

**No. 1 Team Rolls**

**Armstrong Beats SHS;  
Grant Dumps La Sierra**

Bishop Armstrong Falcons—master of the city schools on the gridiron for the last three weeks—continued to handle their neighbors Friday night as Frank Callen's crew, ranked No. 1 in Sacramento County, toppled Sacramento High Dragons, 13-6.

The win, Armstrong's second against one tie this season, was the Falcons' first since Bishop Armstrong High opened its doors in 1956.

Clark Aldrich, possibly the best back in the Sacramento metropolitan area, reeled off 125 yards rushing and scored both touchdowns on runs of three and eight yards.

Sacramento scored on a 47-yard pass from Dick Gordon to John Newman that made the score 7-6 in the third quarter. Armstrong wrapped up the game with its second TD in the same period.

Grant Union Pacers scored three touchdowns in the final quarter to beat La Sierra, 20-13, and score their third straight victory. Grant, Armstrong, Encina and San Juan remain the only undefeated prep teams in Sacramento County.

While the Metropolitan League teams begin playing for keeps, some equally-interesting non-league battles shape up this weekend as some of Sacramento County's most respected prep powers fight for top ratings.

Feature game on the non-league program will be the encounter between Bishop Armstrong Falcons and El Camino Eagles Saturday night at El Camino stadium.

**TOP FALCON BACKS**

Frank Callen's Falcons—snubbed on the schedule sheet by the city schools — are rapidly proving their ability on the gridiron. Armstrong rolled past Hiram Johnson and Sacramento and tied with McClatchy and in the process unveiled one of the finest backfields around.

Halfback Clark Aldrich, slowly returning to full strength after being hobbled by a bruised heel, is probable the most dangerous back in Sacramento metropolitan area. And he has an able running mate in elusive fullback Dave Rakela.

Falcon quarterback John Zupan, at 180 pounds, is a brusing runner and can also throw the ball in expert fashion.

**EAGLES ARE TOUGH**

Don Robards' Eagles, on the other hand, are anything but a pushover. El Camino snapped a slow start by thumping Norte Del Rio, 20-6, last weekend and may be ready to unleash its expected power.

The Eagles were upset by Grant Union, 7-6, and tied a highly-touted Rene team, 19-19. El Camino also Barr McFadden, a 220 pounder, is a crushing fullback and helfback Bob Leshner is a reliable halfback.

Robards last Thursday came up with a short-punt formation that resembled the San Francisco 49ers' shotgun attack. And the formation paid off in the closing minutes of the game when Sabe threw a 40-yard touchdown pass and ran 16 yards for another TD.

Two former Golden Empire League foes who have been flashing fine form of late will collide Friday night in West Sacramento when the Encina Apaches, now a Capitol Valley Conference member, and James Marshall Wildcats, defending GEL champs, match talents.
