Protestantism when it first started, seemed to be destined for eternal prosperity. The freshest and most vigorous people entered into it and the wealth of the world was thrown at the feet of the new religion. And what has been the result? Dissention and quibbling over the most divine portion of Christ's life and the truth of his teachings. Most Protestants might say, "we do not care about religious discussions; leave that to the theolomust exist somewhere and it it did not exist that Christianity is a failure. The speaker closed with an appeal for all to carefully consider what he had said and to attain certainty in roligion themselves.

CHRISTIAN BROTHERS' COLLEGE. - In this issue of the BEE we publish a card setting forth that on the first instant the Congregation of St. Rose Church appointed Messrs. J. J. McCallion, N. H. Nicholl and P. Sarsfield as a committee to call on those who have not yet paid up their subscriptions toward the new Christian Brothers' College. There are now over \$3,000 of subscriptions still unpaid, while the contract calls for the payment of the whole sum due on the building on the first of January next.
