A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Happy New Year, Happy 2013!

In December of 2011, I wrote a letter to parents for the cover of the *Falcon Family News*. In it I shared my affection for the book, *A Christmas Carol*, and ruminated on the visions the ghosts of Christmases Past, Present, and Yet to Come might see if they visited Christian Brothers High School. I recently looked back on the letter and was a bit surprised by one of the musings:

The Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come would certainly reveal the bright future of Catholic, Lasallian education in Sacramento. Expanded and improved facilities meet the needs of generations of young men and women taught by dedicated, energetic and loving faculty members. Our students perform in a state-of-the-art theater. Campus technology is on the cutting edge with teachers maximizing innovative learning opportunities and collaborating with Lasallian partners throughout the world. Student-athletes thrive in the classroom and on the field. Tuition assistance is available to increasing numbers of families. The doors to the best universities and college remain open and welcome to our graduates who go on to make the world a better place.

What a difference in just 13 months as so much progress has been made! As I write this, our Guidance and Counseling department is preparing for a move to Br. Bertram Hall, as the space formerly occupied by campus ministry has been converted into offices. The library and small theater have been transformed into an international languages wing and now house seven new classrooms. All of these changes are in preparation for the spring groundbreaking on a new, 16,500 square-foot, 350-seat performing arts center.

Campus-wide wireless infrastructure is now installed and operational in advance of next year's transition to a 1:1 iPad program for our students. CB's students will develop their skills as 21st century communicators, thinkers and problem-solvers as we embrace this exciting new initiative.

Fifteen members of the Class of 2012 are competing in collegiate athletics. Several of this year's seniors have

accepted and/or been offered athletic scholarships. Vinnie Johnson will be on the gridiron as an Iowa State Cyclone. Andrej Bevins (University of New Mexico) and Hunter Rappleye (St. Mary's College of California) will continue to hit the links as collegiate golfers. Our state-champion wrestler, Mallory Velte, is evaluating several scholarship offers, as are a number of other students in various sports.

An important aspect of our mission as a Catholic, Lasallian school is to help students whose families cannot bear the full cost of tuition and fees. This year, the school is allocating \$1.9 million in support for 356 students.

Finally, as for the doors to the best universities and colleges remaining open, early acceptance and action notices are starting to arrive for members of the Class of 2013. Congratulations to Maria Castro (Stanford University), Alex Daly (Northwestern University) and Ryan Dempsey (California Institute of Technology). This is just the beginning of what is sure to be an exciting spring.

Thank you for entrusting us with your sons and daughters. Together our faculty and staff, parents, dedicated alumni and many supporters are building a new and bright reality for the future of Catholic, Lasallian education in Sacramento. I look forward to this year with excited anticipation for all that lies ahead.

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GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING DEPARTMENT

Parents, if your child has D's or F's on his/her report card, PLEASE READ THIS!

As pages 10 and 11 of the CB Parent/Student Handbook emphasize, "F's" and "D's" are bad news on report cards! It is important for you and your student to understand that neither "D's" nor "F's" are acceptable. "F" grades must be repeated for credit in order to graduate from Christian Brothers High School. "D" grades, though worth 5 credits towards graduation, are **NOT** accepted by four-year colleges and universities. **All California State University campuses, University of California campuses, and most private institutions require a "C" or above in ALL core courses** (core courses are approved History, English, Math, Lab Science, Foreign Language, Visual and Performing Art, and Elective courses - also known as the "a-g" list of approved courses - see below for a chart of these requirements). If students have "D's" on the transcript in any a-g courses and do not remediate them they are **not eligible** to apply for admission to CSU and UC, and therefore are seriously limiting their choices for college.

If your child would like to keep his/her options open and remain **eligible** to apply to a four-year college, the Guidance Department highly recommends that he/she remediate (repeat for credit) any "D" grades earned in a-g approved courses. Students may enroll in a variety of classes during the 2013 CBHS summer school session in order to remediate a grade. While previous grades are never removed from a student's transcript, if a student completes the course in summer school with a "C" or above, his/her transcript will reflect the new credits and the new grade will be used when calculating the grade point average.

For example, if your child is currently enrolled in Biology and received a "D" the first semester, he/she should consider repeating Biology this summer. If he/she is currently enrolled in a Math course or foreign language course and received a low grade the first semester (D or F), it is important to receive a "C" or above at the end of the spring semester. CSU and UC will **"validate"** (count as successful) the whole year of a Math course or a foreign language course if the student shows marked improvement the second semester (i.e., goes from a "D" to a "C," "B," or "A"). Therefore, students have a choice - work very hard this semester and bring the grade up, or repeat it in summer school to raise the grade. **Since a full four years of English is a basic requirement for eligibility, any "D's" in English should be remediated.** One year of World History is the minimum requirement for eligibility, so students should be sure to have a "C" or above for at least two of the four semesters of Frosh/Soph World History. Any US History "D's" should also be remediated.

Please contact your child's counselor if you have questions about remediating grades. If you intend to register for summer school, pre-reg forms will be available in the Main Office in early spring. Check the CB website in February for further information regarding summer school.

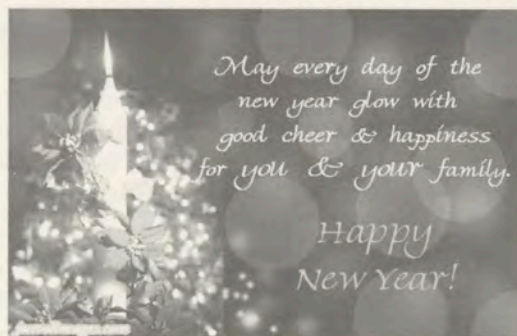
Liturgies *Fall Semester Prayer and Faith Class Passes the Torch*

The St. Nicholas Mass celebrated on December 6 marked the beginning of Advent for the school community but it also marked the end of community liturgies planned and led by the **Fall Prayer and Faith** class. These 26 seniors began the semester determined to engage the student body and encourage participation in the Masses by “shaking up” the liturgies with dynamic presiders, new music, and changes that would bring a “wow” factor to our Masses. After setting these goals they went out and made it happen.

It took quite a bit of organization but the class members reached out to **Mr. Slabbinck** and the **Choir**, and **Mr. Maslen** the **school orchestra** and selected music that was beautiful and inviting for students to sing along. Both provided engaging support for our liturgies. **Ms. Holmes’** Leadership class served as ushers and helped keep the communion lines moving. This was not an easy task, especially when the Gym was configured differently on different occasions. The Student Council led by **Ms. Holmes** and **Ms. Hoekman** also designated students who sat among their peers and modeled appropriate liturgical behavior. **Senior Eucharistic Ministers** did a great job, as well as class representatives who served as **altar servers, readers, and carried** sacred symbols during various processions. Students from **Mr. Macintosh’s** classes and **Mr. Boriskin’s** ceramics classes contributed unique artwork that was displayed at the liturgies.

This class also introduced several innovations designed to engage students and increase participation. All students in our school participated in evaluations of each liturgy in their religion classes. The **Prayer and Faith** class processed over a thousand 3X5 cards after each class and took note of suggestions and improvements offered by students. Suggestions included recommendations for presiders and even distribution of candy at the St. Nickolas Mass. We celebrated mass in the round, prayed with Lasallians worldwide during international Days of Peace, blessed a Peace Pole, and watched music videos, with and without sound.

The class set high goals, listened to the school community, and offered enriching innovations. Consequently, the liturgies this class created were indeed doorways to the sacred that all were invited to open. They also set the bar high for the **Spring Prayer and Faith** class which will take over liturgical student leadership in January. To the fall class, thank you for your dedication to a job well done! To the spring class, prepare to roll up to your sleeves! You will have many accomplishments to live up to and many opportunities to excel.

VOCATIONS

Tracy Chadbourne has taught Spanish at Christian Brothers High School for twelve years. Born in Bethesda, Maryland, but considering her roots to be in Peoria, Illinois, Ms. Chadbourne attended thirteen schools growing up. She graduated from high school in Memphis, Tennessee in 1988, where she chose to attend the University of Memphis. She holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and a Master of Arts degree in bilingual education from National University. The program at National was the best fit for Ms. Chadbourne, as she earned her MA while raising her wonderful daughter, *Cassie Moore '10*.

Ms. Chadbourne was introduced to her vocation journey by a college professor, Fernando Burgos, who encouraged her to be a Spanish teacher. "You know that teacher who always expects you to go further?" she says of Professor Burgos, "That was him. He always encouraged me to go the extra mile. He asked me once after a presentation, 'Tracy, do you want to do that again?' because he knew I wasn't performing at my best. That has always stuck with me." Ms. Chadbourne knew from a young age that teaching was her calling; after Spanish became a passion, she knew she had found her vocation. When a position opened at Christian Brothers, Ms. Chadbourne came for an interview and she knew, "CB just felt right."

The most important, and Ms. Chadbourne's favorite, aspect of CB is the students. The challenge of maintaining a high energy level every day eases when she thinks about the relationships with students, parents, and colleagues that she has fostered over the years. Teaching has been the most interesting job she has ever held. "When you deal with 150 clients a day, 150 stories, 150 world views—you're going to gain some perspective," she says. Being blessed to teach Spanish II and Spanish III has given Ms. Chadbourne an opportunity that many teachers at CB do not have—the chance to teach the same students in consecutive years. This has helped create a culture of respect, compassion, and community in her classes. One of the most touching moments of this year came during the second week of the semester: "Most students from one set in Spanish II last year were together the in the same set in Spanish III this year. The first week of school, they decided to hold hands and pray like we did the year before. That's how I knew I was touching hearts!"

When she's not teaching, Ms. Chadbourne spends her time indulging in her hobbies which include photography, reading and spending time with family and friends. She has been all over the world, including a year spent teaching in Lima, Peru on a Fulbright Scholarship. She believes that Peruvian cuisine is some of the best in the world, and it is one of the many things that she misses about that beautiful country. Her goal for this year is to return to Central America. She just can't get enough of the Spanish, culture, people, and those amazing fresh juices!

Audition Tips From The Best

Learn from CB teachers and students about ways to keep calm and confident during any audition.

As a theatre kid, I have been in my fair share of auditions. When I first started doing plays and musicals, I would be so nervous and on the verge of tears every time. As I've gotten older, the tears have gone away and the butterflies have left because of a few tips I've received from directors and fellow cast members.



At Christian Brothers, there are auditions for plays, musicals, one acts, choir, and Open Mic night. The Talon sat down with **Choir Director Ron Slabbinck** and **Sydney Lovell '13**, a master of auditions, to get some helpful tips to rock any audition.

1. Prep-time

Before you even set foot in the audition room, Mr. Slabbinck says to "know as much information about the production so that you come prepared." This means to research the script, musical, and songs so you have some background. This will allow you to be confident and comfortable. Mr. Slabbinck also said to "take time to relax before an audition"; getting up in front of people is never easy, so take a walk or listen to music to calm any nerves.

2. At the Audition

"Arrive on time and go in with your head high" says Sydney. It's okay to be a little nervous, but "be positive" and don't become overwhelmed. According to Mr. Slabbinck you "have to be confident — the minute you stop second-guessing yourself, the quicker you'll have success."

An audition is always unpredictable. If the directors tell you to come prepared, "don't lose your individuality. Pick a monologue [or song] that best features your strengths and showcases your talents," states the Director of Visual & Performing Arts.

If you mispronounce a word or stumble during your song just "go with it," Sydney says. "Don't let them know you messed up. Just keep smiling!"

3. Be yourself

The last tip is simple: stay true to yourself. Don't go out of your vocal range or use a monologue that requires possibly regretful tricks. "They want you to be amazing, the way you'll be amazing is to be yourself," Mr. Slabbinck advises. Sydney adds, "If you go on stage confident then you'll stand out."

So good luck in any auditions, and take these tips with you. The next audition at Christian Brothers is for the *One Acts Festival*, followed by the Spring play.

International Student Program

To most of our current International Students not long ago, Christian Brothers was a name, a website, and an interview with Mr. Kirrene. Hongyi's host family has been instrumental in helping her adjust both to CB and her new home in California and keeps her "from missing home and family in China too much."

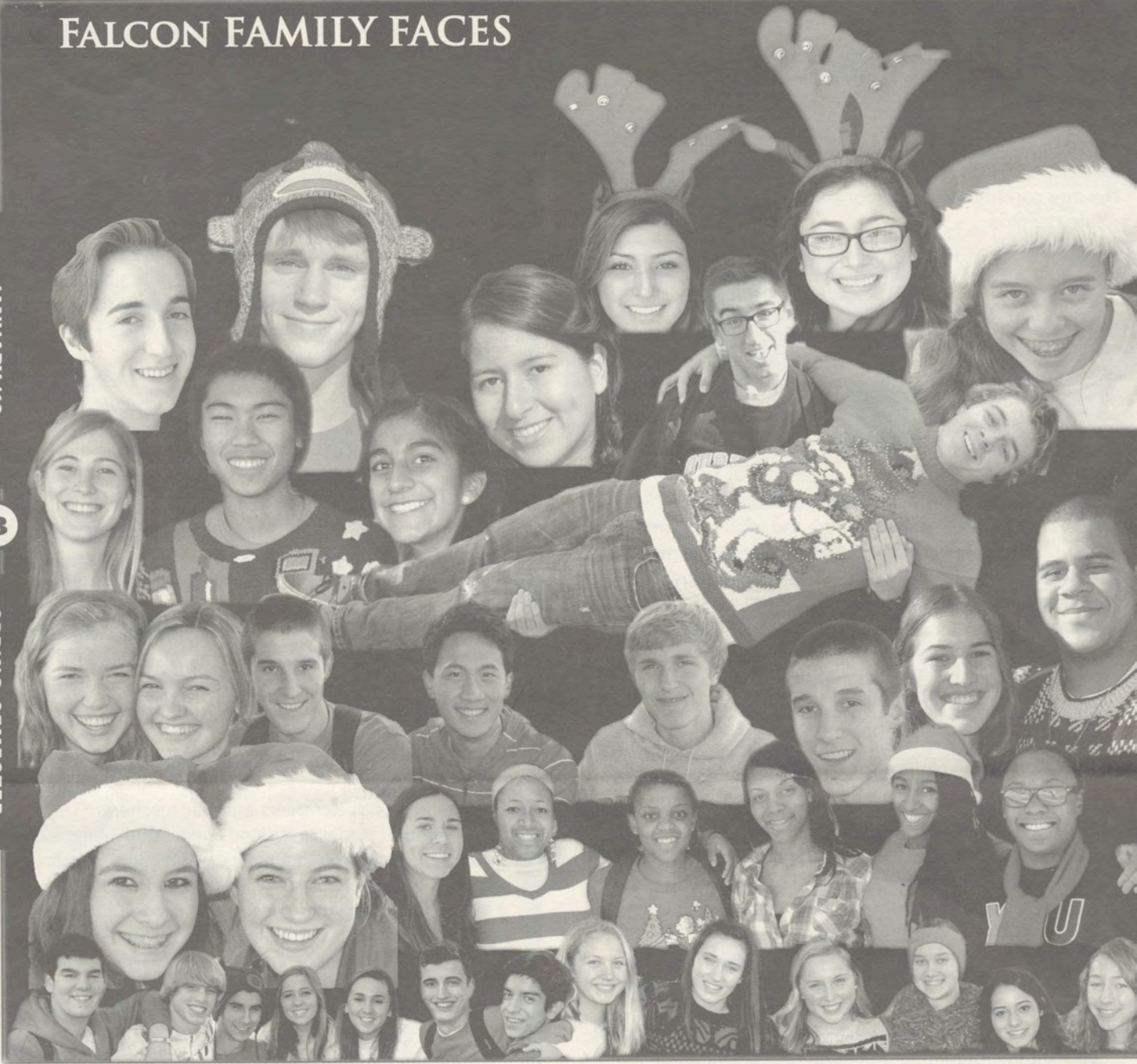
