

## Silvey Family

Frank J. Silvey Sr.

Born in Rhode Island in 1874.

Came to Sacramento at the age of 4-5 on the Transcontinental Railroad.

He told of seeing Indians on horseback as they traveled across country.

His father died while he still was in school and one of his first jobs was watering bricks for the construction of the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament.

He graduated from Christian Brothers College at 12<sup>th</sup> & K in approximately 1890.

He was involved in many endeavors in his life including owning a farm in Dixon where he grew wheat. He built a number of flats and individual houses in Alkali Flats and Boulevard Park Developments. He built Silvey's Motor Villa on old Highway 40 in 1938 in time for the 1939 Golden Gate Exposition. Also he built Silvey' Motel in 1949 after World War II. All three of his sons Edmund, Frank Jr. And Carol graduated from Christian Brothers.

He died in 1965 at the age of 91.

Edmund J. Silvey born in 1900 and attended CBC at 12<sup>th</sup> & K graduating in 1916.

Played baseball as a young man and was inducted into La Salle Hall of Fame in 1993.

He worked for Kimball-Upson, was part owner of the Silvey motels and retired from the Bank of America. He had two sons who graduated from CBS Mike and Jerry.

Edmund died in 1998 at the age of 98.

Frank J. Silvey Jr. Born in 1903 graduating from CBC at 12<sup>th</sup> & K in 1919.

Frank played basketball, soccer and baseball in his youth at CBC. As a young man played in the Winter League With the Knights of Columbus who won the American A Division Championship. Also played for for the Sacramento Stars and the Pacific Tel. And Tel. Championship Team of 1925.

He worked for Pacific Tel. And Tel. For 38 years in the Accounting Dept. Retiring in 1960.

Frank was inducted into the La Salle Hall of Fame in 1993. His son Francis III graduated CBS.

Frank passed away in 1998 at the age of 95.

Carol J. Silvey born in 1911 graduating from CBS in 1931 from 21<sup>st</sup> & Broadway.

Because of illness he was held back two years but managed to play tennis at CBS.

He partnered with his father and brother Edmund in the Silvey Motel endeavors and went on to work for the State of California from where he retired in 1971.

Carol lives at the Pioneer House at the age of 98 and is looking forward to his 80<sup>th</sup> Reunion of the Class of 1931 however he thinks he will be all alone.

Francis (Frank) J. Silvey III born in 1936 graduating from CBS in 1954.

Played varsity basketball and baseball at CBS and baseball Southside Legion.

Graduate of Sacramento City College and the University of California Medical Center San

Francisco School of Dentistry - Doctor of Dental Surgery. Alumni of UC Berkeley and UC San

Francisco. Captain - United States Air Force - Dental Officer. Private practice in Sacramento for

30 years.

Jerry Silvey born in 1938 and graduated from CBS in 1956.  
Went on to earn BS, MS, PhD and retired from the Government of Australia and lives in  
Canberra with his wife and daughter.

Michael Silvey born in 1941 and graduated from CBS in 1959.  
Worked as a manager Sacramento Public Works and retired to Pollack Pines.

Uncles (mother's brothers) of Dr. Frank Silvey:

John(Jack) Bernard Costa born in 1907 graduate of CBS approximately 1924-25.

Played baseball - farm clubs - and AAA Sacramento Solons 1931.

After baseball joined The California Highway Patrol and was Governor Culbert Olsen's driver  
1938-1942.

Owned a cleaning business in Sebastopol and later became an aide and driver for Stanley Mosk  
California Supreme Court Justice.

Albert J. Costa born in 1911 graduate of CBS in 1929.

Worked for the Bank of America and in sales for a number of companies in Santa Barbara, San  
Francisco and Hawaii.

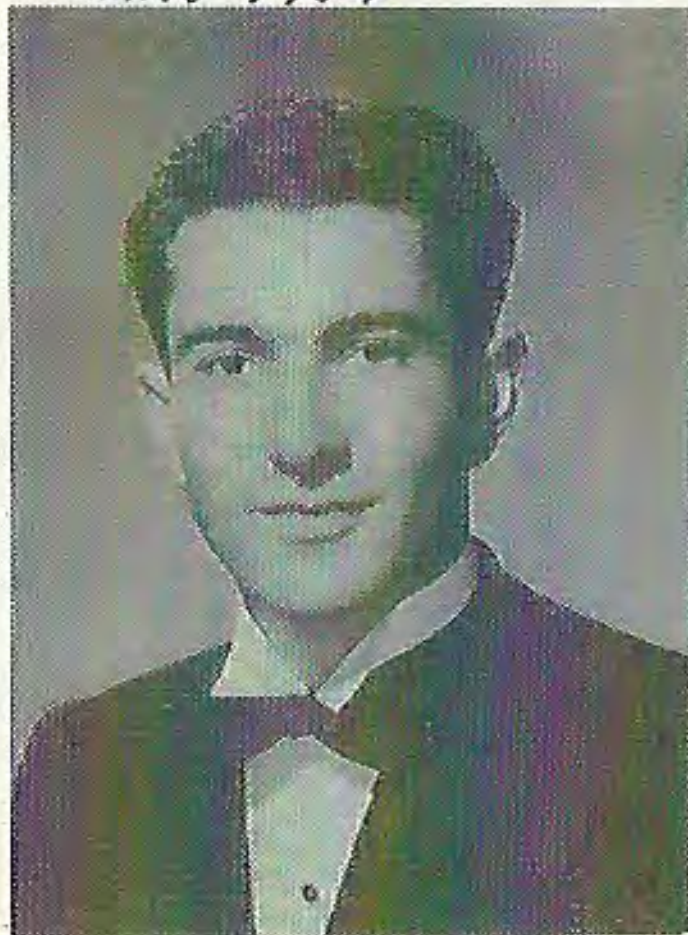

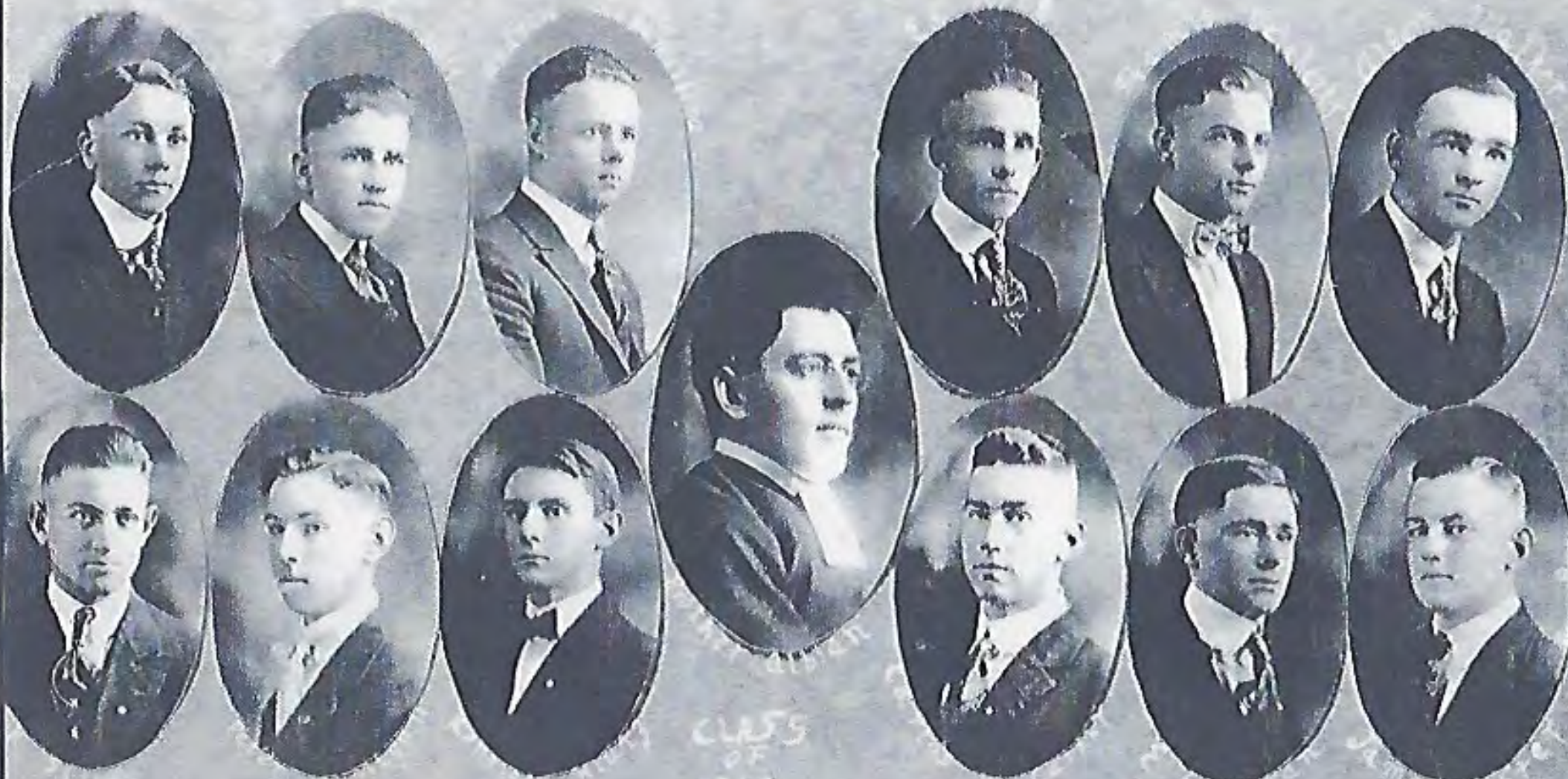
