Chico is considered one of the better teams in the conference, which includes CBS, Chico, Reno, and Shasta High Schools.

### GAELS DOWN ROSEVILLE

## Twelve Hundred Students Attend Cathedral Mass

At least 1200 Catholic high school students filled the main naves of the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament Friday morning, September 24, at a Solemn High Mass in honor of the Holy Spirit. The impressive ceremonies, an event held annually to invoke the guidance of the Holy Spirit during the new school year, were attended by 550 boys from Christian Brothers School, a combined total of 600 girls from St. Francis High School and St. Joseph's Academy, and groups from the Catholic high schools in Grass Valley, Marysville, and Red Bluff. The crowd of students, teachers, parents, and friends came close to "packing" the

Cathedral.

## New ANNUAL At Old Price

The 1955 GAEL YEARBOOK drive for student body subscriptions began Monday of this week and will continue during most of October.

To meet the needs of the biggest enrollment in CBS history, the yearbook staff is faced with the job of raising \$2,000 to pay the costs of printing and binding the new annual.

"Without the backing of the student body, the yearbook just can't exist," said Editor Jim Keating this week. "We want to give the school the finest annual it has ever had. We need every student on the campus to give us his support."

Keating's staff includes Joe Gutierrez, associate editor; Tony Damiani, sports editor; Harry Frank and Don Terra, co-business managers; and a staff of art and feature writers.

There is no change in the yearbook price, the editor said. \$3.50 is the regular price; it is only \$3.00 if students subscribe during the current drive. Down-payment is \$1.50, with the balance of \$1.50 to be paid when the book comes off the press next spring.

Subscriptions are taken at the window opposite the bookstore during bookstore hours. Yearbook representatives also take orders during the activity period.

## Marine Reserve To Have CB Unit

Representatives of the U. S. Marine Corps came to Christian Brothers on Monday, Feb. 28. The groups consisted of Major Myron Lees (from 12th Marine District, San Francisco), Mr. Louis Barnhart, C.W.O., from Sacramento, Marine Corps Reserve Army, Sgt. Thomas McGehee (former student at CBS) and Sgt. John Quisenberry.

Major Lees, head spokesman for the group, explained just what a Marine Reserve Unit would offer to Brothers Students. The unit would consist of sixty-five students.

The reserves offer many vocational opportunities, vocational and ranks advancements. In vocational courses a reservist may attend regular Army and Air Force service and technical schools with pay. These schools offer over 450 courses, in rank you may rise as high in rank and position as your interest, ability and experience will take you.

The minimum age limit to join the reserve is 17, with parents consent, at the age of 18, you may enlist at will.

Meetings will be held in the Armory, at 2640 Front St. The reservist will receive \$2.66 a meeting.
