A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Dear Parents,

As a boy, I enjoyed the book *A Christmas Carol* by Charles Dickens. The supernatural visits from Jacob Marley and the three spirits made my heart pound. The transformation in Scrooge as he awoke in the morning to discover that Christmas had not passed him by was more awe-inspiring with every turn of the page. Even today, if I happen to catch one of the old movie versions on television, I can't help but be caught up. The lessons resonate for me still, though differently now than in my childhood.



What if there was a **Ghost of Christmas Past** taking a look back at Christian Brothers High School? We might see the 200 young men and boys who showed up on that first day of school in 1876. One of those students was Peter Shields, who later in life was credited with establishing UC Davis. A few decades later, we would see Earl Desmond of the Class of 1911, who persuaded the California legislature to establish Sacramento State University, now CSUS. Then, we might see Fr. Keith B. Kenny '42 whose dedication to the Latino community in Sacramento was so profound the city posthumously named a grammar school in his honor. Asha Jennings, from the Class of 2000 might appear. Her Spellman College protest of misogynist lyrics in rap music garnered national media attention and inspired a nationwide "Take Back the Music" campaign by *Essence* magazine. In fact, we could stop in any era and find students inspired to become military heroes, pursue religious vocations, serve as law enforcement leaders, judges, teachers, scientists, doctors and changing the world in myriad other professions. Imagine if the Brothers never opened this school. How different our world would be.

The **Ghost of Christmas Present** would reveal our thriving community of 977 young men and women engaged in high-level learning, Christian service, the arts and athletics. You would see an extraordinary community of students from all walks of life building lifelong friendships, learning about each other and about themselves. Such a healthy, diverse community is not the norm today and I believe it is a model of what can be...Christ's Kingdom on earth.

The **Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come** would certainly reveal the bright future of Catholic, Lasallian education in Sacramento. GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING DEPARTMENT

Financial Aid Night for Seniors and Their Parents will be held Tuesday, December 7, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. in the CB Cafeteria. We will have a speaker who is very knowledgeable on financial aid and we will go over the FAFSA, Cal Grant information, scholarships, etc. See you there! Since this evening is *primarily for parents*, it is not necessary for students to attend.

About College Entrance Exams

Most colleges and universities require a college entrance test score as part of the application process. The two national tests are the **ACT** (American College Test) and the **SAT** Reasoning Test (given by the College Board). **ALL** four-year colleges and universities will accept either score. Both tests are offered at local area high schools 6-7 times throughout the year. Christian Brothers is a test center for both the ACT and the SAT - we administer both exams on dates in October, April, and May.

Research indicates that students often perform differently on the ACT and SAT. The tests, while considered equally for admission, are different in the material covered. The ACT test content has four areas: English, Math, Reading, and Science Reasoning. The goal of the ACT is to measure academic achievement in the four areas and contains analytical and problem-solving exercises related to what has been learned in class. In addition, the ACT recently began offering an optional Writing section (which must be taken if applying to the University of California). The SAT determines critical reading, math, and writing skills, and is designed to measure academic aptitude in analytical skills, numeric reasoning, and writing. **Current juniors should use the next few months to prepare for the SAT and plan on taking it for the first time in March.**

Though the trend seems to be to begin taking these tests earlier and earlier in a student's high school career, we do not see any significant benefit to this action. Since Christian Brothers has all sophomores take the PLAN test (the practice ACT exam) and all juniors take the PSAT (the preliminary SAT exam), we have avenues for students to explore the testing experience. There is never a penalty for taking a test early, however, or for taking a test more than once. Colleges will see every score (unless a student chooses SAT score choice, which we do not recommend), but always take the highest score. The UC system takes the best score from one sitting; many private colleges and the CSU system will take a student's highest score from each section from different sittings and combine them into the highest possible score.

Since colleges will accept either the SAT or ACT and take the highest score, we recommend that students consider taking **both** tests at least once. It will help to compare results from the PLAN and the PSAT and see which score is stronger to help predict your score on either test. By taking both exams, students increase their chances of achieving a successful score.

SAT Subject tests are subject area tests that UC and a few selective private colleges either recommend or require. Currently, the UC system encourages taking tests in subject areas in which a student hopes to major in college, but these tests are not required. Students who plan to apply to highly selective colleges should check the school's website to see how many Subject Exams are required. It is important to register and take these exams by fall of the senior year. We recommend juniors take the tests in the spring of their junior year. They will then have time to take the tests again in the fall of their senior year if they wish to improve their scores. Seniors should not take the tests into 2012, as these test dates are too late to be submitted with other application material. Students should register for the SAT test online at www.collegeboard.com and the ACT at www.actstudent.org.

Admission test scores are only one piece of information a college looks at when considering applications. A student's GPA, number and rigor of college prep courses completed, and other factors are also considered. These factors include co-curricular activities, the college essay, community service, and other aspects of the individual that make him/her distinctive. Teacher and counselor recommendations are also important when applying to private colleges.

Interview with Mr. Kirk Purdy, Director of Counseling & Guidance, member of the Campus Ministry and Kairos Retreat Teams, and Head Men's Golf Coach.

What does vocation mean to you? To me, vocation means being open to whatever God is calling you to do. “Read, read, read.”

What I Read on My Summer Vacation...contributed by our English teacher Mary Bowers

One of my favorite things about vacation – summer, Christmas or Easter – is that I have the time to relax and rediscover the pure pleasure of reading. During the school year I read constantly - chunks, paragraphs, tests, and essays...lots and lots of essays - but I sometimes will go months between books. So when I have some time away from student work, I dive in and read like crazy, making up for lost time.

This past summer, I could not help but be aware of the buzz surrounding a particular young adult book. Much had been made of the fact that it was being made into a movie and the casting news was the biggest thing since Daniel, Rupert and Emma were sent to Hogwarts. The film – which had only just started production - made the cover of *Entertainment Weekly* twice before July, and it seemed everyone was talking about *The Hunger Games*. Not wanting to feel left out of the conversation, I downloaded Suzanne Collins' best-seller to my Kindle and entered the troubled world of Katniss Everdeen and District 12.

My taste in books runs all over the map, but usually does not include much contemporary fiction. I generally like reading things that are old and English or new and nonfiction. One exception is young adult fiction and, like the seven Harry Potter books, *The Hunger Games* is an amazing thrill ride. The protagonist, sixteen-year-old Katniss is strong, self-sacrificing, smart, and brave – and she needs to be. She represents her district in the annual Hunger Games, hosted by the nearly all-powerful Capitol. The Games are a yearly reminder to the 12 surviving districts of Panem (formerly North America) that opposition to the Capitol comes at a great price. As a punishment for a long-ago uprising, each district must deliver two children (12-18 years) to join in a televised fight to the death, and only one will survive. Viewing is mandatory to all citizens and no one expects the girl from impoverished District 12 to stand a chance. Her struggle to stay alive and remain true to herself makes for a compelling and powerful read.

Katniss's adventures do not end at the conclusion of Games, but continue through two sequels: *Catching Fire* and *Mockingjay*. Each book brings greater stakes, higher intensity, and a significant escalation of violence. While I appreciated the expanded scope, I found the graphic bloodshed too heavy handed at times, especially in the final novel.

Comparisons have been made between *The Hunger Games* trilogy and the *Twilight* series: each is hugely popular and has a young female hero caught between two romantic interests. The love story in Games, however, takes a distant backseat to the heart-stopping action, and I would argue that Katniss is much more dynamic than *Twilight's* Bella. The appeal of *The Hunger Games* is also much broader as it has attracted male and female fans in equal number. As Christmas vacation approaches, I cannot think of a better way to spend a few hours than discovering Katniss Everdeen and *The Hunger Games*.
