"Ray Clemons, new coach at the Brothers, made his initial bow before the home folks in impressive fashion. His charges had a lot of polish and made few mistakes during the 48 minutes," said the Bee reporting on the Gael-Dragon game of the 1948 season. This good start was climaxed when Clemons was crowned prep coach of the year. He is assisted by John Odisio. Both coaches are St. Mary's graduates.

In beginning his tenth season at Sacramento, George Relles of California U., sets a new record, for never has any football coach at any high school in this city been on the job so long. Of the eight times Relles has sent teams into

Last Year's Game

Sac High's Dragons had an up fight all the way in opening their 1948 season with a 12-0 win over Christ Brothers before 4,000 spectators at Hughes Stadium.

Until mid-way in the third quarter Brothers held Sacramento scoreless until Harry Slaughter fletted across a 10 yard run. In the final period Brothers went a dozen yards for the only Sac score.

John Ursacht, Tom Connerman, Crane, and Ray Molina helped the Gael cause by playing good defensive ball the entire game. For Sacramento, Ray Bothne, Frank Bianchini, and John Cava were stalwarts in the line.

Though defeated, the Gaels made the best showing against the Dragons since 1936, when they beat Sac 14-0.

Dragons Are Favored Over CBS Eleven In Prep Opener Tonight

A Christian Brothers School football victory over the Sacramento High School has not been recorded for 13 years and the chances appear slim for its occurrence tonight when the Gaels and Dragons inaugurate the prep grid season in Hughes Stadium at 8 o'clock.

Virtually all roads point to a Sacramento victory. But CBS enthusiasts maintain their representatives have a first eleven which will put up a tough battle and can win if the breaks fall its way.

Lettermen In Line

Strict objectivism, however, results in a vote for George Relles' stalwarts. The mentor of the purple and white will field a forward wall manned by lettermen in each position; an experienced, sharp passing quarterback in Mike Acker, and a light but swift pack of ball carriers, headed by veteran Tom Dansby, 50 pound fullback.

Another important factor favors the Rellesmen — reserve strength. In past years CBS never was noted for its reserve material and this season probably will not be an exception.

In the weight department, however, the Gaels compare favorably with their rivals. The CBS line will average 171 pounds to 175 for the dragons. The chief reason for the preference is big Don Burton, 210 pound tackle, who outweighs the saviest Gael lineman, center Dan Lahey, by 23 pounds.

Backfields Even

The backfields are about even, with the Brothers enjoying a two pound bulge—158 to 156—thanks to Johnny Brereton's 176 pounds at fullback.

Relles has been using a crying well when speaking of his ball carriers. Only Acker and Dansby played last year. Tom Agosta, 142 pound right half, is a graduate of the B team, while his running mate, Joe Viega, saw service with the reserves.

Clemons has two returning first string backs in Brereton and halfback Pete Vartanian, Bob Benton, right half was a front line substitute last Fall.

However, CBS has nobody of Acker's ability at the vital quarterback post in the T formation. When the Church decided to give up the skin sport, Clemons was forced to rely on inexperienced youngsters, Gerald (Junior) DeFazio and Jim Blakeway, to direct the attack.

DeFazio, who tips the scales at the 144 pound mark and stands five feet, five inches, will get the starting call. He is a southpaw passer and a rough and ready thrower, so much so his coach plans to utilize him on defense.

Dragon Forward Wall

The Dragons' line will read, left to right, Mike Lateano, Burton, Willis Zumwalt, Cliff Horrell, Merrill Hoffelt, Bill Fletcher and Al Corfee. Relles believes Hoffelt, guard, and Horrell, center, will rate among the best in the Sac Joaquin Conference by the season's end.

Clemons will counter with Gene Anderson and Jim Winchell at the flanks, Andy Smolich and Ken Orvick at tackles, Dan D'Amico and Marvin Neves at guards, and Lahey at center. The Gael coach has had nothing but praise for Orvick and Lahey in recent practice sessions, and he thinks highly of his guards. Only Winchell, the squad's best pass receiver, is without experience.

Neves injured his hand last week and will wear a protective cast during the game. Sponge and gauze will be used, however, to present a soft surface.

Will Make Changes

Both mentors plan to make changes when their players switch to defense. Relles will insert Johnny McPoil and Wayne Menebroker at the ends, Al Kaelin and Ledo Ghilarducci in the secondary and Clyde Caietti at right tackle.

CBS will have Sam Vartanian and Lawrence Santos-Coy at halfbacks, Jack Kearns at guard and Ed Risse at one of the linebacking positions. Brereton will move from offensive fullback to defensive end.

If the Dragons kick off Hugh Williams will replace Dansby in the starting array and put his toe to the oval. Agosta and Brereton will do the punting for their respective teams.

Dragon Back's Speed, Deadly Passing Swamp CBS Eleven, 39 To 0

Swift end runs by fullback Tom Dansby and a porous aerial defense which enabled Mike Acker to hit his receivers with monotonous regularity last night gave the Sacramento High School a convincing 39 to 0 football triumph over the Christian Brothers School in Hughes Stadium.

Approximately 4,000 spectators witnessed the first local prep grid battle of the season and left the stadium with the realization Coach George Relles' Dragons will prove tough in Sac Joaquin Conference wars.

The winners started fast and finished faster, rolling to two touchdowns in the opening period, one in the second and three in the fourth. Only four times were the Gaels able to penetrate into Sacramento territory, twice losing the ball on fumbles, once on downs and once on a pass interception.

The two lines—rated as tops in the city—played on even terms. The Brothers outgained the Dragons on the ground, with most of the winners' rushing yardage coming on end sweeps and very little between the tackles.

But there the comparison stopped. When Acker, the veteran quarterback, faded to pass or flipped a lateral to Dansby, CBS rooters closed their eyes and hoped for the best.

The Gaels, with John Brereton and Junior DeFazio doing most of the work, racked up two first downs early in the first quarter only to have Mike Lateano, Dragon flankman, recover a fumble on his own 42.

Score On Pass

A 13 yard jaunt by Dansby was sandwiched by two CBS offside penalties. Dansby lost six yards on two tries through the middle, then Acker tossed to halfback Tom Agosta, who snared the ball and took two steps into the end zone. The touchdown play was good for 24 yards with nary a CBS defender within 15 yards of the receiver. Mike Dale placekicked the seventh point.

Following the kickoff the Brothers were set back 15 yards for clipping and Brereton punted 30 yards to Agosta, who made a neat 24 yard runback to the Gael 16. On the next play Dansby took off around his own left end, shook off three tacklers and crossed the payoff stripe. Dale's conversion attempt failed.

The third Dragon touchdown came on Acker's 32 yard pass to Dale, who raced behind the Gael secondary to take the throw. The maneuver culminated a 61 yard march. Dansby caught Dale's short pass to make the count 20 to 0 at halftime.

Quiet Third Quarter

The third quarter was scoreless, although Coach Ray Clemons' charges drove 70 yards before surrendering on downs 30 yards from pay territory. Pete Vartanian's 58 yard run featured the drive which ended when Brereton was thrown for a nine yard loss on a pass attempt.

Midway in the final stanza Bob Benton, CBS halfback, fumbled on his own 29 and Sacramento's guard, Merrill Hoffelt, recovered. Acker passed incomplete, then sent Dansby scurrying around end for the fourth six pointer. Dale missed the conversion.

The Brothers came back strong with sophomore Tom O'Donnell sparking a march to the Sacramento 44 only to have Jim Blake-way's fumble pounced upon by Del Roberts, Dragon lineman.

Acker came off the bench to widen the gap even more. After Joe Ulm had gained eight yards, he tossed to Dale for a 48 yard scoring play. Dale's placekick for the extra point was successful for a 33 to 0 bulge.

With less than a minute to play Sacramento's Bob Herndon, reserve halfback, came up with a CBS aerial effort and scampered 32 yards to the Gael 28.

Nason Hall, substituting for Acker, used his predecessor's formula by pitching to Paul Jordan for the last marker. The try for the extra digit failed. The Brothers took the subsequent kickoff as the final gun sounded.



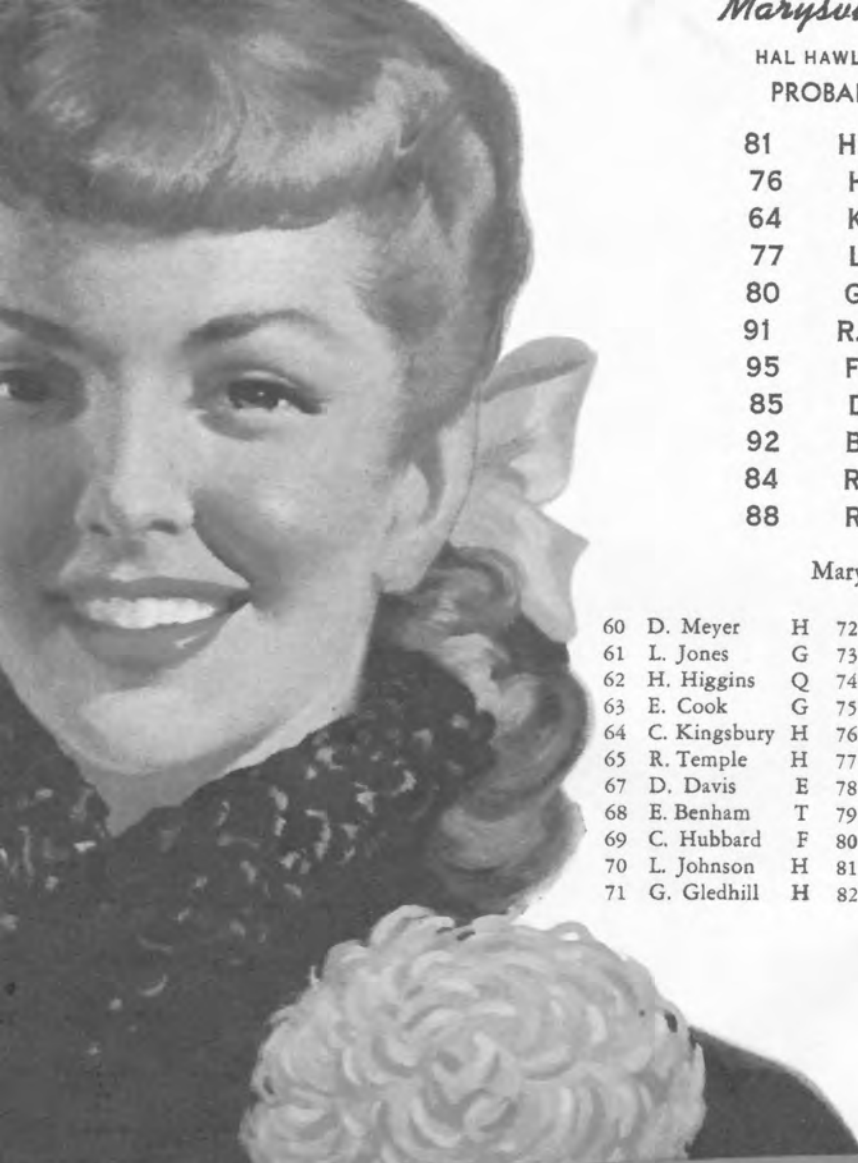

For Third Straight Win

Sacramento. — The Gaels of the Christian Brothers School will try for their third successive football victory Saturday at 2 p.m. when they battle the Marysville High School eleven on the 21st and Broadway Field. Coach Ray Clemons' locals have come a long way since their 39 to 0 defeat at the hands of the Sacramento High School. Since that opening debacle they have taken the measure of the St. Mary's High School of Berkeley, 30 to 0, and the St. Elizabeth's High School of Oakland, 32 to 0. In neither of their wins were the Gaels strained as the substitutes gained experience after the regulars had piled up a comfortable lead.

LAST SUNDAY'S triumph over the Oaklanders was especially sweet for the Brothers because the tussle was witnessed by many alumni present for the Homecoming Day festivities sponsored by the La Salle Club of the Christian Brothers School.

The strong points of the CBS squad have been a rugged defensive forward wall and a capable running attack. But on the other side of the ledger are a porous pass defense, lack of a consistent aerial attack and a shortage of reserves.

In the contest with Sacramento, the CBS linemen were not outplayed. The rushing yardage gained by the winners was negligible when compared to the damage they inflicted on the Gaels via the overhead route.

QUARTERBACK Mike Acker of Sacramento pitched to three touchdowns and set up another with his throwing arm. In most cases, the completions were made without CBS defenders in a position to do anything about them.

Since that night Clemons has shifted his personnel and believes his team will not be caught napping again. However, he admits the Gaels have not met a passer of Acker's caliber to test the new setup.

The lack of a passing offensive is not surprising because the CBS mentor said, in preseason chatter, he did not have an expert thrower on the squad since Jim Church, last year's signal caller, decided to quit the grid sport. Quarterbacks Junior DeFazio and Jim Blakeway have turned in capable performances but have not clicked along the airways.

CLEMONS has been letting Tom O'Donnell, sophomore halfback, pass on an optional end sweep. But nothing seems to work. Against St. Elizabeth's the Gaels completed only one out of six tosses—that a lucky play with the ball slithering off several fingers before end Jim Winchell caught it for a seven yard advance.

The reserve weakness is a perennial headache at CBS. This season, however, it is not as bad as in recent years. Clemons has five men lined up for defensive duties, although he has been criticized

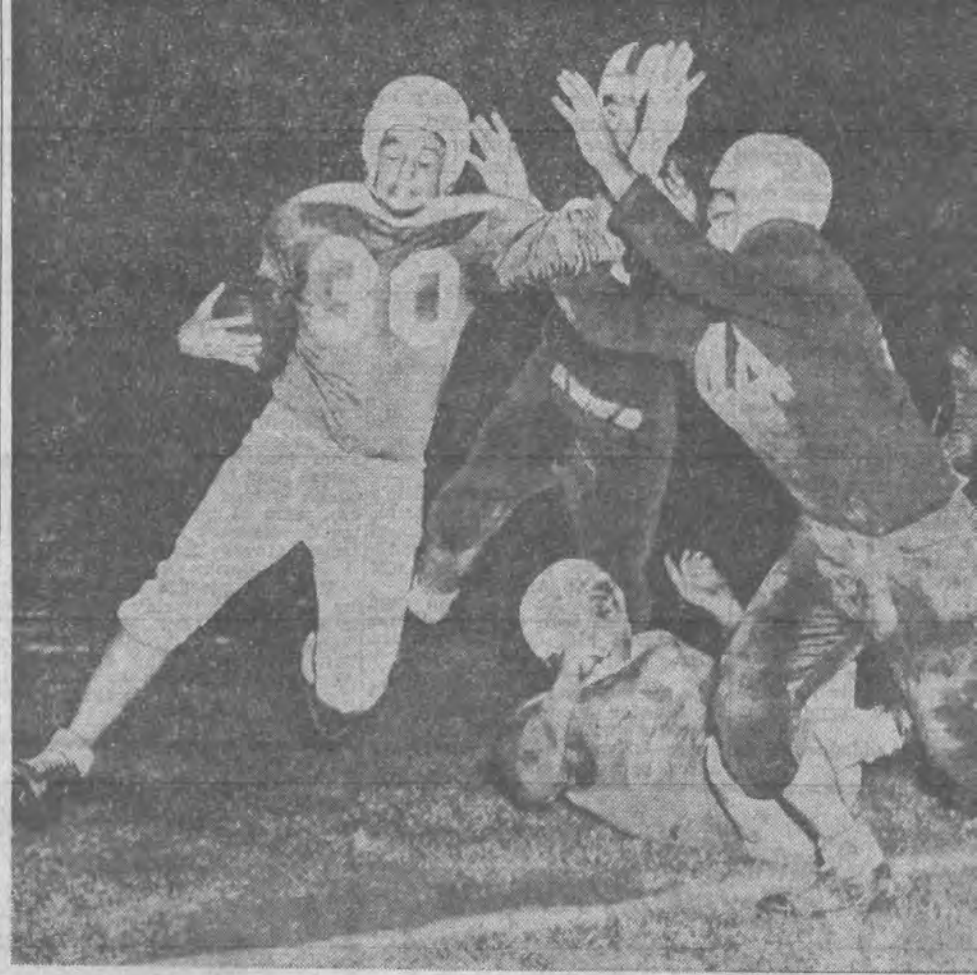
DeFazio's play sums the Gaels' victory.

Christian Brothers Back as Grid Power

Christian Brothers' Gaels, once a power to be reckoned with in prep football circles but recently shoved into the role of grid doormat, have finally bounced back into recognition as a Sacramento football power.

The fact dawned Thursday when Coach Ray Clemons' eleven stopped McClatchy's Lions 21-0.

It had been 13 seasons since the Gaels had come close to accomplishing the trick, back to 1937, start of the annual intra-city series.

At that time, the two teams battled to a 6-6 tie in the opening game, so the 1949 CBS aggregation has set one big record.

But more than just that happened this season. The Brothers, in compiling a 7-2 record for the year, brought back memories of former CBS powerhouses and teams of 1936, 1937 and 1942.

Those were the years when

no one considered CBS a push-over. Coach Jim Flynn (now at Sacramento High) led the 1937 team to a record of five victories and one tie, the 7-7

blot with Sutter Creek. Numbered among wins were ones scored over Sacramento High and Grant.

In 1937, Coach Les Groux' squad compiled a 4-1-1 mark, the defeat a 19-0 lashing at the

hands of Sacramento's Dragons and the tie the memorable one against McClatchy.

In 1942, Mentor John Gianoni's eleven—replete with latest triple flanker maneuvers—captured five of seven and newspapers soundly complimented, "the most victories in four lean years."

Now come the modern day winners, not on the top of the high school heap but knocking at the door.

Before the season began Clemons made a cryptic comment. "In our own class of school—I mean in enrolment—we will be able to hold our own," he said. As things worked out, that came true.

The Gaels opened the season against a hot Sacramento High team and a 39-0 shellacking. Then came schools of approximate size. St. Mary's of Berkeley was dropped 30-0. St. Elizabeth's 32-0.

The win string continued 34-0 over Marysville and 25-0 blanking of Jackson. Chico

fell 19-2.

Grant Union broke out a second half rush to come a CBS lead and narrow 18-14 victory, though a second loss of the season.

Live Oak was dropped and then came the 21-0 over McClatchy, not a but a record-setting game at least.

Back into the prep scene? You bet, and training still continues and Broadway.

Clemons has some not sure, all-city material in his squad. Included are Vartanian at halfback, city's leading high schooler, Center Dan Lahey, Ken Orvick and Guard Vin Neves and Dan D'A...

Graduations hit the squad hard this year. Clemons does not fret. "Next year? He won't. But the Gaels have come into the win picture high-riding season."

...such an animal. A few guys came my way. I closed my eyes and next thing I knew I was on the Packer payroll.

Ray had to wait a long time in his playing career to get behind the line again. When he first reported for football as a 130 pounder at Fremont High School in Oakland, Ray wanted to be a halfback.

Too Many Halfbacks
"They had plenty of halfbacks," he remembers, "so the coach switched me to guard. I still can recall that as the biggest disappointment in my life."

"In fact, I was so angry and heartbroken that when he put me in at guard in practice, I pounded the dickens out of the kid opposite me and really fixed myself at a guard position."

He almost went to Santa Clara after making the Oakland Athletic League all star team two years running. But some Bronco alumni, slated to return Ray to his Oakland home after a Santa Clara visit, got his signals crossed and left him stranded. Ray hitchhiked home, fuming. Slip Madigan picked that opportune evening to do a job of St. Mary's salesmanship and that Fall of 1939 Ray was a galloping Gael.

Curry Was Teammate

His CBS predecessor, Curry, was a teammate of Clemmons through those first three years at St. Mary's. The two also are the youngest football coaches in Sacramento, at 27, with Curry just shading Clemmons as the yearling by 21 days. From the Spring of 1942 to late Summer, 1946, Clemmons interrupted his gridiron activities to join the naval aviation ranks. He emerged as a full lieutenant, serving primarily as a navy test pilot.

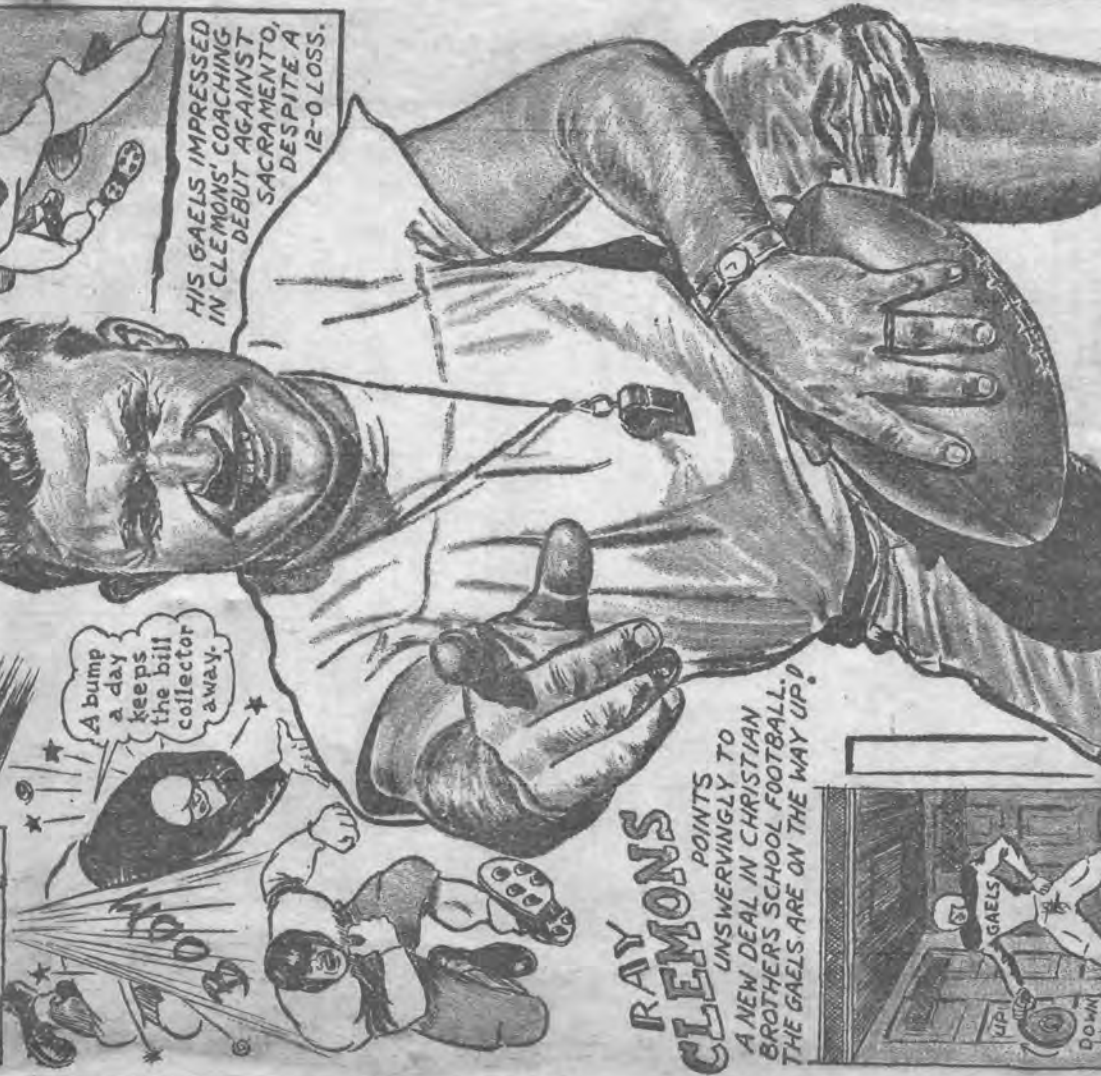
He also was married during his navy days and has two children, Michael, 3, and Judith, 2. Mike promises to be a 1965 image of his 200 pound dad.

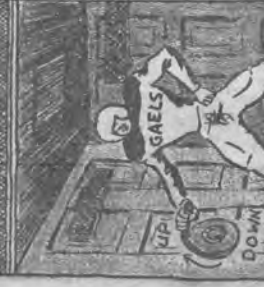
