

CB Surpasses La Salle Goal

The 100% goal of the school was surpassed by Sunday, October 11, when the school reached a final total of 122%. The money came from ticket sales by the students. The goal was \$15 per student. Several of the homerooms reached 200% and above. The highest percentage, and, incidentally, a new record, was 311%, which was made by Mr. Fontes' homeroom 206. The second highest percentage was brought in by Mr. Sperbeck's homeroom 205. They brought in 268%.

Three homerooms did not sell their share. They will have to come to school one day in the spring when the rest of the school will get a holiday.

The money the La Salle Club

receives is given to the Athletic Department to be divided between the Sports program and the P.E. department. The P.E. department is given approximately \$400 to \$500, while the remainder goes into the Sports program. The money the Sports program gets is used to help pay for the extension of its activities. Some of the things that have been added because of the La Salle Drive is the new \$40,000 baseball diamonds, the new equipment, including a new lawnmower, pumphouse, and sprinkler system, and a second refinishing of the gym floor last year. Money received from this and future La Salle Drives will help pay for these new attractions.

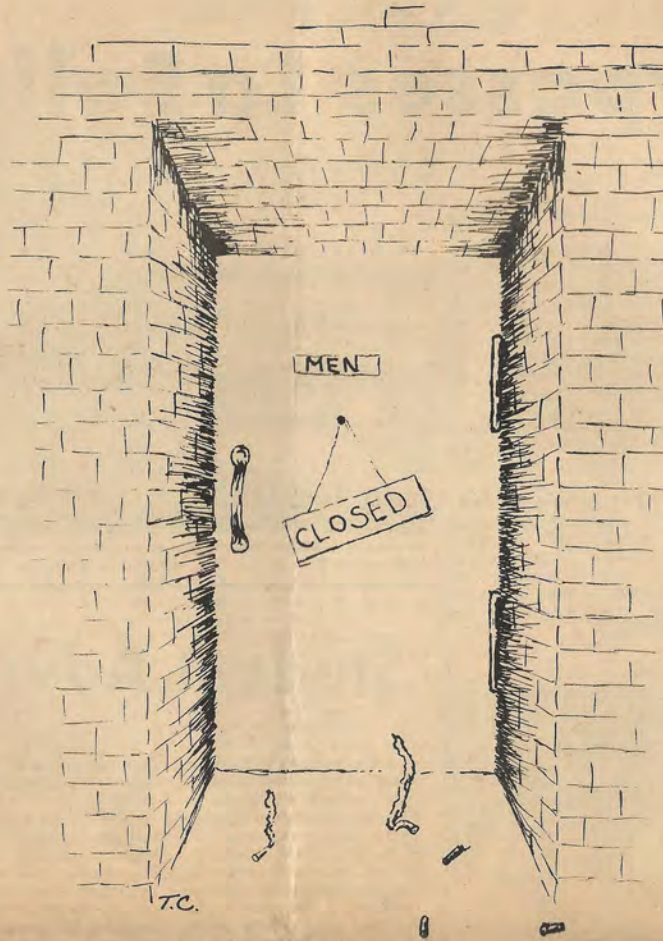

Speech Team Gets Big--- Goes Dramatic!

In October of 1967 a meager group of four students and two moderators (Brothers Martin and Philip), traveled to Grant Union High School to compete against other high school forensic squads that numbered 30 to 35 students. Despite the odds, Christian Brothers walked away with a first place trophy and a third place trophy, a batting average of .500. Today the Speech team membership has swollen to 25 and has pushed itself into a new frontier; drama and acting! Presently the team is divided into groups of three or four, each working on its own three to ten minute dramatic skit or scene. Some of these are well-known written by the students. These short group skits are meant to serve as warm-ups in an attempt to "measure our talent," in the immediate future the team will begin work on its first two dramatic presentations, to be presented to the student body sometime in December. Jacobs' "The Monkey's Paw" and Edgar Allan Poe's "The Tell-Tale Heart" will be the first two attempts.

The members are also preparing for their competitive speaking in the Sacramento Valley Forensic League. The

State Scholarships Available to seniors

High school seniors needing financial assistance to attend college next fall should plan to submit an application for a State Scholarship. Approximately 9,300 new State Scholarships will be awarded in April 1971 for use in 1971-72, and more than 90% of these will be available to high school seniors.

State Scholarships are available for use at any accredited four-year college in California, plus the California Maritime Academy. The awards range from \$300 to \$2,000 at independent colleges, \$300-\$600 at the University of California, and are in the amount of fees charged to students at the California State Colleges (approximately \$140). Students planning to attend a community college during the 1971-72 academic year may have their scholarships held in reserve for them until such time as they attend a four-year college.

Applications are available in the counseling office of every California high school. Students must submit scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination

Board, which should be taken either on November 7 or December 5 and file an application with the State Scholarship and Loan Commission by midnight, December 3, 1970.

Falcons vs. Eagles.

Christian Brothers kicked off the 1970 season against the El Camino Eagles. The Eagles ended up the 1969 season number one in the area, and started out this year in the same position. The red-shoed CBS-men quickly took care of that as they won the "Battle of the Birds," by the score of 14-6.

An outstanding defense and some long ground gainers by Ken Lewis put the Falcons at a 6-0 advantage at halftime. In the second half Dan Carmazzi directed the team to another touchdown. This was on the first play of the fourth quarter as Mark Russell galloped 51 yards around left end for the score. Carmazzi ran in the two-point conversion to give the Falcons a 14-0 lead. Later in the game El Camino scored, but it was too late as C.B. took over the number one position.

C.B. vs. Mira Loma

In the second game of the season CBS had to face a team that had won 33 out of their last 34 games. The Mira Loma Matadors, who were rated above the Falcons by some disbelievers fell to C.B. by a score of 21-0. Halfback Dave Hernandez started the scoring with a 46 yard run on a delayed draw play. It appeared that the Falcons were going to the locker room at halftime with a 7-0 lead, but Dan Carmazzi threw a perfect pass to Doc Blanchard for six points in the final 10 seconds of the half. Hernandez ran in the 2 point conversion. In the second half Mark Russell scored the only TD on an 18 yard aerial from Carmazzi. John Cartwright was outstanding on defense.
