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## EDUCATIONAL DIRECTOR ELECTED.—

The Board of Education held a special meeting last evening, all the members present. The first business in order was the election of a Director from the Third Ward to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of T. M. Lindley. B. F. Pike and J. I. Feiter were placed in nomination and the latter was elected on the first ballot, the vote standing: For Felter—Dreman, McFarland, Richardson and Tracy—4. For Pike—Hart, Montgomery and Nelson—3. The Board declined to join in the general protest against the raising of a low section of M street, between Ninth and Tenth. Nor would it consent to the purchase of an anatomical model for the teaching of physiology in the Grammar School. F. L. Landes was allowed the sum of \$21 76, unpaid salary as teacher. The Hebrew school was granted the temporary use of a school room to be designated by the Superintendent. The Board refused to increase

## **THE SITUATION EXPLAINED.**

From the statements of the School Directors themselves it appears that, without taking into consideration the large number of pupils who are to attend the free college soon to be opened by the Christian Brothers, there will be need of ten more class rooms to accommodate the increase in the primary department and the Grammar School, but there is room in the Sacramento Grammar School building for six additional class rooms, and the dispensing with the fourth teacher in the High School gives at that place one or two more class rooms, thus leaving the Board to provide two or three class rooms, at the farthest, provided these arrangements were made. **is that there is really no necessity for any more Grammar classes, and only a few eighth grades are needed.**

**The President of the Board on that occasion made a statement of the financial condition of the school fund which is well calculated to excite the surprise of every one acquainted with the real facts in the case. There are now \$37,926 33 in the school fund, but that amount must run the schools until the money from State apportionment comes in next February or March, thus giving about \$37,000 to run the schools for over six months. Now, according to the figures of the Board of Education, at this time next year, provided all things were as they asserted, there would be \$17,000 to take the place of the present \$37,000 and run the city schools for six months. This clearly demonstrates, out of the mouths of the Directors themselves, that on the first day of next June they will be at least \$20,000 behind hand if the proposed building is constructed.**

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## **College Dedication.**

The new college building erected at the corner of Twelfth and K streets by the subscriptions of the citizens of Sacramento generally, without regard to creed or nationality, was dedicated at 4¼ o'clock yesterday afternoon according to the regulations of the Catholic Church by the Rev. Joseph S. Alemany, Archbishop of California. Long before the time for beginning the ceremonies the building was thrown open to the immense throng there assembled and every room and corridor was carefully examined by a critical multitude. All the appointments, as well as the building and its arrangement, were unanimously declared superior in every respect. The procession embraced, besides the ecclesiastics and the scholars, the boys and

girls of the parish, the latter bearing two magnificent banners belonging to the Convent School. At the conclusion of the religious services the Archbishop delivered a scholarly address to the people from a platform placed in the shade of the building, on Twelfth street, while the immense audience occupied convenient placed benches as seats. The address of his grace was principally concerning the institutions established and supported by his church from time immemorial. He called special attention to the numberless free schools which have always been included in the number, and closed with a eulogium upon the Christian Brothers and expressed the sincerest hopes for the success of the establishment which had just been set apart for the cause of education.

Governor Irwin then made a few well timed remarks upon the pressing need for the universal diffusion of education, expressing the firm belief that there is room enough for all who choose to undertake the noble work, and declaring that he saw no good reason for any antagonism between the schools established by

the State and by the various churches—the field was so wide as to leave plenty of room for all.

Adjutant-General Walsh followed with an eloquent and appropriate address, after which the immense throng dispersed.

The speaker's stand was draped at the back with three superb silk banners, all belonging to the Ancient Order of Hibernians. The center one was the emblematic flag of the Order, while to the right and left respectively were the glorious national colors, and the green flag of Erin, adorned by the sunburst, harp, wolf-dog and round tower of the Emerald Isle.

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## **Christian Brothers' College Vacation.**

During the week the various classes at the College under the charge of the Christian Brothers' have been undergoing an examination preparatory to the holiday vacation. Yesterday afternoon the term closed, examinations were made of the classes in the higher branches both by the teachers and capable examiners not connected with the school, and the pupils acquitted themselves with great credit— with remarkable credit considering that none of them have been under instruction in the College over five months and many of them only a month or so. The pupils were self-possessed and by every movement and answer gave evidence of the excellent training to which they had been subjected, and of their confidence in and love and respect for President Cienon and his able corps of assistants.

The progress of the College has been very gratifying to its friends and promoters, and it already gives ample evidence that it will be a worthy and able helper in the great cause of education, with the probability that it may soon be acknowledged as a leader in this section. It already numbers about 300 pupils—actually 295 on the roll—though it has been scarce five months in existence. The combined rolls of the College and St. Joseph's Seminary for girls, under control of the Sisters, show a list of 700 pupils—about one fifth of the school children of this city, and Father Scanlan as well as the members of his flock have good cause to congratulate themselves upon the progress of the cause of education made in this parish during his administration of its affairs—for Father Scanlan and his assistants are as fully alive to the temporal as the spiritual interests of their parishioners.

A noteworthy feature of the students of the College is their general intelligent and respectful appearance as well as their manifest desire to excel in their studies. The classes in algebra, plain trigonome-
