Capital City Playoffs Begin

Christian Brothers faces El Camino

The 1973 football season began for Christian Brothers against El Camino last September 13. They are hoping that it doesn't end against the same opponent this Saturday.

The Metropolitan League champions conquered the Eagles in the season opener for both teams by a decisive 33-6 count. If they can repeat the victory in the first round of the Capital City Football Championships they will earn the right to advance to the finals next week to meet either North Metro kingpin Del Rio or Delta titlist Vacaville. If they lose they will put away the equipment and start thinking about next year.

A victory could set up another rematch if Vacaville gets by Norte, a team they too have already beaten in an early season non-league game. The Falcons defeated the Bulldogs 34-20 in the third game of the year.

Having already beaten two of the playoff participants may be a dubious distinction

for Brothers. Although they disposed of both of them with. relative ease both have made considerable improvement and a certain complacency could afflict the Falcons for these crucial games (or game).

Although it is unknown just how they arrived at the pairings that made two first round rematches one thing is for certain; it's darn poor planning. If El Camino and CBS loom as the two best teams on paper, then a natural pairing would have had Norte Del Rio play CBS and El Camino play Vacaville in the opening round. That would have avoided first round reruns and maybe put the two best teams in the finals. Even if you argue that Vacaville is better than El Camino the pairings would still be the most desirable as teams would at least be facing first time opponents.

Interestingly, El Camino was also lambasted by Norte Del Rio in the third game of the season but they came on strong to walk through their league with seven straight wins to finish 8-2. That same Norte team took it on the chin a week later from Jesuit but then they too got hot and went undefeated in the North Metro.

Vacaville dropped just one game, to Woodland, after losing to Brothers. They bounc-ed back after that one league loss to down Armijo and then win the big one for the Delta League co-championship and a playoff berth by stilling un-beaten Cordova, who held the state's longest regular season unbeaten string of 27 wins, by a 12-0 score.

So CB's three contenders for the area championship come to the playoffs with momentum. Brothers too was riding high after being upset by Elk Grove when they came back with sterling victories over Burbank and Sacramento for the championship but they suffered a confrontation with the elements and a gutty band of Jesuit Marauders last Saturday night at the swamp and suffered a tie that kept the ninth win they were after at least one more week away. Their record now stands at 8-1-1- matching their best ever record achieved in 1970.

The Falcons made it look ridiculously easy for a game between the champions of the two toughest football conferences in Northern California. The Eagles have not had an easy time of it in recent years with the Falcons but their contests have been close and exciting every year; but 33-6 and 32-14 is a bit convincing , and this was an EC team that had waltzed through the Capital Valley Conference with an eight game winning streak.

It was the play of exciting Bob Bingham that electrified the crowd. He carried seven times for 195 yards including a 52 yarder for a score. Every time he came back into the inside on a reverse from Tisdel he found a gaping hole in the middle of the Eagle defense. Christian Brothers Bump Eagles From Title Chase

El Camino High School had its chance for revenge but Bob Bingham spoiled the night for the Eagles as the one-man wrecking crew paced Christian Brothers to a 32-14 thrashing last night to advance to the finals of the Capital City Football Championship playoffs.

A crowd of more than 6,000 at American River College saw the No. 1 rated Falcons remain unbeaten in their rivalry with El Camino. The win was the second of the year for the Falcons over their cross-town foe and their fifth overall, along with two ties in the series which started in 1968.

The decisive win allows the Falcons to meet No. 4 rated Vacaville which beat Norte Del Rio 19-7 in the first playoff game Friday night - in the championship game Friday at

El Camino had an eight-game win-

ning string going into the contest but it was apparent early the battle was going to be similar to the 33-7 loss to CBS in the opening game of the sea-

Bingham carried the ball only seven times, but it was seven too many as far as El Camino was concerned. The senior flankerback gained 176 yards and scored the Falcons' final TD on a 38-yard jaunt. Bingham was stopped for four yards on his first carry, but before the first half was over he had rambled 23, 33, 21 and 52 yards in leading Brothers to a 14-0 halftime

Bingham, due to a number of injuries throughout the season, gained less than 200 yards rushing in 10 previous games. He started to work to almost equal his season total the first time the Falcons had the ball.

The 6-0, 175-pounder ran for 23 and 33 yards in leading CBS to its first TD on the initial series of the game. Quarterback Jess Tisdel went the final three yards on a quarterback sneak with 7:13 remaining in the first quarter to end an 80-yard march.

El Camino had a chance to cut the score midway through the second quarter after receiving a reprieve when Joe Greco's 38-yard scoring run was called back due to a holding penalty

The Christian Brothers defense produced the third TD late in the third quarter. Defensive tackle John Hurtsig knocked the ball out of quarterback Edges' hand and into the arms of defensive end Dennis Gauthier, who returned it from the EC 47 to the 11. Four running plays later, Gandy scored from the two.

A Gandy interception set up the next Falcon score. The senior linebacker returned an Edge pass from the Falcons 33 to midfield. Then Tisdel connected with receiver Dan Farrell on a 50-yard scoring strike with 11:37 left in the game.

Eagles March 80 For TD

El Camino, which ran twice as many plays as the winners, marched 80 yards for their first score with 7:18 left with Steve Ridenour going the last yard.

Bingham retaliated with another inside reverse - a play which had the Eagles confused all night long for his long TD run two minutes later. Tom Storelli finished the scoring with a two yard run for El Camino with 10 seconds left to play. The TD dive climaxed a 73-yard, 14-play drive.

El Camino played without top linebacker Jeff Buchanan, who suffered rib and shoulder injuries during practice late this week.

Falcons defeat Eagles

Wingback Bob Bingham scored one touchdown and set up two more with long runs to pace the Metro League champion Christian Brothers Falcons to a 32-14 victory over the El Camino Eagles in a Capital City Football Championships playoff game Saturday night at American River College.

The Falcons, second-ranked and 9-1-1 overall, advance to the championship game against the Vacaville Bulldogs at 8 p.m. Friday at American River College.

The Eagles, Capital Valley Conference champions, finish 8-3.

Bingham, a 6-foot-1, 180-pound senior speedster, dazzled the Eagles with big gains on flanker reverses and led all rushers with 195 yards

on just seven carries. In the first half, Bingham ran 23 and 32 yards to set up a 3-yard touchdown run by Falcon quarterback Jeff Tisdel, and ran 52 yards preceding a 28-yard touchdown scamper by Tisdel.

Bingham closed the Christian Brothers scoring with a 38-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.

The Falcons scored first, Bingham's run setting up Tisdel's quarterback sneak, to take a 6-0 lead with 7:14 remaining in the first quarter. Later in the first half, the Falcons scored again, Tisdel racing 28 yards over left tackle for the TD, and keeping on the conversion to give the Falcons a 14-0 lead with 5:17 left in the first half.

Capitalizing on an El Camino turnover, the Falcons scored what proved to be the winning touchdown when Chris Gandy plunged from the two-yard line with 2:20 remaining in the third quarter. Gandy's TD was set up when Falcon defensive lineman John Hurtzig blindsided Eagle quarterback Butch Edge as he attempted to pass, the ball popping into the hands of Dick Reisinger, who raced 36 yards to the Eagle 11. Four plays later Gandy scored.

Tisdel, the Falcons' senior quarterback and a former Sacramento Union Prep of the Week, got the Falcons on the board early in the fourth quarter, lofting a 50-yard bomb to wide receiver Dan Farrell that gave Christian Brothers a 26-0 lead with 11:37 remaining.

Moving well but shut out

Moving well but shut out most of the game, the Eagles dented the scoreboard with 7: 18 remaining, when Steve Ridenour rammed over from the one to culminate a drive that went 80 yards on 13 plays. Edge kicked the conversion.

But the irrepressible Bingham doused all Eagle comeback hopes minutes later when he raced 38 yards to score with 5:43 remaining in the game. The Eagles' last touchdown, a four-yard run by Tom Storelli, came with but 10 seconds remaining in the contest.

"Bob's been getting a lot better the last couple of weeks," said Falcon coach Dick Sperbeck. "This was his best game ever."

Jim Dimino, coach of the Eagles, agreed.

The No. 2 ranked Falcons of CBS, who defeated the Bulldogs 34-20 Sept. 28, are champions of the Metropolitan League. Their record stands at 9-1-1. Their only defeat was to Elk Grove in league, 9-6, and they were tied by Jesuit in the Holy Bowl, 0-0.

Vacaville, rated No. 5, is 8-2. Besides losing to CBS, the Bulldogs were upset by Woodland, 38-18, on their way to a Delta League co-championship with Cordova. The Bulldogs earned the playoff berth by virtue of having defeated Cordova in the regular season.

Tickets for the game, \$2 for adults, \$1.50 for students with ASB cards and \$1 for children, will be on sale at the gate. Officials of both schools have advised people to arrive early to avoid heavy traffic into the

Once in the stadium, fans will be treated to some real

grueling running attack, with CBS getting the edge in the passing department.

Last week's Prep of the Week, Dave Petree, will provide the Bulldogs with most of their offense. The 5-foot-9 and 175-pound senior fullback is a three-year varsity performer for head coach Tom Zunino and his staff.

Pat Ford, a 5-11 and 150-pound junior, will start at quarterback for the team that juggles its formations on what seems like every play. The offense, however, is built around the double-slot forma-

Joining Ford and Petree, who gained 134 yards against Norte Del Rio in the semifinal game a week ago, will be Joe Macrina (5-8, 160) and Jeff Wright (6-0, 160).

The defense is held down by all-state shot putter Ray Burton (6-2, 220) at a linebacking position and Bill Zupo (5-9, 155)

at an end spot.

Vacaville's presence in the final game marks the second time an underdog and out-oftown team has participated. Last year it was Yuba City, which tied two others for the traffic. Both teams offer a North Metro League title, won

its semifinal game and eventually fell to undefeated Mira Loma.

Joining Bingham in the backfield will be another Prep of the Week, Jeff Tisdel (6-0, 180) at quarterback, Joe Greco (5-8, 170) at fullback and Chris Gandy (6-2, 205) at halfback

In Tisdel the Falcons have a slight advantage. He finished the regular season as the area's third-best passer. He completed 79 of 147 attempts for 1,040 yards and 12 touch-

The Bulldogs will remain on the ground more often than Brothers but Ford has been sharp when necessary. He passed for 51 completions in 96 attempts for 804 yards to rank two places behind Tisdel dur-

ing the regular season. Vacaville has not, however, defensed a passing team in its last two outings. Both Norte and Cordova, who the Bulldogs beat the final day of the season, relied on a running attack. Vacaville is a proven threat in the rain and mud and weather could play an important factor.

The Falcons are coached by Dick Sperbeck and have represented the Metro League two out of the last three years.

Vacaville Beats Brothers for Title

Vacaville High School, the least regarded of the four playoff participants, held sputter-ing Christian Brothers, the favorite, to eight yards in the second half Friday night while Pat Ford was tossing two touchdown passes and upset the Falcons, 12-0, for the Capital City Football Tournament Championship at American River College.

The Bulldogs generated 189 yards total offense to Brothers' 59, and 51 of that came entirely on rushes in the first half, which ended with Vacaville in front by six. Jeff Tisdel completed two passes for the Falcons' second half yardage as CBS had the ball only 13 plays drive of 50 yards in nine plays the final two quarters.

Vacaville almost made its third touchdown against the Metropolitan League titlists when the Bulldogs advanced to the Falcon 10 late in the fourth quarter with the aid of a roughing-the-kicker penalty, but the bid was ruined by a clip, although the block seemed perfectly legal.

Reversing a 14-point loss to CBS and bouncing back from a trouncing by Woodland in its own league, the Bulldogs opened the scoring with a three-yard touchdown pass from Ford to Eddie Mann with 19 seconds remaining in the second quarter. The conversion failed on a bad center

The six points followed a

Cordova 12-0 for the Delta League title when the latter was the top-ranked team in the area, took a 25-yard quick kick by Brothers to midfield. It was the third quick kick on third down for the Falcons during the initial 24 minutes.

The big play on the drive pre-ceding the Mann TD was a 14-yard pass from Ford to Ray Burton. Brothers ran out of a shotgun offense most of the first half, favoring the pass, while the Bulldogs went to the run more often. The Falcons, however, did not complete a pass.

First half statistics showed

Brothers with 51 rushing yards and four missed passes, while the Bulldogs ran up 48 yards and passed 39 yards, with Ford three for five in the aerial department. First downs were even at three and Petree was the leading ground gainer with 38 yards on 17 carries. Tisdale packed seven times for 22 Brothers yards.

The Falcons entered the game ranked No. 2, losing only to Elk Grove 9-6, and playing to a scoreless tie with rival Jesuit in the mud. The Falsons had nine season wins and had beaten the Bulldogs, 34-20, earlier in the year.

Vacaville posted an 8-2 mark during regular season, bowing to Woodland, 38-18, aside from the Brothers loss. The Bulldogs came in ranked No. 5 and got to







Sperbeck Of CBS Is Optimist Coach

Dick Sperbeck, who has guided Christian Brothers to a 46-10-3 overall mark the last six football seasons, has been named to coach the Sacramento County All-Star team in the 18th annual Optimist Football Game Aug. 10 at Hughes Stadium.

Sperbeck, whose teams have not been rated any lower than sixth, hopes to add another victory to the County's win column after last year's 28-16 triumph gave the Sacramento squad a 6-5-1 edge over the Northern California All-Stars.

A graduate of Marysville High School, Yuba College and St. Mary's College, Sperbeck coached CBS to a 9-2-1 record last season and the runnerup slot in the Capital City Football Championship race.

bloodsport' revisited:

An open letter

To: All Concerned with the T.V. movie "Bloodsport," I, as a football coach at the high school level and moreover as a father, am highly indignant at all who were involved in perpetrating "Bloodsport" upon the American viewing public. Furthermore I am incensed at such as Chris Wise of the Sacramento Union who would not only view this horrible misrepresentation as typical but would be so prejudiced toward something he knows nothing about to write "If it keeps one boy from wanting to be a football player, it was a monumental endeavor" and "considering what goes into a football mentality, it is a wonder that the sport can even be remotely connected with educational institutions." If it had been about an inept, malpracticing physician (which could not happen as the A.M.A. lobby is too strong) would he have written that it was a success if it keeps people from going to doctors or that it's a success if it keeps one boy from going into medicine? So much for his inane

When Danny Thomas Productions approached the Woodland and Rancho Cordova communities, they told them that the title was to be "Poetry in Motion" and that it was about a high school running back. I maintain that they never intended to call the movie by that name but rather used it to dupe the high schools of those communities into cooperating with them. I choose to think that, than to believe that Dale Lackey of Woodland and Harold Mathews of Cordova would cooperate in a project that so maliciously maligns interscholastic football. There is no way that "Poetry in Motion" could have been a title for that movie and it was never intended to be. It is an odious indictment of the American people that Danny Thomas Productions told the Woodland people that the name was changed because the new title would have more appeal and capture more viewers

And what of the alleged humanitarian Danny Thomas and his part in this prostitution. Is it so important to him to sell a movie to television that he would so viciously attack high school football and its coaches without having any insights into what it is and what it does for boys? And what of his part in the deception involved with the name. I fear some hypocrisy must surround this docile, homespun, charitable man we see presented on television. If he is not involved he would be wise to watch what he puts his name on.

I am also surprised at the paradox of Channel 13 KOVR playing the film although they probably did not have a choice as it was a mandate from ABC. Their sports director Steve Somers is doing a fine job of promoting high school athletics and what they represent locally while at the same time a movie is shown which puts football in such a distorted position.

I am not concerned that objective, intelligent people could possibly view "Bloodsport" as anything but pap when they depict a scene where a coach throws a coat over the body of a boy who dies on the practice field and comments, "Not before the big game" or one where the coach pours it on an opponent because a father from the stands tells him to, or any of the other drivel that was misrepresented and distorted. But I am concerned that dimwitted people can have their prejudices reinforced by a medium that will sell its soul to get someone to watch its infantile trash. I am also concerned that my honorable profession that does so much for young men should be put in such a bad light.

But perhaps it's not all bad; maybe it will prevent at least one boy from becoming a newspaper television critic or a T.V. movie producer.

It ridiculed our profession'

It's coming was heralded with excitement and anticipation. "Poetry in Motion," a movie about a high school football player, was to be filmed in Woodland and telecast nationally by ABC. Local high school athletes-including Rod Connors of Cordovawould be used as doubles and extras.

Well, the men from Danny Thomas Productions came, and filmed, and left, and by the time "Poetry in Motion" was telecast last Dec. 5, the title had been changed to "Bloodsport" and the dander of the local coaching corps had been most definitely

The movie, which chronicled the senior season of a high school quarterback and his domineering father, was in many respects a good one. The acting—by Ben Johnson as the father and Gary Busey as the quarterback—was convincing. The football action footage—supervised by Steve Sabol of NFL Films-was superior.

It was Larry Hagman's portrayal of the coach as a weak, insincere, gum-chewing, whistle-toting and generally oily character that has upset local coaches, most notably Dick Sperbeck of Christian Brothers, whose letter appears above.

Other coaches have joined the chorus.
"I thought it was —," said Sacramento
High coach Dave Hotell. "That guy brutalized us as coaches. Chewing gum and the whistle around the neck and all that . . . and some people will be stupid enough to believe that's the way things really are.

"I think the movie set football back about 300 years," said Larry Ghilardi, coach at Kennedy. "It gives coaches and football a very bad reputation. The picture ridiculed our profession.

"Football does a lot of good for kids. At some schools it can give them something to live for, a reason even to go to school. And as coaches we spend 24 hours a day with the . we have more time for them sometimes than even for our own kids

"There's more to life than football, of course, and we all know this. The scholarships for college are there for a few-but that's a very limited few. What high school football can do is give a kid lessons in coping with life; it can teach him to pick himself up

All coaches have had experience with domineering parents, and in this respect, Ghilardi and Hotell concede the intergrity of

the plot.
'I don't think there isn't a coach around that hasn't had at least one experience with that sort of parent," Ghilardi said. "And in some cases, some good kids have been ruined because of it. But those parents are very, very few."

Dale Lackey, principal of Woodland High School, seemed unconcerned by criticism of

"Dick Sperbeck is a fine coach and a fine person," Lackey said, "and he's very inter-ested in high school athletics. But I think he just forgot that he was just watching a mov-

Lackey said the Woodland School District and Chamber of Commerce were approached by Danny Thomas Productions at the end of

pal of Cordova High School. Cordova had been approached along with Woodland about participating in the movie, and running back Rod Connors had been sought as a double for the opposing team's quarterback in the mov-

ie's big game.

"I could never get the real meat of the dialogue," Mathews said. "And it seemed as if I was the only one asking any questions."

"I but I bent getting a run around from that phony production manager, and no one would give me a direct answer.

'I wasn't going to put my name on anything without seeing what it was, and I started to get a little skeptical. Sometimes you just get a feeling about those things. So finally I just told the people from Danny Thomas Productions that they'd just have to go some place else.

"No students or personnel of Cordova High participated in the movie. No Cordova equipment or uniforms were used.'

Needless to say, Mathews was slightly nonplused at receiving Sperbeck's letter, although the Christian Brothers'coach subsequently apologized in writing. For Mathews' opinions of the film coincide with Sper-

"To say that movie was a travesty would be an understatement," Mathews said. "People who watched that movie and took it as a representation of a typical high school football coach and program would be sorely misled.

'Am I happy that Cordova was not involved in the movie? That would be the understatement of the year!'

August about making the movie.
"We made some facilities available to them, and cooperated with them as well as we could. The people from Danny Thomas Productions were honorable, honest people in every respect . . . if I were in a position to cooperate with them again, I would do so if I could," Lackey said.

Lackey said that the title change was made by the American Broadcasting Company two weeks prior to the telecast, not by

Danny Thomas Productions.

"What we knew about the movie was merely the fact that a movie was going to be made about a high school athlete. We didn't get into the concept of it . . . it was just another movie

"I didn't particularly care for the new title . . . as far as liking the movie, we were too close to it here to really judge . . . we were more interested in seeing who was in it

and what was left out than in the story. Woodland football coach Armand Jaques

agreed with points in Sperbeck's letter.
"From a coaching point of view, I would agree with him," Jaques said. "It was an unfortunate movie, although certainly not a death blow to high school athletics

While it was being filmed, the story was not really talked about specifically, it was talked about in generalities. If the situation came up again, I might have reservations

One man who did try to ascertain the nature of the plot was Hal Mathews, princi-


About the Clinic
