

EXPLANATION OF FEES AND EXPENSES

Yearly total amount includes fees for science laboratory, typing and shop equipment; visual aid equipment; locker rental for students' books; student-body card fee which supports athletics, student publication — THE GAEL, student activities and projects; rental and laundering of bed linen and bed spreads; and a weekly movie, the film being rented by the school and shown exclusively to resident students. All other expenses for purchases from bookstore, for laundry, shoe repairs, etc. will be added to regular statements.

PART PAYMENTS

The total for board, room tuition and fees may be paid in two semester payments of \$392.50 (high school), or of \$349.00 (elementary and grammar school); or in nine (9) payments of \$87.50 (high school) or of \$77.75 (elementary or grammar grades). The first payment will be made at registration in school, the other eight (8) will be due the fifteenth of each succeeding month. However, these payments should not be considered as monthly rates. An incomplete school month does not infer a discount from regular periodic installments on the yearly or half yearly amount. Boys leaving during any one of the nine period payments must complete the payment for that period.

TEXTBOOKS AND STATIONERY are sold in the school bookstore. If the student is to charge these items, the parents should so inform us and the amounts will appear on the regular statements.

A charge of \$4.00 per day is made for any stay over the Christmas or summer vacation periods.

REGULATIONS OF THE RESIDENT STUDENTS' DEPARTMENT

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. The students of Christian Brothers School are expected to act in a gentlemanly manner at all times.
2. The school reserves the right to request any student to withdraw from school at any time without giving any reason for such request, except that the student is generally undesirable. Grounds for such dismissal are: persistent and unfounded criticism; bullying; laziness in study; grievous or repeated disobedience; a negative attitude in religious matters.

3. Students are held accountable for any destruction of property on as well as off the campus. Any damage done to school property by a resident student will be immediately repaired and charged in full to the student perpetrating the damage. Nails, tacks, paste (or other adhesive material) are not to be used to fasten objects to the walls in students' rooms.
4. Only parents and relatives (who have reached their majority) are permitted to visit students' rooms.
5. No student will be permitted to own, rent, borrow, or operate an automobile while he is under the jurisdiction of Christian Brothers School.
6. It is recommended that parents send directly to the Prefect of Resident Students any money which they wish to place at their sons' disposal. It is also recommended that parents specify the weekly allowance. The school advises that the weekly spending money of each boy not exceed \$1.50.
7. Cards, dice, and other games of chance are strictly forbidden whether the exchange of money is involved or not.

SMOKING: Older students in high school are permitted to smoke, and these only upon the receipt of a *written* permission from their parents. Smoking is permitted only at the time and in the place provided for that purpose. Smoking in students' rooms or in any other than the designated part of the campus is strictly forbidden. The penalty for disobedience in this matter may be dismissal.

ROOMS: There are three or four boys to a room. Each student must cooperate to see that his room is kept neat and clean at all times. No playfulness or loud noise will be tolerated in the rooms.

PRIVILEGES

1. Resident students who have not been reported for misconduct and whose grades are satisfactory may, with the permission of their parents, leave the school on Friday after school hours. **NO STUDENT WILL BE PERMITTED TO LEAVE THE CAMPUS ON A WEEK-END VISIT UNLESS SUCH A VISIT IS AUTHORIZED IN ADVANCE BY HIS PARENTS.** Such authorization must be in writing.
2. Except for very serious reasons, absence from the campus is not permitted on school days.
3. High-school students who maintain a "B" average are allowed to study in their rooms during the scheduled study-hall periods.
4. On Wednesday afternoons junior and senior high-school students are allowed off-campus privileges from 3:00 to 5:00.
5. Students who remain at the school over the weekend are allowed the off-campus privilege on Saturday and Sunday afternoons from 12:30 to 5:00. Off-campus activities of younger boys are supervised.

6. Students may be visited during recreation periods. On such occasions, no student is permitted to go off the campus unless he is a relative of the visitor.

DRESS: Students are required to dress properly for meals. Levis are strictly prohibited at all times except during recreation. If cords are worn to school, they must be clean.

PENALTIES: The usual penalty for the infraction of rules is deprivation of privileges. Students enjoying the week-end privilege, for instance, must return to the campus not later than 7:00 P.M. on Sunday evening. Students who fail to return on time from Saturday or Sunday afternoon outings or from weekend visits are automatically "campused" for an indefinite period.

A COMPLETE EDUCATION

Christian Brothers School is a Catholic High School with Grammar Grades from the fifth to the eighth grade. It is a school for real boys. Every phase of a young man's life is duly emphasized and developed. Students have for their constant companions upright boys with real boylike interests. The faculty is composed of men who have devoted their lives to the education of youth. The religious vows of poverty, chastity and obedience free the Christian Brothers from the responsibility and anxiety of family life and economic security, and thereby they can turn their every endeavor towards the betterment of the youth under their care.

The *Program of Studies* include both academic and non-academic subjects.

The Academic Curriculum prepares the boy for college and university. Boys who are interested in the professions — doctor, lawyer, teacher, engineer, architect, scientist — or who desire to enter the field of research or government service, or those whose intelligence is sufficiently developed to engage in the mental disciplines of the academic subjects are encouraged to follow this curriculum.

The Non-academic Curriculum is devised to prepare youth for life, specifically those who are not going on to college or who are not able to follow the academic courses. Opportunities are available in bookkeeping, typing, shop, mechanical drawing, and art. Remedial reading and mathematics are taught to those who need them. Courses in language orientation and vocational orientation will be found useful for those who want to be acquainted with practical situations in adjusting themselves to a life in which they must earn their living in the various occupational areas.

For all students Religion, English, World and U.S. History, Civics and Physical Education are required subjects.

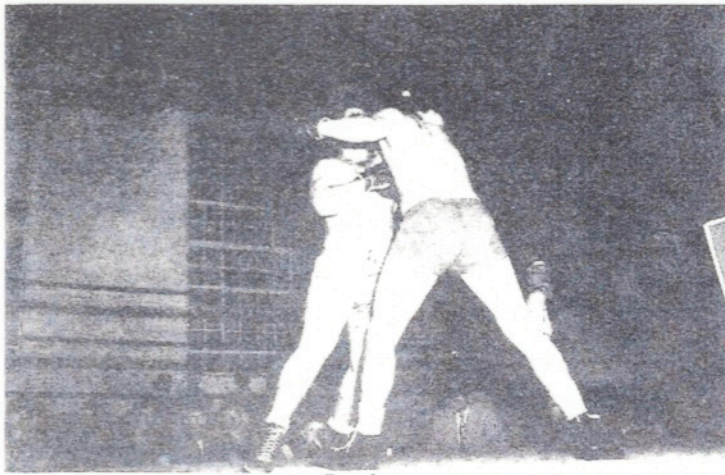
