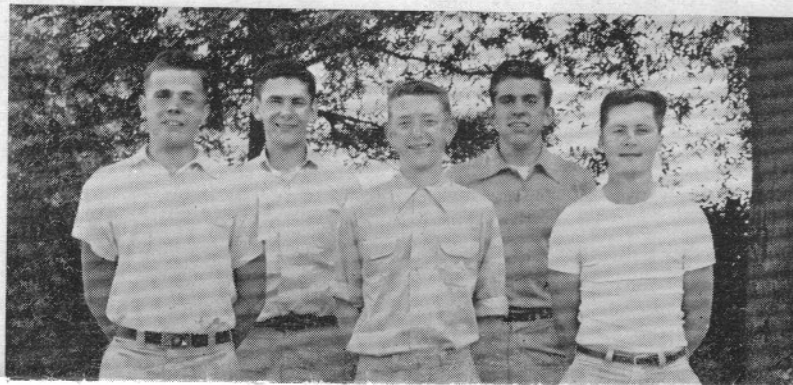
## Frolic Successful; Athletics Aided
