To the Jesuit-Christian Brothers High Schools' Communities:

A traditional purpose for the Catholic school is the "development of the total man". This basic purpose is interpreted from religious order to religious order, from institution to institution. But the original concept remains intact.

Catholic education attempts to inculcate those disciplines necessary for proper academic/intellectual development, to instill a sense of curiosity for the truth and to foster those practical skills necessary for everyday living. All of these are done in the context of the complete growth of the individual.

These are not merely "football players" but individual human beings working to develop another aspect of their entire personality through the medium of athletic competition.

It is in this context that we, the observers, must evaluate this athletic contest - a real opportunity for personal development through competition, through the handling of either victory or defeat. An end result of any such contest is the hoped-for personal growth of each contestant.

THE C.B.S. TRADITION

With innovations earmarking the educational field today, Christian Brothers has traditionally influenced the direction and scope of education in the Sacramento area. A new administration works imaginatively and forthrightly with the new mentality of today's youth, still stressing the values of their own humanity and Christianity. While many institutions find themselves caught in the turmoil of pointless change, Christian Brothers continues to challenge the minds of its students, not on mere issues of the day, but on the truths of human life that form the basis of day to day living. As the inexperience of youth tends to neglect these truths, laymen and Brothers energetically involve their students in a way that calls for the recognition of these concepts as necessary for the development of human behavior.

Such an approach has been one of the distinctive qualities of a Brothers' education. In Sacramento the Christian Brothers have successfully labored in this manner for the past century, evidenced in the community since they pioneered Catholic education here ninety-five years ago. In July of 1876, Christian Brothers was founded as an outgrowth of St. Rose's parish school, first called St. Patrick's by the pastor, Rev. Father Scanlon. Eventually the California province of the Christian Brothers accepted a new three story building at the corner of 12th and K Streets and the school assumed the name of Christian Brothers College.

Thus the influence of the Brothers flourished and pervaded the academic atmosphere of old Sacramento, becoming the city's first school to offer college courses. The community's recognition of scholastic excellence made it necessary to open a high school in new Mission styled buildings on 21st and Broadway. Enthusiastically, the Brothers moved into secondary education, provided a boarding department, and established the spirit of "CBS" as an integral and historical part of Sacramento.

Due to the pressures of space and change, property was purchased on Sacramento Boulevard, where a modern new campus thrives, still demanding the dedication to a Christian, intellectual life.

So it is that "CBS" continually renews itself as an educational influence on the Sacramento scene, adapting itself to recent recommendations of the Western Association of Secondary Schools, which gave Christian Brothers a full five year accreditation term.

With a large and involved alumni working with the laymen and Brothers, it is with pride, conviction and success that Christian Brothers looks forward to a second century of renewing its educational endeavors and athletic prowess in Sacramento.

JESUIT HIGH SCHOOL HISTORY

Compared with the long history of Christian Brothers High School, Jesuit High School is a relative newcomer to the Sacramento educational scene. On September 17, 1963, Jesuit High opened its doors to an incoming class of 93 freshmen. Only the two classroom wings and the administration building had been completed by that time on the site in the Sacramento suburb of Carmichael which had formerly been a hops field.

The growth of the school is reflected in both the students and their surroundings. The student body now includes four years with a total enrollment of just over 600 students. Since the opening date, a faculty residence, science classrooms, and a new gymnasium have been added to the buildings on campus.

As we became a four-year high school, we began to develop our athletic program so that we could provide all aspects of a total high school formation. At the heart of the program is the gymnasium complex which was completed for the 1968-1969 school year. About half the area of the campus is utilized for outdoor athletic activities, including the football game field, a practice field, three baseball fields, and a track which just underwent major improvements in Spring of 1971.

As faculty, parents, and students become more aware of the human problems of the community at large, Jesuit has begun to broaden its perspective in order to acquaint its students with the social responsibilities of contemporary life. The community social action program which has been inaugurated is one attempt to provide a context for carrying the principles of a Christian life into contemporary practice.

Alongside the other Jesuit high schools throughout the country, Jesuit High of Sacramento hopes to grow in its contribution to Catholic secondary education and to the service of the community which its pioneer years here have begun.

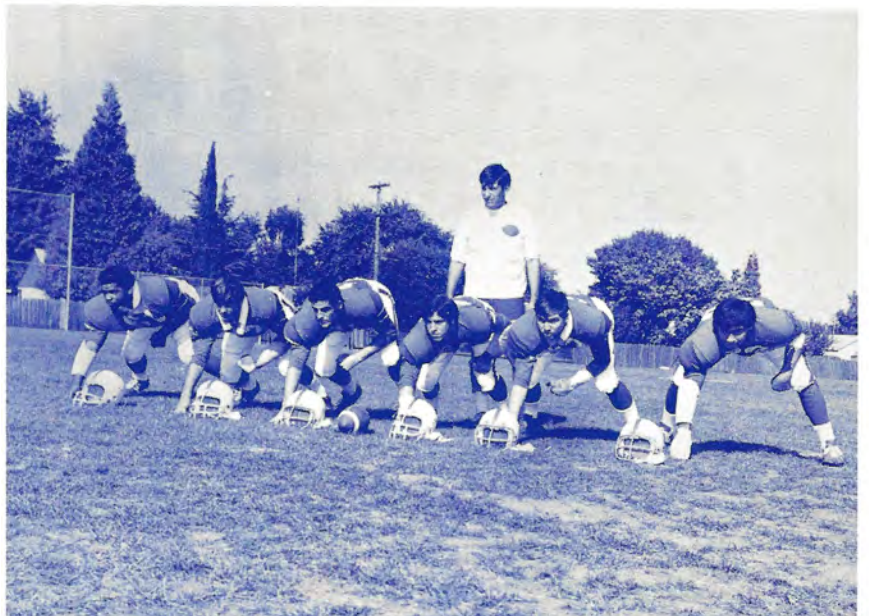

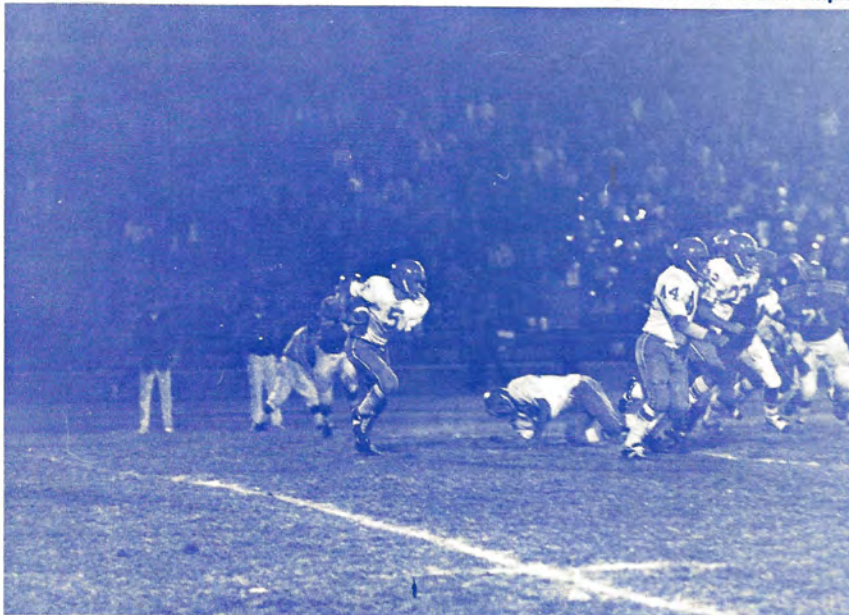

Mark Costi powers his way as Norbert Fahey looks to block opposition against El Dorado in a Golden Empire League contest

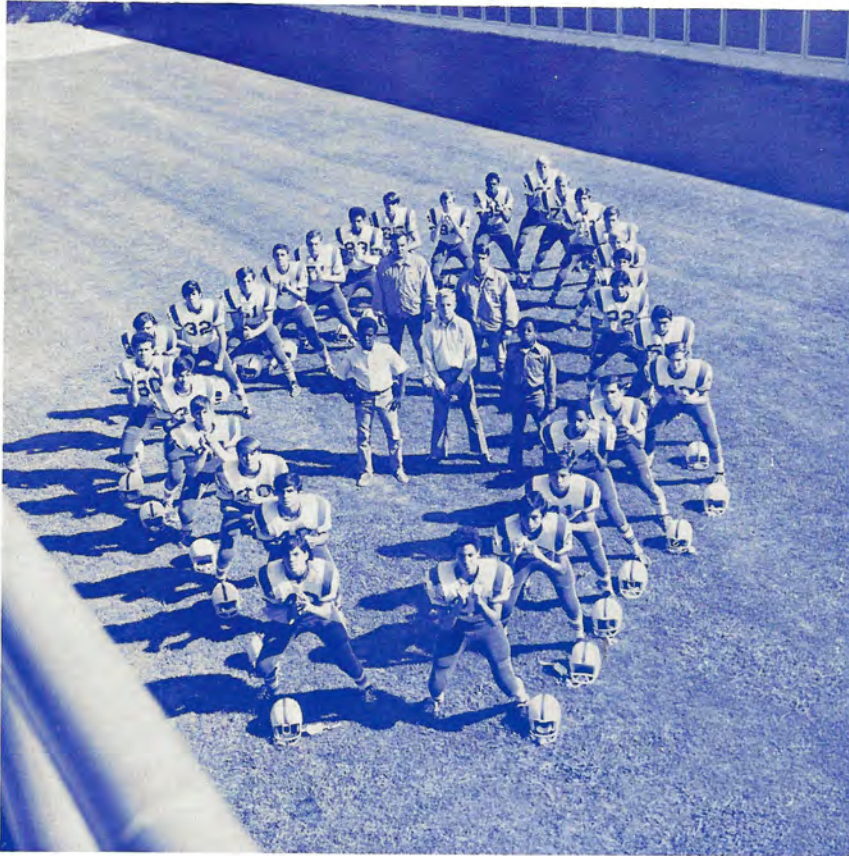


Dan McGinn finds running room with Mark Costi and Scott Linde running interference against Mira Loma

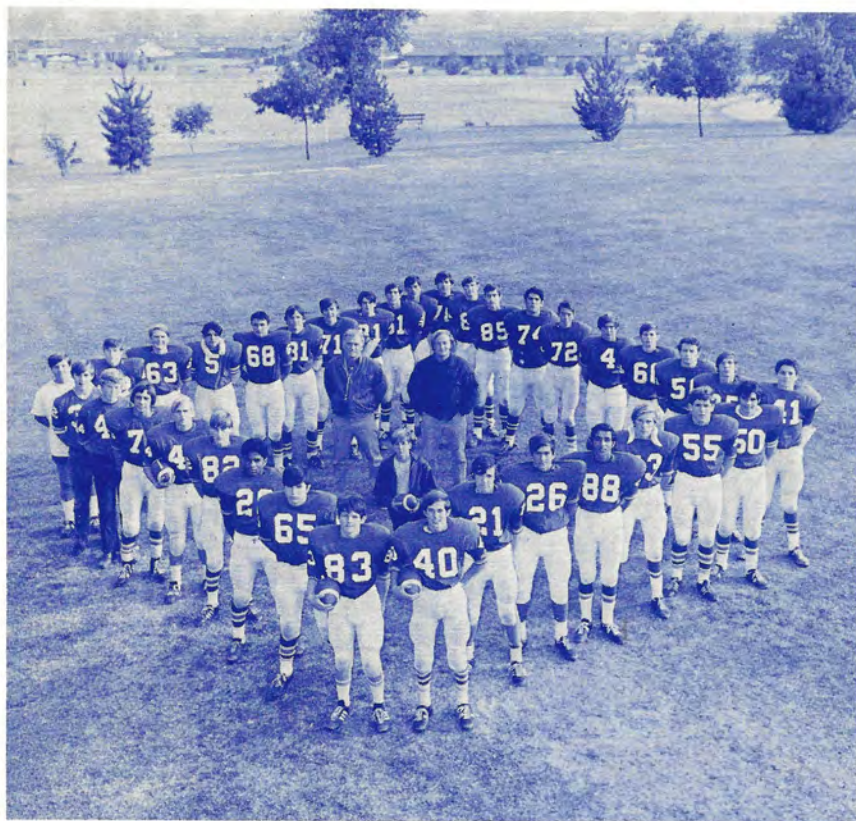
