

# Christian Brothers High School Yesterday and Today

Take a walk on the Christian Brothers High School campus and the feeling of community among the students, teachers and staff is palpable. In its 148 years in Sacramento, this venerable high school has changed its location three times and been known by six different names. What remains unchanged is the inimitable spirit—the Lasallian spirit and tradition of teaching and caring for young people in a community steadfastly dedicated to the intellectual growth and spiritual well-being of its students.

This rich tradition of Lasallian education dates back to 1680 when St. John Baptist de La Salle, a prominent French priest, founded the Brothers of the Christian Schools "to give a human and Chris-tian education to the young, especially the poor and working class." De La Salle transformed educa-tion by forming a community of educators with whom he developed a spirituality of teaching and learning. In 1876, the De La Salle Christian Brothers and members of the Catholic community brought that legacy to the Sacramento valley establishing the St. Patrick Institute at 12th and K streets, evolving into what is now Christian Brothers High School. Lasallian Education centers on Catholic values and personal relationships, emphasizing academic excellence, faith formation, respect for the individual, service and social justice. A Lasallian Education strives to enrich each student's cultural, intellectual, physical, social and spiritual development.

In 1956, when the doors first opened to the current campus, just over 500 young men and women joined together to launch the area's first co-institutional Catholic high school – Bishop Armstrong High School. Today, more than 1,100 young men and women enter its doors each day and each, in his or her own way, continues the legacy of learning and service that are at the very heart of a Christian Brothers High School education.

## **FOOTBALL 1983**

The 1983 Christian Brothers Falcons football team, with Head Coach Jeff Tisdel '74 at the helm, achieved the greatest season in school history. Not only did they win the AAA Sac Joaquin Section Championship by prevailing through a four-game playoff gauntlet that pitted them against the Sacramento region's toughest competition, but in doing so they finished with the best record ever at 13-1. For those directly involved or along for the emotional 14-week ride, it was a season to remember.

The Falcons started the season ranked #1 with their nemesis and Metro League rival, Cordova Lancers ranked #2. Given their recent head-to-head history, the Sacramento Bee and Sacramento Union billed this annual match-up as Sacramento's best rivalry, and their coverage looked forward to their Week 6 tilt.

In the build-up, CB dispatched of El Camino, Valley, Burbank, Johnson, and Jesuit (in a Holy Bowl rout of 31-14) and arrived at Week 6, like Cordova, at 5-0. After much media hype, 7,500 filled ARC Stadium to see Cordova win a close one, 28-20. For CB, it was a disappointing loss but, like with any good play, this mid-season setback set the stage for their dramatic Act Two.

Upon knocking-off Kennedy, Nevada Union, McClatchy, and Sac High, CB finished the regular season for the second straight year at 9-1 and in 2nd place in the Metro League to the 10-0 Lancers. However, unlike in 1982 when the Capitol City playoffs were reserved for 4 teams with one wild card entry (which the '82 Falcons literally lost on a coin flip with Elk Grove), the 1983 playoffs were expanded to 8 games. This new format gave CB, as a 2nd place team, a chance for redemption.

After CB defeated Bella Vista in the first round, the Falcons, the media, and high school football fans got what they wanted; a rematch with #1 ranked Cordova. And on a glorious, fall, Saturday afternoon, the estimated 8,500 people who filled Cordova Stadium witnessed a historic playoff beatdown! CB led 27-0 at halftime, finished with the same score, but it didn't even feel that close. When one considers all the history and elevated elements that factored into that game, the lopsided result may have been the greatest, certainly the most satisfying, victory in CB football history.


The march to the section title continued the following week on a crisp Friday night as CB faced Grant in Grant Stadium for the Capitol City Championship. Before another fun, full house of Southside meets Northside, CB dominated in an exciting game, 29-14.

After these consecutive, emotional wins, CB faced Vintage of Napa for the section championship at Hughes Stadium. In a tight, defensive battle, CB won in a manner emblematic of a complete team as Steve Barros kicked a field goal in OT to win 15-12!

Post-season, All-City First Team honors included DE Keilan Matthews, DT John Foster, OT Carl Jablonsky, and the Player of the Year, RB Vince Delgado as he set a state single-season rushing record of 2,357 yards.





# **SOCCER 1982**

Fans of sport appreciate witnessing triumph after trial, victory after years of close-but-no-cigar defeat. As an example of this, the CB Athletic Hall of Fame would not be complete without the inclusion of their 1982 soccer team. Seven years after Pele sparked the American soccer boom in 1975, every high school had established soccer programs. Led by the incomparable Father Michael Carroll and returning nine starters from the 1981 Metro League co-champions and a 3rd place finish in the Tournament of Champions, the 1982 team was on a mission to win it all for the first time in CB history. And they delivered!

CB easily won the deep Metro League going 8-0-2 displaying a high-powered offense and a steel curtain defense with an astounding 30 goals for and only 4 goals against in league play. They thus not only qualified for a return to the TOC but did so as the #2 seed.

In high school soccer, the post-season Tournament of Champions is truly that: 10 league champions and 6 second place selections in the vast Sac Joaquin Section vying for an ultimate champion. En route to the crown, the Falcons dispatched Ripon Christian 4-0, 8th ranked Folsom 3-0, 3rd ranked El Camino 4-1, and, lastly, #1 Del Campo 3-1 in the title game. This was a dominant TOC run as CB scored 14 goals for and only 2 goals against!

To put in context the dominance of the '82 Falcons, Del Campo was 18-2 on the season. Both of their losses came to CB on neutral fields by a cumulative score of 8-2. CB finished the season going undefeated with a 17-0-4 record. It would be 25 years before another team went undefeated in the top division of boys' soccer in the Sac Joaquin Section.

At season's end, the Sacramento Bee named four Falcons to their All-Metro First Team: forward Dave Bristol (also chosen as the Bee's Player of the Year), defender Jerry Lyerly, defender Steve Moore, and mid-fielder Danny Landenberger.

Which brings us to Father Mike Carroll. Not only was he chosen by the Bee as Coach of the Year in 1982 (and previously in 1980), but one could make the argument he is the most successful coach in the storied history of Christian Brothers athletics. Starting in 1976, his team qualified for the TOC in just his second year and returned for 6 consecutive seasons. In that span, CB finished 3rd in the TOC four times, was runner-up once after losing in heartbreak fashion on penalty kicks, and, ultimately, a champion. Overall, in his on/off/on, 13-year tenure as CB soccer head coach, Father Carroll's teams won 10 Metro League titles, made 12 TOC's and had (of what is known) a record of 148-19-20!

But what Father Carroll has accomplished on the soccer sidelines pales in comparison to the impact he has made on students as a teacher and priest at CB, and as a pastor for the congregations of St. John Vianney, Presentation, and St. Joseph's in Auburn. He is beloved by those who have had the privilege of getting to know or interact with him.



# **BASEBALL 1962**

#### 1962 Bishop Armstrong Baseball Team

The story of the 1962 Bishop Armstrong baseball team cannot be fully appreciated within the short confines of tonight's program. For a very enjoyable retelling of their magical spring season, CBHS encourages you to visit their memory lane site, cbarchives.org. Set the cursors for the school year 1961-1962 and read 'Flying High with the '62 Falcons: When Bishop Armstrong's Diamond Nine Dominated Northern California.' Written by Rick Cabral '70 (a stand-out quarterback in his day), it's a fond recount of this remarkable team that would finish the season 22-2 and later be recognized by Cal-Hi Sports as the State Team of the Year and their coach, Dick Sperbeck, as State Coach of the Year!

Rick writes, "When old time baseball people reminisce about the best high school baseball teams ever to play in Sacramento, the 1962 Bishop Armstrong team frequently springs to the top of the list. Six players from the squad made All-City, including the area's batting leader and two of the top pitchers. The Sacramento Chamber of Commerce awarded its annual 'Hall of Fame' award to one Falcon (Mike Green), designating him as the best baseball player in the area two consecutive years."

"While assembling its dominating 22-2 record, the Falcons beat four conference champions. They beat all comers, beat them soundly, and snuck by others when necessary. But what remains from that impressive season are the memories of a group of ballplayers who knew how to play the game the right way, without egos, and retain their tight kinship to this day." In those days, Coach Dick Sperbeck would transport his team in an old Army truck for practice and games to their home field at William Land Park's Diamond One, "the center of the Sacramento baseball world", and now known as Doc Oliver Field. Regarded as the best team in town when baseball was still king, Bishop Armstrong routinely played their home games before large crowds. Their only two losses came on the road and were narrow defeats to the '61 defending champion Lodi Flames and to the Stanford Cardinal frosh team where they battled at the plate against future Cy Young award winner, Jim Lonborg. The Falcons would later avenge their loss to Lodi in a thrilling extra inning win on Diamond One as Mike Green pitched 12 innings while striking out 20 batters in a 2-1 victory.

At season's end, Bishop Armstrong placed six players on both the Bee and Union All-City team, a feat not duplicated by any Sacramento team since! Pitcher Mike Green batted .416, had a 9-0 pitching record, a 0.28 ERA, and only allowed 3 earned runs in 75 innings. Pitcher and 2B Larry Marietti was also 9-0, batted .382 and led the area with 24 RBIs. OF Jim Fox led all area hitters at .482. Catcher Burt Bonomi was prolific at throwing-out

base stealers and hit .342. OF Gene Cervantes batted .367, and SS Doug Crawford hit .333. Rounding-out the entirely solid squad were Clark Aldrich, Bernie Church, Rich Elorduy, Carl Boyer, Joe Gill, John McCarthy and key reserve players, Glen Borges, Don Bradley, Mike Hauser, Ken Pierson, and Donn Pintar.

Said Joe Gill '63, future long-time CB baseball and basketball coach, "I was just happy to be on the team because there were some good players. I didn't realize at the time how many great athletes there were. I just wanted to go out and play."

Team sports have long seen amateur and professional teams loaded with talent not jell to achieve team success. But in the case of the amazing talent assembled on the '62 Bishop Armstrong baseball team, Cabral writes, "One of the secrets to Armstrong's success was team chemistry." Burt Bonomi remembers, "Everybody always got along. We all liked each other. And there were no egos." Larry Marietti sums up, "Not only as ballplayers, but we were all good friends. It was the camaraderie." Kudos to these Brothers Boys for their gold standard team success in CB baseball history and for the friendships forged on Diamond One that continue to this day.


# Armstrong Shuts Out Dragons In Two Hit Game
