WILL SOON COMMENCE.—The work of constructing the proposed college of the Christian Brothers in this city will be soon commenced. The sum of \$13,000 has been subscribed to the fund by citizens, and about one-half of the amount has been paid in. The remainder will be collected in a few days, and by the 1st of February the preliminary work upon the building can be begun.
