Fund Drive Gifts Mounting

In early May, Christian Brothers High School made its first appeal for funds. The first phase of this appeal closed on June 30, with a total of \$130,000 from 115 gifts from Alumni and friends for an average gift of \$1130. Fifty of the gifts ranged from \$1000 to \$12,000 and these accounted for \$108,000 of the total.

Organization is presently underway to broaden the base of the appeal to include the 3500 alumni appearing on our lists. Drive Chairman Raymond Clemons, hopes to achieve a goal of \$300,000 during the coming months. The success of the first phase gives all concerned much reason for optimism. September 6 Christian Brothers High School opened its doors for its 103rd year of Catholic education with a full enrollment of 720. Brother Ronald in his seventh year as principal reports many administrative and staff changes for the school year.

Two new administrators are making their second appearance in the Sacramento area. Brother Richard Camara, new dean of students, returns after a 14-year absence. Brother Richard spent a sabbatical in Spain studying language and later in Rome at the Centre Internationale Lasallienne of religious studies. Brother Richard's masters in counseling gives him a good background in handling disciplinary situations.

Brother John Achin, newly appointed dean of activities and public relations had taught at Brothers until 1966. Previously Brother John was the academic vice-principal of San Joaquin Memorial High School in Fresno, the new home of Brother Tom, his predecessor. Brother has a Masters degree from Portland University.

Also joining the administrative team is Mr. James Hughes, a veteran of seven years at Brothers. In his position as dean of studies, Mr. Hughes will supervise scheduling, student placement, teacher assignment and general implementation of the academic program. He will also continue his interest in business courses and career development.

Rejoining the staff after a two year absence is popular Jack Witry who teaches business and math. Witry took a leave to manage business operations for a successful fine food company in the area. Also returning is Brother Terryl Jones, following a year's novitiate and religious studies. Brother is senior moderator, humanities instructor and director of an evaluation pro-

ject of the humanities program.

New members of the religious staff are Brothers Joseph Desimone and Kevin Bernston. Brother Joseph instructs in the american and religious studies program while Brother Kevin is freshman counselor, English instructor and drama moderator.

Justin Meyer: A Wine Maker with Style

Students of the early sixties recall a burly, fun-loving but serious young Brother who taught Spanish, business and religion while coaching basketball and golf and playing the guitar or banjo on the side. His name is Justin Meyer, and he recalls CB with particular fondness.

The popular teacher has since left the Brotherhood and moved his career in a different direction, that of wine maker. The Los Angeles Times wine editor Nathan Chroman was so impressed with Justin that he wrote the following feature on the daring young wine maker:

"There are wine makers with as much style as their wines, like Justin Meyer of the Franciscan Vineyards.

"If you compliment him on his style he would vehemently deny it just as vehemently. I would assert that here is a mine maker who, at a youngish 40, is independent, fun-loving, brilliant and fiercely proud. On top of everything else he is one of California's finest wine makers as confirmed recently by his new wine releases.

"Both his wine and personality andwine-style are just beginning to surface after tours of duty with Christian Brothers and, for the last two and a half years, with Franciscan, a winery that had gone belly-up.

"That Meyer brought the winery back from financial and enological despair is not only a mark of his ability, but also shows a personality that does not wince at a challenge or two.

"To meet him with a glass of Franciscan in hand while singing and strumming his guitar (a favorite pastime) is decidedly different from encountering the quietly confident Joe Concannon, the iconclastic Joe Heitz, the passionate Andre Tchelistcheff, the dynamic Robert Mondavi and the gentle, familial dignity of Louis Martini. If you could bottle all that style, Bacchus himself would buy a case for his own cellar

"When the Franciscan facility, a modern plant only four years old, was

acquired, there were about 200,000 gallons of bulk mine in cooperage on hand. Meyer tasted it, kept some for aging, blending and bottling under the Franciscan name and sold the rest to other wineries.

"After much deliberation, he and his partner, Colorado businessman Ray Duncan, elected to sell the bottled wine and virtually begin anew. The sale of wine at the unheard of price of \$1 a bottle was kind of a joke in the Napa Valley. Consumers, though, bought 30,000 cases and had the pleasure of tasting it first. Meyer himself frequently joked that 'it was the best \$1 bottle of wine in the Napa Valley.'

"The bargain sale, of course, did not endear him to the valley. Some wine makers and local retailer were angry because they may have considered that every bottle of wine sold at \$1 robbed them of a sale of something else.

"Actually, the sale brought much good will to Franciscan (perhaps to the Napa Valley too) as there are many good \$1 bottles of Franciscan gracing tables unable to afford other brands.

"The fun-loving tag, though accurate, really belies Meyer's ability. Indeed, in some wine circles he might be considered overeducated. Few wine makers can boast of a BA in economics from St. Marys College, as well as a BS degree in viticulture and enology from UC Davis topped by a masters in horticulture from the same institution. The grape-growing expertise is decidedly useful in maintaining the more than 1,000 acres the Franciscan partnership controls.

"One of Justin's creation is the Franciscan proprietary wine, Sundance. Appropriately named by Meyer in honor of California's sunny slopes, this is a delightful Muscat wine with a supreme 'Muscatty' nose, extremely full flavored and thoroughly delightful drinking.

"It is a splendid finish to the new Franciscan line from Justin Meyer a highly stylized maverick Napa Valley wine maker, also known in those parts as the Sundance Kid."

Grads Push Stadium

Last week two CB grads were in the forefront of a proposal to promote a 32,000 seat, tri-purpose sports stadium for the Sacramento area.

ing of the signs is correct. What we need are the workers to contact the prospects. I am sure that we will be successful if we get out the workers. That is our program at



Principal Shares Thailand Impressions

As reported in the last Connection, Brother Ronald taught teacher training courses in Thailand this past summer. When asked his impression of the coun-

try, he wrote the following:

Thailand is truly a most fascinating and exotic country - It's serene politeness; it's centuries old religious traditions; it's folk arts, music, and dances; it's fiery achitecture; it's delicately beautiful people - but it is also a country with terrible poverty, an authoritarian system and tradition that stifles creativity; a process of westernization that is endangering the beneficial traditions of the people, and a land with a severe refugee problem.

"Any westerner who approaches Thailand without leaving aside his western prejudices and expectations will be out-of-place and probably, sorely disappointed; but for he who will approach with respect and a willingness to help without dictation, the experience will be one of the most re-

warding in his life."
