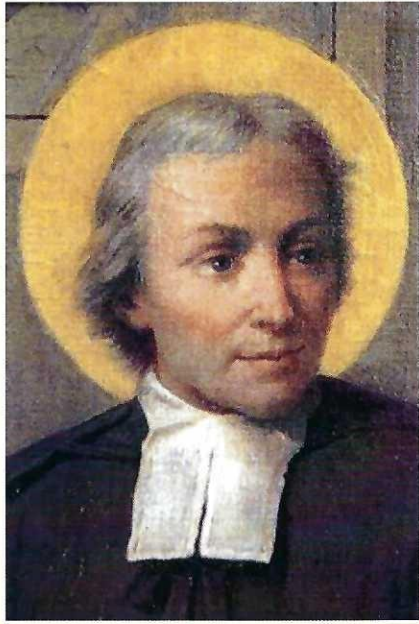

## *Christian Brothers High School Yesterday and Today*

Take a walk on the Christian Brothers High School campus and the feeling of community among the students, teachers and staff is palpable. In its 148 years in Sacramento, this venerable high school has changed its location three times and been known by six different names. What remains unchanged is the inimitable spirit—the Lasallian spirit and tradition of teaching and caring for young people in a community steadfastly dedicated to the intellectual growth and spiritual well-being of its students.

This rich tradition of Lasallian education dates back to 1680 when St. John Baptist de La Salle, a prominent French priest, founded the Brothers of the Christian Schools “to give a human and Christian education to the young, especially the poor and working class.” De La Salle transformed education by forming a community of educators with whom he developed a spirituality of teaching and learning. In 1876, the De La Salle Christian Brothers and members of the Catholic community brought that legacy to the Sacramento valley establishing the St. Patrick Institute at 12th and K streets, evolving into what is now Christian Brothers High School. Lasallian Education centers on Catholic values and personal relationships, emphasizing academic excellence, faith formation, respect for the individual, service and social justice. A Lasallian Education strives to enrich each student’s cultural, intellectual, physical, social and spiritual development.

In 1956, when the doors first opened to the current campus, just over 500 young men and women joined together to launch the area’s first co-institutional Catholic high school – Bishop Armstrong High School. Today, more than 1,100 young men and women enter its doors each day and each, in his or her own way, continues the legacy of learning and service that are at the very heart of a Christian Brothers High School education.

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## FOOTBALL 1983

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The 1983 Christian Brothers Falcons football team, with Head Coach Jeff Tisdel '74 at the helm, achieved the greatest season in school history. Not only did they win the AAA Sac Joaquin Section Championship by prevailing through a four-game playoff gauntlet that pitted them against the Sacramento region's toughest competition, but in doing so they finished with the best record ever at 13-1. For those directly involved or along for the emotional 14-week ride, it was a season to remember.

The Falcons started the season ranked #1 with their nemesis and Metro League rival, Cordova Lancers ranked #2. Given their recent head-to-head history, the Sacramento Bee and Sacramento Union billed this annual match-up as Sacramento's best rivalry, and their coverage looked forward to their Week 6 tilt.

In the build-up, CB dispatched of El Camino, Valley, Burbank, Johnson, and Jesuit (in a Holy Bowl rout of 31-14) and arrived at Week 6, like Cordova, at 5-0. After much media hype, 7,500 filled ARC Stadium to see Cordova win a close one, 28-20. For CB, it was a disappointing loss but, like with any good play, this mid-season setback set the stage for their dramatic Act Two.

Upon knocking-off Kennedy, Nevada Union, McClatchy, and Sac High, CB finished the regular season for the second straight year at 9-1 and in 2nd place in the Metro League to the 10-0 Lancers. However, unlike in 1982 when the Capitol City playoffs were reserved for 4 teams with one wild card entry (which the '82 Falcons literally lost on a coin flip with Elk Grove), the 1983 playoffs were expanded to 8 games. This new format gave CB, as a 2nd place team, a chance for redemption.

After CB defeated Bella Vista in the first round, the Falcons, the media, and high school football fans got what they wanted; a rematch with #1 ranked Cordova. And on a glorious, fall, Saturday afternoon, the estimated 8,500 people who filled Cordova Stadium witnessed a historic playoff beatdown! CB led 27-0 at halftime, finished with the same score, but it didn't even feel that close. When one considers all the history and elevated elements that factored into that game, the lopsided result may have been the greatest, certainly the most satisfying, victory in CB football history.

The march to the section title continued the following week on a crisp Friday night as CB faced Grant in Grant Stadium for the Capitol City Championship. Before another fun, full house of Southside meets Northside, CB dominated in an exciting game, 29-14.

After these consecutive, emotional wins, CB faced Vintage of Napa for the section championship at Hughes Stadium. In a tight, defensive battle, CB won in a manner emblematic of a complete team as Steve Barros kicked a field goal in OT to win 15-12!

Post-season, All-City First Team honors included DE Keilan Matthews, DT John Foster, OT Carl Jablonsky, and the Player of the Year, RB Vince Delgado as he set a state single-season rushing record of 2,357 yards.

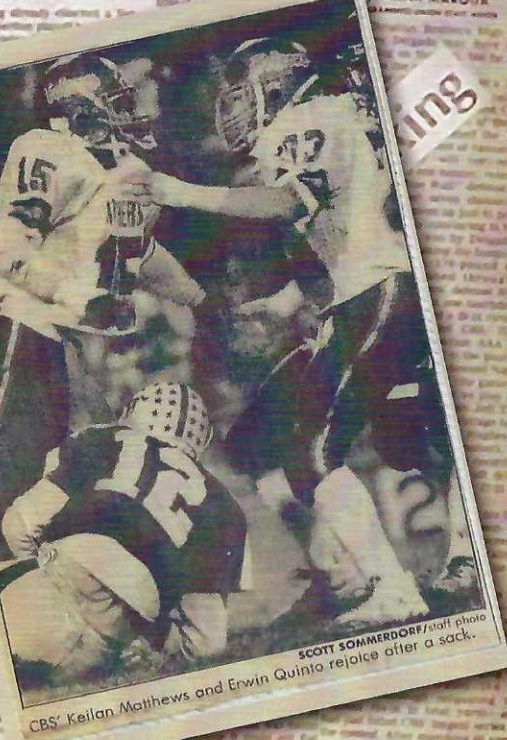

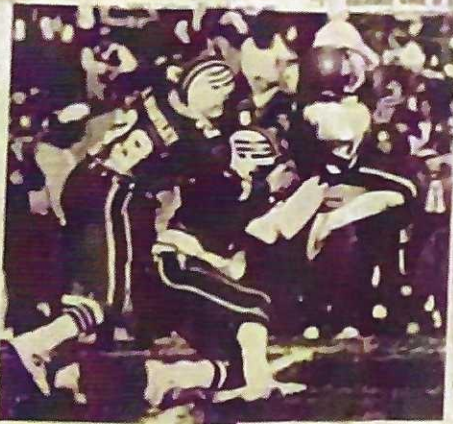

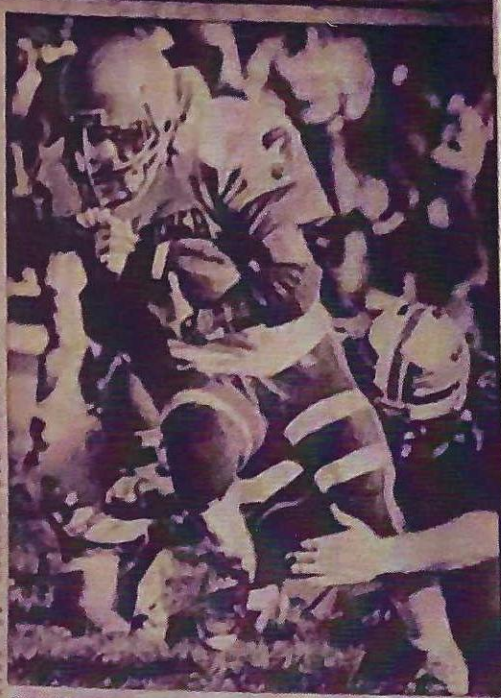

## Christian Brothers powers past Burbank

While Falcons look forward to Cordova, Titans still entertain playoff hopes

Jerry Lee, his team the victim of its own inexperience and a murderous schedule, has an upbeat way of looking at things. So does Jeff Tisdell, but the two Metro League coaches are coming from different ends of the spectrum. "We just can't help but get better," said Lee after his Burbank High School football team dropped its fourth decision of the season Friday, losing to Christian Brothers 45-6.

### Inside Prep Football

While he didn't say it in so many words, Lee would simply like to get past Friday's game with Cordova with his junior-dominated team in one piece — physically and mentally — and then concentrate on beating the rest of the Metro League schools. "Our goal is to finish in the top three and make the playoffs," he said. "We can be very competitive with the city schools."

"Traditionally, we're a slow-starting team." The Titans were simply outclassed by Christian Brothers Friday night at American River College. Tisdell's top-rated Falcons, coming off a tough 19-13 win over Valley, came at Burbank with their wings flapping.

Leading the way was Rob Quintero. Those who thought that all a Christian Brothers quarterback has to do is hand the ball off to Vince Delgado, Matthews or Danny Soto were surprised. Quintero can throw. He connected on 8 of 12 passes for 124 yards and two touchdowns. The first came on a 12-yard strike to Quinto with 10:52 left in a period, giving Christian B a 20-0 lead. His second score was much more spectacular.

Christian Brothers, which touchdowns on five of its possessions, was frustratingly add points to its 28-0 lead in 1 seconds of the first half. Christian B threw incomplete as the half on a procedure penalty against B gave the Falcons one more shot on the Titan 26-yard line.

With the clocking showing Quintero lofted a pass to the left of the end zone. The ball appeared to be overthrown but wide receiver Omoin stretched all of his 5-ft-150-pound frame parallel to the turf and somehow came down with the ball for a touchdown.

"It was a nice throw but it was even better catch," said Tisdell. "That was a fantastic catch."

Tisdell's Falcons were rated No. 1 in the Sacramento area before the season began and have occupied the top spot through the first four weeks of play. Everyone expected Christian Brothers to be formidable, Tisdell included.

But even the coach is mildly surprised by Quintero.

"I didn't know if our passing game would be this effective," said Tisdell. "Quintero is throwing the ball exceptionally well."

"It isn't that surprising because he's

always had a great arm. Rob just lacked experience because he didn't get much time last year."

The Falcon ground game was typically potent, led on by Quintero's opening drive Friday, when the Falcons mercilessly marched 75 yards in less than five minutes for a quick 7-0 lead.

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Lancers, while 4-0, appear to be a bit down this year, with narrow wins over Vacaville and McClatchy.

"Tisdell doesn't think his team will be looking past Friday's game with Hiram Johnson. Well, not much.

"Naturally they'll be thinking ahead a little bit," said Tisdell. "I think they know they have to concentrate. Another game may be more important later, but now this is the most important game of the season."

Burbank has faced Davis, Nevada Union and Christian Brothers during the first month of the season and Lee has no doubts about which club is the strongest.

"There's no way Davis or Nevada Union is as strong," Lee said. "Christian Brothers is a real good ballclub."

"Without a doubt, we're a good football team," said Tisdell. Then he allowed himself to think ahead to Cordova.

"I think we'll be peaking at the right time."

Sideline notes: Tisdell was very impressed with the play of his defensive line. "Three of the four — John Havey, John Foster and Carl Jablonsky — played exceptional games," he said.

Johnson is coming off a 26-18 non-league win over Downey Friday in which Warrior fullback Bob Dawson rushed for an incredible 100 yards.

## Sandoval Picks CBS To Win AAA Semifinal

What better authority could there be to analyze Friday night's Sacramento Section AAA semifinal — unofficially the city championship — between CBS and Grant?

Sandoval felt the wrath of both and talks about which is the better team.

"Christian Brothers is as solid a high school football team as I've ever seen," said Sandoval, whose Lions lost to CBS 26-7. "Everybody was so surprised when they beat Cordova (27-6). I wasn't. I thought that would be the score the first time they played."

"They've got so much talent I told CBS Coach Jeff Tisdell that if he lost one game he ought to quit."

THAT DOESN'T sound very promising for the Packers, the Capital Athletic League champs who beat McClatchy last week in the quarterfinals 28-6.

"But don't count Grant out though," cautioned Sandoval. "CBS' backfield had the stats and got the most ink, but Grant has a more diversified offense. You total up your yards and they're right there."

Sandoval was asked what each team would have to do to win.

First Grant. "Grant needs a dry field. The weather has to hold," said Sandoval. "They rely on quickness. CBS will get the initial hit, but Grant is quick enough to come back. They react fast enough to compensate for mistakes. They're a well-disciplined, well-coached football team that needs good footing to be successful."

"I don't think Grant can control the football against CBS. (Broad St.) Sandoval is a quality quarterback. I can see Grant hitting the big plays. And they'll see it."

THEN CBS. "Christian Brothers has to run right at them," said Sandoval. "Grant is too quick to run outside on them."

Whoever makes the finals, it will draw a big crowd and we want to accommodate as many people as possible."

The capacity at Hughes is 22,333, compared to Herzel Field's 2,500.

PETER PELLE, El Camino's two-time All-Metro halfback, has been selected to play on the U.S. National Youth Soccer Team that will compete in the Granatkin Tournament in Leningrad, Russia, Jan. 3-14.

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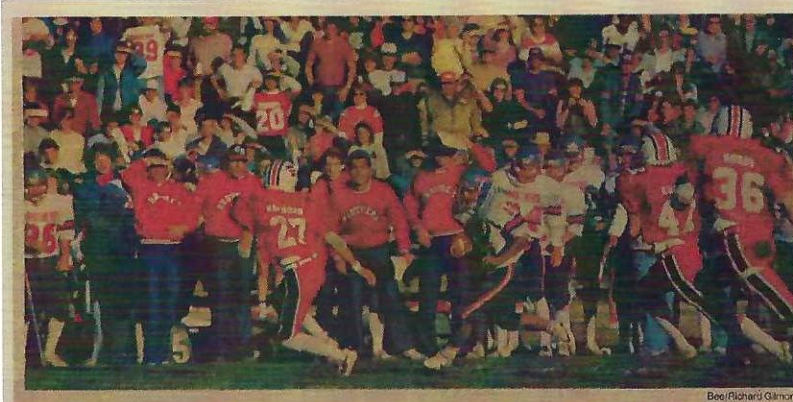

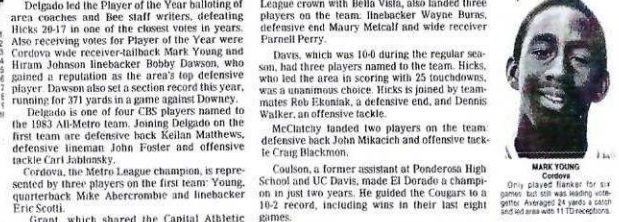

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## Soccer 1982

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Fans of sport appreciate witnessing triumph after trial, victory after years of close-but-no-cigar defeat. As an example of this, the CB Athletic Hall of Fame would not be complete without the inclusion of their 1982 soccer team. Seven years after Pele sparked the American soccer boom in 1975, every high school had established soccer programs. Led by the incomparable Father Michael Carroll and returning nine starters from the 1981 Metro League co-champions and a 3rd place finish in the Tournament of Champions, the 1982 team was on a mission to win it all for the first time in CB history. And they delivered!

CB easily won the deep Metro League going 8-0-2 displaying a high-powered offense and a steel curtain defense with an astounding 30 goals for and only 4 goals against in league play. They thus not only qualified for a return to the TOC but did so as the #2 seed.

In high school soccer, the post-season Tournament of Champions is truly that: 10 league champions and 6 second place selections in the vast Sac Joaquin Section vying for an ultimate champion. En route to the crown, the Falcons dispatched Ripon Christian 4-0, 8th ranked Folsom 3-0, 3rd ranked El Camino 4-1, and, lastly, #1 Del Campo 3-1 in the title game. This was a dominant TOC run as CB scored 14 goals for and only 2 goals against!

To put in context the dominance of the '82 Falcons, Del Campo was 18-2 on the season. Both of their losses came to CB on neutral fields by a cumulative score of 8-2. CB finished the season going undefeated with a 17-0-4 record. It would be 25 years before another team went undefeated in the top division of boys' soccer in the Sac Joaquin Section.

At season's end, the Sacramento Bee named four Falcons to their All-Metro First Team: forward Dave Bristol (also chosen as the Bee's Player of the Year), defender Jerry Lyerly, defender Steve Moore, and mid-fielder Danny Landenberger.

Which brings us to Father Mike Carroll. Not only was he chosen by the Bee as Coach of the Year in 1982 (and previously in 1980), but one could make the argument he is the most successful coach in the storied history of Christian Brothers athletics. Starting in 1976, his team qualified for the TOC in just his second year and returned for 6 consecutive seasons. In that span, CB finished 3rd in the TOC four times, was runner-up once after losing in heartbreak fashion on penalty kicks, and, ultimately, a champion. Overall, in his on/off/on, 13-year tenure as CB soccer head coach, Father Carroll's teams won 10 Metro League titles, made 12 TOC's and had (of what is known) a record of 148-19-20!

But what Father Carroll has accomplished on the soccer sidelines pales in comparison to the impact he has made on students as a teacher and priest at CB, and as a pastor for the congregations of St. John Vianney, Presentation, and St. Joseph's in Auburn. He is beloved by those who have had the privilege of getting to know or interact with him.

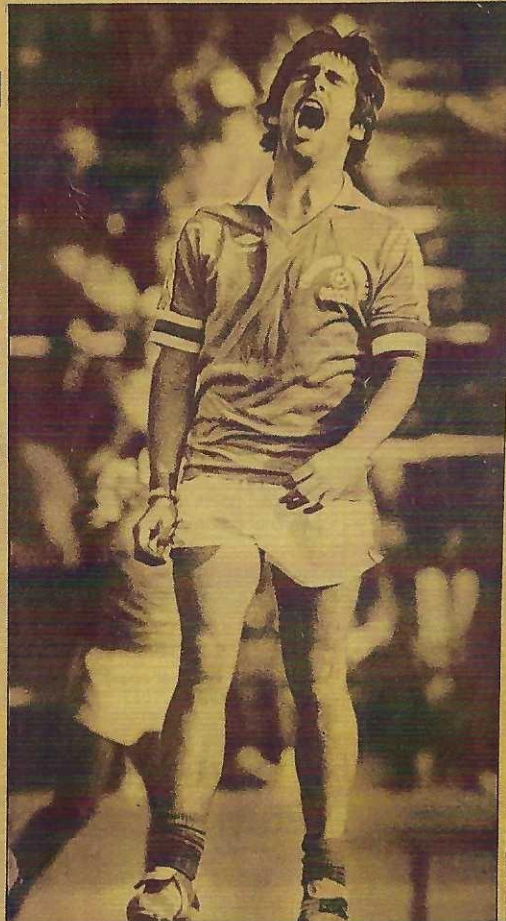
CBS, which has been on top of the rankings the entire season, finished the season as the only unbeaten team in the Sacramento area with a 17-0-4 record.

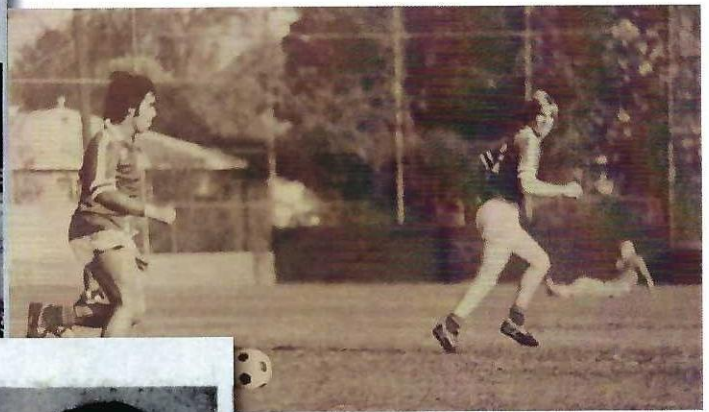

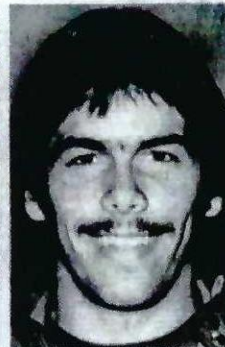

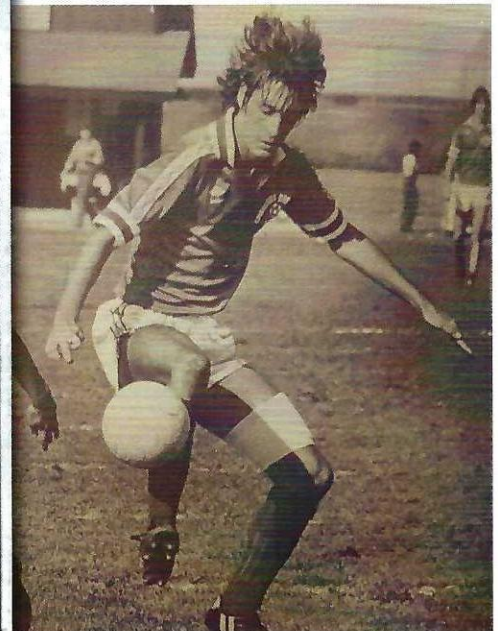
The Falcons, seeded second in the tournament, simply outclassed the Southern League (Modesto area) champions.

# Falcons New Soccer Kings

After five consecutive trips to the Sac-Joaquin Section prep soccer playoffs and nothing but runners-up certificates, Christian Brothers High won the gold medallion Saturday.

The Falcons' 3-1 victory over Del Campo captured the section crown in front of nearly 1,500 spectators on a scarred but dry Abbott Field.

After handing the top-ranked Cougars their only loss in the regular season, CBS was aware that Del Campo would have extra motivation in the rematch. The Falcons, 18-0-4, planned to offset that edge by attacking from all angles.

Striker Dave Bristol booted in the Falcons' first goal at 1:32 off an Edgar Chavez corner kick. Danny Landenberger dribbled from midfield, eluded two defenders and fired in the winning goal past goalkeeper Chris Remy at 40:50.

"We wanted to start quick," said No. 2-seeded CBS Coach Father Michael Carroll. "We played stronger once we were ahead."

"We play in spurts. Fortunately, the spurts came at the right time."

Shots-on-goal were almost equal in number (DC 13-12), but the Fal-

cons' had a better shot selection. Del Campo, harassed by outstanding defensive play by fullbacks Steve Moore, Jerry Lyerly and Scott Moore, was forced to adopt a long-range attack. Goalkeeper Joel Rosales was seldom tested.

"They wanted to play on the half," said Gary Summerhays, Del Campo's second loss of the season.

# Reverend's flock roams the soccer fields

He preaches forgiveness and compassion on Sundays, his Irish brogue sounding musical to parishioners at St. John Vianney Roman Catholic Church in Rancho Cordova. On weekdays, when the Rev. Mike Carroll coaches the Christian Brothers High School soccer team, his message, while not completely diametric, isn't so forgiving.

"He sure doesn't act like a priest on the sidelines," said Kenny Ablog, the high-scoring CBS center forward. "He's always telling us, 'Have no mercy on the (goal)keeper.'"

Carroll's soccer teams have followed his advice. He took over a mediocre CBS team in 1976 and the wins came in increasing numbers each fall, culminating in a Sac-Joaquin Section title in 1982. Twice he was selected

The Bee's Coach of the Year.

A club player who learned the game as a youth on the verdant fields of Cork, Ireland, Carroll resigned following the 1982 championship season. No sooner had he guided the Falcons to the mountaintop than he disappeared over the other side.

He asked for, and was granted, a sabbatical from the priesthood. He resigned his teaching position at Christian Brothers and took a job with the Sacramento County juvenile hall. Carroll handed the soccer reins over to Dave Kelly, a close friend who was coaching at Valley High School.

"I was glad they got an Irish guy to do it," Carroll said. "You give a jockey your horse, you want him to win the damned race."

The Falcons stayed ahead of the pack during Carroll's absence, winning two section titles in two seasons under Kelly. But Kelly had

to resign after opening his own insurance office and Carroll took his place.

Ablog, the only member of this year's team who played for Carroll in 1982, notices a difference in his coach.

"He's more gang-bro," Ablog said. "He's harder than I remember him being. He sort of scares us into doing what he wants us to do. Kelly was a nicer guy, but I think Father Carroll is what this team needs."

A visor shading his pale Irish complexion from the sun, he is economical with his directives, and his players listen closely. Their only confusion stems from whether to call him 'Coach' or 'Father.' They use both.

"I'm only disappointed when we lose to a team of lesser ability," Carroll said. "I feel something is wrong when I can't get the best out of the kids."

That's a considerable burden to shoulder,

both for the coach and his players, considering the Falcons are favored to win the section title again this year. But Carroll, 37, has wrestled with, and defeated, heavier burdens in his lifetime.

Carroll's youth was not filled with dreams of becoming a priest. It was not until his father died, 20 years ago, that Carroll realized the depth of his religious beliefs.

"I wanted to do something with my life," Carroll said. "My dad had gone to church every morning. He was the kind of guy who always sat in the last pew, but he was there. Not many people knew that side of him."

"When you kneel next to someone every morning, you feel it. I started wondering why an ordinary guy couldn't become a priest."

Carroll was ordained in 1972, the same

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# BASEBALL 1962

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## 1962 Bishop Armstrong Baseball Team

The story of the 1962 Bishop Armstrong baseball team cannot be fully appreciated within the short confines of tonight's program. For a very enjoyable retelling of their magical spring season, CBHS encourages you to visit their memory lane site, [cbarchives.org](http://cbarchives.org). Set the cursors for the school year 1961-1962 and read 'Flying High with the '62 Falcons: When Bishop Armstrong's Diamond Nine Dominated Northern California.' Written by Rick Cabral '70 (a stand-out quarterback in his day), it's a fond recount of this remarkable team that would finish the season 22-2 and later be recognized by Cal-Hi Sports as the State Team of the Year and their coach, Dick Sperbeck, as State Coach of the Year!

Rick writes, "When old time baseball people reminisce about the best high school baseball teams ever to play in Sacramento, the 1962 Bishop Armstrong team frequently springs to the top of the list. Six players from the squad made All-City, including the area's batting leader and two of the top pitchers. The Sacramento Chamber of Commerce awarded its annual 'Hall of Fame' award to one Falcon (Mike Green), designating him as the best baseball player in the area two consecutive years."

"While assembling its dominating 22-2 record, the Falcons beat four conference champions. They beat all comers, beat them soundly, and snuck by others when necessary. But what remains from that impressive season are the memories of a group of ballplayers who knew how to play the game the right way, without egos, and retain their tight kinship to this day." In those days, Coach Dick Sperbeck would transport his team in an old Army truck for practice and games to their home field at William Land Park's Diamond One, "the center of the Sacramento baseball world", and now known as Doc Oliver Field. Regarded as the best team in town when baseball was still king, Bishop Armstrong routinely played their home games before large crowds. Their only two losses came on the road and were narrow defeats to the '61 defending champion Lodi Flames and to the Stanford Cardinal frosh team where they battled at the plate against future Cy Young award winner, Jim Lonborg. The Falcons would later avenge their loss to Lodi in a thrilling extra inning win on Diamond One as Mike Green pitched 12 innings while striking out 20 batters in a 2-1 victory.

At season's end, Bishop Armstrong placed six players on both the Bee and Union All-City team, a feat not duplicated by any Sacramento team since! Pitcher Mike Green batted .416, had a 9-0 pitching record, a 0.28 ERA, and only allowed 3 earned runs in 75 innings. Pitcher and 2B Larry Marietti was also 9-0, batted .382 and led the area with 24 RBIs. OF Jim Fox led all area hitters at .482. Catcher Burt Bonomi was prolific at throwing-out

base stealers and hit .342. OF Gene Cervantes batted .367, and SS Doug Crawford hit .333. Rounding-out the entirely solid squad were Clark Aldrich, Bernie Church, Rich Elorduy, Carl Boyer, Joe Gill, John McCarthy and key reserve players, Glen Borges, Don Bradley, Mike Hauser, Ken Pierson, and Donn Pintar.

Said Joe Gill '63, future long-time CB baseball and basketball coach, "I was just happy to be on the team because there were some good players. I didn't realize at the time how many great athletes there were. I just wanted to go out and play."

Team sports have long seen amateur and professional teams loaded with talent not jell to achieve team success. But in the case of the amazing talent assembled on the '62 Bishop Armstrong baseball team, Cabral writes, "One of the secrets to Armstrong's success was team chemistry." Burt Bonomi remembers, "Everybody always got along. We all liked each other. And there were no egos." Larry Marietti sums up, "Not only as ballplayers, but we were all good friends. It was the camaraderie." Kudos to these Brothers Boys for their gold standard team success in CB baseball history and for the friendships forged on Diamond One that continue to this day.

## MAN in the BLACK HAT

### A Million Dreams Ago

The little fellow picked up a ball in the Cardinals' bull pen in St. Louis. His steps were short and springy. He might have been all the left-handers in the world preparing for pitching duty. About as big as 50 cents worth of beefsteak, his magnificent presence came from an innate mastery of his working craft. But for cruel fate he might be one of the great pitchers of this era.

Bobby Shantz was the American League's Most Valuable Player in 1952—or a million dreams ago—when he was 24 games for Connie Mack's Philadelphia A's. He was not for sale at any price, not even the \$300,000 Mr. Mack was offered. He was one of the best small pitchers of all time, and you'd have to go back to Little Dick Kerr and Lefty Claude Williams of the post-World War I White Sox to find any pitcher under five-eight who ever made it as big as Shantz had in 1952.

"I don't care what the roster says about the guy's size, he looks like Man Mountain Dean to me," said Yogi Berra of the 3-6, 142-pound pitcher.

"Anyone who says Shantz is small hasn't tried to hit against him," said Mickey Vernon, one of the A.L.'s top hitters, after a fruitless afternoon of swinging at Shantz' pitches.

Although the testimonials were plentiful around the league, they could not off the completely disappointing season of 1952.

Bishop Armstrong Falcons won 22 games and lost only two this season, had two players hit over .400, six over .300 and two pitchers who rang up shutouts with impressive ease.

For this reason, the Falcons placed an unprecedented six players on the Union's 1962 All-city baseball team. Bristling with power and speed and abounding with a wealth of outstanding pitchers, the team in its entirety could probably be rated as one of the area's strongest ever.

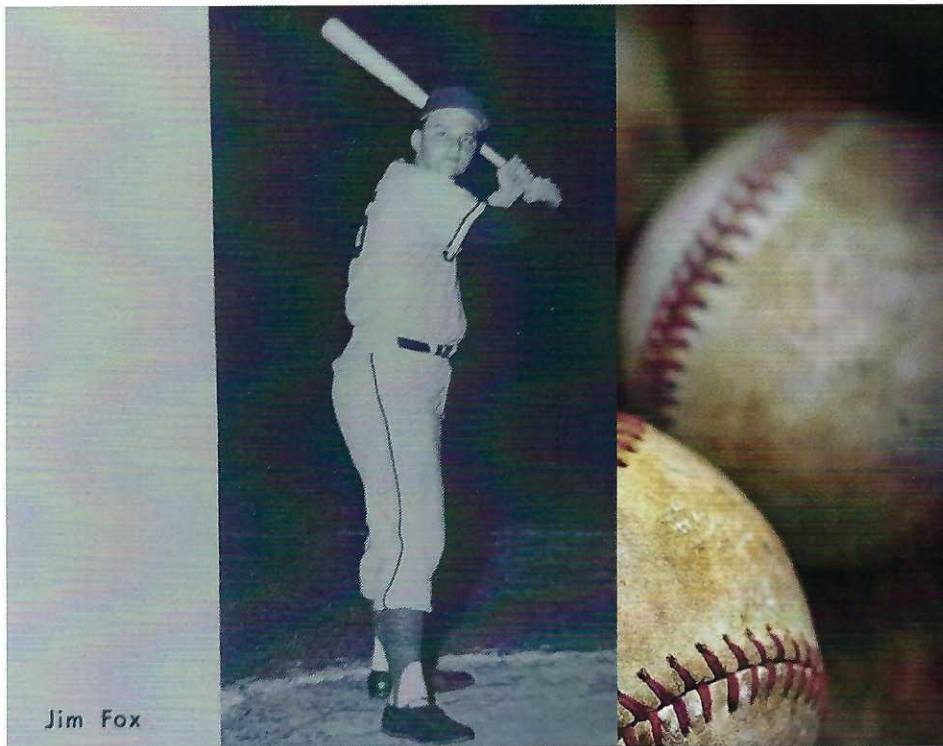

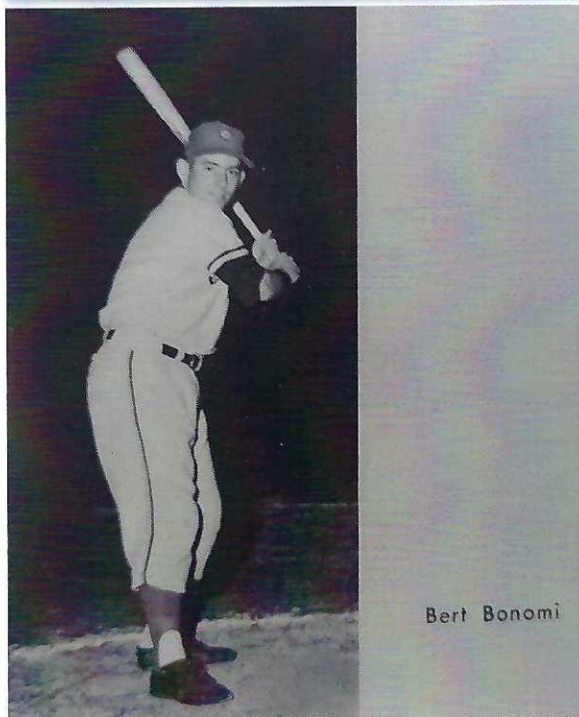

## Green Hurls Falcon Win

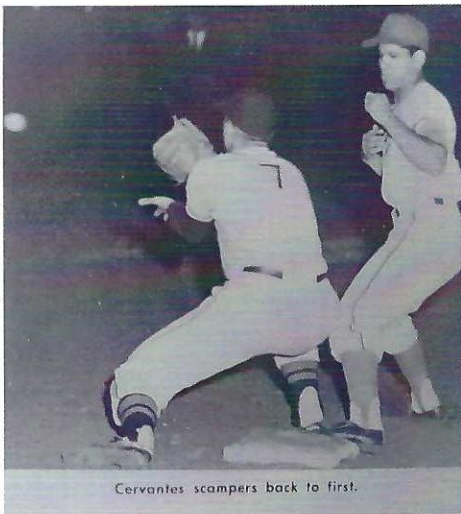

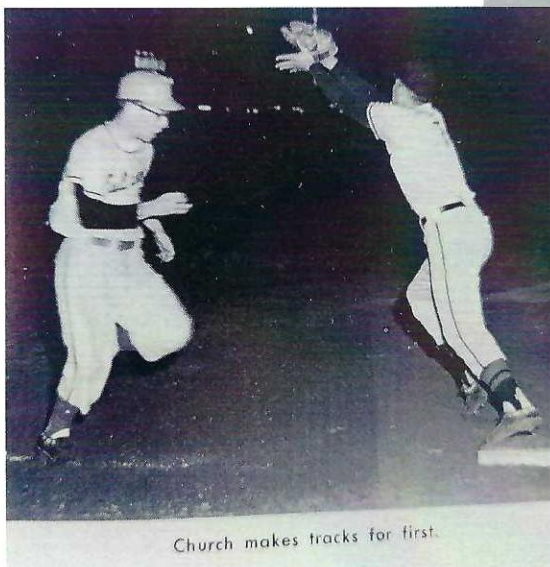

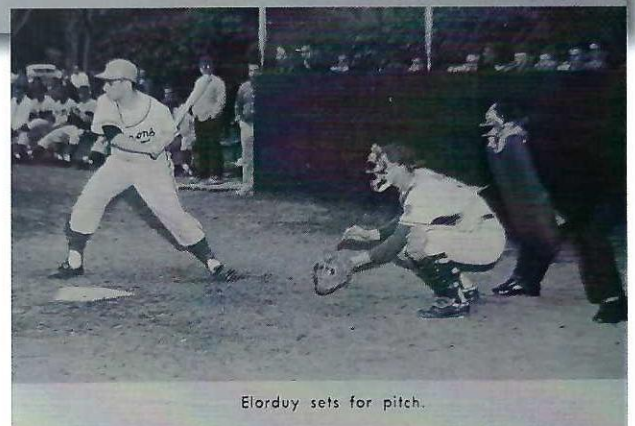
