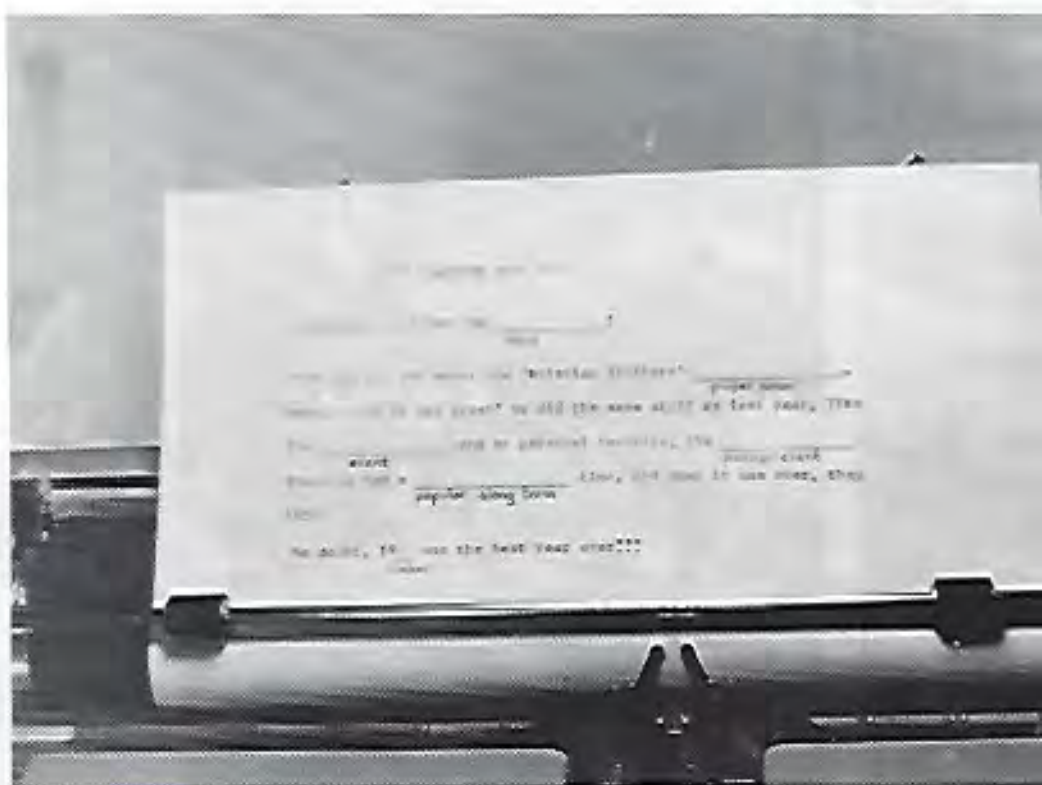

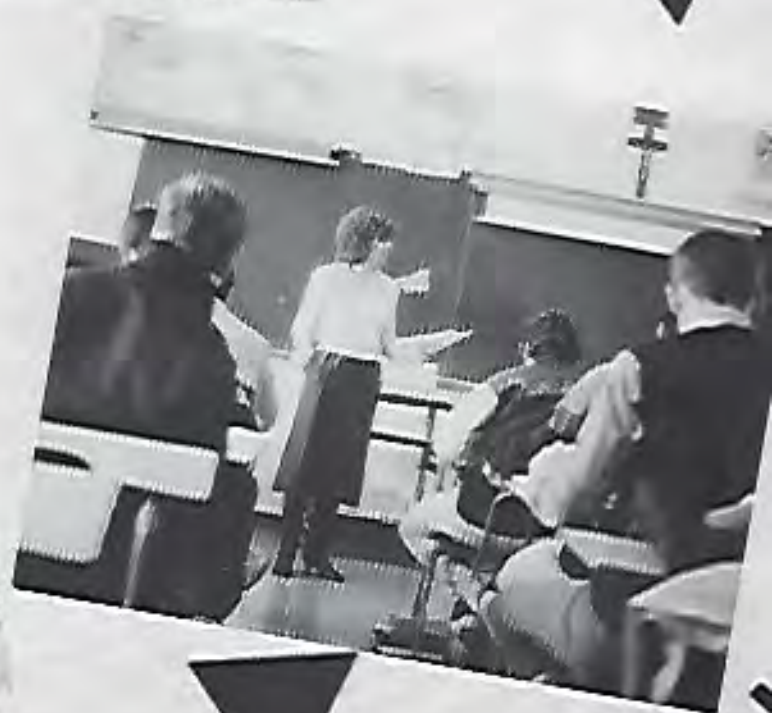

Social and American Studies

American Studies offers the students journeys into their American heritage. It challenges them with primary, often conflicting views of major events and eras and asks them not only to remember the past but also to make their own sense of it. In addition, students are invited to compare and contrast their studies with current social issues and themselves.

The themes of the course, both in literature and history, are common threads woven throughout the year. Freedom, order, power, justice, rights, responsibility, racism, peace, competition, sexism, and fears permeate each of the chronological units encountered by the students. Contemporary parallels such as depersonalization, McCarthyism, Watergate, civil rights, social justice, Vietnam, nuclear war, toxics, and Central America are interspersed throughout the year to help the students see that they share a common humanity with their ancestors. Hence, by studying the past the students are well prepared to make reasoned decisions in their world.

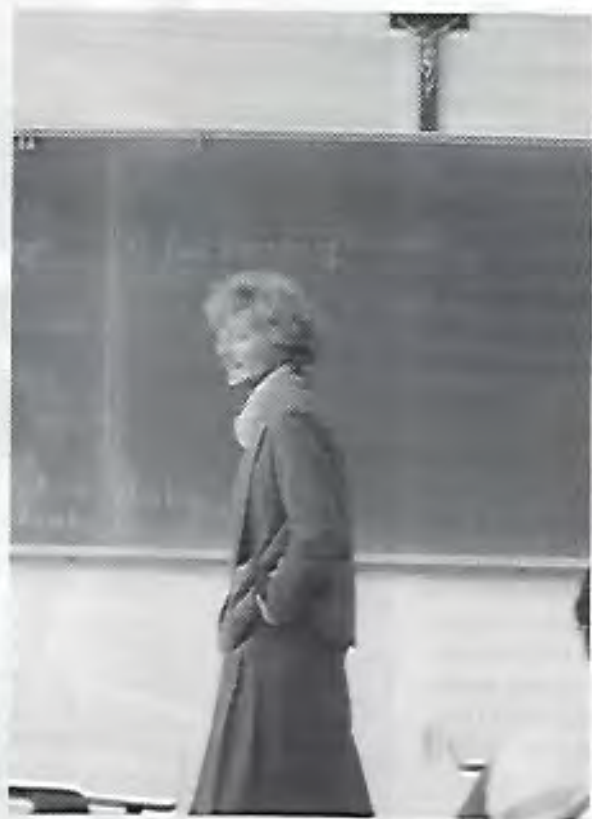

The ambitious nature of the Master Plan for Curriculum Development called upon all of the school's academic departments to reassess their programs this year. The English Department was no exception as it sought to strengthen its existing Grammar and Rhetoric program in the freshman year with the addition of Composition and Rhetoric in the sophomore year. Intent on offering a first-rate, comprehensive composition and literature program, the department felt that the addition afforded it an opportunity to continue and reinforce the skill areas begun in Grammar and Rhetoric. When the Master Plan extended the Religion, Social Studies, and English Departments the invitation to deviate from the integrated Humanities program of the past ten years, the opportunity arose to add further to the English program. Thus, with the 1985-86 school year, the English Department will begin formulation of composition programs for the junior and senior year as well as American and World Literature for the upper division.

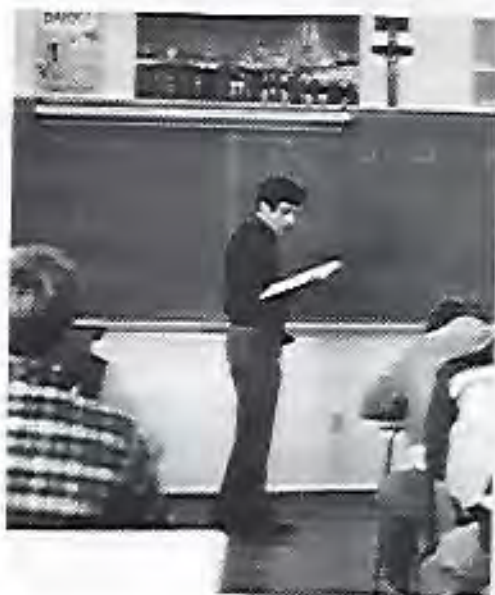
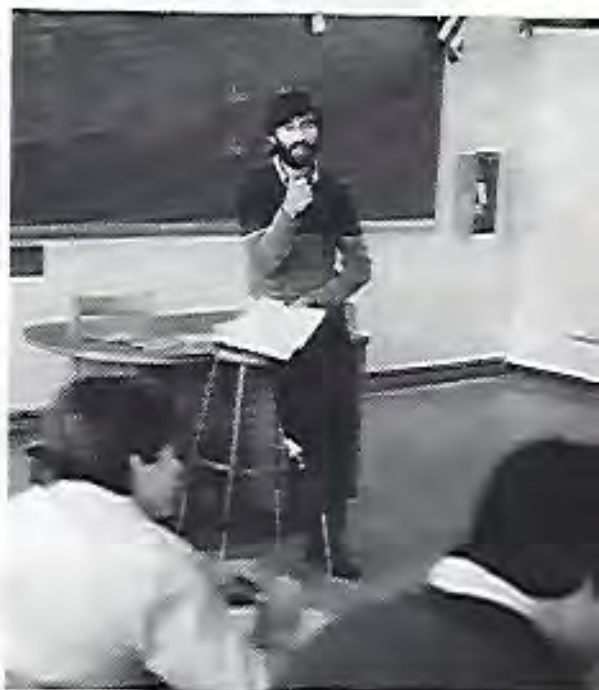

Foreign Language

The foreign language department at Christian Brothers offers a four year program in French, German, and Spanish. Starting in the 1985-86 year all students will be required to take at least two years of a single foreign language. In order to achieve a working facility in their chosen foreign language, students are strongly encouraged to continue their study in the third and fourth years. Programs are designed to benefit all students. There is a foreign language program for the remedial student and, if possible, an honors program for the most advanced students.

The department is also developing quality travel/study programs. For the last three years, Christian Brothers has maintained an annual exchange with the Fulinger Gymnasium in Cologne, West Germany. Each year at the end of the Fall semester, students travel to Germany for four weeks to live with a German family, attend classes, and do some touring. Likewise, a group of German students come to Christian Brothers for three weeks each Easter.

Humanities

Ten years ago a remarkably unique and innovative program was developed at Christian Brothers — lower division Humanities. This year marks the end of a decade of the programs work of helping develop the Christian Brothers student; this year also marks the end of the program, so it is only appropriate to reflect on the many and varied contributions of Humanities to the student's development.

Since its inception the Humanities program has taken into consideration the uniqueness of each individual student, and it attempts to balance the student's special, personal, emotional, and academic needs. The end result is a course which integrates the personal experiences of the student (rather than those of others), the student's critical thinking skills, and his creative skills with traditional academic materials.

Throughout this two year course the student is invited to participate in activities which tie the academic subjects of social science, religion, and literature with his personal experiences. The end result of the Humanities program is a student who has been actively involved in his own education as both teacher and student and a student, who is better able to understand the complex relationships which exist in our all too complex world.

The ability of the humanities program to integrate its various subjects is due to its emphasis on creativity and reasoning. The student is asked to be creative rather than study creative people. He is also nudged along the path to becoming a reasoning person. The student is not asked to memorize, but he is invited to become his own man, a man who is aware of the world around him, of its creator, and of himself.

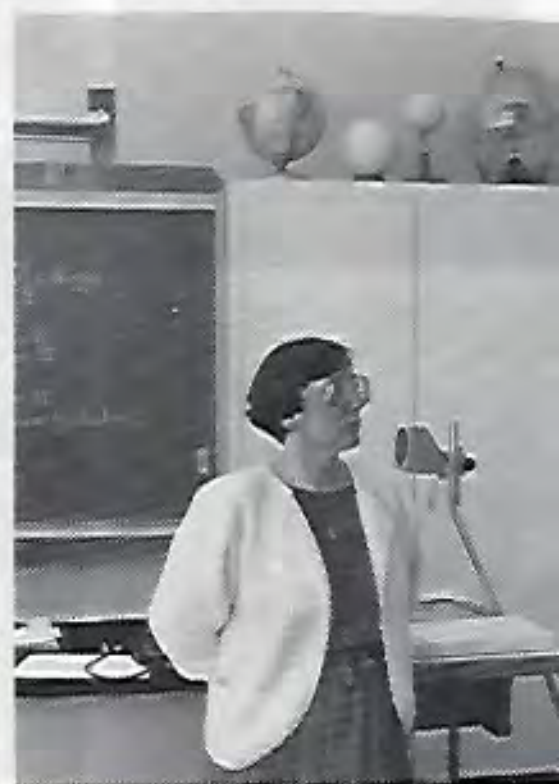

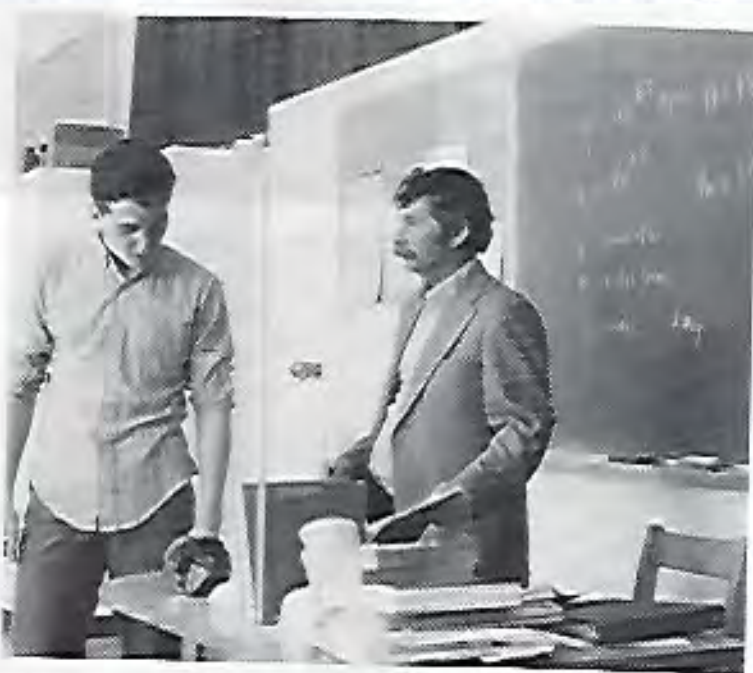

Religion

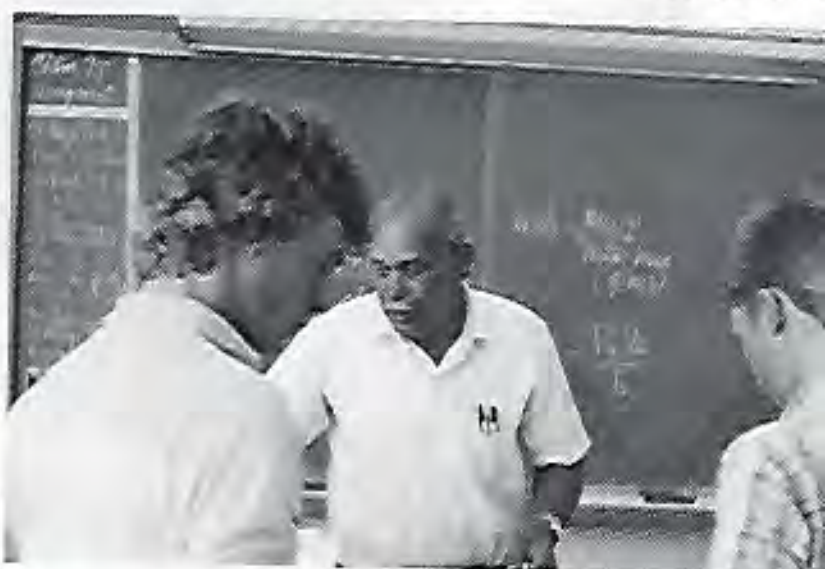

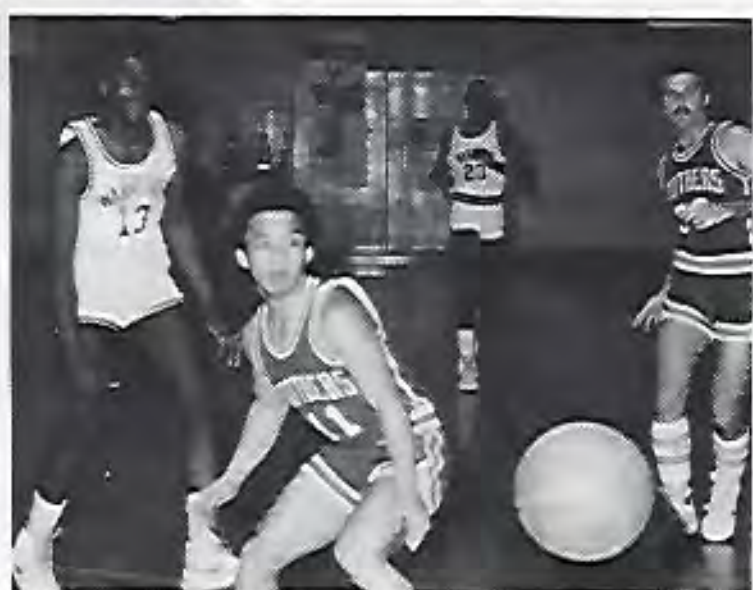
Varsity Gives A Fighting Try

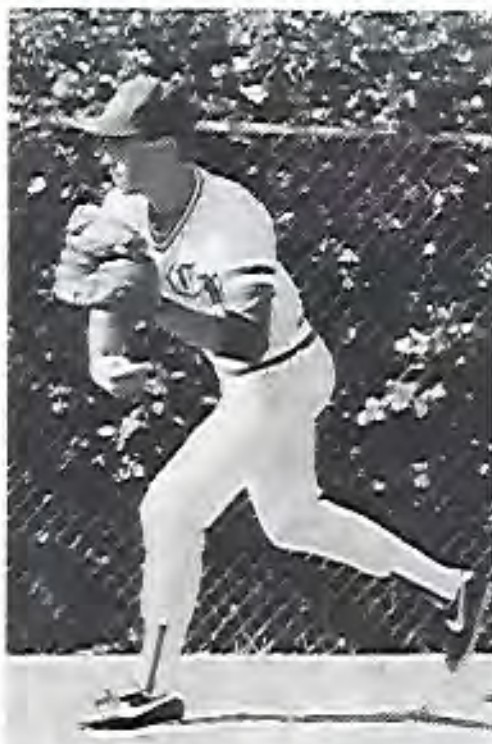

FROSH WIN IT ALL

The 1985 Freshman baseball team established a legacy of achievement that may well serve as the yardstick by which future Christian Brothers Freshman teams are measured. Enroute to a perfect 16-0 season, the team claimed the fifth consecutive Freshman Baseball League championship for C.B.S. The Falcons dominance of every opponent and out-scoring its opposition 105-19 in 8 metro league games. Of the 16 games, only two were one run victories.

Success was guaranteed by both the offensive and defensive phases of the Falcons game. Pitchers Pat Zalasky (voted the team's Most Improved player) and Cary Newton were virtually untouchable. Zalasky compiled a 0.58 earned run average while striking out 54 batters in 36 innings. In going 7-0, Zalasky allowed 19 hits, six walks, and three earned runs. Newton was 6-0, striking out 50 in 37 innings with a 1.3 E.R.A. Coaches Kevin Matheny and Ken Harris had much to be pleased about in their efforts to mold the Falcons into a team that could be a force in local high school circles for the next three years. Said Matheny, "Obviously, we had a wealth of talent to work with from the first to the sixteenth man. Anyone of our players could have been a key player for our opposition. A season such as this comes along once in a coaching lifetime. To taste perfection is something that we will be savoring for some years to come."

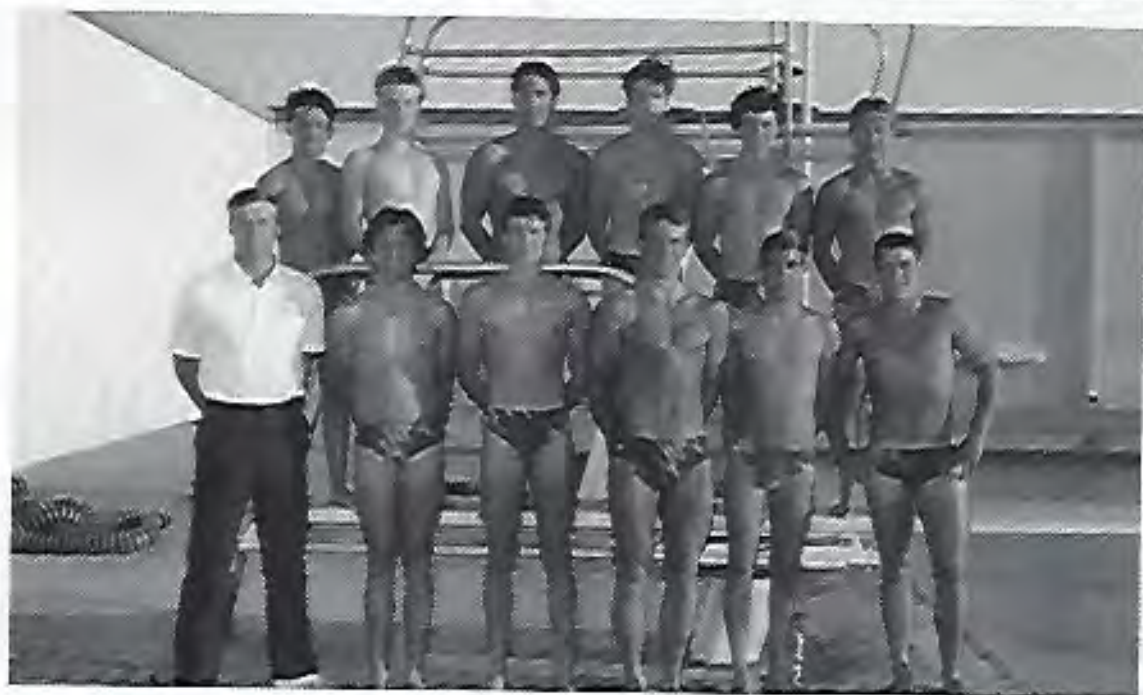

SWIMMING TAKES SECOND IN METRO

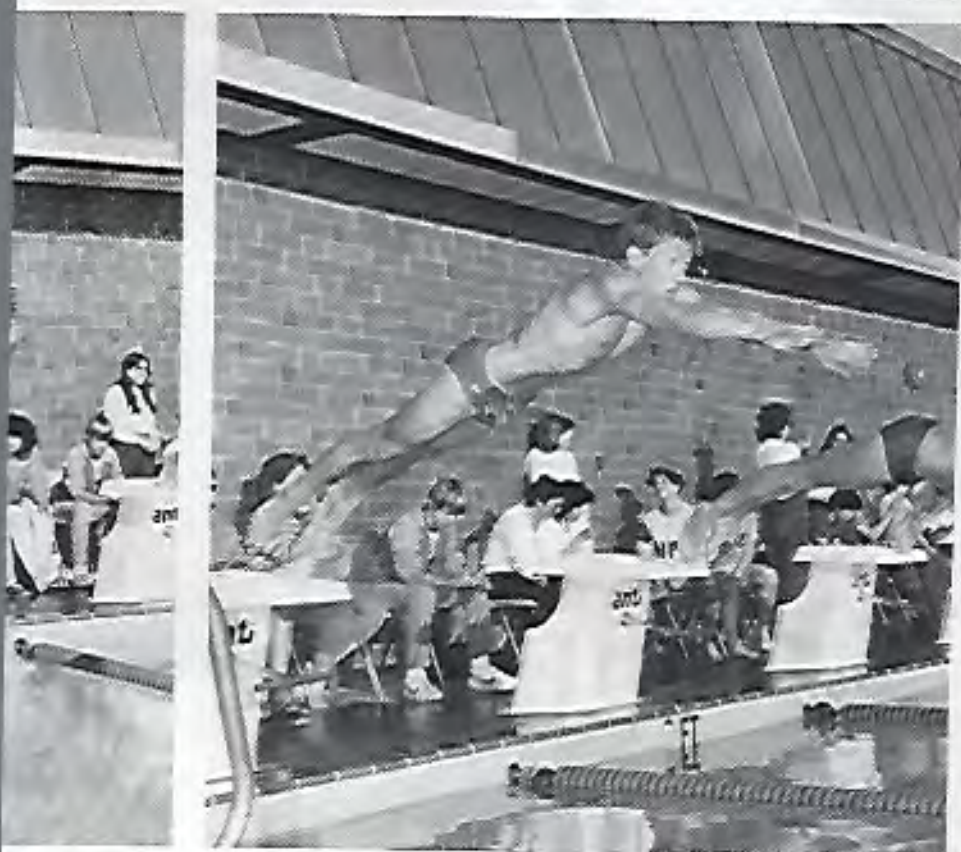

GOLF TEAM REGAINS METRO TITLE

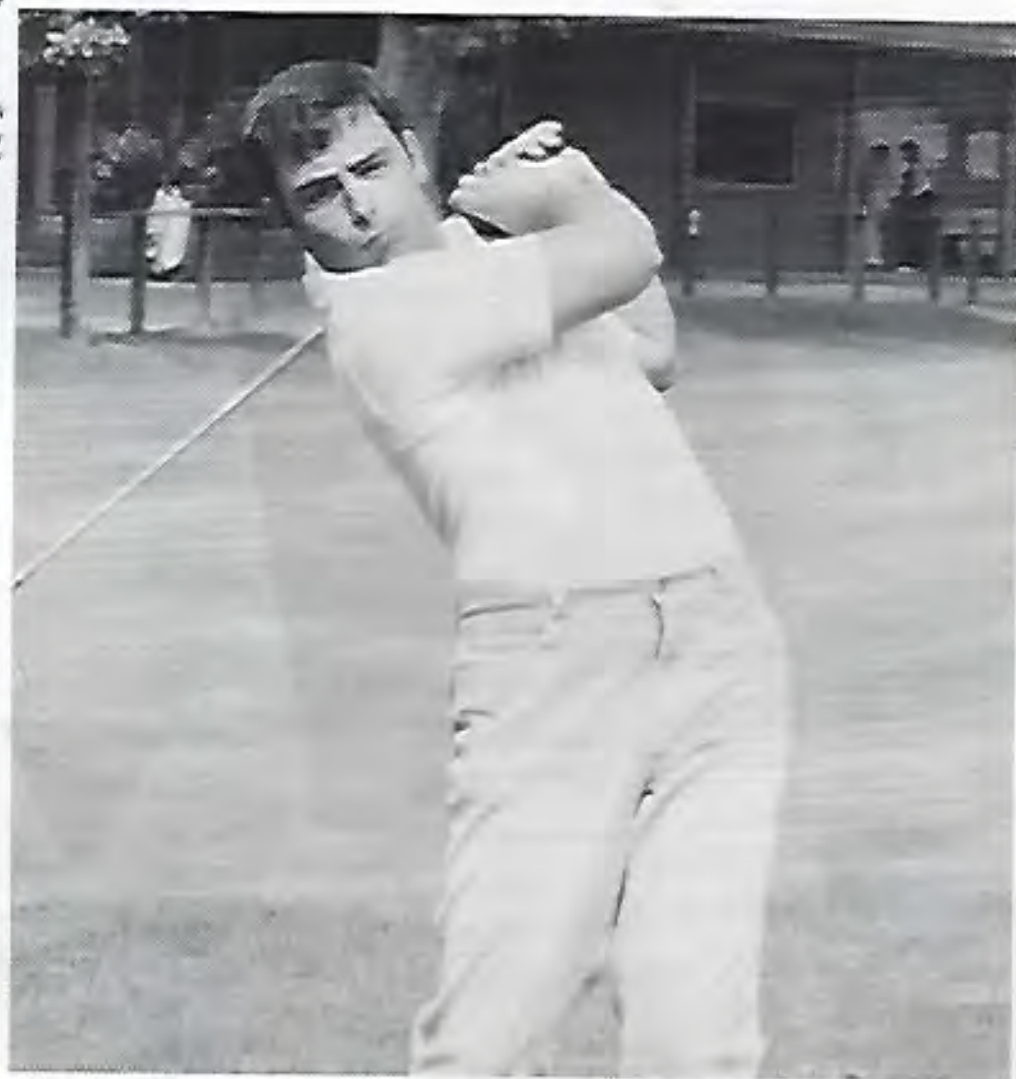

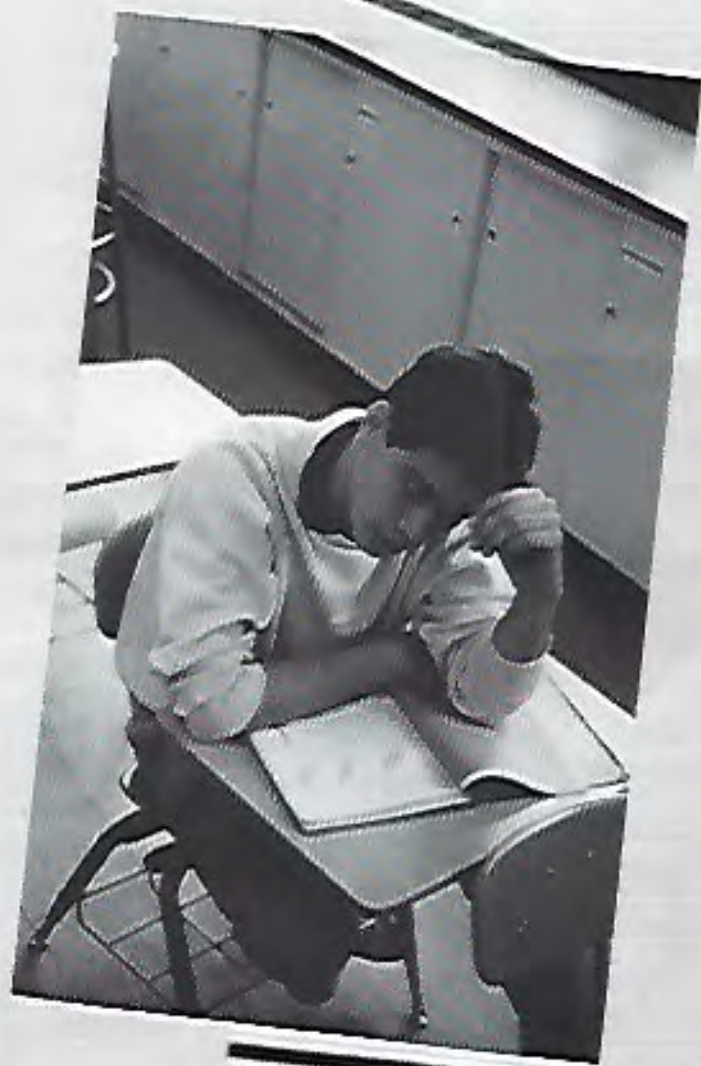
Highlights of the season were wins over returning Metro Champion Kennedy High School, a one-stroke victory over Cordova High School and the entire team qualifying for sub-sections.

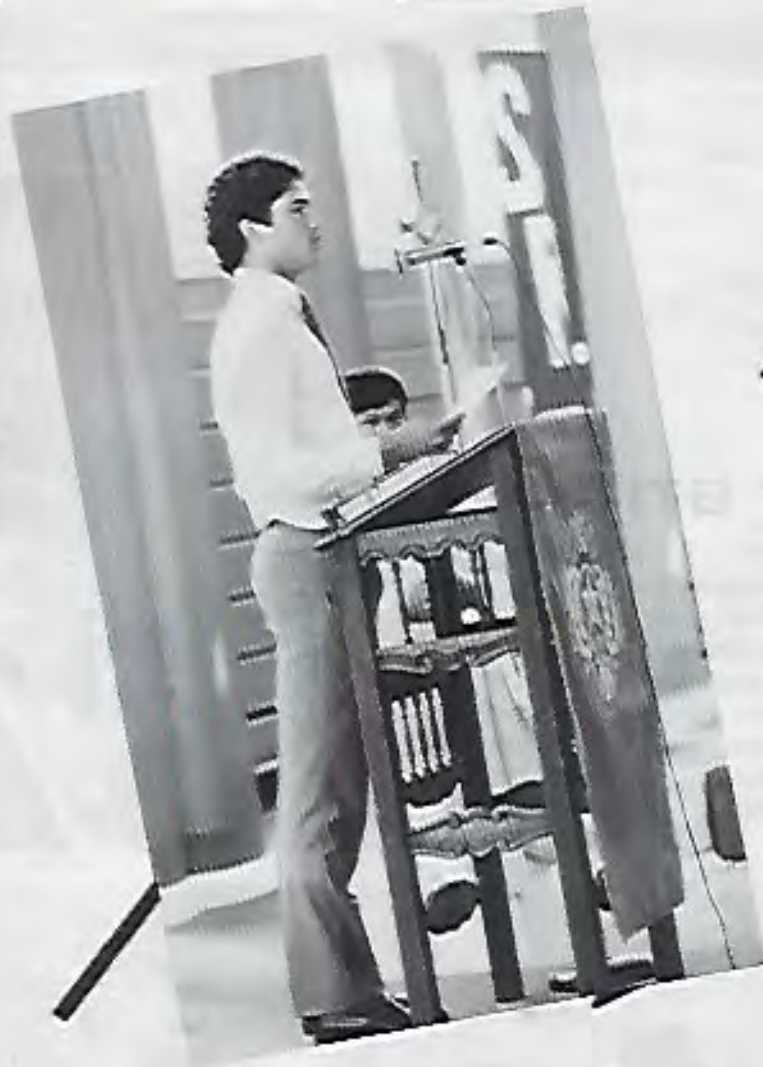
The golf team only loses one golfer for the next year. Prospects look good for another excellent season.

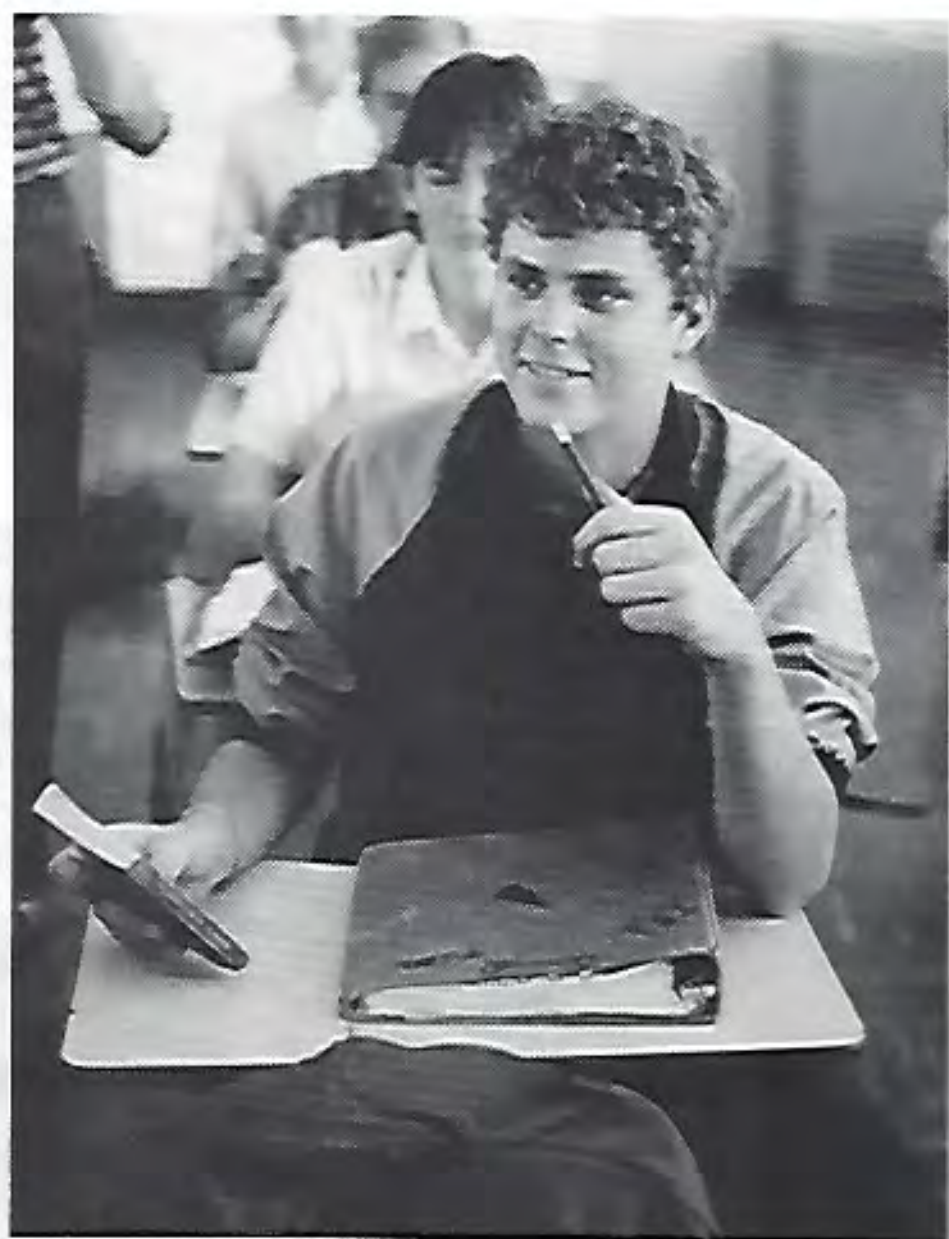
A SOPHOMORE EXPERIENCE

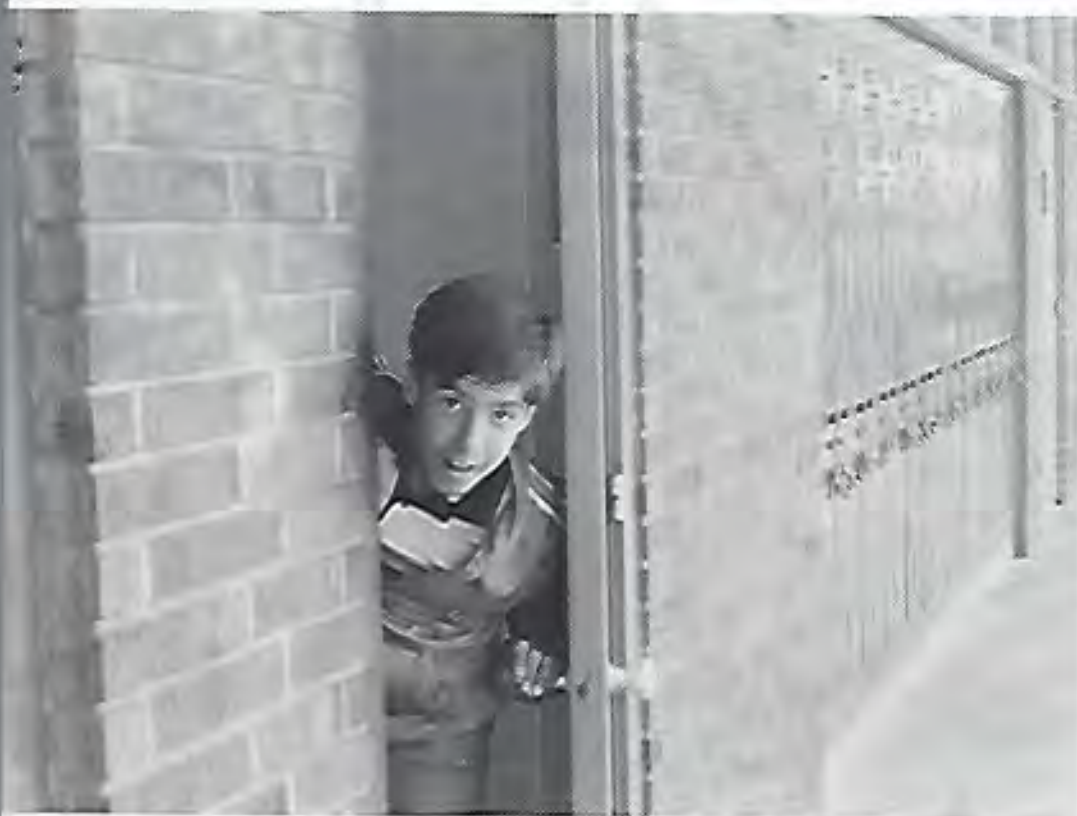

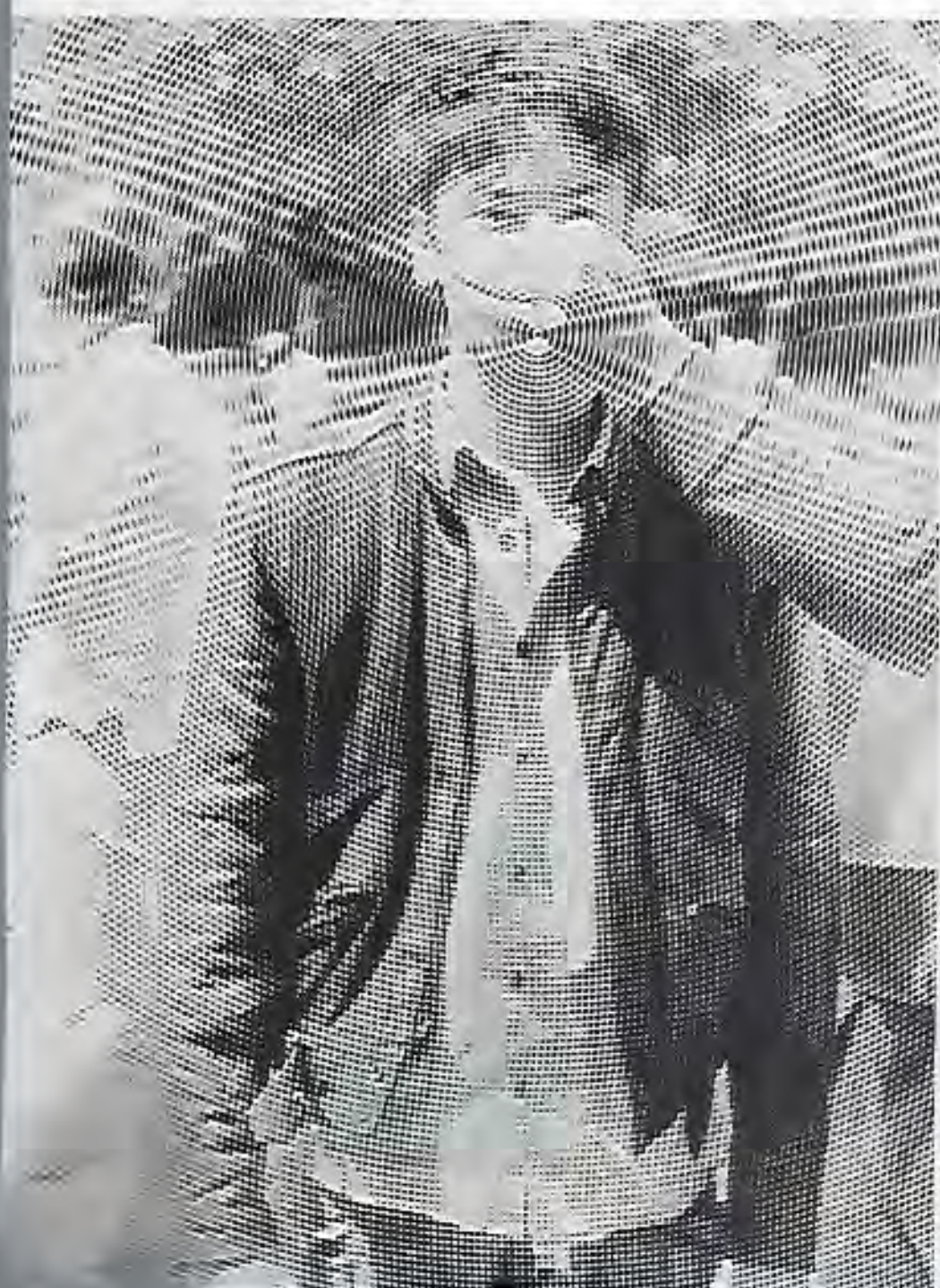


THE WAYS OF HIGH SCHOOL

Overall, the Freshman year is a learning experience that will help me for the following years to come at high school. My next 3 years will prepare me even more for the future.

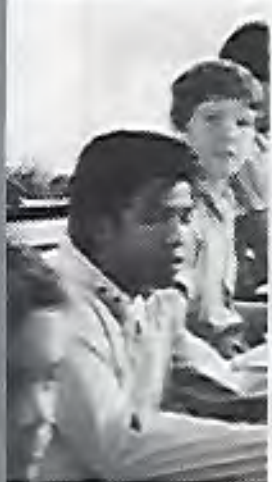


GOING OUT OF STYLE

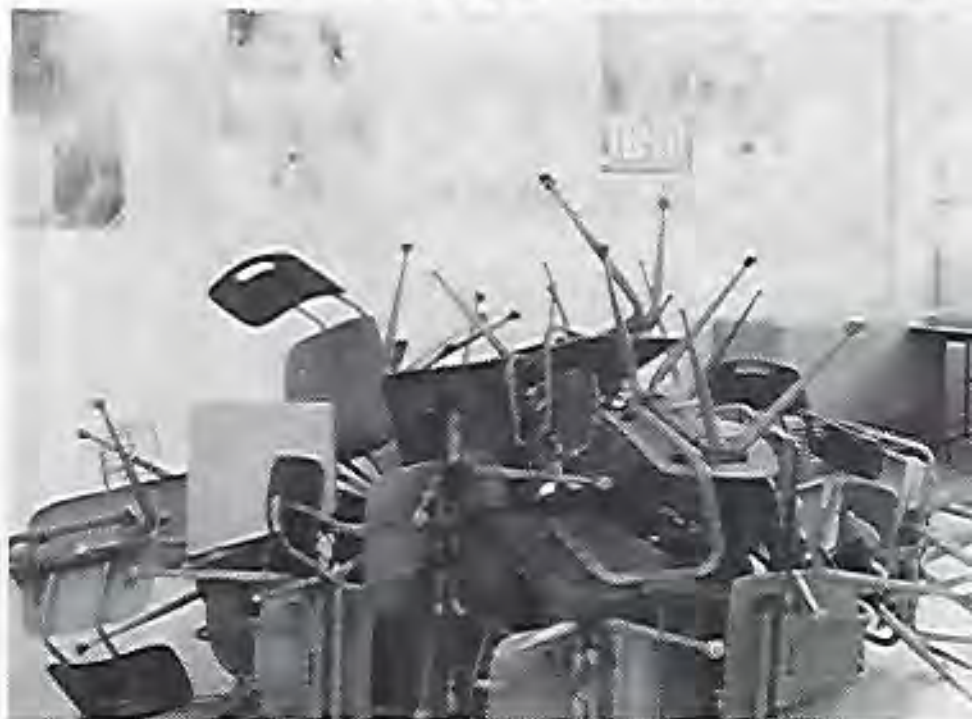
Throughout the years there were three underlying motifs in the Humanities program: Experience, Creativity, and Reasoning.

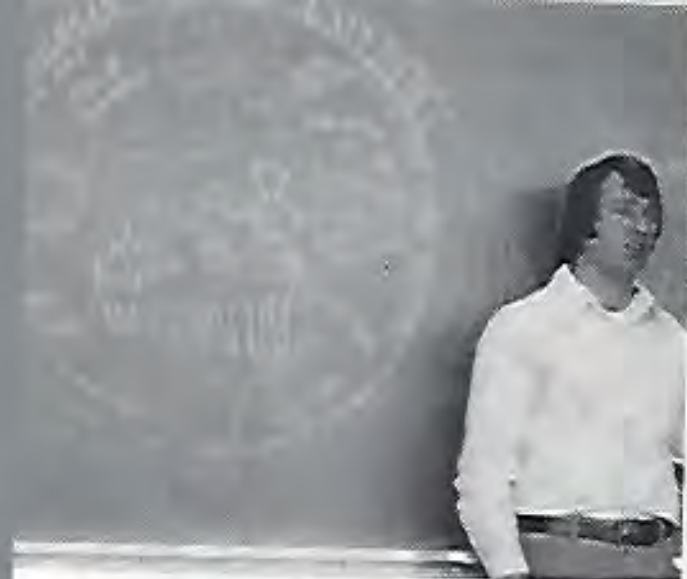

KRANIG WINS GOLD FOR C.B.S.

1985 was a momentous year for Brent Kranig. In his senior year he literally came out of nowhere to stun the high school wrestling community with a brilliant showing in the California State Tournament. The year began on an upbeat note when Brent took the 175 pound championship at the Christian Brothers Tournament; he was also selected the outstanding heavyweight of the tournament. Brent followed this success up with another championship and an outstanding wrestler award at the El Camino Tournament in early January. The following week in the very prestigious Woodland Tournament, Brent lost a very close decision to finish second; however, this was the first time a Christian Brothers wrestler had ever made it into the finals of this tourney. The Real odyssey, though, didn't unfold until post-season competition began. Brent commenced his string of victories with a resounding 18-0 triumph in the finals at the Metro League Tournament at McClatchy High. The next week saw Brent continue his unbroken victory streak with a thrilling 11-7 win in the finals of the 178 pound class at the northwest Sub-Section Tournament held at Cordova High School. Brent set new standards for Christian Brothers wrestlers when he became the first Falcon wrestler to win the gold medal at the Sac-Joaquin Section Tournament.

This year's State Tournament was held in the new Spanos Center at the University of the Pacific. From over one thousand high schools in the state only a few had managed to survive the rigorous qualification process. Brent was only one of

three representatives in his weight class to qualify from the Sac-Joaquin Section. In his first match, he pinned a wrestler from the Bakersfield area. This win qualified and put him in the quarterfinals against the defending National Greco-Roman Champion, Steve Lawson, from El Dorado High in Placentia. Lawson was the odds-on favorite to take the state tournament since he was undefeated this year with his closest match being 18-6 decision; no one gave Brent a chance of making it past this match. However, as often happens in the topsy-turvy world of sports, the underdog prevailed by a slim 6-4 score. The loyal fans who made the trip to Stockton went wild and that night there was a feeling of impending victory all the way through championship. On Saturday, Brent easily disposed of the San Diego



champion by 15-4 score. The impossible dream had come true — Brent was in the finals for the State of California. That night with the local press and television stations in attendance Brent took the mat against a powerfully built Samoan wrestler from Channel Islands High School in Oxnard, California. Brent fell behind in the first round 0-2 score; in the second round, Brent closed the gap to 3-4. In the final round with 56 seconds left, Brent pulled ahead 6-5; his lead was short lived since his opponent evened the tally at 6-6 with 30 seconds left. Trying desper-

ately to score before time ran out, Brent attempted a Whizzer throw which Samoan countered and scored ending match 6-8. The defeat devastated Brent and it was a little consolation that he was a silver medalist in the most populous state in the nation. The support of family and friends helped to dull the sharp pain Brent had suffered in losing this heartbreaking match. The saga had not ended with the State Scholastic Championships. Brent journeyed to Las Vegas, Nevada to attend the Junior Olympic Southwest Regional Championships on April 5th and 6th. He won the Greco-Roman championship at 178 pound class and probably would have won the freestyle if he did not have to catch a plane for home. In doing so Brent also earned a scholarship to attend National Development Camp to be held

this summer at the University of the Pacific.

Brent's trip was made possible through donations from Raley Travel and the Messersmith Group who both financed his airline transportation.

Brent is currently awaiting word whether he will be accepted to Columbia University in New York City or attend the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Still the saga goes on Brent will be wrestling for the nationals this summer and then maybe more.

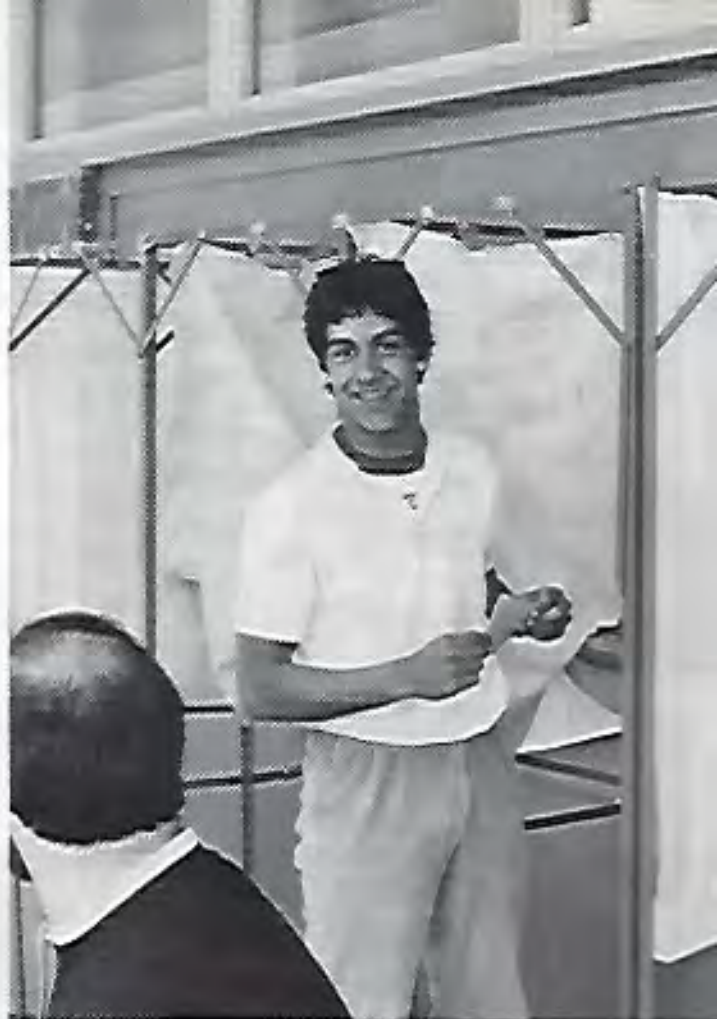
