Festival Plans Are Set; Lagergren Gets Lead

May 7, 8, and 9 will see Christian Brothers, St. Francis, and St. Joseph present a Student Fine Arts Festival at the Eaglet Theater. A varied program involving art work, music, and the play "Shadow and Substance" has been planned. Students of the three Catholic high schools will have a chance to show their ability in two art divisions; copy work and original work. These divisions have been further sub-divided into water color, oil, pen and ink, charcoal and pastel, pencil sketches, design, cartoons, crafts, and an open classification which includes anything in the line of art not covered in any of the preceding classifications.

Cash prizes are to be awarded to the winners of each group, exact amounts will be announced later. Entries from CBS must be turned in on April 25. CBS eliminations will be held April 27, the winning entries from the school being displayed here on April 28 so that students from CBS will have a chance to see the wares of the craftsmen representing this school.

The leads in the play have been captured by: Karen Lagergren who will portray Brigid; Brothers' own Roger Meyers will take the part of Dermot O'Flingsley, and Walt Murpny, Sacramento State College's contribution to the drama, will play Canon Sherritt.
