the student to develop skills in logical reasoning and spatial relationships. Topics include area, angles, polygons, congruence, similarity, right triangle trigonometry, circles, proof (explaining), and three dimensional figures. The course is essential in the natural transition from concrete skills of Algebra I to the greater emphasis on abstract reasoning required of the student in Algebra II. Fulfills U.C./C.S.U. "c" subject requirement.



High School Courses

SOCIAL STUDIES

American Government and Civics 5 credits

*Required course for all Seniors.
Offered in Sessions I and II.*

This course will enable the students to understand how the political processes in the United States work. Through the study of American government and civics, the student will be challenged to respond to a variety of questions.

1) What are the basic beliefs and ideals that underlie democracy in the United States? 2) How do our legal, governmental, and economic institutions affect public policy at the local, state, national, and international level? 3) How can the individual participate most effectively in the United States political system? In addition to becoming familiar with the structure and operation of the political system in the United States, the student will analyze some of the conflicts that confront our nation. In doing so, the student will develop the ability to be an effective decision maker and a responsible citizen. Fulfills U.C./C.S.U. "a" subject requirement.

Psychology 5 credits

*Elective course for Juniors and Seniors only.
Offered in Sessions I and II.*

This course focuses on essential psychological factors including perception, development, behavior, personality and social functioning, utilizing both theoretical and experiential approaches. The content of the course will center on everyday commonplace behavior rather than the unusual or bizarre. Students are encouraged to apply this class as a basis for a helping relationship such as peer counseling or conflict resolution. A research project is required in this class. Fulfills U.C./C.S.U. "g" elective requirement.





PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Health and Fitness

5 credits

Required course for students who are enrolled in performing art as juniors and seniors (or recommendation by instructor for fine arts as sophomores).

Offered in Session I and II.

This course involves introduction of non-traditional sports and activities as well as the benefits of regular physical activity. Students will study the effects of cardiovascular conditioning and strength training. This course also includes a quarter of Health, which entails instruction and certification in C.P.R. w/ an A.E.D. and First Aid.

Driver Education (optional course)

No credit

Pass/Fail

Offered in Session I only (8:00am–10:00am).

Cost: \$100

Students will learn the laws related to operating a motor vehicle and how to respond to driving problems in various environments, under adverse weather conditions, and in emergencies. In addition, proper attitudes and skills necessary to become safe and competent drivers will be emphasized. This course meets the State of California requirement to obtain a driving permit.

Weight Training/Yoga

5 credits

Elective course offered to sophomores, juniors, and seniors who have successfully passed lower division PE or the Health and Fitness course.

Offered in Session I only.

This introductory course combines weight training and yoga for a semester-long course that satisfies the upper division physical education requirement. Weight training will assist the athlete and non-athlete who wish to develop body strength, bulk, speed, and quickness. The goal of the course is to increase athletic ability through weight training and agility methods. Yoga emphasizes numerous Asanas (poses) which will strengthen an individual's mind, body, and spirit. The various techniques of breathing, stretching and meditation allow an individual to hold Asanas for an extended period of time. The results will provide a person the focus necessary to achieve a balancing centering of the mind and body in everyday life.



Remedial High School Courses

ENGLISH

Remedial Freshman Literature
and Composition

5 credits
Set A

Remedial Sophomore Literature
and Composition

5 credits
Set B

*Prerequisite: Deficient five credits in Freshman or
Sophomore Composition and Literature*

Emphasis for Remedial Composition and Literature is centered upon skills identified as foundational for the continued development of the students' writing and understanding of literature. The goals of the regular composition and literature courses taught throughout the school year are reinforced through an intensive curriculum that includes attention to grammar, sentence construction, elements of composition and a further understanding and appreciation of a variety of literary genres. This course is required of those students identified as in need of additional instruction prior to being allowed to continue within the college preparatory curriculum of the department.

American Literature

5 credits
Set B

Prerequisite: Deficient five credits in American Literature

The focus of this course is an exploration of American literature. Through reading, discussion, and writing, the student explores both the thought and the expression of American writers. Various facets of the American "consciousness" are examined as they have been treated in novels, short stories, drama, non-fiction, and poetry. Major themes include the pioneer spirit, nature, God and religion, native humor, love and romance, death, alienation, and social justice. Attention is also given to the evolution of American literature—to major literary figures and to the schools of writing and thinking they embody—as well as to the style and artistic merit of works. The emphasis is on learning to read diverse literary styles and on in-depth analysis and interpretation. Within the framework of the literature program, this course also addresses various writing, speaking, and language arts skills, chief among those being essay, creative writing, group discussion, and vocabulary development.

All Remedial High School courses meet for six weeks: Set A 8:00am-10:15am and Set B 10:35am-12:50pm.



RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Remedial Religious Studies 5 credits

Remedial Religious Studies may be taken for remediation or as an extra elective—it is not intended to replace a religious studies course taken during the regular school year.

SCIENCE

Remedial Advanced Physical Science 5 credits
Set B

Prerequisite: Deficient 5 credits in Advanced Physical Science

This course is designed to serve as a solid foundation for those students who wish to take biology, chemistry, and physics later. It will help them to understand basic principles of science. Some of the topics include matter, energy, motion, atomic theory, and physical geology.

SPANISH

Remedial Spanish I (1st Semester) 5 credits Set A

Remedial Spanish II (1st Semester) 5 credits Set B

Prerequisite: Deficient 5 credits in Spanish I or II

An introductory course in the Spanish language, with emphasis on the development of listening, speaking, reading, writing, and general knowledge of Hispanic culture and civilization.

SOCIAL STUDIES

Remedial United States History 5 credits Set A

Prerequisite: Deficient five credits in US History

Remedial U.S. History utilizes the ten themes recommended by the National Council for the Social Studies as the basis for all Social Studies curriculum standards. Students will study subjects/people/eras in US History using the following topics: Culture; Time, Continuity, and Change; People, Places, and Environments; Individual Development and Identity; Individuals, Groups, and Institutions; Power, Authority, and Governance; Production, Distribution, and Consumption; Science, Technology, and Society; Global Connections; and Civic Ideals and Practices.

Remedial World History I 5 credits Set B

Remedial World History II 5 credits Set A

Prerequisite: Deficient five credits in World History I or II

Remedial World History is a summer session class which utilizes the ten themes recommended by the National Council for the Social Studies as the basis for all Social Studies curriculum standards. Students will study various subjects/people/eras in the areas of world history and geography using the following topics: Culture; Time, Continuity, and Change; People, Places, and Environments; Individual Development and Identity; Individuals, Groups, and Institutions; Power, Authority, and Governance; Production, Distribution, and Consumption; Science, Technology, and Society; Global Connections; and Civic Ideals and Practices.



High School Prep Courses

All Pre-High School courses meet for six weeks: A Set 8:00am-10:15am and B Set 10:35am-12:50pm. These courses are designed for eighth grade students who would benefit from additional work in language arts, mathematics, or reading. One or more of these courses may be required of entering freshmen who need to build skills prior to September.

Language Arts

A course that covers language mechanics including grammar, word usage, spelling, capitalization, and writing. This course is directed towards students who would benefit from intense writing-skills development prior to entering high school.

Reading

A developmental reading course with instruction in reading rate, comprehension, vocabulary building, and composing. This course is designed for the student who would benefit from reading skill development to prepare for high school reading requirements. Part of the time, students will use Reading Plus, an individualized, computer-based reading program designed to improve all of the essential skills required for reading proficiency.

Math

A review course of the four basic functions plus fractions and percent. Emphasis is on refining math skills prior to entering high school with the goal of preparing the student to enter at least a two-year Algebra I program.



Music Camps

Choral Camp

Date & Time: June 16–26, 8:00am–11:00am (weekdays)

Registration Fee: \$175

The Christian Brothers High School Summer Choral Camp is designed to develop choral singing skills in male and female students who are currently in 5th, 6th, 7th or 8th grade. Participants will learn to improve their singing skills, sharpen their musicianship and will perform a variety of choral literature ranging from traditional compositions to jazz. Students will also have an opportunity to work with guest choral directors and professional clinicians. The camp will culminate in a concert on the final evening of camp. Don't miss this unique experience to make great music with great people!

Orchestra Camp

Date & Time: June 16–26, 8:00am–11:00am (weekdays)

Registration Fee: \$175

Incoming freshman are strongly encouraged to attend.

The Christian Brothers High School Orchestra Camp is designed to improve the skill level and musicianship of students in grades 7, 8, and 9. The camp will focus on developing technique, phrasing, rhythmic accuracy, scales, playing in different musical genres, and tone production. Students will also spend a great deal of time preparing selected literature for a shared concert with the choral camp students on Thursday, June 30th, in the evening. This class is for students who have already had experience playing a musical instrument either through private lessons or through school band programs. Instruments accepted are piccolo, flute, oboe, all clarinets, all saxophones, bassoon, French horn, trumpet, trombone, baritone, tuba, violin, viola, cello, string bass, and percussion. Piano players are also welcomed to join in if they would like to play orchestra bells, marimba, vibes, or xylophone.
