





Christian Brothers football team has many good players

(This is the first of two articles dealing with the football prospects of Christian Brothers and Jesuit High School).

If the form sheet means anything the football Falcons of Christian Brothers High School will be first or second in the Metropolitan League and among the top five or six teams in Northern California this coming season. Their loss to Sacramento High School in the conference finale last November cost them what would have been their third championship in a row and broke a league string of 20 straight games without a loss dating back to the middle of the 1969 season. If they had won that one plus one more in '69 and one more in '68 they would be shooting for their 6th straight championship in '73. As it is, they have been first or second during that period and only Sacramento High School has won the title besides Brothers since 1967. Again this year, Sac High will be their chief obstacle in the way of the crown and a playoff berth.

What was a green team in 1972 has ripened to a veteran one in '73 according to Falcon head coach Dick Sperbeck starting his 12th season in that capacity. Gone are the much honored line duo of John Cartwright and Kelly O'Neil and all Metro League center Bill Pierson but all the rest are back.

There is special strength in the linebacking and receiver corps. Highlighting the form-er is All League returnee Chris Gandy, Bill Boughton, and Eason Ramson. Gandy and Boughton have been varsity starters since their sophomore years and Ramson started last season. Gandy

195 respectively. In the middle is Boughton who averaged an amazing 14 tackles a game last year, tops on the squad. He is 5-11 190 pounds.

Sperbeck calls his receivers "super." They include two all-league returnees in Bob Bingham and Dan Farrell. Bingham hauled down 23 tosses for 358 yards and a 15.5 average per catch in '72 in-cluding six for 95 yards against Elk Grove and five for 97 in the Mira Loma game. Farrell, now only a junior, caught 20 for 338 and a 16.9 average in his soph season on the varsity, his big game being six catches for 95 yards in the Kennedy contest.

Backing up those two is jun-ior Randy Wilson, also a varsity veteran, who could pos-sibly play ahead of either one before the season is over. Two excellent tight ends round out the receivers. They are Ramson and Kurt Schirmer both of whom can catch well and run fast afterwards.

There's another superstar in Dave Hoskin's line this year. He is two time all-league tackle Brica Ragster, now a mature 230 pounds, who is ready to come into his share of the headlines after playing alongside O'Neil and Cartwright the past two years. He has however drawn more than Jeff Tisdel who completed 62 his share of raves from opposing coaches to say nothing of linemen across from him so he certainly has not gone unnoticed. He will anchor what is otherwise an inexperienced defensive line.

Playing with him in the down positions will be John Hurtsig, Steve Hennessey, and Schirmer all of whom played defensive end last year. Hurt-sig is 6-1 205 and strong enough to do the job. Schirmer is only 180 but makes up for it with his quickness while

and Ramson, at the outside Hennessey, up from the sophs, positions are 6-2 205, and 6-3 is an intelligent player who won't make mistakes.

> Coach Mel Fontes has two veterans back in his second-Wilson started in '72 and Bingham has been the Falcon safety since his soph year when he made all league at the position. Third spot is up for grabs among five can-

Sperbeck states that even though he lost three outstanding defensive ends to the line the positions will be well taken care of. A pleasant surprise has been Dennis Gauthier who sat out last year but who may start in '73. Tom Neri and Mark Franzoia are also listed as possible starters as is Joe Greco who is being used at both the end and linebacker spots.

The offensive backfield looks good. Gandy is a bruising runner who could be unstoppable. He was unable to play much offense last year after carrying 23 times for 115 yards in his halfback debut in the league opener versus McClatchy. Greco, a junior, will be the fullback again. He carried 70 times for 246 yards and a 3.5 average in his soph year including 16 times for 65 yards in his debut against El Camino.

At quarterback is veteran passes for 829 yards in his 141 attempts last year. Additional experience should cut down on his 13 interceptions. Sperbeck claims he has improved "110% because of 200% effort on his part." If he's right, Tisdel and the Falcons could have a great year because his junior year stats are quite respectable.

The fourth running back is slotback-receiver Bingham who had the highest average per carry in '72 with 5.4 on 37 carries for 202 yards. His replacement, Wilson can also

Chris Gandy, a running back-linebacker. Brica Ragster, a tackle, and defensive halfback Bob Bingham were the league's top players in their respective positions last year and give the Falcons a definite experience advantage in tonight's contest.

Signal caller Jeff Tisdel, a senior who threw for 850 yards last year, will man Sperbeck's offensive unit that will have Dan Farrell, another all-leaguer who hauled down 24 passes in 1972, at a wide receiver

Two Metropolitan League powerhouses, Sacramento High School and Christian Brothers, open fire in the 1973 prep football campaign tonight in non-league games.

The offensive line is strong. Ragster and Hurtsig will man the tackle spots and both are good blockers. Boughton and Hennessey are the guards, the former being an especially good trap blocker. The departed Pierson left a void at center that will probably be filled by sophomore Lindy Smith with John Slaughter backing him up.

In the weakness department Sperbeck cited lack of depth as the main one. He stated that injuries to key people could mean the difference between an average year and a great one. Being a small school, the Falcons always are thin, but the problem is worse than ever this year. They are stressing conditioning as never before, both to avoid injury and prepare the athletes for going both ways. Another weakness is in the placekicking department where no able kicker has surfaced as yet.


Tisdel, with all the pass protection he needed, threw again to Farrell this time a 10-yarder with 10 minutes left See Page C3, Col. 3

Quarterback Jeff Tisdel mpleted 11 of 15 passes for 12 vards and two touchdowns nd ran for 116 yards and nother score to hand the Mira oma High School Matadors neir second straight loss. 9-13, and up Christian Broth-rs' mark to 2-0 Friday night t American River College.

Tisdel, who passed the Falons to a second-place Metroolitan League finish last seaon, used favorite receiver Dan arrell on both passing TD ccassions, one from 10 yards out and the second, a gameleciding toss from the 19 with 26 remaining in the game.

Trailing 7-3 at the half, the Matadors rallied in the third quarter. Together with a stingy iefense that held the Falcon attack to zero vardage for 12 minutes and a field goal, the Matadors moved within a

Then, four plays into the final quarter, Matador quarterback Gary Sotelo scored from five yards out on a quarterback keeper and a successful PAT made it 13-7 Mira Loma.

Tisdel then drove the Fal-cons 66 yards in eight plays. capped by a two-yard sneak, to make it 13-13. It remained that way until Farrell's grab.

Junior placekicker Sam Bippus booted the defending city champion Matadors into the lead with a 25-yard field goal at the 5:16 mark of the first quarter.

The Matadors, following a Chris Gandy fumble on his own 15. had taken possession with just over seven minutes remaining in the initial quarter. Matador fullback Paul Allen went off guard for two vards and halfback Mike Kilpatrick took a pitch out from quarterback Gary Sotelo for three yards before he halted at the eight on third down.

Matador head coach Don Brown, his first taste of backto-back loses since 1966, then elected to go for the sure three pointer and called upon Bippus. Bippus later in the contest kicked a 37-yarder, reportedly the longest in Matador history.

Each team exchanged possessions to run out the first quarter and then, on third down and two from his own 43-yard line, Sotelo rifled a pass over the middle that was picked off by Falcon deep back Bob Bingham on the 30 and returned back up field to the

Falcon fullback Joe Greco tried the middle of the Matadors' defense unsuccessfully but quarterback Tisdel came back to find split end Farrell open on the sideline for an

On the ensuing play, Tisdel faked a pitch left and elected to keep the ball. The 6-foot-0 and 176 pound senior shook loose from two tacklers at the line of scrimmage, then raced down the left sideline before being caught from behind at the 10 yard line.

CBS Rebounds Behind Tisdel For 19-13 Win

Christian Brothers School found its rushing attack pretty well sealed off, so quarterback Jeff Tisdel put the Falcons in the air for 132 yards and two touchdown passes as CBS came back in the last six minutes to whip Mira Loma 19-13 last night at American River College.

The defeat for Mira Loma marked the first time since 1967 that the Mats have lost two consecutive regular-

Mira Loma's defenders, bolstered by John Allen, Mike McMinn and John Axelgard, stifled the CBS ground game which saw halfback Chris Gandy rush for 155 yards last week. Gandy got only 19 yard trips against the Matadors.

But Tisdel, who threw eigh

11 completions to Dan Farrell for 104 yards and two TDs, battered out 109 vards on the ground as he set up the Falcons' first score with a 35-yard sprint and plunged two yards for the third touchdown.

In one of the most exciting games played in the school's history, Christian Brothers staged a 4th quarter two touchdown rally to beat Mira Loma

Matador place-kicker Sam Bippus kept th Mats in the game by booting field goals of 25 and 37 yards in the first and third quarters, setting a school single-game field goal record.

Brothers defensive back Bob Bingham intercepted a Gary Sotelo pass and returned to the Brothers' 43-yard line to set up the Falcons' first score early in the second period.

Five plays later, Tisdel fired a bullet nine yards to Farrell in the end


Prep of the Week








Johnson quarterback Eric Cervantes breaks through the CBS



CBS collected 10 first downs in the first half, SHS had one.







Four Prep Grid Squads Chase Capital City

The Capital City Championship Playoffs, highlight of the Sacramento area prep football season, will begin Friday night at 8 when surprising Vacaville tangles with Norte Del Rio at American River College.

Saturday night, also at 8 at ARC, No. 1 rated Christian Brothers will attempt to end Capital Valley Con-ference post-season domi-nance with a victory over El Camino. The winners of this weekend's games will meet Nov. 30 at 8 PM at ARC for the title.

The four teams have at least one common opponent in the playoffs. Christian Brothers already has defeated El Camino 33-7 and Vacaville 38-18, while Vacaville beat Norte 22-13, and Norte bounced El Camino 47-12. But comparative scores mean nothing now, especially since the games were played eight and nine weeks ago.

Vacaville, rated fourth in the Top Ten, will bring a 7-2 record and the best offense into the clash with fifth seeded Notre, 7-2-1,

champion of the North Metro League.

307-Yard Average

Vacaville averaged 307 yards through nine games. The Bulldogs rely on hardrunning fullback Dave Petree, the No. 6 rusher, and fourth rated passer Pat Ford, who also ranks seventh in total offense.

Norte has gained 3,080 yards through 10 games, with more than one-third of the total coming from halfback James Owens, the No. 2 rusher and leading scorer in the area.

With the similar offensive stats and very comparable defenses, the game is regarded as a tossup.
