FORWARD

Christian Brothers High School has assumed the responsibility for directing the development of young Catholic men and their formal education during early manhood. So it is that Christian Brothers High School must have a sense of direction in its own efforts if it is to succeed.

It is hoped that this STUDENT HANDBOOK will serve to inform those seeking information about the school and its programs, to stimulate and encourage those effected by the educational process described herein, and to guide those responsible for the serious work of Catholic education. It is also hoped that this STUDENT HANDBOOK reflects the principles, objectives and procedures by which the school seeks to implement its sense of direction.

HISTORY OF CHRISTIAN BROTHERS HIGH SCHOOL

With the academic year 1972-1973, Christian Brothers High School enrolls its "centennial class".

Founded in 1876, Christian Brothers High School was first located at 12th and K Streets. 1924 saw the campus moved across the levee to 21st and Broadway. 1956 was the year for the establishment by Bishop Robert Armstrong of a new campus for 11-12th grade boys and girls on Sacramento Boulevard. In 1964, the campus for CBS on 21st and Broadway was returned to the Diocese and the campus on Sacramento Boulevard assumed an all-male appearance once again. June, 1968, witnessed the school's name change to Christian Brothers High School, with its dedication continuing to the memory of Bishop Robert Armstrong.

Since 1876, Christian Brothers High School has offered a curriculum and co-curricular programs reflecting the needs and desires of the young Catholic men of Sacramento. The academic and co-curricular programs have undergone constant evaluation and adaptation to meet the changing requirements of the individual and society itself. In 1966 Christian Brothers High School was accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges for the first time; 1971 brought an up-dating and continuation of this accreditation for a full-term.

The present status of the school evidences a serious and sincere effort to develop within the school and its programs a sensitivity to the contemporary needs of its students, and a consistency with proven concepts of modern education.

- To Achieve Maturity In the Student's Relationship With God and Others
- To Bring the Student To a Response of Active Concern for the Earthly City and the Reign of God
- To Develop Christian Personalities Rather than Intellect Only
- To Integrate the Religious Aspects of the Person Into All Facets of the Educational Process, Especially In Light of the Christian Principles
- To Develop the Cognitive, Affective, Psychomotor, Critical and Spiritual Aspects of the Student's Personality Into an Integrated Whole
- To Give the Student Participatory Involvement In His Educational Process
- To Bring the Student to a Process-Oriented Understanding of Life
- To Forge a Union of Fellowship Between Teachers and Students
- To Bring the Student to a Realization of His Christian Freedom

GRADING POLICIES

Teachers use grades to indicate their evaluation of a student's ACADEMIC achievement. Subject matter grades are never used as a disciplinary weapon. This latter is covered by a code number for observations on the grade report form.

Before an "F" grade is given to a student, it is recommended that the teacher submit a "deficiency report" to the concerned people, i.e. student, parents and the main office. This "deficiency report" is REQUIRED before a semester "F" grade is given a student.

No semester "F" grade may be given by an instructor unless there has been an "F" grade on one of the prior 6-week grading reports. Conferences with the student and his parents are encouraged at the earliest signs of indifference or non-achievement.

GRADING POLICY GUIDELINES

- "A" ... Thorough mastery of all required work as measured by the criteria established by the instructor. The student understands the principles and concepts of the subject. He develops insights that are applicable in new and similar situations.
- "B" ... Firm grasp of the objectives of all required work as measured by the criteria established by the instructor. The student can apply these basic insights in similar and some new situations.
- "C" ... Understands most of the fundamentals of the subject as measured by the criteria established by the instructor. The student attempts most of the required work. He can apply basic principles to situations similar to those experienced in class work.
- "D" ... Grasps fundamentals sporadically. The student attempts required work inconsistently. He can apply basic principles to situations similar to those in class work infrequently.
- "F" ... Understands few or none of the fundamentals as measured by the criteria established by the instructor. The student attempts little or none of the required work. He cannot apply basic principles to situations similar to those in class work.

GRADING POLICY INFORMATION

Semester grades are FINAL grades. 6-week report grades are merely progress grades.

Seniors receiving semester "F" grades will not receive a diploma until they have completed approved make-up work, usually through summer school.

Other students receiving semester "F" grades will not be promoted until they have completed approved make-up work, usually through summer/night school.

Students who believe that they have been treated unjustly in an academic matter (e.g. grade, course work-load) may petition the Vice-Principal, Dean of Studies, for an impartial review of the issue. Students using this procedure must first make every attempt to settle the issue with the teacher concerned. Failing this, they should obtain the petition form from the Dean of Studies' office and follow the procedures outlined thereon.

Students, whose grades indicate such consideration, may be eligible for membership in the California Scholarship Federation and/or the National Honor Society. Membership requirements for these honor societies will be published by the moderator at an appropriate time.

Honor Roll status is gained by having a Grade Point Average of 3.0 or better. First honors is given to a GPA of 3.5 or better; second honors for a GPA of 3.0 and up. An acceptable grade in conduct is necessary for either honor roll.

FINANCIAL

School Insurance: Christian Brothers High School participates in the student insurance program of the Sacramento Diocese. Every school function is covered by this insurance and, as such, any injury incurred during the time of school supervised activities must be reported to the school office IMMEDIATELY and the proper accident application forms filed with the proper authorities. Cost of this insurance program is incorporated into the student body fee.

Insurance for tackle football is through another program. This insurance applies only to those students formally and officially listed as members of the school football teams. The cost of this insurance program is shared by the school and the individual student's family.

Payment Schedule: 1) full tuition and fees at beginning of school year
2) one-half tuition and fees at beginning of year
3) one-fourth tuition and fees at beginning of each semester, payment again on November 15 and March 15

Financial Aid Program: There is a financial aid program for those families requesting such assistance. Formal written application is required each year. Forms are available in the treasurer's office. Financial assistance is available in the following forms: scholarship (usually restricted to upper division students), loan, grant-in-aid (reduction of tuition) and work assistance.

PROCEDURES

Attendance: Parents should notify the school office before 9:30 a.m. of the absence and the reason for the absence of their son. Call 452-2876. When possible, students who find that they will be absent from campus for part or all of a school day should bring a written and signed note from home stating the reason for such absence or early dismissal. This note should be brought to the attendance office the day before the anticipated absence.

Upon returning to school after an absence, the student should again bring a note verifying the fact and time of the student's absence. The note is presented at the attendance office where an admit slip will be granted.

Daily attendance is required for all students unless they are ill.

In the instance of such illness, parents are asked to call the office each day of the boy's absence.

Absence for reasons other than illness will be considered unexcused absences unless they are for very serious reasons.* Such absences should be cleared first through the office. In such instances the time missed may have to be made up at the discretion of the administration.

Medical Appointments are usually made in advance, therefore the student should let the attendance officer and teachers know what days or periods will be missed so work may be assigned. Every effort should be made to have these appointments made for other than school hours. Failure to notify the school may result in the student having to make up missed classes after school. Obviously, this does not apply to emergency situations.

*Spontaneous "vacations" are not considered as being a "very serious" reason.

State law requires that a student's absence in excess of EIGHT DAYS during a semester may disqualify a student from course academic credit. This applies as well to tardy students.

Students late for school or any class obtain an admit slip from the Vice-Principal's office. Tardiness is defined as arrival at school or a class after the bell for the beginning of class.

Automobiles: All students are to register their cars in the office and thereafter observe rules of safe driving, especially around the school.

Student parking is provided at the rear of the cafeteria. The front parking-lot is reserved for guests and faculty members. PARKING LOTS ARE OUT-OF-BOUNDS DURING SCHOOL TIME.

Students are urged to lock their cars and to place items of value (e.g. tape decks) in the car trunk.

Students bringing bicycles to school are to park them behind the science building in the racks provided. These bicycles should be very strongly chained for protection against theft.

Lost and Found: Students finding articles should deposit them in the Vice-Principal's office. Students losing articles should report such losses promptly to the main office. Lost articles may be claimed in the Vice-Principal's office after school.

Medical: Medical examination forms must be on file for all lower division students. Participation of students in PE and/or inter-scholastic activities is controlled by these medical forms; as well this information is often valuable in the instructional program for teachers and administrators.

Religious: Seniors must make an annual closed retreat. A fee is charged for this activity.

A student body chaplain is available for counselling, for the sacraments and the general religious needs of the students. Holy Mass is celebrated regularly for the students in the chapel before school.

STUDENT CONDUCT

General Policies: Christian Brothers High School maintains the following as the basis for its regulations and rules affecting student conduct:

- Christian Brothers High School respects the individual as a creature of God endowed with particular qualities which mark him as unique in the eyes of God and man
- Christian Brothers High School respects the individual as a responsible human being capable of intelligent action
- Christian Brothers High School acknowledges the need for guidance, direction and training for each individual in the pursuit of Christian maturity

THEREFORE, Christian Brothers High School accepts its partnership with the parents and the student in establishing and maintaining a Catholic atmosphere of identification and understanding regarding the serious work

and purpose of Christian education

AND THEREFORE, Christian Brothers High School recognizes the primary responsibility in the formation of the young man to be that of the parents, and acknowledges its function as a partner in this process of formation

AND THEREFORE, Christian Brothers High School understands the necessity for basic structures and regulations to assist both the parents and the student in the development of each student as a Christian man

AND Christian Brothers High School feels the responsibility to demand the intelligent observance of regulations, reasonably determined, to achieve the full purposes of the school.

- 1) At all times, the CBHS student conducts himself as a Christian gentleman, manifesting a respect for himself and a pride in his own person. This self-respect is extended by showing a proper courtesy to all around him, by being considerate of the rights, the needs and the feelings of adults and fellow students alike.
- 2) The CBHS student exhibits respect and courtesy especially for the classroom by coming prepared for the serious work of the class, by participating intelligently and seriously (within his ability) in the work of the class.
- 3) The CBHS student extends this respect and courtesy to every person associated with the school, regardless of function or position, and by regarding the property of the school and those associated with it as his responsibility also. He will respect the proper use, repair and maintenance of all such properties, regardless of ownership.
- 4) The CBHS student conducts himself with the same sense of self-respect and pride at all activities, held on or off the campus.
- 5) The CBHS student also manifests his self-respect and pride by his gentlemanly appearance at all times, his dress and grooming being directed and guided by this sense.

To foster and maintain this personal pride, the school requires

That the student's appearance is always neat and clean

That the wearing of blue denim jeans is prohibited

That DRESS boots are permitted, but sandals are prohibited

That knit t-shirts and colored t-shirts are permitted, but

tie-dye shirts and white t-shirts are not allowed

That the students hair may extend to mid-neck but off the collar

That the hair must be combed and neat at all times

That the ears must be visible

That mustaches and beards are prohibited

That side-burns may be to the bottom of the ear

That these rules of dress apply at all school functions, on or off campus, unless expressly changed by the administration for a given activity or event.

That in the instance of seeming infractions, the Dean of Students will speak privately with the individual student for correction of the situation or condition.

- Christian Brothers High School realizes the difficulties in attaining this atmosphere of mutual respect, understanding and cooperation by every person in the school. Hence, the need for sanctions to support or correct those individuals having more than normal difficulty adjusting to this corporate effort.

The Dean of Students, and the counseling department, work with each student who encounters these difficulties. The Dean has delegated authority to act consistently with school policies in individual cases. He attempts to understand the individual, the circumstances and the conditions of a particular difficulty; then he makes appropriate efforts to correct the situation.

Classroom teachers share this responsibility by establishing norms and procedures for proper classroom behavior, and then by consistent and reasonable enforcement of these regulations.

- Christian Brothers High School also recognizes the need for stronger, more direct sanctions for students frequently acting in unacceptable manners, or that student involved in a single, major infraction. The following are the major sanctions available to the school:

Detention: Usually a period after school for purposes of discipline in minor infractions.

Suspension: Temporary removal from the student body, namely loss of student privileges for a determined period, and referral of student to supervision by parents for a time period. Applied for serious offense or continued behavior inconsistent with the school's good order.

Expulsion: Permanent disgraceful removal from the student body. Applied for a most serious offense or a series of serious infractions detrimental to the school's good order. Prior to actual expulsion, the individual student may appeal for a hearing under the "due process" concept of the school to protect his rights and those of others involved.

"Due Process"...

- 1) referral to and consultation with the Dean of Students
- 2) consultation with the instructor/prefect and the Dean
- 3) written information to the parents and the student of the charges and the action pending
- 4) conference with the student, parents and the teacher/prefect with the Dean of Students
- 5) Formal hearing, if necessary or desired, including the appearance of the student and witnesses before a board comprised of administrators, teachers, students and the parents
- 6) Decision by the board for the final action of the school administration

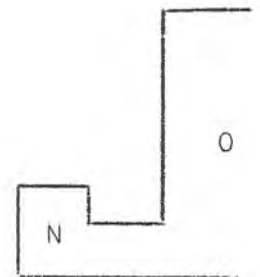
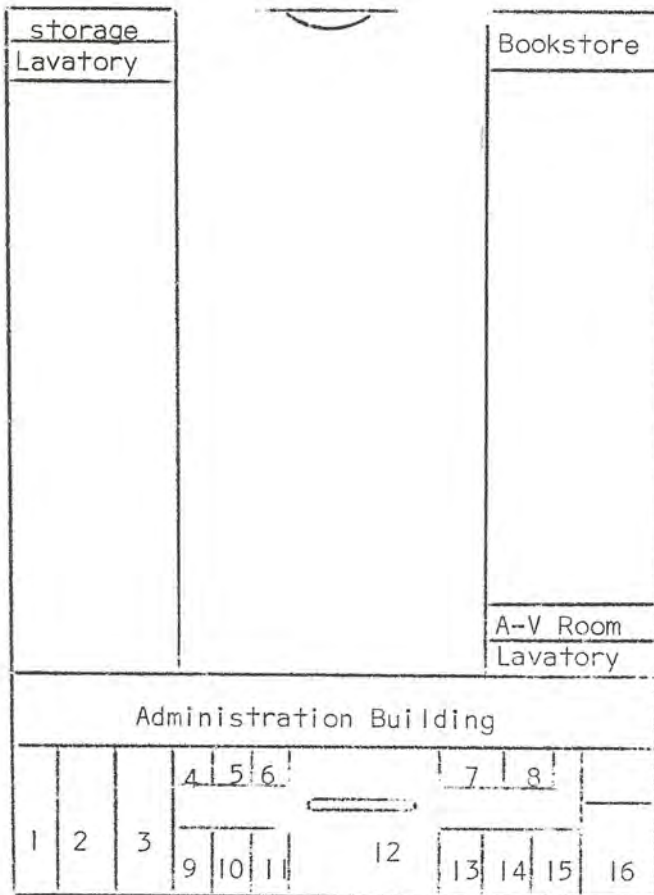
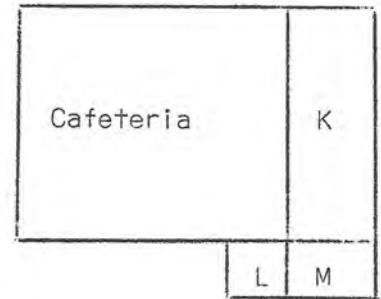
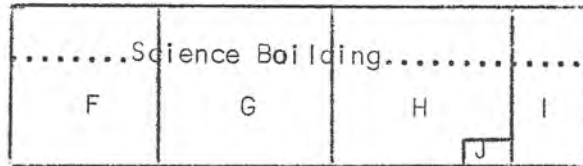
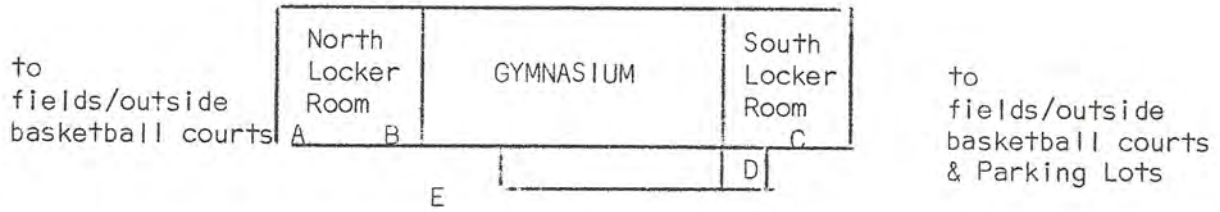
Teaching Controversial Subjects: As a Catholic school, Christian Brothers High School has a two-fold obligation. As a CATHOLIC school, CBHS is committed to the teachings of the Church in matters of Faith and Morals. We are not free to accept or to reject these teachings. So, all discussion of such subjects must be done in an atmosphere of Faith and respect for the teaching magisterium of the Church. As a Catholic SCHOOL, CBHS is committed to the pursuit of truth. Yet, sometimes this pursuit of truth touches upon very sensitive personal, political, social and religious areas. It is to give a sense of direction that the following principles are stated here:

- 1) Before controversial subjects are discussed in the classroom, the school administration should be so informed.
- 2) Significant problems should be stated and discussed in terms suited to the maturity level of the learners and their capacity for understanding concepts and values.
- 3) An atmosphere as free as practicable from bias and prejudice should be maintained.
- 4) Differing points of view should be presented with dignity and fairness.
- 5) The prestige of the position of the teacher should not be used to advocate partisan positions or opinions.
- 6) Pupils should be encouraged to analyze problems accurately, gather and organize pertinent data, detect propoganda, identify prejudice, and discriminate between fact and opinion.
- 7) The legitimacy of honest differences of opinion among individuals looking at the same evidence should be established.
- 8) Dignity, rather than embarrassment, for the exercise of ones right to change his opinion should be established.
- 9) Students should be encouraged to withhold judgment until thorough study has been accomplished.
- 10) The presentation of sound, reliable, adequate evidence should replace empty argument.
- 11) Proposed solutions to public problems should be tested in the light of democratic principles: concern for the worth of the individual and for the common welfare; recognition of fair play; and emphasis on peaceful, constitutional methods of progress.
- 12) Parents, as the prime educators, have the right to question or challenge, or seek clarification, in instances where there might be concern.

Admissions Policy: Christian Brothers High School admits in compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 those students whose ability and general record indicate a basic success in the program of studies at The High School. We accept the Sacramento Diocesan "Policy of Admission" as stated: "Every person, as a child of God, regardless of race, condition, or age, has equal dignity and an inalienable right to an education and therefore no qualified student will be denied admission to this school on the basis of race, color, or national origin.

Generally, admission is based on achievement in a standardized academic test and prior academic records.
