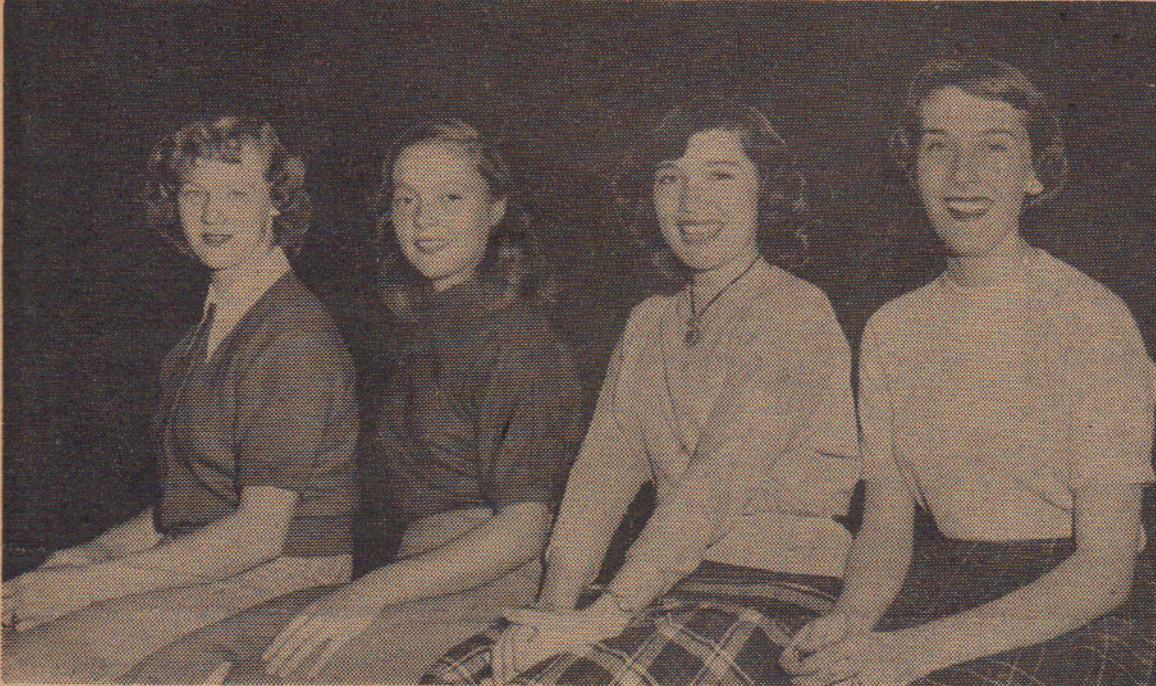

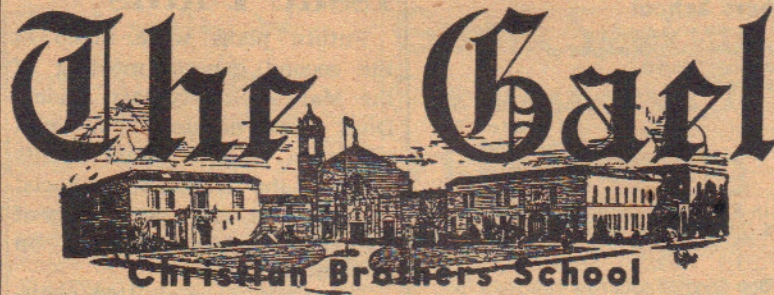
## Resident Students Form Government

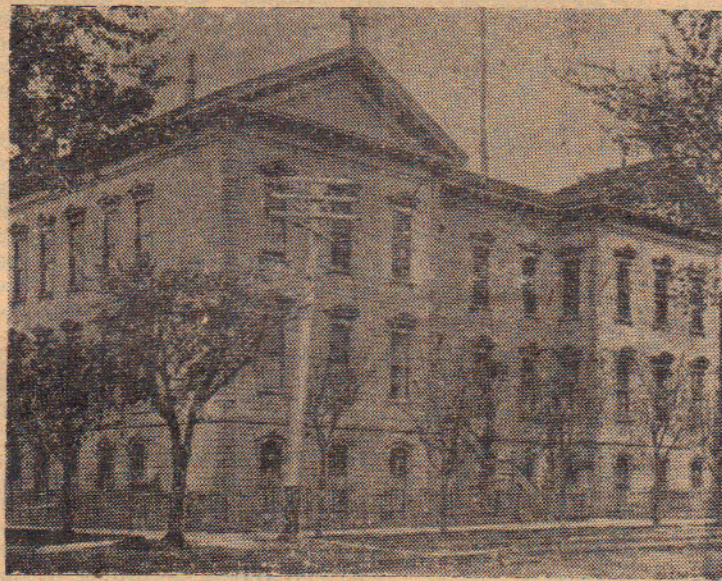
The first general assembly was held on October 10, at 8 o'clock in the cafeteria.

## Brother Bertram Discloses Plans For Tri-School Paper

A special edition of an experimental interschool newspaper will be published sometime near the Easter season, Brother Bertram reported today. It will be edited through the collaboration of the staffs of Christian Brothers, St. Francis, and St. Joseph. If successful, it may replace the three separate issues normally put out by the schools.

Brother Bertram stated that it was decided at the recent teachers' Institute such a system would be highly desirable. By uniting under one publication the activity plans carried in all three newspapers, the cost and work would be reduced. As it is now, three separate papers contain almost identical information on the same subjects. It was also suggested that this would provide for better relations among the schools.

Reactions of CBS students to the proposal have been diverse. When questioned, Glenn Freitas replied, "I am against the idea of a tri-school newspaper for it will take away the distinction and independence of the three schools. Besides, it will limit the number of writers and prevent many from getting valuable experience in journalism."

Mack White, former GAEL editor, expressing a favorable view, stated: "I believe that a combined publication by the three schools, if established permanently, would be better. It would cut down the cost and give the students a bigger paper, more frequently."

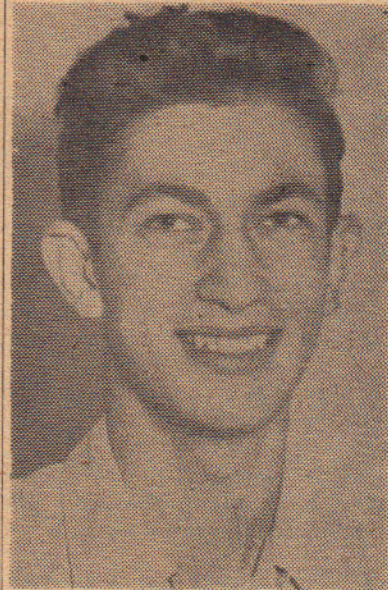
