

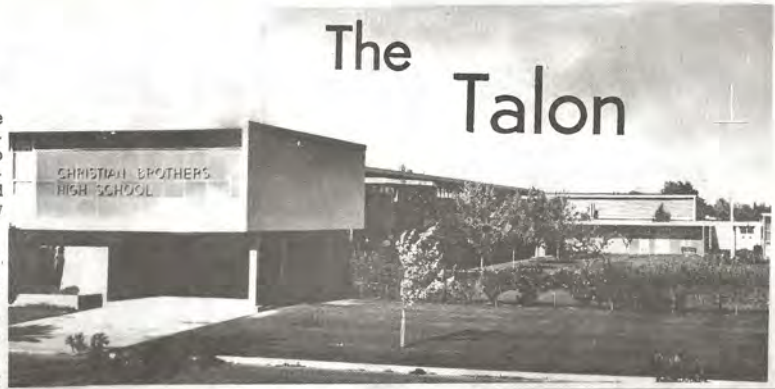
No Holes In Sacramento Blvd.

Jeff Franzoia, Student Body President, and the other Student Body Officers who were elected last May, along with the home room, class, and club presidents comprise the representative governing body of Christian Brothers High School, the Stu-

dent Council. Now that the selection of most of the council's members for this semester is finished the council has begun to perform its duties.

During the first session of the council, held Wednesday, September 22, Br. S. Martin

expressed his wish that the representatives would take their responsibilities seriously and keep their home rooms and clubs well informed about the council's activities in order to insure that student government can function as an integral part of student life.

Jeff reported that the action taken by last year's council concerning the P.A. system for the gym will be followed through by Br. Hilary in the near future and the council was asked to ponder the possibilities for altering the usual homecoming format of previous years.

Most importantly, the executive and junior class councils have independently undertaken the initiative to revise the seemingly defunct student constitution in order to form a better structure under which student government can function. Ultimately, though, it will be the students who will make the final decision concerning any constitutional changes.

Tasty - Topic

Breaded Porklets
 6 porklets (pork cubed steaks)
 2 eggs
 1/4 cup milk
 1/2 teaspoon sage
 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 1 1/4 cups fine dry bread crumbs
 1/4 cup lard or drippings
 Beat eggs slightly and add milk. Mix sage, salt and pepper with crumbs. Coat porklets with crumbs, dip in egg mixture, then in crumbs again. Brown in lard or drippings. Cook at a moderate temperature 20 to 25 minutes or until done, turning occasionally to insure even cooking. 6 servings.

Westberg Likes CB, Sees Changes Developing

Mr. Tom Westberg is the Chairman of the Science Department at C.B. His field is Biology. Mr. Westberg spent the summer in Brunswick, Maine where he was one of 30 individuals, out of about 300 chosen to take part in an Institute in Marine Ecology. He is presently working for his Masters Degree in the field of Biology.

TALON: How many years have you been at C.B.?
WESTBERG: 3 1/2 years.

Do you like it here?
I am very satisfied. I wouldn't be here if I wasn't.

Why?
I think it's a different type of student here. A student that is interested in learning.

Do you like the way the administration and teachers are handling this school?
I think like any institution there is room for change. For the most part the people here are attempting to change things for the better.

As the Chairman of the Science Dept. do you plan on opening up some courses for the Lower Division?
I am less structured. I

I made a strong attempt last year but the Administration wasn't quite ready to open up the program I had in mind. When the requirements in the schools program are a little bit looser, then I think we will be able to open up the program for the Lower Division as an elective.

Has the school changed since you came?
Fantastic changes have occurred! There is now a less rigid and structured program for dealing with student problems. There is also an attempt to meet individual needs without losing any discipline and order. With the administration, I see more of an awareness to some of the ideas that students have and a willingness on their part to meet the students half way with their ideas. With regards to the students, their participation is alive and moving but it is still not quite there yet. However, it is a lot better this year.

Last year you went on the first junior class retreat that this school has ever had. Have you noticed any change in yourself, your classes, and the students that went on the retreat?
I am less structured. I

am much more aware and open to some of the problems that exist with individuals. Instead of just reacting to the problem, I now try to analyze exactly what's going on and what is causing the behavior.

With regards to myself, I have been told that I have been seen in a little bit different light. Maybe now I am a little bit more human in the classroom.

With regards to the students that have come back from Retreat, I have, along with everyone else, noticed a great change in these students. And unlike other classes that have come back from Retreat, I think this particular group is going to try to keep the feeling of the Retreat alive. It is not an end-type thing.

Do you recommend that the present Junior Class go on this year's Junior Class Retreat?
Very definitely! I think we have already seen the advantages of last year's Junior Retreat this year. We saw it in the first week of school with the Senior-Freshmen Activities. It will help this year's Junior Class next year in getting the whole school together. A little less class segregation. I not only think that the Junior Class should be

involved with the Retreat experience but also there should be some sort of program for the Lower Division. Something that will get these people to open up with other classes other than their own. In other words I would like to see good interclass communication.

What do you think of the idea that each teacher at C.B. experience a retreat?
It's impossible to describe the Retreat experience in words to another teacher. So the only way a person is going to be able to relate exactly what kind of an experience their students have been involved with is to go himself on a Retreat.

There have been a number of criticisms concerning the Retreat experience. What are your comments?
The emotional aspect of the Retreat has been looked down upon. Now if the Retreat program is totally emotional and nothing else, then it is definitely at fault. But if it is emotional and brings results and change then it is not at fault.

Enlow Hits High In National Meet

Alfred Enlow got his competitive weight lifting career off to a flying start last summer, setting a national age group record in the Junior Olympics tournament in Los Angeles.

Enlow, a 15-year-old junior at Christian Brother High School, snatched 175 pounds to eclipse the old record by five pounds.

He also pressed 205 pounds and made 225 pounds in the clean and jerk. All this within the space of about six minutes. His

efforts earned him a pair of medals - one for his record and one for his first place finish in the heavyweight class.

His total lift was 605 pounds, just 10 pounds short of the record. In practice sessions, Enlow has lifted 665 pounds. But in Los Angeles competition dragged out over four hours instead of the normal two, and by the time Enlow got to make his lifts, he was given only six minutes.

In short, at 5-foot-6 and 205 pounds, Enlow has all the makings of a future Olympian. That's what he and his trainer, Hung-

Falcons Tackle Encina in hope for first win

Still OFFICIALLY seeking their first victory, the Christian Brother's Falcons take on the Encina Apaches tonight at 8:00 at El Camino Stadium.

The Falcons 0-1-1 after an opening game 16-16 tie with El Camino and a 7-0 loss to Mira Loma last week will be facing the 1-1 Apaches whose latest affair was a 21-6 loss to Yuba City, who the Falcons measured in a pre-season scrimmage.

If Brothers third successive Capital Valley Conference opponent is anything like the first two, then the game could turn out to be quite a struggle as was the case last year when the Falcons ground out a 20-13 victory.

The Falcons again opened the season with rival El Camino and the two metropolitan area football giants battled to a 16-16 tie before 2,700 fans at McArthur Field. The Falcon's appeared to have won the game at the end of the third quarter when kicker Joe Medina booted a 25 yard field goal. But a mix-up by the referees caused Brothers' to boot again, this one wide and apparent victory had been snatched away.

The Falcon's next opponents were the Mira Loma Matadors
