Fund Raising Appeal Kickoff on May 25

"Kickoff date for starting the Fund Raising Appeal will be May 25, 1978 at the school," announced Ray Clemons, Development Drive Chairman. He stated that "the appeal is meant to meet the rising costs of education and the abiding inflation." This is the first appeal in Christian Brothers 100 year history.

Thanks to the generosity of Christian Brothers Winery of California (\$265,000 for the coming year) and the contributed services of the Christian Brothers of the Sacramento Community (\$100,000), the school is financially sound.

The signals are all too evident that even with these generous subsidies, we still have been forced to raise tuitions to such a point that there is danger of eliminating the community the Christian Brothers as a religious order were founded to serve and to cater to, since it is becoming increasingly difficult for a working man to send his children to private schools. The reason for the appeal is to preserve the character of Christian Brothers School for future generations of Sacramentan youth.

Father Hesburgh, C.S.C., President of Notre Dame University in an interview printed in the New York Times and commenting on the greatness of Notre Dame, said that "Money is the key to excellence in education." Christian Brothers is financially sound and is taking steps now to assure the same high quality of instruction that has been its characteristic. Forceful steps are being taken to assure the continuance of this tradition.


Most students (91%) go on to higher education and follow up studies show a very good achievement record. Christian Brothers graduates remain in California and more importantly in the Sacramento area which makes it a valued community asset.

Flash!

As we went to press, Chairman Ray Clemons reported that a total of \$75,280 has been received in cash and pledges. This is a remarkable sum when you realize that only 38 gifts have been made with only 18 people working in raising these funds.

With 3000 alumni yet to be contacted, let's hope for \$150,000 before May 25.

Before carrying this effort to the community at large, the Administration, Board of Regents, Friends and Alumni will be embarking on a special appeal. Those associated with the Christian Brothers Family understand the reason for this step. They have shared in and gloried in the dramatic progress of Christian Brothers in the 20th Century and now they wish to assure this legacy for many future generations of Sacramento youth. They are building the bridge for the work that lies ahead.

SENIORS GARNER \$ SCHOLARSHIPS

Twenty-four Christian Brothers have received scholarships and grants from the State of California valued up to a quarter of a million dollars over the four years of their college career.

Twenty of the seniors have received State Scholarships. These four year grants pay tuition at the California college or university, public or private, which the student attends. Grants range in value from a high of \$2700 for a private college to lesser amounts for public institutions.

State Scholarships are based on grade point average, scores on the national Scholastic Aptitude Exam, and financial need.

Four seniors of Christian Brothers won College Opportunity Grants which are also sponsored by the State of California. These grants, covering tuition and subsistence amounts up to \$1000, are for low income families where students could not go to college without this help. College Opportunity recipients were Peter Grego, Richard Henning, Felipe Macias and Peter Rosales.

Students who qualified for both scholarships must make a final choice of the one they wish to take by June 1.

Bro Joe Says: "Check Your History" The Students We Serve

A year's work by our staff has produced the whereabouts of 3200 living alumni. There are another 1000 whose addresses or status is presently unknown. Who are these alumni?

Our early class lists show a pattern of Celtic surnames which as time went on broadened to German, Italian and Slavic names. After World War II, population took a dramatic turn when new groups moved into the area. At present the roles of Christian Brothers show 17% of the student body with hispanic surnames. Alumni lists, too, confirm this same pattern for the past 25 years.

Christian Brothers is located in the Oak Park area which is considered low middle class neighborhood. Some of our students come from this area but most commute from longer distances. Presently there are 40 black students in a school population of 700. Since its origin, Christian Brothers has never discriminated on the basis of color , religion or national origin in the selection of students or in the hiring of teachers.

Christian Brothers, true to the ideals of its founder, has traditionally served the sons of working families and the poor. There is no discrimination against the sons of professional people, however, and today 8% of the student body fall in this class.

Christian Brothers has given strong upward mobility to its graduates as our Alumni lists clearly manifest. Today 91% of our graduates go to college and evidence desire for professional as well as vocational careers. Medicine, law, banking, real estate, clergy, teaching are in strong evidence among the alumni as well as a more recent trend toward ecology and nature interests.

The dark days of the depression of the 30's and 40's touched individuals as well as the school. Few students could pay the going rate of the time (\$60 per year) and only a prayer and the determination of the Brothers to hold to their mission to the poor kept the school alive. Many students passed through CBS without paying a penny. And this was at the very time when the Brothers and the Province went completely in hock, all of their properties having gone into receivership, a very dark hour for CBS and the Brothers.

God provided however, and the

wines of the Christian Brothers saved the Province and our educational aims to serve the poor. In fact the Winery still picks up the tab for a quarter of a million dollars each year for the school's funding of students who could not otherwise attend.

Never before have the Brothers appealed directly to the community to ask for help. The Brothers have been reticent to do so. The subsidy from the Winery gave a sense of well being and finances have always seemed to be there. Stable financial administration has kept the school sound.

However today, the Board of Regents has studied the situation and wish to avoid the financial problems which have ravaged other private schools. The Brothers have no intention of abandoning their students for a more affluent clientele. Thus the reason for our appeal to friends, alumni and parents to help us continue our good work.

Summer in Thailand

Brother Ronald, Principal, will be participating in a unique program this summer. He will be teaching school administrators in a Masters program in Thailand. This is part of a project sponsored by the Christian Brothers to upgrade education in developing countries.

The Crop Fast

Students from Christian Brothers participated in a 24 hour fast for hunger sponsored by CROP on April 14 and 15. Students raised over \$4000 for world hunger during the overnight event which included students from Bishop Manogue, St. Francis, Loretto and Mercy.

Brother Hugh (Kennedy) was director of Novices last year. This next year will find him at the Brothers Spiritual Life Center in New Mexico at Santa Fe.


