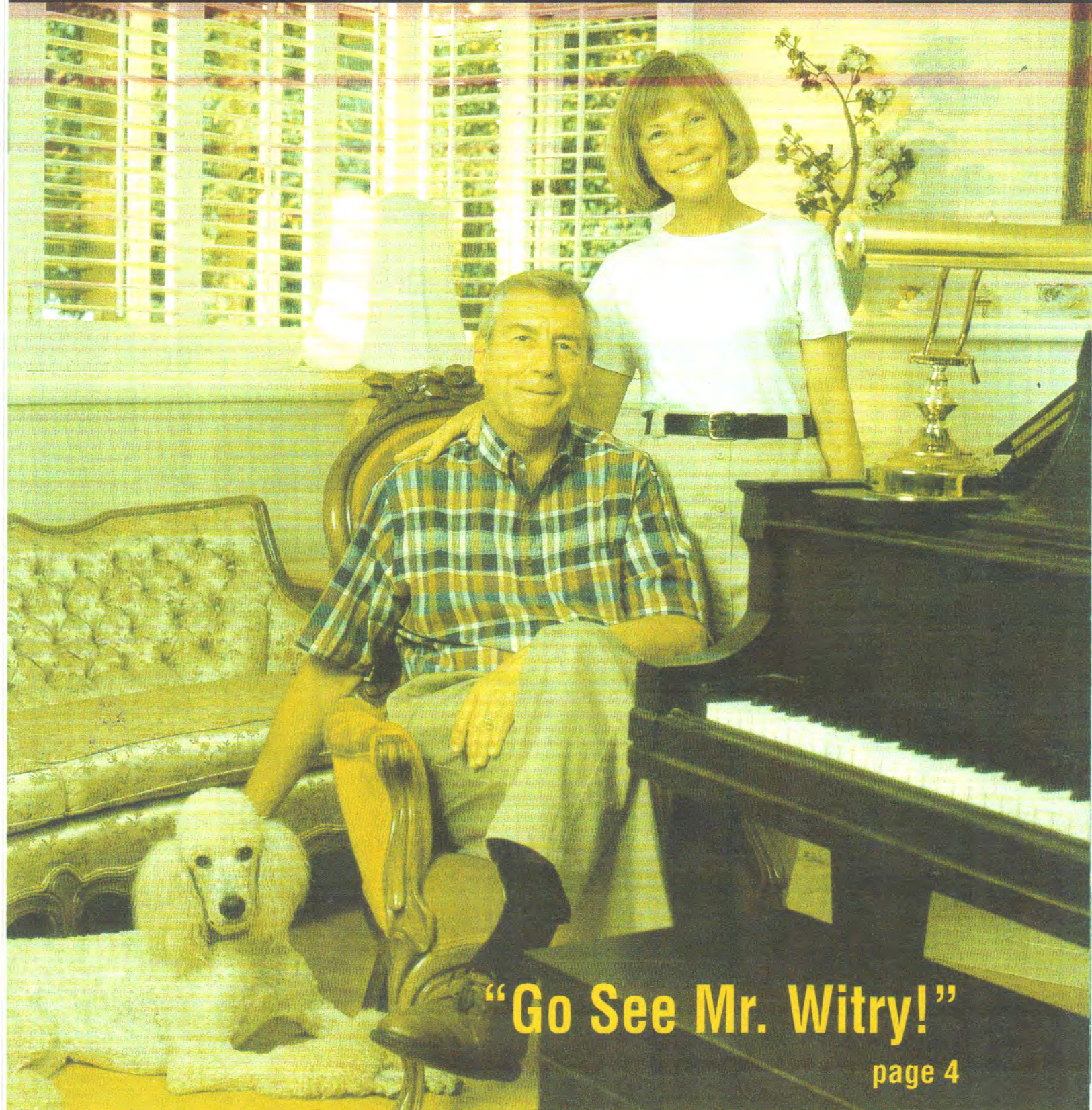

But basically, I enjoyed a lot of it. It could be a pain, it could be hard. Perhaps the hardest part could be dealing with the parents. The kids understand when you're trying to be fair – and sometimes looking back, maybe you weren't so fair, you can make mistakes, too. But you do what you think is best, and overall, I think it worked out pretty well.

There are a lot of rewards in working with those kids – it isn't all negative. And that's one reason I always wanted to teach as well – you need a little break. But I never minded being Dean of Students – it was kind of fun.

Q. Athletics has a lot of discipline. Did being a coach help you deal with kids who were getting out of line?

A. I think so. As a matter of fact, I've always held that coaches make good teachers, because coaching is teaching. When you've been coaching for a while, you find out that you're going to have to deal with people, you're going to have to accept the good times and the bad times, the good things and the bad things.

Q. But in addition to your Dean of Students role, you've always enjoyed working in the classroom.

A. I do. I like to see that light go on. I always asked for a couple of classes where kids either had trouble with math, didn't like math or were afraid of it; as well as advanced classes, simply to see the whole picture. You have to be patient, and work with them and work with them. And it's great when you see a light go on, terrific when you see a smile and the kid saying, “Ah, I finally got it!”

I've seen kids who've taken Algebra I and Algebra II, and it was a mystery to them. So the second time around, you take it slow and patient – and make a test so they can pass. Any teacher can fail you – as a teacher, you can make a test as hard as you want. But you have to make sure everyone has some sort of success somewhere along the line. I like to throw enough questions in there so that even the really slow kids, if they have a pulse and can draw a breath, can get a passing grade, can get half the test right.

And that's something, because math is a mystery to some kids – more out of fear than anything else. Once you get over that fear, it's kind of fun. It just comes later for some kids. I remember one kid who had a hard time and always took lower-level math classes, never an advanced math class. He graduated, and I got to meet him four or five years later – he was an electrical engineer.

How many Christian Brothers' boys from the '70s to the '90s can remember that order, whether he or one of his pals was on the business end of it. It meant you'd crossed the line, in the classroom or on the yard, and it was time to take that long stroll toward the office and the tough-but-fair guy charged with getting you back into line.

The Vice Principal. The Dean of Students. The man. Jack Witry. But with Witry's retirement this spring, ending a career with the Brothers that started right after he graduated in 1957 from St. Mary's College, it's important to remember that there was always so much more to this CB institution than the deep voice, the long stroll and the detention room.

You could find it on the basketball court, where Witry coached in the '50s, '60s and '70s with the love of the game that had sent him to St. Mary's on a basketball scholarship after he graduated in 1953 from St. Rita High in his native Chicago.

It was there in the math classroom, where he reveled in seeing “the light go on” in many a struggling student's head.

You could hear it down the hall, where he would peek into a new teacher's classroom to offer encouragement and a helping hand.

And how about the incredible work ethic he displayed from 1978 to 1992, when he managed to teach three or four classes a day while working for Tony's Fine Foods? (And characteristically, he's grateful to this day to CB and Tony's for allowing the arrangement.)

So after 25 years, it was time for me to go see Jack Witry – now hale and hearty in his newly minted retirement. He was the same understated, straight-shooting, salt-of-the-earth blend of scholar, counselor, jock and workin' guy I remembered from the day I said my first Hail Mary (which, as a non-Catholic, I had to learn quickly) in his Algebra I class.

To survive, let alone succeed, as the director of discipline for a bunch of teenage boys – and sometimes their parents, too – you have to know your own mind, your own values and those of the school you serve. Witry always did.

Here is a sampling from my conversation at his home with the guy who, in his own words, was never the students' “pal” – but was always their friend:

Q. What brought you to Christian Brothers?

A. A job – coaching basketball and teaching. When I graduated from St. Mary's, I wanted to get into teaching and coaching. There was an opening, and on the day of my last final, I got a call asking if I was interested in going up to Christian Brothers in Sacramento. I said, “Sure.” I had originally planned to go to Bakersfield, but we hadn't signed a contract yet. Then this opened up, and I'd rather go to Sacramento than to Bakersfield – so that's how I got here.

Q. Some might think of the Dean of Students as having a thankless job. What did you find

rewarding about it?

A. Believe it or not, some of my better relationships with kids over the years came through detention. Kids would come back to the school, poke their head in the door and say, “My seat's still there!” You just have to understand that when they're acting up in class, they're saying something, they're telling you something. There aren't many bad kids. It's like the old “Boys Town” – there's no such thing as a bad child. They can be testy, they can get on your nerves, but most kids in a one-on-one situation are pretty nice kids. When they get into a group, things change.

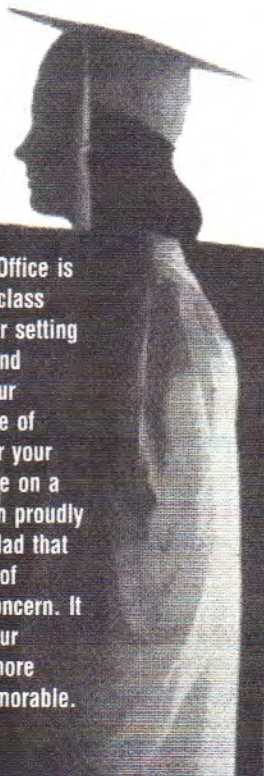

Having both the school principal and the head football coach excited about the fall sports season is great. To know that they mean it is fantastic. "System-wide, we're on an upswing," said football's head coach Greg Meegan. The freshman class is "loaded with athletes...we're in really good shape."

Noting that a big part of the athletic turn-around has to do with the philosophy of the sports program, Principal Tom Rutten cites many outside stimuli as factors. CB has a "great group of coaches," the school's coming off a successful year, and mandatory off-season programs have been done away with. The students finally feel that "it's their team," according to Mr. Rutten. That attitude shows in their drive and determination.

A brief glimpse at the fall sports has a rose-colored glasses feel to it. Last year's football ranks, with stars like Albert Hollis II and Joe Traverso, will be joined by 1998's strong junior varsity squad. Women's volleyball will be the "best ever," says Mr. Rutten, who also sees the start of women's golf as "awesome and exciting." Add to that the steady and solid basketball teams, a men's soccer team coming off of a playoff year, and the fact that ineligibility has dwindled a great deal of late, and one can easily see a definite recipe for success beginning to take shape. ♦

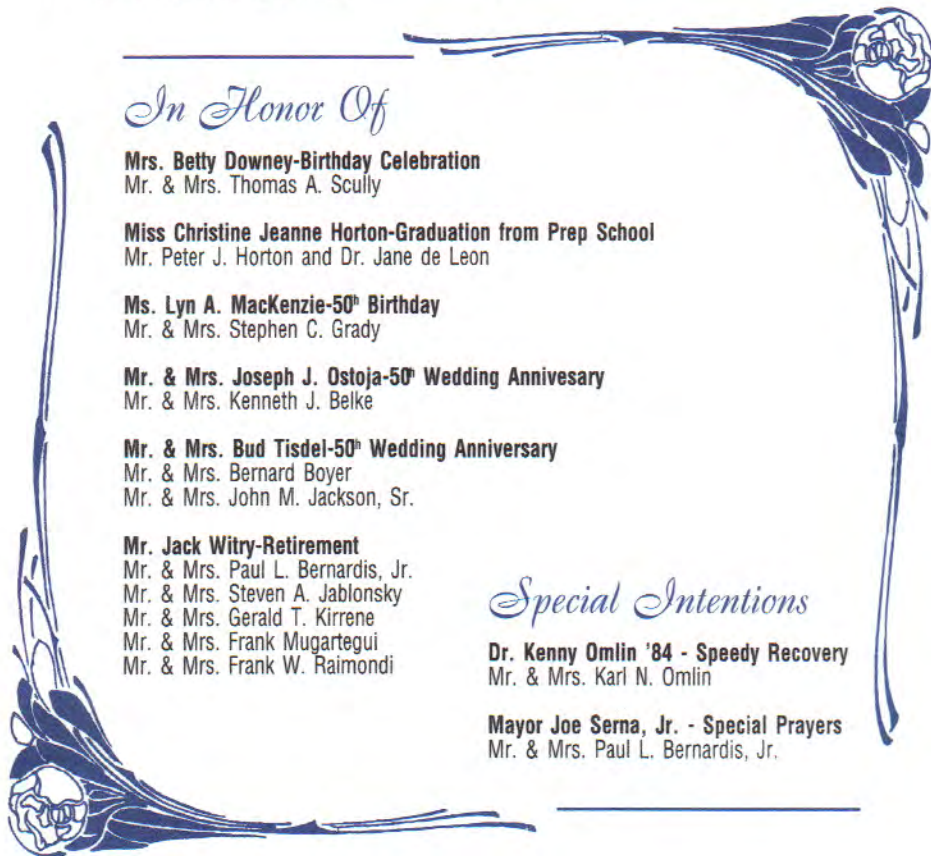

He went to college, the light went on, he matured, he took some calculus and did great. You would never, ever have marked him for a good math student in high school – it just came later.

Q. Did you have a particular philosophy dealing with teenagers and their troubles?

A. No, but I always maintained one thing: Never, ever tell a kid to do something and then let them get away with not doing it. Once you set the tone, and they understand it, then things work pretty well. Thank God things worked out for me as far as classroom management was concerned. I never wanted to be a buddy of the kids because I felt that if you get too close, they may take advantage of it. Maybe I'm wrong on that, but I was always afraid to cross that line, so I always kept a separation there. And I think the kids understand that.

Q. Is there a difference doing that kind of work in a Catholic school?

A. Absolutely. In public school – and the kids know this – it's really hard to kick a kid out of school. You can suspend them (that's difficult) but to expel them, you practically have to go to the Board of Education for a hearing. Our kids understand that we have a little more authority and a little different bottom line. But our kids are no different than those kids – they'll mess around if you give them a chance.

I really, firmly believe – and maybe it's my upbringing and the high school I went to – that discipline is perhaps one of the most essential parts of success in any field, whether it's athletics or the classroom or on the job. Once you get that across, then success follows. People want limits – consciously or subconsciously, they seek limits.

I tell the parents and the kids, too, that schools aren't just to teach kids how to read and write, and to do math and science. Even way back when schools first began, they were there to make people better people, to make kids better people. There's a difference between knowledge and action. There are a lot of people who know the difference between right and wrong, but it's not knowing it – it's how to act out what you know. That's how we can have these geniuses

committing bank robberies and murders. The key is moral action – how you perceive people and treat people. If you just teach knowledge, you're wasting your time. You need to make these kids better people, caring

and sensitive to the needs of others.

Q. Have the kind of issues that students face changed over the years?

A. There are more things to do and more distractions, but basically, kids aren't so different today. If you treat them right and make demands of them, they'll come across.

Q. Has going coed changed the atmosphere at CB?

A. Yes. First of all, boys and girls are more relaxed around each other these days in general. Second, the boys have cleaned up a little bit. There are still some who come to school sloppy, but not too many. And their manners are a little better – they're a little more conscious of the other sex being around. It's a good thing from the point of view that the boys finally learn that girls can be friends, not just dates. There are good things about all-boys schools, too – boys can relax in a different way. But overall, going coed has been a good thing for Christian Brothers.

Q. Are there different problems because of the interaction between the boys and girls?

A. For a lot of girls, at this age especially, half their problems are boy-related – a boy said this or that about me, or broke up with me or something. I didn't handle many of those – Sister Maria did a good job with that. She's sensitive, and she knows women and their personalities better than I do. Guys don't take things that seriously, at least with us. They either keep it to themselves or with their buddies.

Q. Are there special memories of CB for you?

A. First of all, getting the job and liking it right away. I knew I had made the right choice. Then there are the associations with teachers – good people to deal with. And successful sports seasons. And getting some nice comments. One in particular came from the president of a junior college whose son was in my advanced algebra class. He came up to me at a parent night and said, "Thanks for doing a good job with my son. He always says you're one of the best teachers he's ever had, and he always wants to be in your class." And from him, being an administrator at high school and college, it meant a lot to me. He was a respected member of the community, I was a young teacher then, and it really felt good. You never know how you come across to people. I'm sure there were people who thought just the opposite, but coming from a person like him, it meant a lot. Comments like that, over the years, have felt good.

Q. I remember that in the early 1970s, you were the one teacher who always started class – even if all minds were on the algebra test that day – with a Hail Mary and the Pledge of Allegiance. What were you trying to accomplish?

A. We all need a little help. I felt that a moment of solitude, a prayer to the "Man" upstairs and his Mother, might be a little more important than the test coming up – and that might relax you and let you do better. I've always felt very close to the Virgin Mary and prayed to her – and things have worked out pretty well. I didn't always get the answer I wanted, but I always got an answer.

Q. How does it feel to retire as someone who is seen as an institution from a school as tradition-conscious as Christian Brothers?

A. I've never thought of myself that way. But it feels good – only because I know I can go back and help out occasionally. They asked me if I was interested in helping out – substituting and so forth. And I said if I'm free, I'm happy to help. It was a fun job, and you want to keep close to it. Retirement? I'm looking forward to it. More free time – I know it looks like teachers have a lot of free time, but it doesn't really work out that way. I'll have more time with my wife, be able to travel in the off-season, and still know there are people there at CB whom I can go back and talk with, help out and associate with. I don't have any regrets about retiring. I know I'm going to miss the classroom a little. But it feels good to be retired, and to retire on good terms. That isn't always the case. I appreciate what the school has done for me. If I had it to do over, I would do the same thing all over again. I really enjoyed teaching and the people I worked with, and of course I enjoyed the kids. There aren't really many moments I regret over the years – very few.

Q. Do you have any advice for the teachers who come after you on how to keep Christian Brothers special?

A. Yes, and I push this a lot. I tell the kids and the teachers, and I sincerely mean this: I always felt it was a privilege to work there. I think they should feel the same way as teachers who work there; the kids should feel privileged to attend there. It's a great school – a lot of good things have come out of there, and they should appreciate it. And when they're gone, they'll look back and say, "Gee, I'm glad I went there." I'm sure it's going to carry on the same way, so the graduates will appreciate it, the teachers will appreciate it. So that's what I have to say to people: Appreciate what you have there, and work to keep it going.

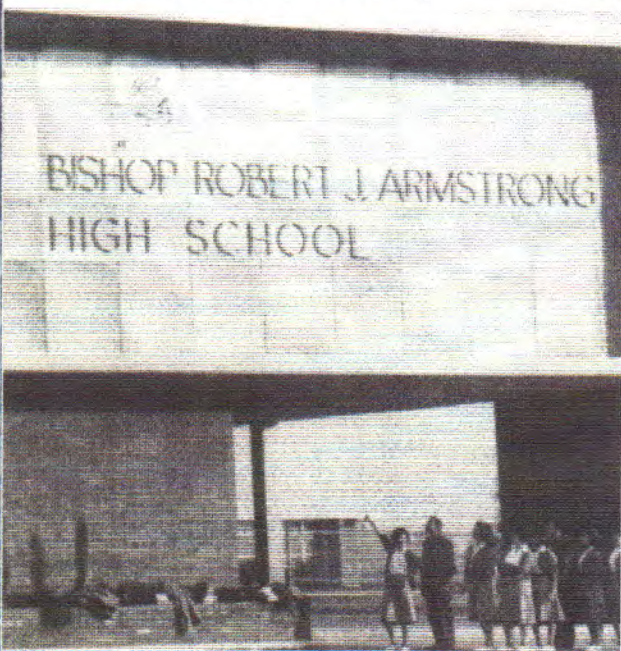

The Christian Brothers High School Mission Statement includes, "Our students are presented with experiences which deepen and strengthen their faith based on the gospel of Jesus Christ, the traditions of the De La Salle Christian Brothers, and the responsibility to be of service to others."

"Service to others" at Christian Brothers is modeled in many program opportunities. The Campus Ministry Department oversees Lasallian Youth and other service programs. The Student Activities program oversees many service-oriented clubs.

Lasallian Youth started in 1995 under the guidance and inspiration of Brother Kevin Slate, FSC. The tenets of Lasallian Youth are faith, service and community - the commitment to deepen one's faith, service to the less fortunate and building community within the school, community and abroad. The first year realized 12 students who helped coordinate several charitable fund drives. Today, over 40 students give a minimum of 100 hours annually in service to others, locally and abroad. Locally, Lasallian youth tutor students and coordinate the "Brothers Buddies" program at Immaculate Conception School in Oak Park, provide a Christmas party complete with

Santa and presents to the students at neighboring Oak Ridge Elementary School, and coordinate the monthly "Street Sweeps" program. Lasallian Youth also coordinate several charitable fund drives each year that benefit local organizations including the Sacramento Food Bank, and the Bishop Quinn Cottages. Over the years, financial support to a Brothers' school in Kenya has provided playground equipment, uniforms for every student, and farming equipment for the nearby farms, which support the families. The CB Lasallian Youth gather annually with other Lasallian Youth from throughout the world to be inspired to serve and discover new ways of living out St. John Baptist de LaSalle's vision of service to others.

Christian Service is another program under the direction of Campus Ministry. Christian Service provides referrals to many local and regional service

organizations in need of volunteer support. Every Christian Brothers High School student is required to fulfill volunteer hours in the community in order to graduate. Christian Service helps students connect with a service opportunity that best suits their individual gifts.

The Student Activities Program supports an extensive co-curricular activity program and supports many clubs and activities throughout the year. Many of the clubs are service-oriented, including the Wellspring Breakfast Club, which provides breakfasts to a local women's center, and the Key Club, which coordinates local volunteer service opportunities.

After completing four years at Christian Brothers High School, students have experienced many ways of serving others. These experiences plant seeds in the students to inspire others and continue serving those less fortunate. ♦
