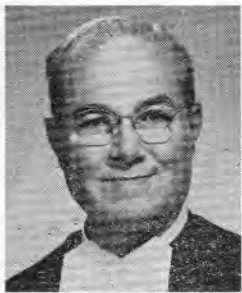
## From the Principal . . .

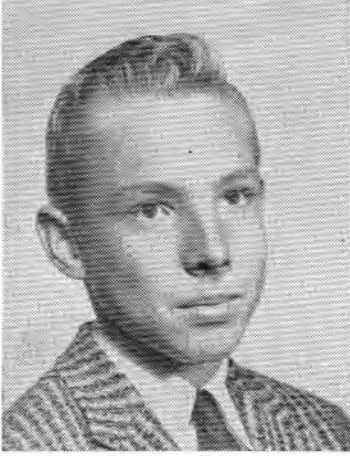
### From the Vice Principal . . .

Christian Brothers is in its second childhood.

Maybe that statement seems out of place to you, but let us just for a brief moment go over CBS history.

Back in 1934, when these ancient halls were first dedicated to learning, Christian Brothers began what can justly be called its "first childhood." Since then it has aged into a school for grammar and high school students. But in 1954, the grammar school had to be dropped because of the over-crowded facilities. Then again in 1956, the junior and senior levels were moved over to the now existing Bishop Armstrong High School. That move was made to make room for the increasing number of freshmen and sophomores. Since then Christian Brothers has only had two years of school, the freshman and sophomore years.

These two classes, however, are enabling Christian Brothers to begin again, to renew all the old phases of life around the enchanted campus; the academic phase, the athletic phase, the social phase, and the extra-curricular phase.

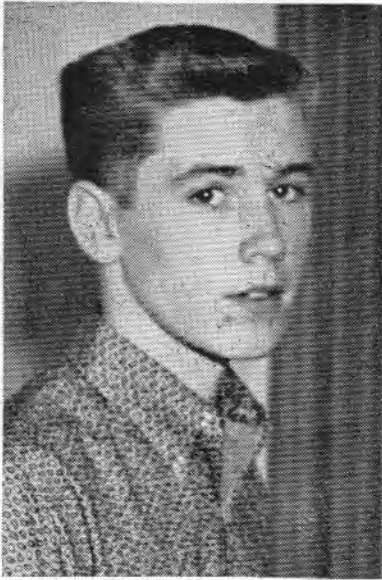
One must imagine the situation of a two-year high school in order to understand what we mean by a "renewal." The example, leadership and successes usually assigned to the upper division fell upon the sophomore class of the school. How successfully it fell, the year 1960 seems to indicate.

In the first place, academically, the objective of the school is to improve our education scholastically. I think the answer to whether we have been successful in this phase speaks for itself. The large number of freshmen and sophomores who make the honor roll each quarter is one indication of the effort put into the studies of the school. However, other indications of the intellectual spirit can be seen in the debating, CSF, and dramatic groups of the school.

The "Soph Hop" graced the social year, along with five other dances sponsored by the various groups of the school. These dances offered to the students a break in the social life and a chance to help develop an all around character. But one must not pass over the day by day social associations of the school year.

In athletics CBS offered many opportunities in interschool competition, which kept all those who participated in top physical condition. Proof of this is the football team with its undefeated record, and the track team with an outstanding performance. Yet I think that we have fallen in one field of athletics at CBS—P.E. One could wish for a more universal participation by the whole student body. But we are only "beginning." Maybe next year we will improve this situation.

The last and most important phase of our education is its religious phase. Inaugurated this year was weekly Mass—an opportunity for all to benefit by use of the Sacraments. The example of the Brothers has gone far to aid this important development.

## Student Council

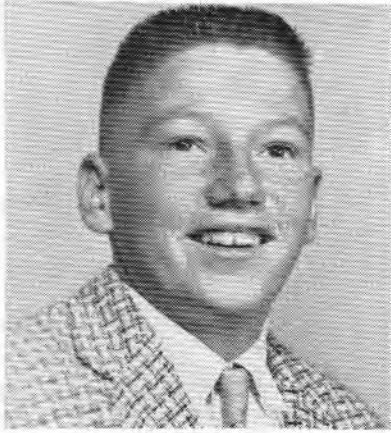

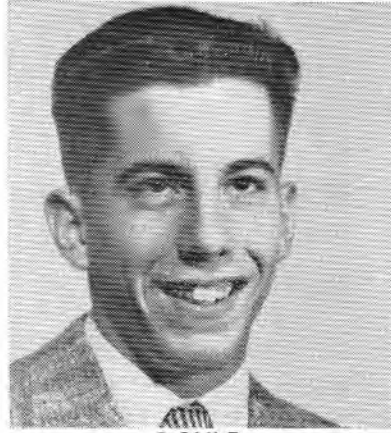

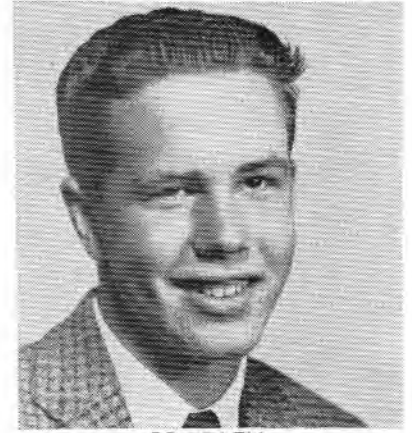

Not merely in sports, but a perhaps more important phase of TC2's accomplishments is in academics. They have constantly had the most students donning the "A" and "B" honor rolls.

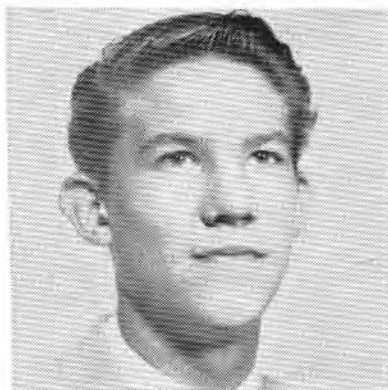

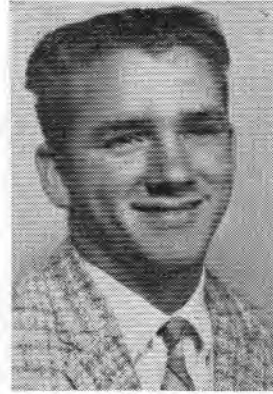
## Class 213

Seven members of the class became members of the California Scholarship Federation as a result of their intellectual prowess. Larry Clark's straight "A" card led the group.

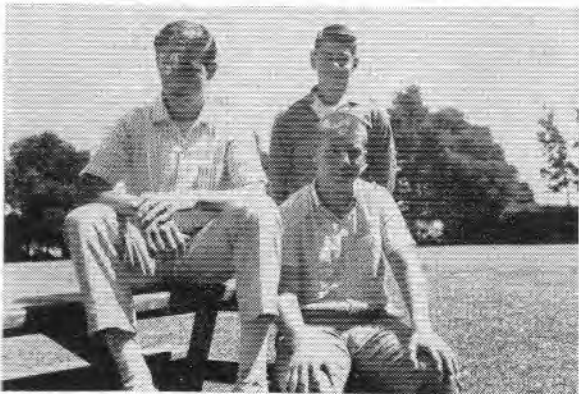

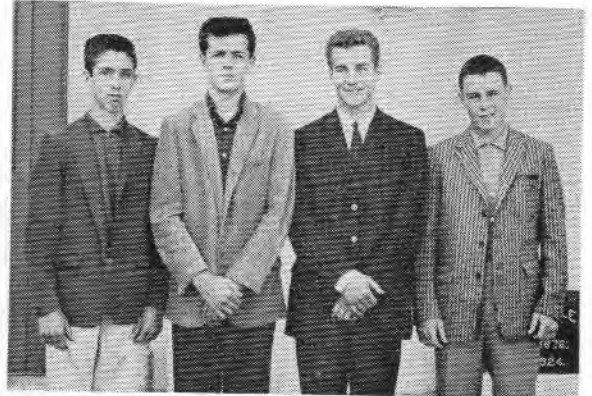
Class 123, the Frosh Clowns, made itself known throughout the school year by its lively enthusiasm throughout the school. In the age of "rock and roll," this class fell right in.

## Swimming Team

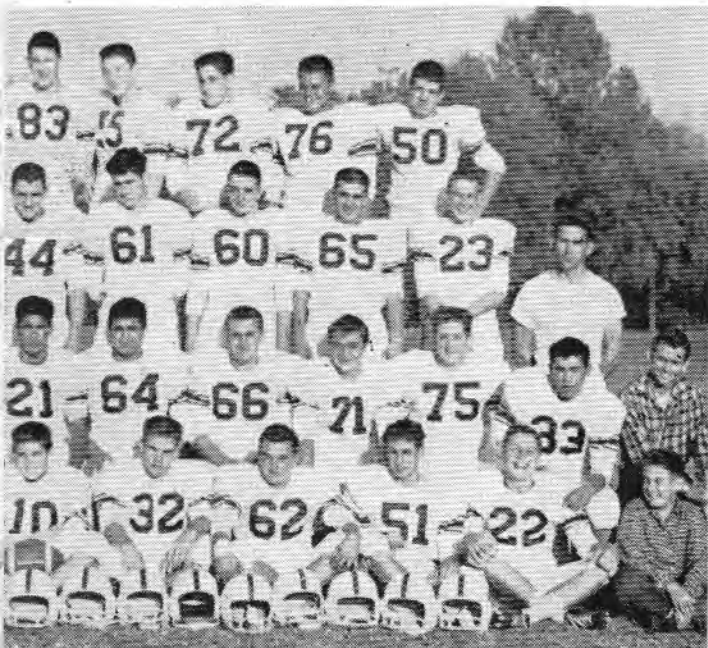

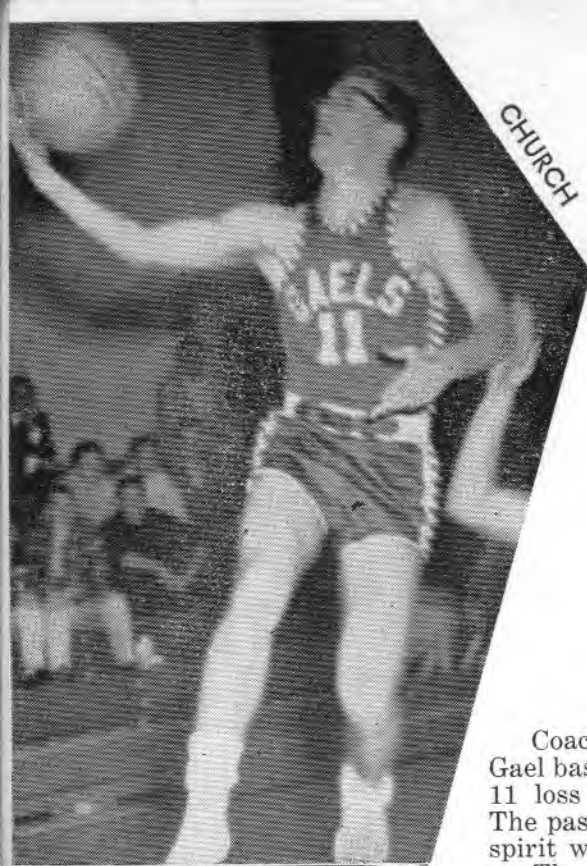

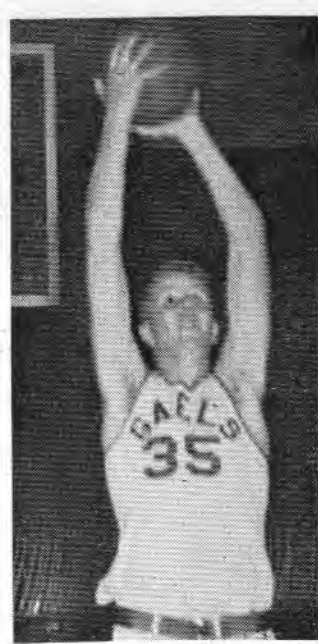

## Baseball

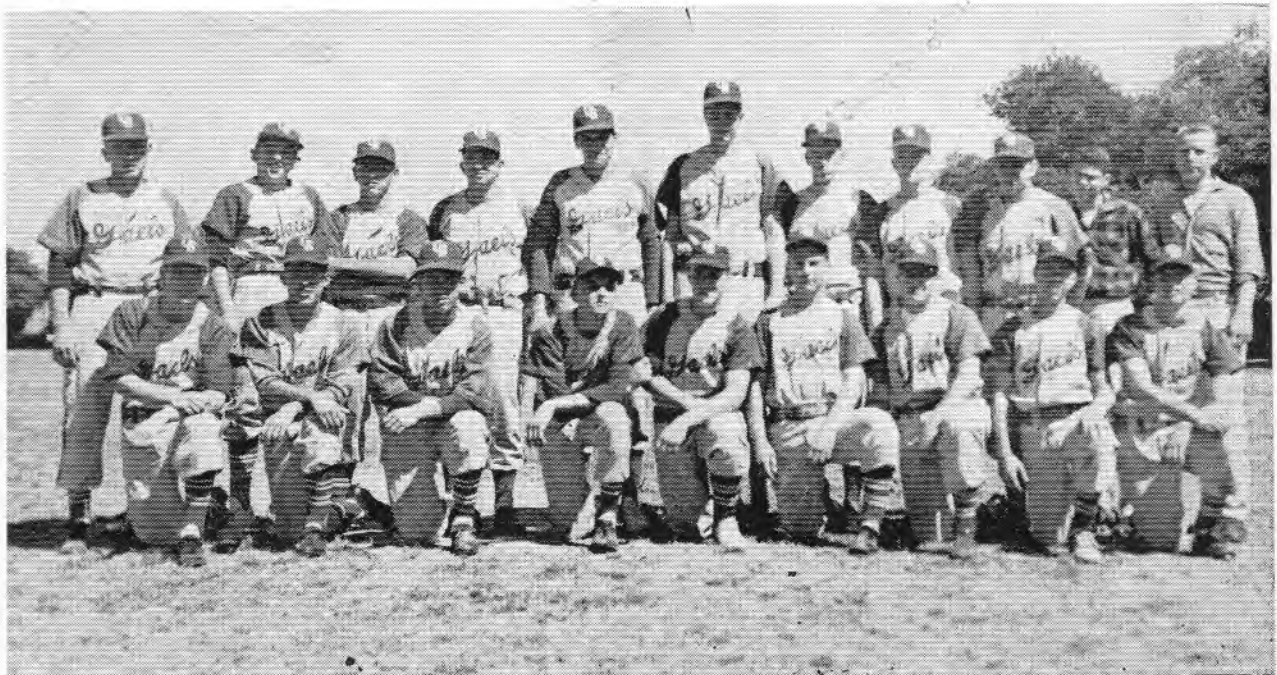

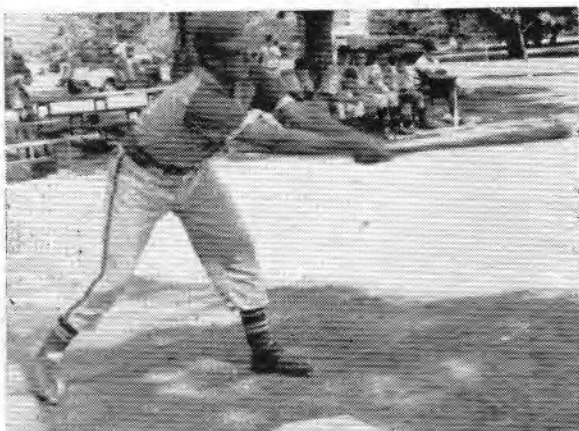
