Plucky Brothers Lose Hard Fought Struggle To Speedy Dragons

The Sacramento High School Dragons got off to a winning start on their 1948 football season in the Hughes Memorial Stadium last night, but only after a hard fought, slam bang battle with a plucky Christian Brothers School eleven. The winning margin was 12 to 0.

Showing unexpected strength, the losing Gaels fought tooth and nail for every yard and in the first half outplayed the favored Dragons to the surprise of the opening prep gridiron crowd which numbered approximately 4,000 persons.

Impressive Debut

Ray Clemons, new coach at the Brothers, made his initial bow before the home folks in impressive fashion. His charges had a lot of polish and made few mistakes during the 48 minutes. Opposing coaches and game officials had nothing but praise for the courageous Gael gridders, who did not concede one iota to their neighborhood opponents.

Clemons, a former St. Mary's footballer, also saw service with the Green Bay Packers. The Brothers were a tightly knit team and executed their assignments with a lot of class.

If the debut of the Brothers' football squad is a criterion, Clemons is going to be a welcome addition to the local coaching fraternity ere Autumn is too far along.

There was no talk of a moral victory in the Brothers' dressing room following the contest. There were tears to be sure and the blue and white gridders were disappointed, but already the chatter was of the game next week with the Elk Grove High School. There was no disgrace in the defeat suffered by the Irish.

Speed Stands Out

For many of Coach George Relles' Sacramentans it was their first big clash. The victors do not have the power of last year's eleven which won all but a single contest. But the current edition of the purple and whites has speed to burn. The fleet leads in the backfield will make the Dragons a dangerous combination any time they have the pigskin.

Against the tricky stuff tossed a them by Clemons' charges, the Dragons stood up okeh. The pin sized forwards could do with more experience, but that will be gained as the season progresses.

Mike Acker and Dick De Fazio quarterbacks, can toss the ball plenty. The aerials will be a weapon which may play havoc with Sac Joaquin Conference foes. Bruce Ayers, fullback, will not take a back seat in the running department. With a little more assistance from his blockers he will score lots of touchdowns for the Sacramentans.

Runs Back Kickoff

Frank Agosta started the Dragons off to their first touchdown by running the third quarter kickoff back 35 yards to the midfield stripe. Ayers cracked off right tackle for 11 yards and followed with four more. Acker hit Vic Frediani, end, with a pass and the receiver, running in halfback fashion, sped to the Brothers' 10. Slaughter on the next play sliced through a hole at left tackle for the six points. Dan Lahey, Brothers center, made a flying leap to block De Fazio's attempted placement for the extra point.

The final score came with only 18 seconds remaining in the game and directly was due to a desperation pass by the Brothers. Lawrence Tornatore, Dragon fullback, intercepted the ball on the 15 yard line and returned it to the Gaels' seven before he was hauled down. De Fazio on two rushes into the line moved to the two. The Dragons suffered a five yard penalty at this point. Ayers then outran the Brothers' defenders to race untouched into the end zone. De Fazio's effort at the conversion fell short of the uprights.

The Dragons crossed the goal line on one other occasion in the third chapter but a penalty was imposed. Acker tossed to Slaughter for 20 yards into the end zone but the Sacramentans were detected offside.

The Brothers put together a sustained march from their own 22 to the Sacramento 24 yard line. The drive which started in the third quarter fizzled in the fourth when the Irish suffered a 15 yard penalty for clipping and a pass interception followed.

Irish Iron Men

Towers of strength for the Brothers and iron men who went the full distance were John Lysaght, halfback, Joe Concannon, guard, John Brereton, fullback, Bob Lehtola, end, and Joe Crane, tackle. Ray Molina, tackle, made his share of the stops for the losers.

Roger Bothne, line backer, Phil Gianopulos, halfback, Slaughter, halfback, John Calava and Frank Bianchini, tackles, and Tornatore, who played mostly on defense, planted themselves in front of many Gael thrusts.

The closeness of the contest is indicated in the statistics. The Dragons made 12 first downs to eight for the Brothers. The defeated team made 116 net yards while the winners gained 178, although 70 yards were credited to the air lanes.

Jim Church, Gael quarterback, was the only casualty, suffering a cut over his left eye.

CBS Overwhelms Rams, 43-0, Before 1,800 Fans

With their backfield operating with machine like precision behind an aggressive forward wall, the Christian Brothers Gaels scored in every quarter Saturday to overwhelm the Rio Vista High School Rams, 43 to 0. More than 1,800 fans witnessed the fracas, the first of the season on the CBS field.

The losers were on the short end of a 13 to 0 count at half time but fell apart after the intermission. They failed to dent the Gael line, winding up with minus 13 yards from scrimmage, and not once were they able to muster an offense inside their opponent's 40 yard stripe.

Fumble Set Up Score

Coach Ray Clemons' gridders wasted no time in starting the point parade. Shortly after the opening whistle, Len Avila, Ram halfback, fumbled on his own 23 and guard Joe Concannon recovered for the Gaels. Three plays later quarterback Bill Mulderrig completed a pass to Bob Lehtola, senior end, for 19 yards and a touchdown.

Fred Bates, Rio Vista signal caller, elected to gamble midway in the second quarter by calling a fourth down pass. The effort failed and CBS took control on the Ram 34. Fullback John Brereton made one yard off tackle, halfback Pete Vartanian broke loose for 20, and Brereton carried the ball to the six before Johnny Lysaght, burly left half, powered into pay dirt.

CBS threatened several times in the first 24 minutes, only to fumble away opportunities. The second half was a different story.

Pass Is Intercepted

Mulderrig's rifle passes to end Bart Lagomarsino and Brereton paced a drive to the Ram six yard stripe but Manuel Camach, the best Rio Vista on the field, intercepted to stop the thrust.

Two plays later he punted to the Gael 34 where Tommy Mears, diminutive safety, captured the pigskin, cut sharply to his left, picked up a swarm of blockers and galloped 66 yards for the third six pointer. Mulderrig, faking a placement, pitched to Lehtola for the conversion.

The final quarter saw the Ram defense disintegrate as CBS crossed the goal line four times. Dan Lahey, line backing center, snared a Rio Vista pass and was hauled down 10 yards short of the end zone. Mulderrig went all the way on two quarterback sneaks to make the score 25 to 0.

23 Yard Punt Return

Mears started the parade to the fifth touchdown with a dazzling 23 yard punt return. Larry Cloney, reserve halfback, capped the subsequent 41 yard drive with a 16 yard dash around end.

Moments later the Brothers had the ball again. Lysaght threw to Jim Winchell, sophomore flankman, for 29 yards to put the oval on the visitors' five. John Sinor, substitute fullback, carried it across.

The last tally came just as the gun ended the debacle. Lahey came up with his third interception and lumbered 27 yards into the end zone.

Clemons used every griddy on the bench with the intention of keeping down the score and giving his youngsters needed experience. He succeeded only in the latter.

Rams' Offensive Weak

Sam Martorello, 195 pound guard, and Burt Blackwelder, veteran end, made the majority of Ram tackles, while Camach and Avila led what little offense their team could muster.

For the winners, tackles Ray Molina and Joe Crane and guard Marvin Neves sparked the rugged line play. Vartanian's running showed no signs of the leg ailment which bothered him last week, while Mears returned six punts 128 yards. The Gael overhead game, with Mulderrig and Jim Church doing most of the throwing, connected seven times in 20 attempts for 98 yards. The land offense accounted for 191 to bring the net to 289. Only in the conversion department, where they missed six out of seven, did the Blue and White falter.

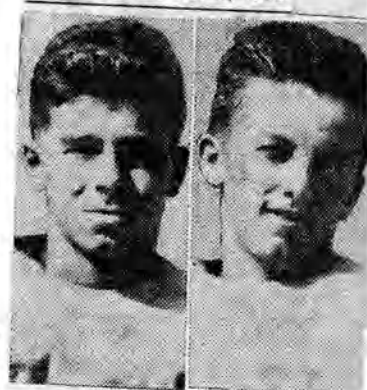

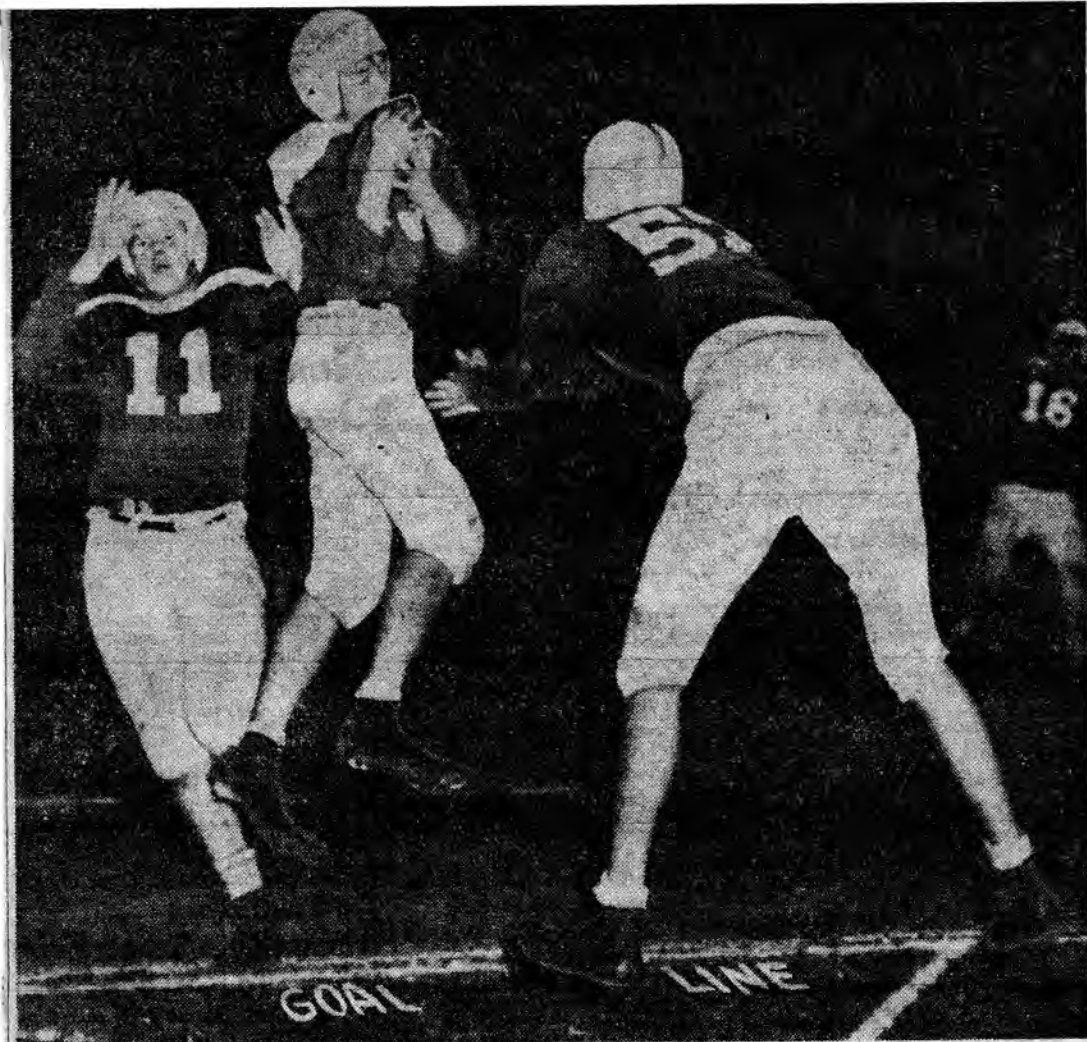

Bob Farmer's Power Paces Lion Eleven In 28-6 Win Over CBS

Bob Farmer, a bulldozing fullback tailored to the Ernie Nevers style, personified the power which swept the C. K. McClatchy High School eleven to a 28 to 6 victory over the Christian Brothers School last night in Hughes Stadium. The 190 pounder rambled

to two touchdowns and set up a third, booted four consecutive extra points and carried the ball 14 times for 165 yards and an 11.3 yard average.

He also ripped off the game's longest run, a 66 yard dash in the second period which broke the back of a valiant Gael club. Until that point, the Brothers actually had been outchargin' the favored Lions and threatening to make a close ball game of it.

Punt Bounces Backward

True, the Red Brigade led, 7 to 0, on a practically outright gift of a touchdown in the first four minutes of play. Bob Lehtola, back to punt with the ball on the 28 yard line, lofted the ball straight upward. It hit on the Gael 40 and bounced crazily backwards, finally winding up on the original line of scrimmage.

In six plays, Farmer and Matt Vujevich alternating the ball packing, the Red Shirts were over. The big gainer was a 13 yard scamper by Vujevich to the two yard line, although he lost the ball en route and teammate Jay Atherton gathered it in to keep possession. Two plays later Matt went over on a quarterback sneak. Farmer added the point.

Following the kickoff, the Gaels put on their best sustained drive of the evening, featured by the hard running of Johnny Lysaght and sophomore Tommy Mears.

Taking the boot on the 11, Mears moved to the 28, and the Broadway gridders were off. Lysaght powered 21 yards, Mears nine, Lysaght four again, and then on a fourth down with eight to go, Mears raced around end for 15 yards to a first down on the Lion 20. Four plays later they wound up on the 22.

Sloppy Ball Handling

The Gaels remained in Lion territory for awhile on two exchanges of fumbles. It might be noted at this point that the ball handling by both teams was sloppy all night. The Lions fumbled seven times, the losers five, and sustained offenses by both teams were stymied by the erratic ball handling.

After the Gaels backed the Lions to their own 14 on a punt, Farmer started wreaking his havoc. Crossing up the Gaels by taking a direct pass from center off the T and spinning over his right tackle, he galloped his aforementioned 66 yards before Lysaght caught him on the Gael 20. Vujevich conducted the ball in from that point, the final stab being a five yard dash around his right end. With Farmer's conversion, the halftime score was 14 to 0.

Lions Clinch Game

The Lions sewed up the issue right after the intermission. Taking the kickoff, they moved 72 yards for a tally. Farmer contributed the last 34 yards on a power drive over tackle and right through the secondary.

A few minutes later he was over the goal again. The Gaels got a bad break when a roughing the kicker penalty against them gave the Lions the ball and a first down on the Brothers' 35. Bob Norris whisked 27 yards around his left end on a reverse from Farmer which completely fooled the Gaels.

Da Prato rambled to the one yard line and Farmer took the ball over.

Coach George Bican's first stringers retired and the Gaels broke into the scoring column with four minutes to play. Johnny Brereton, capping a 60 yard march, boomed down the middle on a 16 yard gallop to a score.

The Gaels might have had another before the march started if an official's whistle had not tooted prematurely. A field goal try by Farmer from the Gael 18 was snatched under a horde of invaders, and Fred Tucker found himself in possession of the ball on the 40 with the goal line ahead and no Lion within 20 yards.

The whistle blew, however. He hesitated and Tom Galli came up to tackle him. So the Gaels drove to a touchdown, anyhow.

A Lion last minute score on a 25 yard pass from Nick Arch to Wayne Spratt was called back because the Lions were offside.

Joe Concannon and Fred Tucker, the Gael guards, played bangup ball games.

Bill Burns and Tiger Orr on offense and Jack Pritchard on defense provided the fireworks in the Lion forward wall.

Joe Concannon, CBS Star, Refuses To Let Flock Of Ill Omens Slow Him

Joe Concannon is the thirteenth of 13 children, born on Friday the thirteenth of October, 1929, one of the depression years.

With a start like that, how could the little son of Erin with the doughty spirit of the Gaels of old let any miscasts by Dame Fortune dismay him in later life?

He took a puny 5 foot 8 inch frame covered by a mere 145 pounds and whipped it into one of the best pieces of guard machinery in Sacramento prep football ranks.

No Business In Line

Joe had hardly any business being a lineman for the Christian Brothers School team in the first place. For a time, when he was a sophomore, Concannon was shifted to quarterback and earned his first football letter in that fashion, despite a severe injury to a leg which handicapped him half of the campaign.

The next season, 1947, he was in the line, the smallest front wall man in the entire area. Yet he was one of the two juniors (the other was Grant Union's Gene Filipski) to be chosen to the first string all city team selected by The Bee and radio station KFBK.

The impetus of his spirited play has transmitted itself this year to the CBS Gaels, enjoying one of their better seasons of recent vintage. And little Joe has stepped naturally into the leader's spot of the behemoths assembled by Coach Ray Clemons.

Joe Goes Wild

In no derogatory sense, Clemons explains: "Joe, normally a quiet, almost shy little fellow, goes wild every time he steps onto a field. Bad? Heck, no. It's good."

The end product of that transformation of character which football produces in little Joe is a slashing brand of line backing and snappy blocking. Joe really can handle the big boys. Ask the goliaths of last year's Sacramento High School team.

He clinched all city honors in that one game against the Dragons by making fully three quarters of all the tackles on the field.

Joe is not the first of the Concannon tribe to go places on the gridiron. Brother Jimmy played a stellar brand of quarterback at the University of Arizona and now is esconced at his alma mater as freshman coach.

Mike was a halfback at Christian Brothers School here, class of '42.

Life Guards, Too

Athletics in the County Cork Concannons did not stop there. Nine of Ma Concannon's brood were or have been life guards. Johnny is one of Sacramento's leading softball pitchers, has submarined his team to the city title the last two years.

Although he has not delved deeply into other sports, aside from sandlot frays, Joe can claim a meas-

ure of baseball fame, too. Last season he was one of the Edmonds Field ground crew which whipped the diamond into shape for the Solons.

Joe will receive his high school diploma in June. He has hopes of going on to a technical school to specialize in learning the ins and outs of a diesel engine. Could be that the football eleven of such a school would inherit a high calibered little guard to keep its grid engine well oiled.—By M. O.
