Dragons to Outweigh Gael Team

Irish Backs Rate Edge on Experience in Big Scrap

Interest has soared so that the largest crowd in this game's history may turn out at the stadium tomorrow night to watch Christian Brothers school take a determined crack at 20 years of Sacramento High school superiority.

We don't think the light Gaels can turn the trick—they haven't the line to move the big Fergusons, McKerrases, Richardsons and Nelsons that stud the Dragon front all.

But Jimmy Flynn's backs, who are more mature and experienced than those of Lourance Janssen at the high school, are likely to throw any a scare into the Purple before the night's over.

Bennett Gael Passer

Adrian Bennett is quite a passer, as well as Jim McPartland. The Gaels admit they haven't an "80-yard punter," although that's what some of their players told Janssen, at they have some boys who can boot that ball, especially Charlie Schanz, a tackle from San Juan. The Brothers claim to have a defense worked out to stop Janssen's Warner reverses. They point to the success of St. Mary's team in stopping all Warner reverses shown against them, and they say they can emulate their Moraga boys.

Dragons Shift

Sacramento high will blossom it with a shift Friday for the first time since Janssen took over the coaching reins. It's just a simple little affair, says the Purple coach, and is primarily designed to keep its own linesmen on the alert—although he hopes, too, the opposing team may be caught asleep maybe during the night.

Ferguson and McKerras, near-100-pound tackles, haven't been moving so lightly in recent scrimmages. They've gained so much weight in the last year they've been slowed down. Janssen hopes they are not too slow Friday.

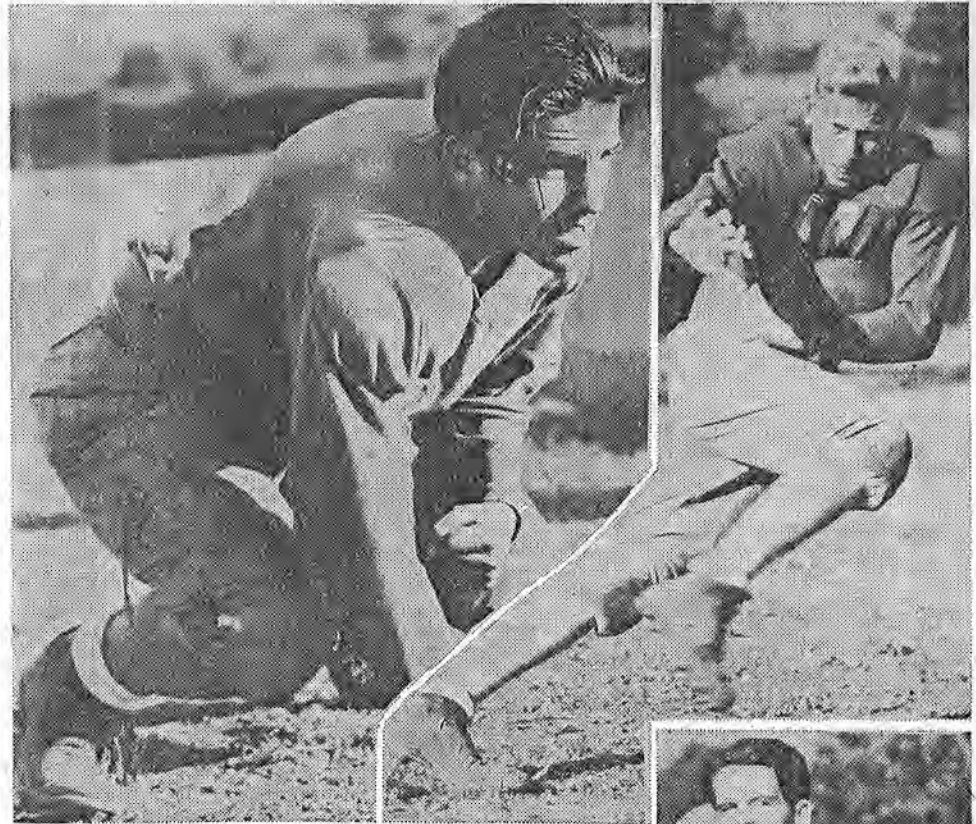
High Backfield Intact

There are no lineup changes from those previously announced at the high school. Bob Roof at back and Joe Verdina at right half will rate the call, although George Lyons and Lloyd Craig, respectively, may be in there when the evening whistle blows. Ralph Drennon is certain to open at left half and Duke Garbagedian, the experienced man, at quarter. Back Coughlin, first-string Brothers tackle, was being treated for eye infection yesterday and may not start. Charlie Schanz will take his place if he doesn't, with Eddie Stullis the other tackle.

Dragons Outweigh Irish

The high line will outweigh the Gaels about five pounds to a man, Dragon forwards averaging 182 to Brothers' 177. In the backfield the starting Purple lineup averages 180 pounds to Christian Brothers'

Dragons Strong on Blocking, Condition for First Battle

By way of introducing our Fearless Journalism department to the football-loving populace of Sacramento today we hereby go on record with our extra special pick for this week-end's contest.

It's Sacramento high to beat Christian Brothers.

It would be easy enough to substantiate this pick by the Goback method, a procedure consisting of going back into the files and seeing what Christian Brothers did last year against the high school, what players the high school lost and what players the Brothers lost at graduation, how the coaches slept during the summer, and how the players who are left reacted to "The Music Goes Round and Round."

Our New Plan

But this season you can have the Goback system. We're going to try the Howitlooks plan. And stick with it—at least until kick-off.

Under our Howitlooks plan we like George Relles' outfit to lick

Coach George Relles announced his starting lineup for tomorrow's game as follows last night: Ends, Yamada and Cushow; tackles, McMillan and Guthrie; guards, Winters and Luchessa; center, Wisner; halfbacks, Bottino and Bowa; quarter, Templemann; fullback, Marshall.

Relles was such a great blocker in college he should have gone into the hat-cleaning business. He didn't, though, and some 30 or 40 Sacramento high school kids have profited in the last three weeks by learning how to block.

Nothing Fancy

There may be nothing fancy about the high school attack tomorrow—unless you can call a flat pass over the center of the line, tossed by Paul Bowa and Fred Marshall, fancy—but there will be something awfully fundamental about their offense.

All right, the Dragons can block. They will also be in top physical condition, considering that the game's the opener.

Trace the game progress of last year's high contests and you'll find the Dragons started out like a house afire every game, but slowed down about the middle of the second quarter as if the house really were afire and they'd just got out in time.

Tougher This Year

That, according to Lourance Janssen, last year's head coach, was because of poor physical condition, resulting from lack of week-day scrimmage, impossible to stage because of a practice field with no turf on it.

This year's practice field has plenty of turf—and turf makes tough, or some pun like that.

Well, having proved it to our own satisfaction that the high school will be good enough (if not to yours, Bill Hallanan, Cliff Russell, Bernie Scollan, Ray Coughlin, et cetera) we'll have to show why Jimmy Flynn's outfit will not be.

Flynn's Line Good

Flynn will field a fine, big veteran set of forwards. George Gillette, end; Vic Martinelli, tackle; Dave Simmons, Guard, and Bill Palm, center, all played a major part in the 6-0 upset win over the high school last year. And they're back, bigger and smarter.

But the Brothers won't have the offense. Even Flynn will tell you his offense is out for Marquette university's football squad at Chicago—namely, one Jim McPartland. McPartland was to have been the big gun in the Brothers attack, but his Pop had to go midwest and left Jimmy holding the bag.

Green Halfbacks

Leo Bennett is a veteran at fullback, but both starting halfbacks are green, playing their first football. They are Ted Gardner and Pat Pappan. Quarterback is also new, Ralph Gillette. Last year the Brothers beat the high school on Adrian Bennett's passing and Bobby Wilhams' running—both are gone.

It ought to be a close one, nothing more than 6-0 or 13-0 in favor of the high school, under the Howitlooks plan. But if we weaken and revert to our Goback system Flynn could possibly pull one out.

Gael Team Confident for Opener

Dragon Lineup Lists Light Backs in Stadium Tilt

The closest Sacramento High-Christian Brothers battle since 1932, when the Dragons just beat out the Gaels on the strength of Bob Coe's 65-yard dash, 6-0, is foreseen for the stadium Friday night.

And the foreseer is none other than Lourence Janssen, main high coach, who says that although his line will probably outweigh the Brothers' wall, he has no one in the backfield to spring loose as last year, when Cliff Perry, Julio Pane and company swamped the Irish, 32-6.

Gael Tales

"I understand they are confident that this is the year they're going to beat us," said Janssen last night. "They tell me about a punter who boots 'em 80 yards. I don't know his name. I know they have one of the toughest guards in the city in Simmons, 165 pounds, who transferred from the high school, and a couple of fast backs in the Bennett brothers.

"And they have an end, Bob Gillette, who is big, rangy, and can catch passes."

Not in Janssen's memory have the Brothers taken the high school, and that goes back 10 years, to 1925. The closest game was the 6-0 affair in 1932, when the Gaels had a great team headed by Frank Nugent at center and Ed Jackson, a remarkable kicker.

High Lineup Given

And in between paragraphs of repeating "what they tell me about the Brothers taken the high school, to report the following starting lineup for the Dragons Friday, with weights.

Others most likely to get in the game are: Ed Anzore, George Yamada, and Cliff Fishback, ends; Don Lewis, Ellis McMillan, and George Orite, tackles; Bernard Hall, John Ban, and Robert Lucceschi, guards, and Harry Haseleu, center.

Lloyd Craig, 155, will probably see action at right half and Paul Mussalini, 131, and Larry Senna, 140, at left half. Mervin Riggs, 150, may get in at quarter with George Lyons, 175, alternating at full with Roof.

The high backfield, as one can see, is very light. That's why they put Garabedian, a tackle, back there at quarter.

Has Fast Line.

"We have an experienced backfield and faster boys in the line than the Dragons. I think our grid-ders will outfight the high school team," Flynn continued.

"Watch us go Friday night."

Coach Laurence Janssen of the Sacramento High School is inclined to agree with Flynn about the situation.

"While our line is made up mostly of veterans they have taken on fifteen pounds of weight to a man since last year and they are pitifully slow," said the Dragon mentor. "Our backs are untried."

Sees Little Scoring.

"I look for a good, close battle with little scoring," said Janssen. "We don't expect to get beat, but it will be a tough assignment for us so early in the season."

So the local season will open with the traditional big game between the Sacramento rivals. A defeat will not break the losing team, but it will badly bend it.

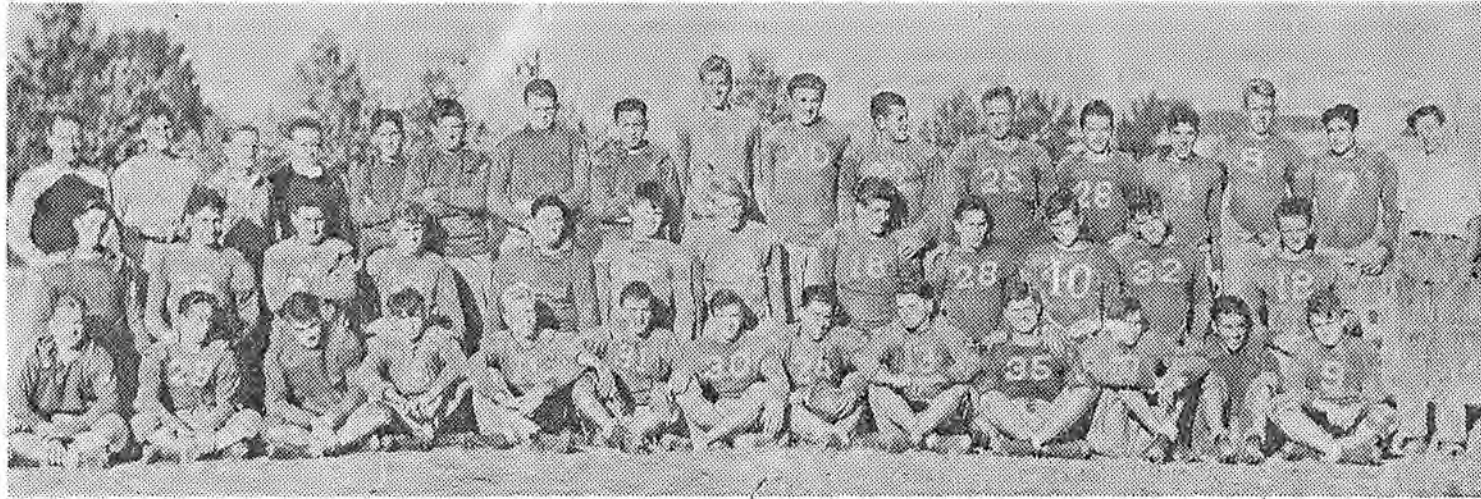

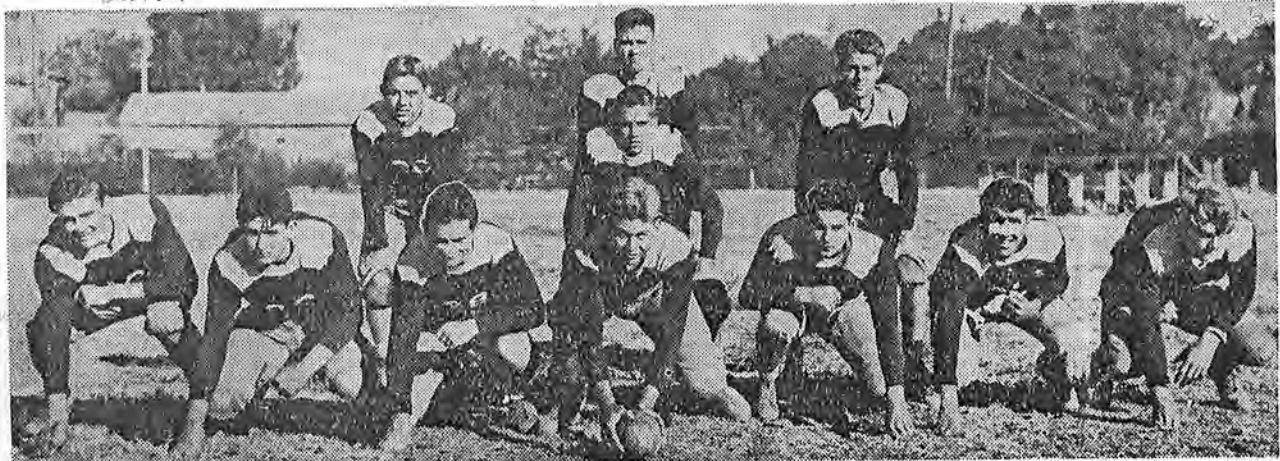

Brothers Hope To Score First Grid Victory Over High School To-morrow

Coach Jimmy Flynn Will Start Bill Stewart At Quarterback; Dragons Need Practice

For Sacramento football followers to-morrow will be the first day of Fall. Footballs and leaves start flying this time of the year and the pigskin will make its first appearance at the Sacramento Stadium when the Sacramento High School and the Christian Brothers School mix in their annual struggle.

Three Straight Defeats.

Since this annual game was revived three years ago the Brothers have not tasted victory. On all three occasions since 1932 the Brothers were just about ready to gobble up the prized dish when it was snatched away from them.

The first game ended 7 to 0 after a real battle. In 1933 the Dragons scored a 32 to 6 win, but the first half ended with a touchdown apiece. Lack of substitutes caused the Irish to wither in the second half. The same situation was true last year when the high school won 27 to 7.

Perry Spoils Dish.

For the last three years it was Cliff Perry that swiped that victory dish right out from under the noses of the Brothers. His long spectacular runs brought wins to the Dragons on all three occasions. "Now that Perry has graduated I think we can win," sang Coach Jimmy Flynn and Brother Peter in a duet yesterday. "We always have been able to stop everybody on the high school team but Perry."

Williams On Bench.

Flynn announced a change in his lineup to-day. Bill Stewart will start at quarterback in place of

Bobby Williams. Williams, who is reputed to be the best back on the Brothers team, will watch the opening kickoff from the bench, but he will be shoved into the fray early in the contest. The Bennett Brothers will be in the opening backfield, Adrian at halfback and Leo at fullback. Bill Diage will be the other halfback. All are veterans from last year's team.

Jack Coughlin, tackle; Captain Manuel Soares, guard, and Bill Palm, center, are regulars from last year. Coughlin suffered a back injury last Fall which kept him out most of the season.

Dragons Work Hard.

The Sacramento High School coaches are working every minute to get the Dragons in shape for this early game. Coach Lourence Janssen admits his team is not ready, but he hopes they are ready enough. The Dragons work smoother with each successive practice.

"I wouldn't hesitate to predict a victory for us if the game was a month from now," said Janssen today. "We hope we have progressed sufficiently to win the game and we may surprise, even ourselves."

The game is scheduled for 7:30 o'clock. The admission price is 50 cents.

High Line Powerful

The Dragons send a starting line against C. B. S. which may before the year is out develop into one of the best front walls in recent high history. And that wall, powered by Bill Greer and Reynolds Gualco at the ends, Harold McKerras and Bob Ferguson tackles, Bob Mumphrey and Jim Nelson guards, and Ernie Richardson, center, should prove the margin of victory, in spite of all the Gael enthusiasm.

That line should be able to bottle up the Irish running attack, which operates from Notre Dame formation, but the Gaels may uncork a passing attack which the new Dragon backfield is likely to find difficult to solve.

Gael Passes Threat

They punched at the big high school line a few times, did the aroused Gaels, and finally Bobby Williams went over on a quarterback sneak, a play which Maestro Flynn had given the boys only yesterday afternoon.

Dragons Dominate Play

And that was the game for Christian Brothers.

Sacramento High dominated the situation the rest of the night, piling up 10 first downs to the Brothers' two rolling up yardage with fleet Larry Senna and tricky Paul Mussalini leading the attack, getting off some nice kicks, but also drawing the lion's share of penalties.

Dave Simmons and Manny Soares, guards, and big Bill Palm, center, starred in the Brothers line, along with Jack Coughlin, tackle. But every one of the Gaels played well.

High Fumbles Chances

Lourance Janssen's high grid-ders had several opportunities to score but fumbled them away or were hit by offside penalties. Outstanding in the high line were Bill Greer and Ed Anzore at the ends and Ernie Richardson at center. The Dragons didn't have a passing attack, and could have used one.

TWO PASSES SPELL LOSS FOR DRAGONS

Bobby Williams Makes Only Touchdown Of 6 To 0 Game In Third Quarter

The Christian Brothers School finally went and did it—beat the Sacramento High School in a football game. After years and years of trying the Irish last night at the Sacramento Stadium scored a 6 to 0 victory over their home-town rivals in the season's opener.

Flynn Is Right.

Jimmy Flynn, in his first year of coaching, all week predicted his Brothers would win the ball game and he knew what he was talking about. His boasts were backed up with victory and after the game the Brothers' supporters carried him off the field.

A large football crowd attended the game, which was surprisingly smooth for so early in the season. A few fumbles were the main faults.

Simmons Starts It.

The Dragons showed the Brothers around the field in the first half, making five first downs to none for their rivals. The only place the high school did not push the Irish was over the goal line.
